After passing under the 15-501 overpass, the road will go up a hill. At the top of the hill, take a left at the light onto Country Club Rd. Take the first right onto Ridge Rd. Henry Stadium will be on your right, across from Boshamer Stadium, UNC's baseball field.
- From points north of Chapel Hill: Follow I-85 South to Durham. At exit 174. stay in the left land to get on 15-501 South, which will bring

you into Chapel Hill. Exit 15-501 at the Highway 54 junction, following signs for the UNC campus. At the top of the hill, take a left at the light onto Country Club Rd. Take the first right onto Ridge Rd. Henry Stadium will be on your right, across from Boshamer Stadium, UNC's baseball field.

- From points west of Chapel Hill: Take I-95 North to I-40 East. Follow I-40 to exit 270, which is 15-501 South. See directions from points north.
- From points south of Chapel Hill: Take I-77 North to I-85 North. Follow I-85 North to I-40 East. Follow I-40 East to exit 270, 15-501 South. See directions from points north.

Karen SHELTON Head Coach 32nd Season

Over the course of her 31 years in Chapel Hill, Karen Shelton has built one of the country's finest field hockey programs at the University of North Carolina. Shelton took over as the Tar Heels' head coach in 1981 and since then has led UNC to national prominence in the form of six NCAA Championships, eight NCAA runner-up finishes and 29 winning seasons.

Heading into her 32nd campaign in 2012, Shelton carries a career record of 527-138-9 and

ranks fifth among NCAA coaches in career wins. She earned her 500th career win on Oct. 31, 2010, with a 5-0 win over Radford at home in Francis E. Henry Stadium.

Four times in the past five seasons, Shelton has led Carolina to the NCAA Cham-

pionship game, claiming titles in 2007 and 2009 and finishing as runner-up in 2010 and 2011.

In 2009, Shelton led the Tar Heels to the program's sixth national championship. She was named National Coach of the Year for the fifth time in her career and the second time in a three-year span. Shelton has been honored eight times as Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year and has led the Tar Heels to a league-best 16 ACC titles.

In January of 2008, Shelton was inducted into the National Field Hockey Coach-

es Association Hall of Fame for her achievements as a coach. She was inducted into the USA Field Hockey Hall of Fame in 1989 for her performance as a player.

Born Nov. 14, 1957, in Honolulu, Hawaii, Shelton spent the first 10 years of her life on Army bases across the country. She was in fifth grade when her father retired and the family - Shelton has four brothers and two sisters - moved to Pennsylvania, the cradle of field hockey. At West Chester State, Shelton played on three national championship field hockey teams and one national championship lacrosse team. Three times she was named field hockey's national player of the year, a streak that has never been equaled.

Shelton earned a bachelor's degree in health and physical education in 1979, then spent one year as assistant coach at Franklin & Marshall College before coming to UNC.

She was a member of the U.S. National Team from 1977-84 and started for the squad that won a bronze medal at the Los Angeles Summer Games in 1984. Shelton was U.S. Field Hockey's Athlete of the Year in 1983. In 1999, she was named the Delaware County Field Hockey Athlete of the Millennium by the Delaware County Daily Times.

Throughout her career, Shelton has groomed her players for success after UNC. Carolina student-athletes are high achievers on the field and in the classroom, adding academic honors to All-America accolades. Tar Heels alums are successful in fields such as medicine, coaching, teaching, dentistry, business and finance.

Many of Shelton's players have gone on to represent the U.S. in international play. Six of the 16 players on the U.S. roster at the 2008 Summer Games were from UNC, and three Tar Heels represented the U.S. in 2012, with a fourth serving as the team's alternate. Every U.S. National Team since 1989 has included at least one Tar Heel.

A very visible ambassador for North Carolina and its athletic programs, Shelton was inducted into the Order of the Golden Fleece, a campus honor society, in March of 2002. In 2011, she received UNC's C. Knox Massey Distinguished Service Award in recognition of her longtime service and dedication to the University.

Shelton is married to Willie Scroggs, a senior associate athletic director at UNC who coached the Carolina men's lacrosse team from 1979-90, a span that included three NCAA titles. Their son, William, is a senior at Carolina and a member of the men's lacrosse team.

Grant FULTON Associate Head Coach Eighth Season

Grant Fulton came to Chapel Hill as an assistant coach in the summer of 2005, bringing to Chapel Hill a wealth of international experience as a coach and a player. He was promoted to Associate Head Coach in January of 2010.

Before arriving at Carolina, he spent two years coaching his native South Africa, where he served as an assistant for both the men's and women's national teams. He also has been an assistant coach and player for the University of

Pretoria men's first team. He spent part of 2002 in Canada, where he was the head coach and manager for the Vancouver Hawks Field Hockey Club, working with male and female players of all ages. He coached and managed several club and school teams from 2001-02, and he was a player and coach for Oranje Zwart, a club team in The Netherlands, in 1998-99. From 1996-99, he co-founded and helped run Sport for Africa, which promoted a variety of sports to children ages 7-18 in Pretoria.

In the last four summers, Fulton has served as head coach of the South Region team in the USFHA Women's National Championships, leading the squad to a runner-up finish in 2009. As a player, he was the top goal scorer in the 2008 USFHA Men's National Championship.

A graduate of the University of Pretoria, he represented his home country at the 1996 Olympic Games in Atlanta and appeared in a total of 60 international matches with South Africa's National Team.

He was awarded a U.S. Field Hockey Level III Coaching certificate in 2007.



Guy CATHRO Assistant Coach Second Season

Guy Cathro joined the North Carolina field hockey coaching staff in January of 2011 as an assistant coach and Director of Player Development.

"Guy brings an impressive skill set that includes advanced tactical and technical knowledge as well as an aggressive attacking mindset that will only enhance and complement our already-outstanding coaching staff," UNC head coach Karen Shelton said.

Cathro came to UNC after spending four years as an assistant coach at Syracuse, where he helped lead the Orange to its best campaign ever, a No. 1 ranking and final four appearance in 2008. He also has coached in the USFHA High Performance program, as an assistant for the Pennsylvania team in 2007 and with New Jersey from 2008 on.

He gained extensive coaching experience in his native Scotland, assisting with the Scotlish University Select Squad (2007) and the Midlands District U18 and U15 squads (2006, 2007), and serving as the Dundee University Hockey Club head coach (2001), among a variety of posts.

His highlights as a player include earning more than 20 caps with the Scotland U21 squad (1995-99) and being a member of the Scotland senior training squad in 1999. Cathro earned his U.S. Field Hockey Level 3 coaching accreditation in June of 2010. A native of Dundee, Scotland, he is a 1999 graduate of Heriot Watt University in Edinburgh.



Jackie KINTZER Volunteer Asst. Coach First Season

Jackie Kintzer is in her first season as a member of the Tar Heel staff, serving as the team's volunteer assistant coach.

She was a member of the UNC program as a player from 2006-10, helping the Tar Heels to two NCAA Championships and an ACC title.

As the Carolina goalkeeper, Kintzer was a two-time All-America selection. She also earned All-ACC, All-ACC Tournament and All-NCAA Tournament honors.

A studio art major, she was named to the ACC All-Academic Team as a senior. Kintzer currently is a member of the U.S. National Team. She was named to the 2011 Pan American Elite Team after the U.S. won the gold medal there to qualify for the Olympic Games and she served as an alternate to the 2012 Olympic Team.



Teryn BRILL Director of Operations First Season

Teryn Brill is in her first season on the Tar Heel staff, serving as the team's Director of Operations. In addition to organizational and logistical duties, she manages the team's social media presence.

Brill played for the Tar Heels from 2007-11 and was part of two NCAA titles and an Atlantic Coast Conference crown. A journalism major, she started every game at back in her junior and senior seasons and was named to the All-ACC

 The Academic Support Program assists Tar Heel student-athletes in exploring their interests and abilities. enjoying a broad educational experience, and reaching or exceeding their academic goals.

LOUDERMILK

- . The Academic Support Program is housed in the Loudermilk Center for Excellence, a 150,000-square-foot facility that serves all of Carolina's nearly 800 student-athletes across 28 varsity sports. The Loudermilk Center's largest feature is the John W. Pope Student-Athlete Academic Support Center. This 29,000-square-foot facility provides classrooms for teaching and tutoring, study rooms and office space, as well as a writing lab and computer lab. It also houses the Baddour Carolina Leadership Academy, which offers leadership training for Carolina student-athletes, coaches and staff.
- During the 2011-12 academic year, 290 Carolina student-athletes earned spots on the ACC Academic Honor Roll, which is open to members of varsity squads who earn a cumulative GPA of at least 3.0 for the year. In the fall of 2011, 129 student-athletes made the Dean's List, and 124 did so in the spring of 2012. UPPER CLUB & SUITES
- The Academic Support Program helps freshmen transition from high school to college through a variety of academic programs such as academic counseling, individual tutoring, group review sessions and supplemental instruction.

CREED Program

Special focus is on responsibility, accountability, making good choices, ethics and character building.










FRANCIS & HENRY STADIUM

Inside the Tar Heels' spacious locker room, each player has her own full-length locker, with ample storage space and a plaque bearing her name and number. Next door is the film and meeting room, where a "smart classroom" set-up allows the Tar Heels to seamlessly blend different information sources as they prepare for games and practices. 
