Nike Supports UNC Athletics

The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and Nike Inc. signed a new 10-year contract for Nike to be the exclusive supplier of athletic footwear, apparel, and accessory products to the Tar Heels effective July 1, 2008. Nike provides the athletic department with shoes, uniforms, coaching gear, balls and other equipment. In addition to the apparel and equipment, which constitutes the majority of the value of the contract, Nike gives the University \$2 million for the Chancellor's Academic Enhancement Fund. Chancellor Carol Folt has directed the funds to faculty support. Nike also provides support for team tours, travel and the hosting of regular-season tournaments in several sports. The athletic department also received \$1 million for signing the contract, with those funds having been used to overhaul lighting and sound at the Dean E. Smith Center.

Coming off its most successful season in 17 years, the North Carolina men's lacrosse team enters the 2014 campaign with 31 returning letter winners and seven returning starters on the roster. Mentored by 2013 ACC Coach of the Year Joe Breschi, the Tar Heels were 13-4 a year ago while winning its first ACC Tournament championship since 1996.

A year ago, UNC struggled at the beginning of the season, splitting its first six games before catching fire and winning 10 games in a row en route to sharing the ACC regular-season championship and then winning the ACC Tournament crown with exhilarating wins over Duke 18-17 and Virginia 16-13. The Tar Heels made their seventh straight NCAA Tournament appearance, beating Patriot League champion Lehigh 16-7 in the first round before suffering a heartbreaking 12-11 loss in the quarterfinals to Denver despite leading by six goals in the first half.

Gone from last year's team are eight seniors. Three of those players were in the regular rotation for the Tar Heels last year. Marcus Holman was a Tewaaraton Trophy finalist, ACC Offensive Player of the Year and first-team All-America. He finished as Carolina's all-time points leader. Holman led the Tar Heels in 2013 with 80 points on 37 goals and 43 assists. Two other starters must also be replaced – midfielder Davey Emala and close defenseman Kieran McDonald. Emala was UNC's fifth leading scorer last year with 27 points (21 goals, 6 assists). He was at his best in the ACC Tournament and in Carolina's regular-season overtime win over Johns Hopkins. McDonald

had a spectacular senior year on defense, starting all 17 games and scoring his first career goal. He led UNC with 27 caused turnovers and was second in ground balls with 66.

The Tar Heels have an immense amount of returning firepower on the offensive end and every player who filled a significant role in the short stick defensive midfield, long stick defensive midfield, close defense, face-off unit and in the goal all return with the exception of McDonald.

The attack unit will be led by juniors Joey Sankey and Jimmy Bitter, both preseason All-America selections by Face-Off Yearbook. Sankey had 56 points last year on 36 goals and 20 assists while Bitter had 52 points on 32 goals and 20 assists. Sankey and Bitter are the first two players in UNC history to reach 50 goals in their careers by the end of their sophomore years. Sophomore Patrick Kelly also returns in the attack unit after scoring six goals last year.

Preseason first-team All-America Chad Tutton will lead a stacked offensive midfield. The Canadian had 35 points last year on 28 goals and seven assists. Other returnees in the offensive midfield include sophomore Steve Pontrello (12 goals, 1 assist), sophomore Spencer Parks (9 goals, 1 assist), senior Pat Foster (5 goals, 2 assists), senior T.J. Kemp (4 goals, 2 assists), junior Walker Chafee (3 goals) and a pair of players who red-shirted last year, junior Duncan Hutchins and freshman Michael Tagliaferri.

Carolina is very deep at the short-stick defensive midfield position, led by a trio of senior captains – Ryan Creighton, Greg

McBride and Campbell Wood. Creighton had 11 goals and three assists last year to go with 22 ground balls and nine caused turnovers. Fifth-year senior McBride had two goals, eight assists, 17 ground balls and seven caused turnovers. Other key players in the short stick defensive midfield return in the form of sophomore Jake Matthai (4 goals, 2 assists, 10 ground balls) and senior Mark McNeill (2 goals, 1 assists, 20 ground balls).

Sophomore Kieran Burke returns in the goal for the Tar Heels after a spectacular freshman campaign in which he was named the ACC Defensive Player of the Week on three occasions. The first freshman to start in goal for UNC since 2002, he had 199 saves and a .545 save percentage while posting a 12-4 goalkeeper record.

Returning starters on close defense for UNC are senior

Ryan Kilpatrick (36 ground balls, 8 caused turnovers) and junior Matt Shannon (22 ground balls, 10 caused turnovers) as well as sophomore Zach Powers.

The entire face-off corps also returns led by senior R.G. Keenan, a first-team All-America in 2012. Last year Keenan won 198 of 374 face-offs and led the Tar Heels in ground balls with 111. He had five goals and three assists and scored the game-winner in overtime against Johns Hopkins and tallied twice in the ACC Tournament championship game win over Virginia. Senior Frankie Kelly and sophomore Brent Armstrong also return as key elements of the face-off game.

The Tar Heels are also expected to get contributions from a talented freshman class that was ranked No. 3 in the annual Inside Lacrosse Rankings. Nine of the 10 true freshmen were ranked in the IL Top 100 recruits in the Class of 2013. Five were Under Armour All-Americans.

Carolina was picked to finish in a tie for second place in the ACC preseason coaches' poll and is ranked third nationally heading into the season by Face-Off Yearbook. The expanded ACC schedule will add games against Syracuse and Notre Dame to games against Maryland, Virginia and Duke. The non-conference schedule is headed up by Princeton, Johns Hopkins, Harvard and Bucknell.

HEAD COACH JOE BRESCHI 6th SEASON

Joe Breschi's coaching philosophy is summed up in three words • FAMILY • ACADEMICS • LACROSSE. Now in his sixth year as the head coach of North Carolina's men's lacrosse program, Breschi has installed that philosophy at every level of the program and its outreach to alumni, student-athletes, their families and the Chapel Hill community. On the field, in the classroom and in the community, North Carolina men's lacrosse is achieving at the

highest levels and the credit for that goes to Breschi, one of the brightest minds in collegiate coaching circles.

Breschi, a 1990 Carolina alumnus and former assistant coach for the Tar Heels, became the 12th head lacrosse coach in Carolina history on June 18, 2008. Breschi came to Chapel Hill from Ohio State where he had served as the head coach for the previous 11 seasons. He hit the ground running and his first recruiting class, which enrolled in August 2010, was ranked No. 1 in the nation by Inside Lacrosse Magazine. His past three recruiting classes have been tabbed as No. 2, No. 1 and No. 3, respectively, as his recruiting efforts have built a strong foundation for UNC's future in the sport. With those classes in place, Breschi and his staff know that they have put the Tar Heel program on sound footing talent wise and these young men have also achieved at high levels in the classroom while being community service leaders on the UNC campus.

The 2013 Tar Heels won the ACC regular season and tournament championships, the latter for the first time since 1996. Finishing at 13-4, UNC reached the NCAA quarterfinals and was ranked #1 in the final USILA coaches poll. Eighteen Tar Heel lacrosse players were named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll, eight to the All-ACC Academic Team for men's lacrosse and the Tar Heel program was one of three sports on campus to win an ACC Top Six For Service award from the conference. Senior attackman Marcus Holman was UNC's first Tewaaratron Trophy finalist since 2004 and graduated as Carolina's all-time leading scorer. Breschi also notched his second ACC Coach of the Year honor.

In 2012, Carolina advanced to the ACC Tournament championship game for only the second time since 1996. The second half of the season was a strong one for the Tar Heels and Carolina featured one of the most improved offenses in the nation. Eighteen UNC players were named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll. In 2011, Carolina had the ACC Freshman of the Year for the second straight season while six UNC players were named All-America and three were tapped for All-ACC accolades. Fifteen Tar Heels were named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll and Carolina placed a school record eight players on the All-ACC Academic Team.

The Tar Heels have advanced to the NCAA Tournament and achieved double-digit win totals in each of his five years as the head coach. He is the first UNC coach in history to have double digit win seasons in his first five years. In 2010, Breschi led the Tar Heels to a 13-win season, matching the fourth most wins in a season in school history, and the most wins since 1993. Carolina grabbed a share of the ACC regular-season title for the first time since 2003 and advanced to the NCAA Tournament quarterfinals for the second straight year. Carolina opened the season with 10 straight wins, its longest winning streak since 1991. Breschi guided his team to the national lead in extra-man offense and he saw attackmen Billy Bitter and Marcus Holman be named the ACC Player of the Year and the ACC Freshman of the Year, respectively, the first time in 14 and 12 years, respectively, that UNC won those awards. Carolina's final poll ranking of No. 4 was its best since the 1996 campaign. Eighteen Tar Heels were named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll and seven were named to the All-ACC Academic Lacrosse Team. For his efforts, Breschi was deservedly named the ACC Coach of the Year.

In his first year at Carolina in 2009, he led the Tar Heels to a 12-6 overall record and a spot in the NCAA quarterfinals. The Tar Heels won their first game in the ACC Tournament in 13 years and they fell just one goal shy of reaching their first Final Four in 16 years. Nineteen Tar Heels were named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll and 10 made the Dean's List during the spring semester of 2009.

Breschi was an assistant coach at UNC and Brown University for seven seasons prior to his stint in Columbus with the Buckeyes and he has 23 seasons of collegiate coaching experience overall entering the 2014 campaign. Breschi has accomplished much in his life for a man a mere 45 years young.

A native of Baltimore, Md., and a 1986 alumnus of the Loyola-Blakefield School, Breschi compiled a 92-63 overall record in his 11 years at OSU along with a 34-18 regular-season Great Western Lacrosse League mark. The Buckeyes shared GWLL regular-season titles in 1999, 2003 and 2008 and won the conference championship outright in 2004. The Buckeyes had seven winning seasons in Breschi's last eight years and made NCAA Tournament appearances in 2003, 2004 and 2008. Taking over a non-scholarship program in 1997, Breschi built the OSU program to prominence from scratch. Along the way, Ohio State had three double-figure winning seasons, going 10-3 in 1999, 12-4 in 2004 and 11-6 in 2008, when the program had its most significant wins in its history.

Immediately prior to moving to Chapel Hill, in Breschi's 11th season at OSU, the Buckeyes enjoyed their most successful campaign. Ohio State won its first NCAA Tournament game in history by defeating No. 8-seeded Cornell 15-7 in the NCAA first round on the Big Red's home field. The Buckeyes shared the GWLL regular-season title and reached the finals of the first-ever GWLL Tournament.

Four Buckeyes were named All-Americans in 2008, including second-team attackman Kevin Buchanan, who was also the fifth pick in the 2008 Major League Lacrosse draft. Four Buckeyes were GWLL first-team selections in 2008 and another four were second-team choices. He coached Ohio State players to 128 academic All-Big Ten honors and 217 Ohio State Scholar-Athlete awards in his 11 seasons at Columbus. Breschi was a three-time GWLL coach of the year selection in 1999, 2003 and 2004.

In his first five seasons at Carolina, he has had players earn 26 All-America citations and 11 All-ACC awards. Attackman Billy Bitter was named a first-team All-America in 2009, Carolina's first choice since 2005. He repeated as a first-team All-America in 2010. Ryan Flanagan earned first-team All-America accolades as well in 2010. He also was named the co-winner of the Schmeisser Memorial Cup from the USILA as the nation's top defenseman. It was UNC's first major USILA award winner in 14 years and its first Schmeisser Cup recipient in 19 seasons. In 2012, R.G. Keen-

Success at North Carolina came not only as a coach for Breschi, but also as a player. He was an All-ACC selection in both 1989 and 1990 and was selected to play in the prestigious USILA North-South All-Star game in 1990. He was a first-team All-America pick on defense in 1990 and an honorable mention All-America in 1989. He was elected the sole team captain in 1990. Carolina has elected a single captain only three times since 1981 and Breschi's senior year was one of those occurrences.

After leading the Tar Heels his senior season to the NCAA semifinals and an ACC title, Breschi was selected as UNC's nominee for the 1990 Anthony J. McKevlin Award, given annually to the outstanding male athlete in the ACC. In 2002, Breschi was named to the prestigious ACC 50th Anniversary Men's Lacrosse Team, honoring the Top 50 players in league history. He was a member of U.S. National Teams that played in the World Lacrosse Games in 1994 and 1998. Breschi earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in communications from Carolina in 1990.

Breschi and his wife Julie have five children, the late Michael Breschi, as well as four amazing daughters, Samantha, 12, Abigail, 10, Lucy, 8, and Emily, 7.

**Michael R. Breschi Scholarship Fund**

Since the Michael R. Breschi Scholarship fund was created, hundreds of contributions have come from more than half the states in the Union. The scholarship is awarded annually to an Ohio State lacrosse player – most likely a rising senior — who fits former head coach Joe Breschi's criteria.

"It was started in memory of Michael and what he meant to me and my family in the three and a half years that he was with us," Breschi said. "And it's a way to keep his memory alive in all of us, in the Ohio State program and in what I did at Ohio State. And it's a tribute to him and an opportunity to give to a young man who exemplifies the spirit of Michael."

Ohio State and North Carolina annually compete in a fall scrimmage in Baltimore, Md., to benefit the scholarship fund. Ohio State senior defenseman Joe Meurer is the recipient of the 2013-14 scholarship.

OFFENSIVE & RECRUITING COORDINATOR PAT MYERS 6th SEASON

Pat Myers, one of the brightest young minds in collegiate lacrosse coaching, was promoted to the position of associate head coach of the Tar Heel men's lacrosse program in the summer of 2013. Myers is now in his sixth year overall at Carolina where he serves as offensive coordinator and recruiting coordinator.

In addition to possessing a stellar offensive mind, Myers is considered one of the nation's top recruiting coordinators. Over

the past four years, Myers spearheaded recruiting efforts that brought in the nation's No. 1-ranked recruiting class in 2010, the No. 2-ranked recruiting class in 2011, the No. 1-ranked recruiting class in 2012 and the No. 3-ranked recruiting class in 2013 based on ratings by Inside Lacrosse Magazine.

In 2013, Myers directed the most dynamic offense at Carolina in almost two decades as Carolina claimed its first ACC title since 1996. Carolina was fourth in the nation in scoring at 13.35 goals per game, the highest average for a Tar Heel team in 17 years. Four of Carolina's chief offensive weapons were named All-Americans – Marcus Holman, Joey Sankey, Chad Tutton and Jimmy Bitter. Holman was the ACC Tournament MVP, ACC Offensive Player of the Year and Tewaaraton Trophy finalist. He and Sankey were both named All-ACC. Holman finished his career as Carolina's career scoring leader as UNC finished the regular season No. 1 in the USILA coaches poll.

Under the direction of Myers, Carolina's offense took a quantum leap in 2012. The Tar Heels averaged 12.18 goals per game, an improvement of nearly two goals a game over the 2011 total. Attackman Marcus Holman had one of the great seasons in UNC history with 39 goals and 35 assists. Three Tar Heel freshmen — Jimmy Bitter, Joey Sankey and Chad Tutton — combined for 69 goals and 42 assists. All three made the All-ACC Tournament Team, the first time three first-year players had ever made the team in the same year.

As the team's offensive coordinator, Myers saw the Tar Heels score a robust 11.56 goals per game in 2010 with a team concept that produced assists on 65.4 percent of UNC goals. Myers also coached an extra-man offense unit that led the nation at 55.1 percent, scoring on 27 of 49 opportunities. That was the second best EMO percentage in school history. He helped the Tar Heels post 13 wins, equaling the fourth highest victory total in Tar Heel lore and the most in 17 seasons. His offense featured ACC Player of the Year Billy Bitter (UNC's first since 1996) and ACC Freshman of the Year Marcus Holman (UNC's first since 1998). Bitter also made first-team All-America for the second straight year. In his initial season in 2009, Myers was a key part of the reason the Tar Heels reached a 12-win total, won an ACC Tournament game for the first time in 13 years and came within a single goal of making the NCAA Final Four for the first time in 16 years. Myers led an offense that scored 12.47 goals per game, the third highest scoring average in the nation. UNC ranked second in assists per game at 7.72 and first-team All-America attackman Billy Bitter was the nation's fourth-ranked point producer at 3.94 per contest.

Myers had been the offensive coordinator and head assistant coach at Bucknell for three seasons when he was tapped for the same posts at

North Carolina in August 2008.

Myers came to Chapel Hill after completing assistant coaching stints at three schools – Bucknell, Cornell and Ohio State. Myers was a standout lacrosse player at OSU from 2000-03 and was recruited to be a Buckeye by Breschi during his head coaching tenure there.

Myers earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in Sport and Leisure Studies in June 2003 with a specialization in coaching and leisure management. He was a four-year Dean's List student at Ohio State and was named an Ohio State Scholar-Athlete. He was named to the Academic All-Big Ten honor squad three successive years from 2001-03.

A native of Maine, Myers was the volunteer assistant coach under Breschi at Ohio State in 2004, an assistant coach at Cornell University in 2005 and the offensive coordinator at Bucknell from 2006-08. At Bucknell, he was also the head assistant coach, the recruiting coordinator, the strength and conditioning supervisor and the academic monitor on the Bison staff.

In 2008, Bucknell matched its highest USILA ranking in school history at No. 9. In 2007, Bucknell finished 11-4 and achieved a ranking of 11th nationally. In his first year on the Bucknell staff in 2006, Myers helped lead the Bison to an upset of top-ranked Maryland, the first-ever win in Bucknell history over a No. 1-ranked team. Myers coordinated an offense at Bucknell that produced back-to-back Patriot League Rookies of the Year – Joe Mele and Austin Winter – and also aided Winter in winning All-America accolades in 2008.

Prior to his stint in Lewisburg, Pa., Myers was an assistant coach at Cornell in 2005 when the Big Red went 11-3 overall and 6-0 in the Ivy League. The Big Red reached the NCAA quarterfinals that season and had its highest regular-season ranking in 18 years when Cornell reached No. 3 in the nation. The 2005 squad was also the first Big Red team to go undefeated in the Ivy League since 1987. Myers assisted in coordinating an offense that averaged 12.08 goals per game, ranking No. 3 in the nation in scoring offense.

After playing at Ohio State, Myers spent a season on the staff there as the volunteer assistant coach. The Buckeyes went 12-4 that season, achieved a record of 5-0 in the Great Western Lacrosse League while winning the league title, earned an NCAA Tournament invitation for the first time in history and achieved the highest ranking in Buckeye lacrosse lore at No. 6.

Myers played collegiately at OSU from 2000-03. He was the GWLL's Rookie of the Year in 2000 and a two-time All-GWLL selection in 2002 and 2003. He played in the USILA North-South All-Star Game at the conclusion of the 2003 campaign. In 2005, Myers was one of 120 players selected to try out for Team USA that competed at the 2006 World Games.

The Boston Cannons of Major League Lacrosse selected Myers in the supplemental draft in 2004. He played four seasons for the Cannons from 2004-2007.

In August 2010, Myers married Lauren Bricker. Lauren teaches middle school science at Lucas Middle School in Durham. She completed her master's degree from North Carolina State University in special education in December 2011. Lauren is a 2007 graduate of Bucknell where she competed in track and cross country. The Myers family celebrated the birth of their first child when Ava Elizabeth Myers was born on December 21, 2011.



DIRECTOR OF OPERATIONS JOE MARTIN 1st SEASON

Joe Martin is in his first year as the director of men's lacrosse operations at Carolina. He joined the Tar Heel staff in November 2013 after serving as an assistant lacrosse coach at Western New England University for 11 months. In 2013, WNEU went to the NCAA Division III quarterfinals.

Martin was also an assistant football coach at WNEU for five months, working with wide receivers and quarterbacks. He

received a Bachelor of Science degree in business administration from Western New England in May 2012 with a major in finance and a minor in economics.

A native of Springfield, Mass., Martin had a distinguished four-year career with the Golden Bears as a face-off specialist by winning 439 of 723 (60.3%) attempts and setting the NCAA record for fastest goal to begin a game in five seconds. The Golden Bears compiled an excellent 58-19 record with Martin in the lineup and captured two conference titles. Western New England advanced to the Elite Eight of the NCAA Division III Championship in 2009 and the Sweet 16 in 2012.

As a senior, Martin was selected to the Commonwealth Coast Conference first team for the second time as well as the second teams of the New England Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association and the Eastern College Athletic Conference New England. He played in the 2012 NEILA Senior East-West All-Star Game.



DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR CHRIS FEIFS 5th SEASON

Chris Feifs is now in his fifth season as an assistant coach at Carolina. He serves as the team's defensive coordinator and also coaches the face-off men. He is also the team's travel coordinator.

Feifs, a former player at Maryland and offensive coordinator at VMI, was hired in September 2009 as a full-time assistant coach. Feifs took over for Greg Paradine, who left to become the head coach of the newly started lacrosse program at Lenoir-

Rhyne.

In the summer of 2012, Feifs was promoted to the position of defensive coordinator on the Tar Heel coaching staff. He is one of the brightest young minds on the defensive end of the field in the college game and should thrive in his new position.

Carolina saw great improvement as a defensive unit in 2013 as the Tar Heels won the ACC championship for the first time since 1996 and achieved a No. 1 ranking in the final coaches poll. Feifs coached a comprehensive unit that included only one senior in the mix and in Carolina's up-tempo style of play the Tar Heel defense developed a bend but not break attitude that led to a 13-4 campaign. UNC continued to excel at the face-off X and freshman Kieran Burke was one of the nation's standout goalkeepers.

In Feifs' first year as an assistant coach at UNC, he helped lead the Tar Heels to their most successful season since 1993 as Carolina won 13 games and achieved a No. 4 final national ranking.

Since coming to Carolina, Feifs has worked with UNC's face-off men. In 2012, R.G. Keenan was named a first-team All-America at the face-off position. He was also the first UNC midfielder to make first-team All-America since 1996. Keenan is poised to rewrite all the face-off records at Carolina this season. The Tar Heels are expected to have one of the nation's best face-off units in 2014 with Keenan, Frankie Kelly, Brent Armstrong and Stephen Kelly all poised to contribute.

"I'm thrilled to have Chris Feifs as a member of the Tar Heel lacrosse

family," head coach Joe Breschi says. "Having grown up in the state of North Carolina, Chris has a passion for the game and a tremendous desire to help the Tar Heels continue to build an outstanding overall program, both on and off the field. Chris' character and leadership ability clearly fit the vision I have for the Tar Heel lacrosse program."

Prior to coming to Carolina in 2009, Feifs completed his second year as Coach Jeff Shirk's top assistant at VMI. On July 2, 2007, Feifs was named to the VMI staff as an assistant coach and in the summer of 2008, he was officially given the title of offensive coordinator. In 2008, the Keydets earned their first ever bid to the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference Tournament, reaching the tournament championship game. It was the first post-season conference tournament bid for VMI in 28 years.

"I love the opportunity I have to work at the University of North Carolina and give back to my home state," says Feifs. "Coach Breschi was inspirational throughout my hiring process and had me looking forward to getting involved in all aspects of the program right from the start. I began my tenure in Chapel Hill with great excitement and anticipation and everything that has happened in the first four years have reaffirmed my feelings."

Feifs came to Carolina with the experience of having played in the ACC as an undergraduate. Feifs rounded out his playing career at Maryland when he served as the co-captain of the 2007 team. Feifs was drafted in the 2007 Major League Lacrosse Supplemental Draft when he was taken by the Boston Cannons in the draft's third round. He played for the Cannons under the stewardship of coach Billy Daye, a 1993 UNC graduate.

In May 2007, Feifs received his bachelor's degree in criminal justice from Maryland. He posted a 3.5 grade point average and was a three-time selection to the ACC Academic Honor Roll. Feifs played for the Terrapins from 2004-07. As a senior he started 14 of 15 games and had 15 goals and four assists for 19 points. He scored four goals against Yale that season, including the game-winning goal and he also put up three goals against Johns Hopkins. He was the first-ever recruit from the state of North Carolina for Maryland's program. The Durham native graduated from Riverside High School in 2004. He was coached by Jim Kirkley at Riverside where he was named a two-time high school All-America. He is the son of Helmut and Betsy Feifs.



GOALKEEPER COACH BRIAN HOLMAN 6th SEASON

Brian Holman, a former standout lacrosse player at Johns Hopkins, is now in his sixth year as an assistant coach for the North Carolina men's lacrosse program.

Holman serves as UNC's goalkeeper coach, runs the substitution box and helps coordinate the defense. He also organizes UNC's camps and clinics. Under Holman's guidance, UNC has hosted camps and clinics around the state of North Carolina as well as from coast to coast.

Holman's lacrosse pedigree is a distinguished one indeed as a player and coach. Tar Heel head coach Joe Breschi named Holman as a new assistant coach for the men's lacrosse program in June 2008.

Holman has had an outstanding five years with the program tutoring goalkeepers Grant Zimmerman, James Petracca, Chris Madalon, Steven Rastivo and Kieran Burke as Carolina's goal against average decreased to 9.0 and then below nine goals allowed per game in both 2010 and 2011.

In winning the ACC championship in 2013 and achieving a No. 1 national ranking, Holman oversaw the play of freshman Kieran Burke who had a spectacular season. Burke saved 55 percent of the shots against him and limited UNC opponents to slightly less than 10 goals a game despite the fact the Tar Heels played a very up-tempo style of game which led to a higher number of possessions for both teams. Burke won ACC Defensive Player of the Week honors three times as a freshman.

"I think the world of Brian Holman," says Breschi. "He has great wisdom. He has had two sons play in our program and that makes him a great asset in building relationships with the other parents and making them feel a big part of UNC lacrosse. Brian adds a different dimension to

our staff. He's great working with the goalies."

Holman has been involved in collegiate lacrosse at all levels for the past 35 years as a player, coach and parent.

Holman attended Johns Hopkins and was a member of the Class of 1983. As a player at Hopkins he was a three-time All-America selection and he played in four NCAA Tournament Championship games from 1980-83. As a freshman in 1980 he was part of an NCAA championship team at Johns Hopkins. The Blue Jays finished second in the nation in his final three years at the University.

Holman was an assistant goalkeeper coach and defensive coordinator at Johns Hopkins for seven years, an assistant coach at the Boys' Latin School of Maryland for four years, head coach for five years in the Maryland Youth Lacrosse Association and he served three years as head coach of the Breaker's Club Lacrosse Team in Baltimore, Md.

Brian and his wife, Laurie, are the parents of three spectacular children. Matthew is the oldest at 24 and he attended UMBC for two years where he played goalkeeper for Coach Don Zimmerman's team before transferring to Carolina. He played two years of lacrosse at UNC and graduated in 2012. Marcus, 23, is a Gilman School graduate and was an All-America attackman for the Tar Heel men's lacrosse squad, graduating in 2013 as the school's career scoring leader. He won honors as the ACC Freshman of the Year in 2010 and was elected captain of both the 2012 and 2013 teams. He was a Tewaaraton Trophy finalist in 2013 as well as the ACC Offensive Player of the Year and ACC Tournament MVP. Sydney, 19, graduated from East Chapel Hill High School in 2013. Sydney followed in the footsteps of her older brothers in being an outstanding high school lacrosse player. She is a freshman on Coach Jenny Levy's Tar Heel women's team, the defending national championship squad, and was a Top 10 ranked recruit in the Class of 2013 by Inside Lacrosse Magazine.



Bubba Cunningham, Director of Athletics

Lawrence R. (Bubba) Cunningham is in his third year as the director of athletics at the University of North Carolina. Chancellor Holden Thorp appointed Cunningham, who had been the director of athletics at The University of Tulsa for six years, on October 14, 2011.

In his first years as the Carolina athletic director he has guided the Tar Heel program to back-to-back eighth-place finishes in the Learfield Directors' Cup. The Tar Heels won the NCAA championship in men's soccer in his initial year at the helm and captured the NCAA titles in women's soccer in the fall of 2012 and women's lacrosse in the spring of 2013. The Tar Heels' women's athletic program won the Capital One Cup for the 2012-13 school year. Cunningham also guided the department through a major reorganization that was announced in July 2012 and the unveiling of a long-range strategic plan for the program later in 2012.

Cunningham, 51, officially began his duties at Carolina on November 14, 2011, succeeding Dick Baddour. Cunningham is the seventh director of athletics in UNC history, following Robert A. Fetzer (1923-52), Chuck Erickson (1953-67), Homer Rice (1969-75), Bill Cobey (1976-80), John Swofford (1980-97) and Baddour (1997-2011).

Cunningham is in his 12th year as a Division I director of athletics. In addition to his tenure at Tulsa, he was the AD for three years from 2002-2005 at Ball State University.

He was honored as the 2008-09 FBS Central Region Athletics Director of the Year, an award presented by the National Association of Collegiate

Directors of Athletics.

"Bubba Cunningham is an outstanding choice," Atlantic Coast Conference commissioner and former UNC A.D. John Swofford said after the hire. "He is a quality administrator and terrific person. Bubba is a highly respected and proven Athletics Director who will fit in extremely well at UNC and will be a welcome addition around our ACC table."

Cunningham guided Tulsa through its initial move to Conference USA and spearheaded a \$60 million athletics initiative, which included a \$20 million renovation to Skelly Field at H.A. Chapman Stadium, a goal of \$20 million for an athletics scholarship endowment and \$20 million for coaches' salary endowment.

At Ball State, Cunningham led a program with 19 intercollegiate sports and a budget of \$12.4 million. In his final year, Ball State completed a \$12 million campaign to renovate the football stadium. In raising those funds, Cunningham secured the largest single gift in Ball State athletics history.

From 1988-2002, Cunningham worked in the athletics department at the University of Notre Dame. Cunningham served as associate director of athletics for external affairs from 2000-02. He renegotiated the school's footwear contract, developed a communications and marketing plan, created marketing teams for all 26 varsity sports, increased corporate sponsorship income, created a financial/equity plan for the department and served as chairman of the NCAA Division I Women's Golf Committee.

Cunningham earned his bachelor's and master's degrees in business administration, both from Notre Dame, in 1984 and 1988, respectively. He played on the Irish golf team in 1982-83.

Born in Flint, Mich., and raised in Naples, Fla., Cunningham and his wife, Tina, have four children: Matthew, Michael, John and Sarah.

UNC Athletics Announces Strategic Plan

"We educate and inspire through athletics" - that is the mission statement for the University of North Carolina's department of athletics that is a result of a strategic planning process developed by Bubba Cunningham, who is in his third year as the Tar Heels' director of athletics.

"Our number one priority is for athletics to be part of the educational experience of all students at the University, those who compete in our 28 varsity sports as well as those who do not," says Cunningham. "Athletics provides academic and competitive opportunities for more than 700 students, and is part of a unifying spirit for thousands of other students, faculty, staff and alumni.

"Through competition and achievement, our programs can be a source of inspiration for the student body, the community, our alumni, donors and future generations of Tar Heels."

Early in his tenure as director of athletics, Cunningham appointed a group of executive staff members that began developing a strategic plan that will guide the athletic department's decision-making over the next several years.

The planning team identified four core values for Carolina Athletics – Responsibility, Innovation, Service and Excellence.

Fetzer Field serves as the long-time home of the Tar Heels' men's lacrosse program. In Fetzer Field, the North Carolina men's lacrosse program enjoys one of the premier lacrosse domains in the nation and one of the best home field advantages in the sport. Fetzer Field has been the home to four NCAA championship men's lacrosse teams at Carolina, 22 national championship women's soccer squads, two NCAA title winning men's soccer teams and most recently the 2013 NCAA champion women's lacrosse squad.

Fetzer Field is just a part of the outstanding lacrosse facilities enjoyed by the UNC lacrosse program. Fetzer Field will play host to all Carolina men's lacrosse regular season games this year with the exception of the March 23 matchup with ACC rival Maryland that will be played at Kenan Stadium. Last year, UNC hosted the 2013 ACC Men's Lacrosse Tournament at Kenan Stadium, winning its first league crown since 1996.

Carolina's new locker room facility in the Loudermilk Center for Excellence at the Blue Zone, which opened in the fall of 2011, is a state of the art facility and arguably the finest facility in all of NCAA Division I lacrosse. It not only provides the Tar Heel program with a memorabilia area, coaches locker rooms, film and team meeting room, locker room and laundry area, it also provides access to adjacent facilities for academic support and weight training in the same building.

Fetzer Field, originally built in 1935, underwent significant improvements in 1988. The facility has been host to NCAA men's lacrosse tournament games on numerous occasions, most recently in 2013. It began hosting men's track meets as far back as 1935.

Named for former Tar Heel athletic director and track coach Bob Fetzer, Fetzer Field has been the home of Carolina soccer since 1947, the first

year UNC sponsored a varsity men's soccer team, and Carolina men's lacrosse since 1949, the initial year for that varsity sports program. The women's soccer program was started in 1979 and the women's lacrosse program in 1996. All those sports call Fetzer Field home for their regular-season and post-season tournament games and all four sports are annually ranked among the Top 10 teams in the nation in their respective sports.

Located in the heart of the Carolina campus directly adjacent to Carmichael Arena on South Road (N.C. State Road 54), the facility was completed in 1935 as a Works Project Administration program during the tenure of President Franklin Delano Roosevelt.

The facility's renovations 25 years ago made it one of the most beautiful all-around collegiate venues in the nation. The playing field itself was reworked and leveled, the grandstand was refitted with new aluminum bleachers, a new track was installed, lights were added, two convenient ticket booths were added to the front gate and a computerized scoreboard and message center was installed. Even more recently the facilities' concession areas have been revamped so they are more convenient for fans.

The facility has been home not only to women's and men's soccer NCAA and ACC Championship events, but also numerous ACC Outdoor Track and Field Championships, the North Carolina High School Athletic Association Track and Field Championships, the National Junior Olympics, men's and women's lacrosse and soccer ACC Tournaments and first round, second round, third round, quarterfinal and semifinal action in NCAA tournament play. In the summer of 1996, the facility was the home training site for the U.S. Track and Field Team as it prepared for the Summer Olympic Games in Atlanta.

Directions to Fetzer Field

(Coming from Greensboro, N.C.) take I-85 North/I-40 East to Graham and exit on N.C. 54; go approximately 25 miles to Chapel Hill and take N.C. 54 bypass to Columbia Street exit; go North on Columbia Street to South Road (by Navy ROTC building), turn right and follow South Road to Carmichael Auditorium (field is behind Carmichael).

(Coming from Raleigh, N.C.) follow I-40 West to N.C. 54 at exit 273A; take N.C. 54 about 3 miles to Carmichael Auditorium area.

(Coming from Richmond, Va.) take I-85 South to Durham; a left exit onto U.S. 15-501 South; follow approximately 10 miles to Chapel Hill; pick up N.C. 54 business and follow to Carmichael Auditorium area.

The Humble Beginnings of a Vaunted Program

Lacrosse, a sport invented by Native Americans and played long before European settlers first visited the shores of North America, was first introduced at the University of North Carolina in 1937 on a club sport basis.

The first Carolina teams in the late 1930s used the football team's discarded helmets and cleats while team members bought their own gloves and sticks. The team played its home games on a field across the street from Woollen Gymnasium.

In those days, Carolina played in what was called the Dixie Lacrosse League with fellow conference members Duke, Virginia, Washington & Lee, Loyola College of Maryland and the Washington Lacrosse Club. Albert C. Cornsweet, a 1929 graduate of Brown University, coached the initial Carolina teams of the late 1930s.

Most of the players on those early lacrosse teams worked part-time jobs in order to stay in school. It was the heart of the Great Depression and most college students needed to supplement their incomes. There were some scholarship football players who competed in the sport as well. Rumor has it that Carolina football coach Ray Wolf made his players compete in lacrosse so they'd learn how to run. Wolf had an appreciation of the sport and wanted to use it to his advantage by helping keep his players in shape during the football off-season, knowing lacrosse players competed in a sport where participants ran and ran and then ran some more.

In the late 1940s, the athletic department hired Bill Darden as a member of the business office staff and he also began to coach the lacrosse team at UNC in his extra time. The athletic department, after a brief period of time, officially awarded varsity status to the sport and monogram awards were first granted beginning with the 1949 team, officially making it Carolina's initial varsity unit.

The school was admitted as a member of the U.S. Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association (USILA) in 1950 and has remained a member since that time. The 1951 team featured the program's first All-America player. Nick Sowell was named the first-team All-America goalie that year by the USILA.

After UNC soccer and lacrosse coach Alan Moore left Chapel Hill following the 1953 campaign, the 1954 squad was coached by George Good, a captain in the U.S. Marine Corps who was stationed in Chapel Hill as part of the Naval ROTC program. The 1954 team posted a disappointing 0-6 mark. After just a six-year period from 1949-54, the team's status as a varsity sport at Carolina came to an end. The athletic department at that time began to focus resources on other varsity sports. Recruiting high-level in-state talent was a major issue in trying to compete with league foes like Virginia and Maryland.

For a decade the men's lacrosse program at the University would be relegated to a different existence. A club team existed and played outside competition but was no longer recognized by the athletic department as a varsity program. By no means, however, was lacrosse permanently vanquished to the scrap heap. In fact, a strong club team competed on campus from 1957-63 and although varsity letters were not awarded, the players on that club squad kept lacrosse alive on the

Chapel Hill campus and were key figures in setting the foundation for future greatness.

When Jim Tatum arrived on campus to coach football in the late 1950s, it was a simple gesture by him that helped Carolina maintain a strong presence on the club level. Tatum came to UNC from the University of Maryland, which had one of the nation's most dominant lacrosse teams at the time. Tatum agreed to provide funding for lacrosse equipment from the football budget in return for the club team's commitment to take all willing football players in the spring to keep them in shape.

The existence of the club team helped Tatum recruit Frank Riggs from Baltimore the next year and Riggs went on to be captain of the 1961 football team. He later played for the Mount Washington Lacrosse Club in Baltimore and served as president of United States Lacrosse. Riggs recruited other football players to play on the club team. UNC quarterback Jack Cummings was a member of the club team from the outset. In its formative years, the club played teams from Duke, Washington & Lee, Virginia and Colgate. Arthur Greenbaum, a member of the varsity team under coach Alan Moore in the early 1950s, initially coached the club team.

Permanent Varsity Status Granted to Lacrosse in 1964

Lacrosse was resurrected on a varsity level at Carolina in 1964. UNC wanted to add a varsity sport to improve Carolina's standing in the Carmichael Cup, the annual all-sports trophy in the ACC at that time. Maryland was dominating the Carmichael Cup standings at the time and the Tar Heel administration was determined to give Carolina a better chance to win the award. Even if Carolina's initial intention was to improve the University's Carmichael Cup standing, which it certainly did, the move proved brilliant at a more important level as within 17 years the Heels became a national championship team.

The UNC program competed on the varsity level without awarding athletic scholarships for 10 years after reappearing on campus in varsity form. Carolina upgraded the program with the awarding of scholarships after the hiring of head coach Paul Doty during the summer of 1973. The Tar Heels also transitioned from an NCAA small college program (the equivalent of what is now the Division II and III levels combined) to NCAA Division I status in 1974 with the awarding of those scholarships. Almost immediately the Tar Heels were

competitive with the top teams in the nation.

Despite its rather brief history on campus in comparison to other UNC sports, which date back to the early decades of the 20th century or even the late decades of the 19th century, North Carolina lacrosse has been something very special in its time on campus from 1949-54 and 1964 to the present.

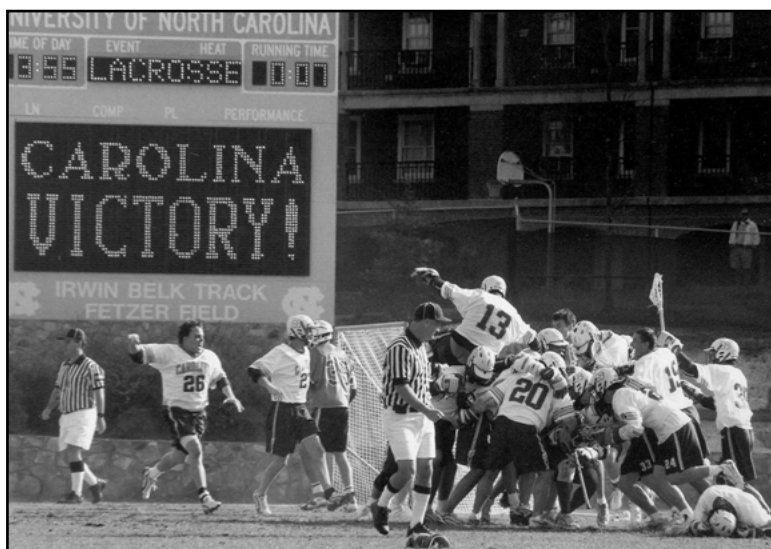
Since 1949 the all-time Tar Heel record stands at 444-273-2. Carolina recorded the 400th victory in school history when Coach Joe Breschi's Tar Heels defeated Lehigh 17-5 on February 20, 2010. Tar Heel teams have won NCAA Division I national championships four times, earning crowns in 1981, 1982, 1986 and 1991. Carolina teams have also captured 12 Atlantic Coast Conference championships—including 11 in a period spanning just 16 seasons from 1981-96. Those championships were won in 1981, 1982, 1985, 1988, 1989, 1990, 1991, 1992, 1993, 1994 and 1996. Carolina returned to the top of the heap in ACC play when the Tar Heels won the 2013 crown with a 16-13 championship game victory over Virginia.

The 1981 and 1982 teams won 26 games in succession, recording one of the longest winning streaks in collegiate lacrosse history. Twenty-eight times since first qualifying in 1976, the Tar Heels have competed in the NCAA Division I Men's Lacrosse Championship. Only four schools (Johns Hopkins, Maryland, Virginia and Syracuse) have played in the NCAA Division I Men's Lacrosse Tournament more often than Carolina has.

Tremendous growth in the program occurred beginning in the late 1960s after the sport gained a foothold in Chapel Hill. After a pair of losing seasons in 1966 and 1967, Jim Bischoff coached the Tar Heels to a vastly improved 7-4 mark in 1968. In addition, at 25th in the final poll, Bischoff's 1968 team was the first Tar Heel squad to earn a post-season national ranking.

Mueller Tutors the Likes of Kramer and Peterson

In 1969, Fred Mueller, a long-time professor in UNC's Department of Exercise and Sports Sci-

ence and a former assistant football coach at UNC, began a successful four-year run as UNC's head coach. The 1970 Tar Heels ranked as Mueller's best team as they finished seventh in the country in the USILA poll with a 9-2 record and won the South Atlantic division championship of the USILA. That team would likely have been the first UNC squad to earn an NCAA Tournament bid but the first championship tournament sponsored by the NCAA came a year later in 1971.

Among Mueller's greatest players was Peter Kramer, who won the C. Markland Kelly, Jr., Memorial Cup as the nation's outstanding goalkeeper in 1969. Attackman Harper Peterson copped honors as a first-team All-America three times in his career and Kramer was a three-time honoree as well.

Ron Miller took over the lacrosse coaching reins on an interim basis for one season in 1973. Miller led the team to a 12-5 record in 1973. Those 12 wins stood as Carolina's school record for victories in a season until the 1982 national championship team broke the mark when it finished with a 14-0 ledger.

Carolina lacrosse entered a new era in 1973 when the program hired Paul Doty as the first full-time head coach in school history. That same year, the team was elevated to scholarship status with the first athletic grants-in-aid in the sport being awarded during the 1974 season. Doty led UNC to national Top 10 rankings in both 1976 and 1977 and to UNC's first two NCAA Division I Tournament appearances those same two seasons. Another program milestone achieved under Doty's tutelage was Carolina's 13-10 win over Virginia during the 1976 season. It marked the first time Carolina had ever defeated either Maryland or Virginia as a varsity team, the two schools which had dominated ACC lacrosse up to that point in time. UNC's first win over Maryland would not come until 1981, however, during another head coach's tenure.

An Era of Excellence under Willie Scroggs

In 1978, UNC turned to the hotbed of college lacrosse, Johns Hopkins University, and hired the Blue Jays' top assistant coach, Willie Scroggs, as the Tar Heels' new head coach. It was a move that bore fruit for a dozen years and led to the glory years of Carolina lacrosse. Scroggs retired from coaching at the end of the 1990 season to become a senior associate athletic director at UNC, ending a brief but brilliant coaching tenure. In 2013, Scroggs was recognized with the Intercollegiate Men's Lacrosse Coaches Association's Creators of the Game Award. Scroggs is retiring from his administrative role in the athletic department in the summer of 2014.

The initial decision to pursue Scroggs was made by Tar Heel athletic director Bill Cobey whose philosophy was that a person needed to go to the best programs in the sport and recruit a top assistant coach or existing head coach in order to build a winning program.

Tar Heel teams were 121-37 during the Scroggs era and were invited to the NCAA Tournament 11 straight seasons from 1980 through 1990. In nine of Scroggs' 12 years, UNC made at least the NCAA Tournament semifinal round while the 1981, 1982 and 1986 squads won NCAA Division I championships. The Tar Heels were 17-8 in NCAA post-season play during his tenure. Scroggs' teams won ACC titles in 1981, 1982, 1985, 1988, 1989 and 1990. In addition, the 1982 team finished the season ranked No. 1 in the nation in the final USILA poll while the 1981 squad finished second in the USILA poll.

When Scroggs announced his retirement immediately after Carolina's NCAA semifinal loss to Syracuse in 1990, the University turned to a coaching veteran, Dave Klarmann, who had been the chief assistant coach to Scroggs for 11 seasons in Chapel Hill. The move paid off in instantaneous and brilliant results. In Klarmann's first season at the helm of the Tar Heels, he led the team to a 16-0 record and the 1991 NCAA and ACC championships. That team also finished first in the USILA poll for only the second time in school history.

After an ACC championship and an appearance in the NCAA semifinals in 1992, the Tar Heels had another banner season the following year. In 1993, the Tar Heels again finished first in the USILA national coaches' poll, marking the second such regular season finish in Klarmann's coaching tenure and the third time it happened in the history of Tar Heel lacrosse. Carolina also advanced to the NCAA championship game for the fifth time in history in 1993, dropping a 13-12 decision to Syracuse. In 1994, UNC won its seventh straight ACC crown. Carolina won the ACC title again in 1996 as Carolina routed Duke in the semifinals and upset eventual NCAA finalist Virginia to claim the crown behind a brilliant goalkeeping performance by Brooks Brown.

Klarmann resigned from his coaching position following the 2000 season after leading Carolina to five ACC championships in his tenure. In his last game as the Tar Heel head coach in 2000 he earned his 100th career victory as the Tar Heels defeated Lehigh.

Carolina athletic director Dick Baddour then employed the same plan used by Cobey in 1978 and he went again to lacrosse power Johns Hopkins to find the new head coach for the Tar Heels, this time hiring the Blue Jays' two-year head coach, John

Haus, to lead Carolina into the new millennium.

The hiring of Haus proved worthwhile as the Carolina program returned to the NCAA Tournament in 2004 for the first time since 1998, winning its first NCAA game since 1993 in the process. Carolina again played in the NCAA Tournament in 2007, reaching the NCAA quarterfinal round for a second time in four seasons. The Tar Heels reached the NCAA Tournament again in 2008.

At the conclusion of the 2008 season, Haus announced his resignation and he became the director of lacrosse and head men's lacrosse coach at Lebanon Valley College in Annville, Pa., shortly thereafter. Baddour then hired Ohio State head coach Joe Breschi, a 1990 UNC alumnus, to lead the Tar Heel program. In Breschi's first season at the helm, the Tar Heels reached the NCAA quarterfinal round, won 12 games in a season for the first time since 1996 and won an ACC Tournament game for the first time in 13 years. The 2010 campaign was even more successful as the Tar Heels opened the season with 10 straight wins and finished 13-3 and ranked No. 4 in the nation. The 13 wins matched the fourth most in school history and the No. 4 poll ranking was the highest since 1996. Breschi's teams have advanced to NCAA Tournament play in each of his five years at the helm and again advanced to the ACC Tournament championship game in 2012. The 2013 season was a breakthrough year for the Tar Heels under Breschi as Carolina finished 13-4, winning 10 games in a row during the campaign. UNC advanced to the NCAA quarterfinals for the third time in Breschi's five years as head coach. Carolina won the ACC Tournament for the first time since 1996, outlasting Duke 18-17 and Virginia 16-13 in two of the most exciting games in tournament history. UNC also finished the regular season ranked #1 in the USILA coaches poll.

Stellar Play in the NCAA Tournament

In winning four NCAA championships since 1981, Carolina teams have been involved in some

of the most exciting games in the tournament's 42-year history.

In 1981, UNC went through the regular season unbeaten and it was ranked No. 2 in the nation behind three-time defending national champion Johns Hopkins entering the tournament. The Tar Heels recorded lopsided wins over Syracuse and Navy in the first two rounds of the tournament before meeting the unbeaten Blue Jays in the national championship game at Princeton's Palmer Stadium. Before a crowd of 13,943, UNC scored six straight goals in the second half to overcome a three-goal Johns Hopkins advantage as the Heels eventually triumphed by a 14-13 margin.

In 1982, the Tar Heels swept through the regular season unscathed again. In the NCAA Tournament, UNC routed Navy and Cornell, setting up a championship game rematch with Johns Hopkins. In a game dominated by the two teams' defenses, UNC beat the Blue Jays 7-5 behind five goals by junior attackman David Wingate and brilliant goal-keeping by Tom Sears who was the choice as that year's national player of the year.

Carolina's third NCAA championship came in 1986 and it was the most unexpected of the quartet of crowns that have been won by UNC. The Tar Heels were seeded fifth going into the tournament. No team seeded lower than fourth had ever made the championship game prior to the 1986 season and none seeded lower than third had ever won the title. To this day, only three other teams seeded as low as fifth have won the NCAA crown in the history of the tournament.

Ironically, in winning the national championship, the Tar Heels avenged all three of their regular-season losses in the exact same order in which they had lost to those teams earlier in the season. After a 12-10 quarterfinal win at Maryland, UNC headed to the first-ever NCAA men's lacrosse Final Four,

an institution now embedded in the culture of the sport every Memorial Day weekend.

At Newark, Del., Carolina was well prepared for the semifinals and it avenged a 16-4 regular-season loss to two-time defending NCAA champion Johns Hopkins by beating the Blue Jays 10-9 in overtime. Carolina

won the game on senior Mike Tummillo's goal off a Gary Seivold assist a little over two minutes into the extra period. Two days later against Virginia, UNC and the Cavaliers traded the lead throughout the championship contest with neither team ever holding more than a two-goal advantage at any time. Another overtime period was required to settle the issue. Gary Seivold scored an unassisted goal 1:50 into the extra session to give the title to Carolina.

Like the 1981 and 1982 teams, 1991's national championship team finished the season unbeaten. UNC opened NCAA Tournament play by defeating Loyola 11-9 in the quarterfinals at Fetzer Field. Six days later, the Tar Heels handed Syracuse its first NCAA home playoff loss in history as Carolina routed the Orangemen 19-13 at the Carrier Dome.

Two days later against Towson, Carolina led 11-4 at the half and was seemingly in control of the game. But Towson made a huge run in the second half and Carolina saw its lead shrink to a single goal in the fourth quarter before the Tar Heels pulled away to win the game 18-13. The Tar Heel victory was led by senior attackman Dennis Goldstein, the National Player of the Year, who was the championship game's Most Valuable Player. Goldstein led UNC past Syracuse with four goals and he added four goals and four assists in the title game against Towson.

A Bevy of All-America Selections and USILA Award Winners

Over the past 35 seasons, UNC players have earned 157 All-America accolades and 94 All-Atlantic Coast Conference citations.

Eleven Tar Heels have been named ACC Player of the Year — attackman Michael Burnett in 1981, goalkeeper Tom Sears in 1982, defenseman Randy Cox in 1984, attackman Mac Ford in 1985, defenseman Graham Harden in 1991, defenseman Alex Martin in 1992, midfielder Ryan Wade in both 1993 and 1994, midfielder Jason Wade in 1996, attackman Billy Bitter in 2010 and attackman Marcus Holman in 2013.

Scroggs was tapped as ACC Coach of the Year in 1988 and Klarmann won the same honor in 1991, 1993, 1994 and 1996. Current head coach Joe Breschi earned the award in 2010 and 2013. In 1989, midfielder Jim Buczek was named as the ACC Freshman of the Year. Attackman Jeff Sonke won the same award in 1998 and attackmen Marcus Holman and Nicky Galasso won the award in back-to-back years in 2010 and 2011. Eight ACC Tournament Most Valuable Players have been Tar Heels — attackman Michael Thomas in 1989, defenseman Joe Breschi in 1990, attackman Dennis Goldstein in 1991, attackman John Webster in 1992, attackman Dan Levy in 1993, goalkeeper Rocco D'Andrea in 1994, goalkeeper Brooks Brown in 1996 and attackman Marcus Holman in 2013.

Carolina has had at least one first-team All-America selection in 22 of 35 seasons since 1979. In 1981, 1991 and 1993, UNC had three first-team selections and the 1984, 1985, 1992, 1996, 2004 and 2010 squads had two each. In 1982, five of the 11 players named to the first-team All-America squad were Tar Heels, a rather astounding feat.

Peter Kramer started Carolina's long list of USILA award winners when he won the C. Markland

Kelly, Jr. Memorial Cup as the nation's top goalie in 1969. In 1981 and 1982, Tom Sears won the Kelly Award as the nation's outstanding goalkeeper. In 1982, he also captured the Enners Award as the National Player of the Year and the Brine Award as the outstanding player in the NCAA championship game.

A year later, in 1983, Peter Voelkel won the McLaughlin Award as the nation's outstanding midfielder. In 1984, Tom Haus won the first of his three Schmeisser Cups as the nation's outstanding defensive player. He went on to win the Schmeisser Cup again in 1986 and 1987. In 1986, Haus was also tapped for the Enners Award as National Player of the Year. Gary Seivold's two-goal, two-assist effort in the 1986 NCAA championship game win earned him the Brine Award as the game's Most Valuable Player.

Carolina added to that jackpot of top awards during the 1991 season. The USILA tapped Goldstein as the National Player of the Year as well as the MVP of the NCAA championship game after scoring four goals and adding four assists in the 18-13 victory over Towson. Graham Harden captured the Schmeisser Cup as the top defenseman in the nation and Andy Piazza became the first Tar Heel to win the Kelly Award as the nation's top goalie since Sears won the honor in 1982.

In 1992, Jim Buczek won the McLaughlin Award as the nation's top midfielder. A year later, the USILA honored Ryan Wade as the top midfielder in America. Ryan Wade's younger brother, Jason Wade, won the McLaughlin Award as the nation's top midfielder performer in 1996.

In 2010, Ryan Flanagan became the first Tar Heel in 14 years to win one of the USILA's top individual awards. The junior defenseman won the Schmeisser Memorial Cup as the nation's top defender.

He was the first Tar Heel to capture the Schmeisser Cup since 1991. Scroggs was named National Coach of the Year in 1981 by the USILA and he was an assistant coach for the U.S. team that won the title at the 1982 World Lacrosse Games in Baltimore. Sears was the starting goalkeeper for that U.S. team and

was named the All-World goalie. Midfielder Joey Seivold, '87, and defenseman Randy Cox, '84, both played on the U.S. team that won the title at the 1986 World Lacrosse Games in Toronto. Three other Tar Heels, Steve Stenersen, '82, Peter Voelkel, '83, and Mac Ford, '85, were alternates on that team.

Mac Ford went on to play on the U.S. team that swept the title at the 1990 World Lacrosse Games in Perth, Australia. He was named the top attackman in the tournament. UNC midfielder Robin Cornish, a Perth native, competed in the 1990 World Games as a middle on the Aussie squad. Carolina sent two representatives to the 1994 World Lacrosse Games in Manchester, England as the Americans won yet again. UNC defenseman Joe Breschi, '90, and midfielder Ryan Wade, '94, played major roles for the U.S. team. The World Lacrosse Games returned to the United States again in 1998 and both Breschi and Wade made return engagements as members of the American team. More recently in the summer of 2005, four Tar Heel players were invited to the U.S. National Team tryouts for the 2006 World Lacrosse Championship. The quartet including goalkeeper Billy Daye, '93, attackman Jeff Sonke, '01, attackman Jed Prossner, '05, and defenseman Stephen McEliduff, '06. Two Tar Heels

are still in contention for roster spots for the 2014 U.S. Team for the World Lacrosse Games – attackman Marcus Holman, '13, and midfielder Ben Hunt, '09. UNC alumnus Richie Meade, '76, will coach the U.S. Team in the World Lacrosse Games.

A Legacy of Great Players

In 1979, defenseman Ralph "Rip" Davy, who passed away at a young age in 2008, became the first Tar Heel to be named a first-team All-America under coach Willie Scroggs. Midfielder Kevin Griswold earned similar honors a year later and was a key player on the 1981 and '82 title teams. Defenseman Gary Burns, '82, was named to All-America teams on three occasions and now works for the Educational Foundation, raising funds for Carolina athletic scholarships. Midfielder Doug Hall was a hero of the 1981 NCAA championship game victory, scoring three goals, and he was a first-team All-America that season.

Jeff Homire, another midfielder, was a first-team All-America in 1982. Chris Walker, '87, was a three-time All-America selection on defense. He played much of his career with the talented Boyd Harden, a first-team All-America in 1988. The brothers Seivold, Joey a midfielder and Gary an attackman, both of whom graduated in 1987, won USILA All-America honors each of their four years while wearing the Carolina Blue and White. Another standout defenseman was Joe Breschi, who led Tar Heel teams to the NCAA semifinals in both 1989 and '90 and is now in his sixth year as head coach of the Tar Heels.

In 1993, the Tar Heels said good-bye to a quartet of outstanding talents. Attackman John Webster left Carolina amongst career leaders in goals (109), assists (79) and points (188). Midfielder Donnie McNichol had a team-leading 109 ground balls in 1993. In addition, his .740 face-off percentage established a school record for a single season. Defensemen Alex Martin and Greg Paradine were also spectacular players of the early 1990s. Both were first-team All-America choices. The 1996 senior class included the likes of first-team All-America midfielders Jude Collins and Jason Wade. Attackman Jeff Sonke was a second-team choice in 2000 and 2001 on attack.

Jed Prossner earned first-team All-America honors in 2004, the first UNC attackman to win them since Dennis Goldstein in 1991. Ronnie Staines was a first-team All-America on defense in 2004, the first Tar Heel defender since Paradine and Martin won first-team accolades on defense in 1993. Prossner went on to be named a first-team All-America attackman again in 2005, so honored despite a 5-8 UNC record. Prossner was only the third Tar Heel attackman in history to win first-team All-America in two or more years, joining Harper Peterson and Michael Burnett. In 2010, Billy Bitter became the third UNC attackman in history to win first-team All-America honors twice.

Prossner, who was the second overall pick in the 2005 Major Lacrosse League draft, also won All-ACC honors in 2005 for the

third straight year. No Tar Heel had made the All-ACC team three years in a row since 1983 when Peter Voelkel did so. Billy Bitter followed that up by being named All-ACC three straight years from 2009-11.

Prossner and fellow 2005 senior Mike McCall finished their careers as two of the most prolific goal scorers in Carolina history. Prossner scored 113 goals to rank No. 2 in UNC history while McCall scored 102 goals to move him into a tie for No. 6 on the career chart. Prossner was also the first lacrosse player in history to win the Patterson Medal as UNC's top senior male athlete. Senior goalkeeper Paul Spellman also broke the UNC career record for saves in 2005, smashing the mark that had stood since 1983 when Tom Sears established it.

Marcus Holman, '13, was a Tewaaraton Trophy finalist in his senior year, joining Prossner (2004) as the only two Tar Heels to be named finalists. Holman was ACC Player of the Year and ACC Tournament MVP as a senior when he broke Bruce Ledwith's 40-year-old record for career points.

15 Tar Heels Named to ACC Top 50 Team

Six Tar Heels have been inducted into the U.S. Lacrosse Hall of Fame—former head coach Willie Scroggs in 2003, three-time national defenseman of the year Tom Haus in 2005, star goalkeeper Tom Sears in 2007, a pair of dynamic attackmen in 2010 — Michael Burnett and Mac Ford, and midfielder Ryan Wade in 2013.

In 2002, when the ACC announced its Top 50 players in each sport to celebrate a half century of the league's existence, 15 Tar Heel players were tapped amongst the Top 50.

This group included defenseman Joe Breschi, '90, midfielder Jim Buczek, '92, attackman Michael Burnett, '83, defenseman Randy Cox, '84, attackman Mac Ford, '85, attackman Dennis Goldstein, '91, midfielder Kevin Griswold, '82, defenseman Graham Harden, '91, defenseman Tom Haus, '87, attackman Harper Peterson, '70, goalkeeper Tom Sears, '83, midfielder Joey Seivold, '87, midfielder Peter Voelkel, '83, midfielder Jason Wade, '96, and midfielder Ryan Wade, '94.

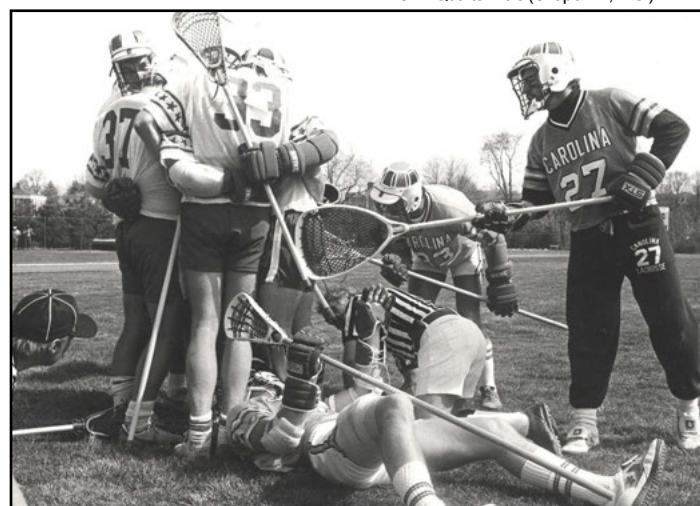

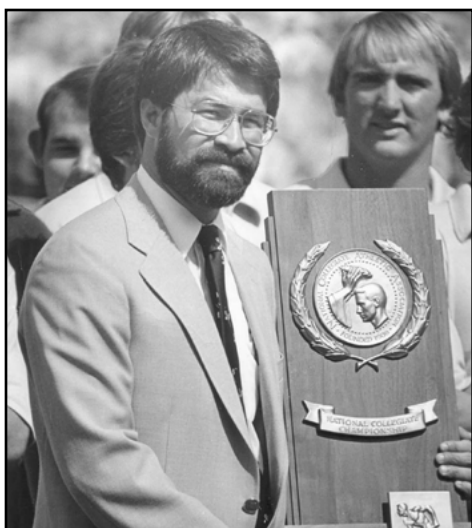

Building character in UNC student-athletes is the main charge of Student-Athlete Development. Through Carolina Outreach, Tar Heels are involved in a variety of projects and organizations on campus and in the community. The UNC Department of Athletics has partnered with Gatorade and the UNC School of Public Health for a national pilot program called Get Kids in Action, in which Tar Heel student-athletes visit local elementary schools to encourage children to exercise. The Carolina Dreams program allows young patients at UNC Children's Hospitals to attend Tar Heel sporting events with UNC student-athletes. Other recent activities have included building a house with Habitat for Humanity, cooking meals at Ronald McDonald House and cleaning up the roadways through the Adopt-a-Highway program.

Student-Athlete Development also seeks to develop student-athletes on a personal level through a variety of speakers who address issues like nutrition, gambling, relationship communication and substance use. Career Development helps UNC student-athletes look beyond college with resources such as career counseling and workshops on resume writing and interviewing skills.

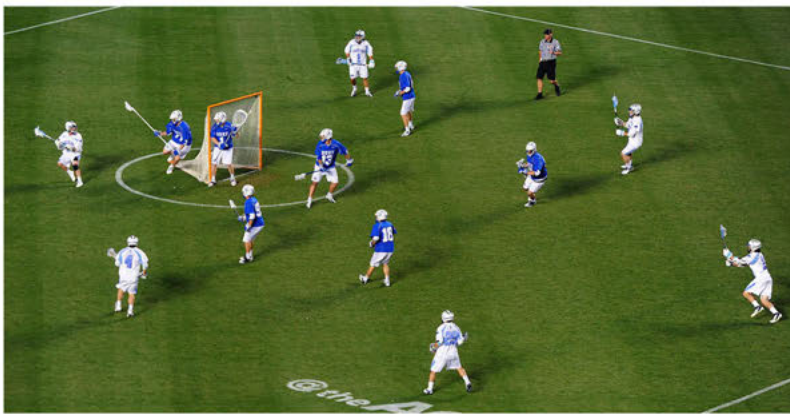
