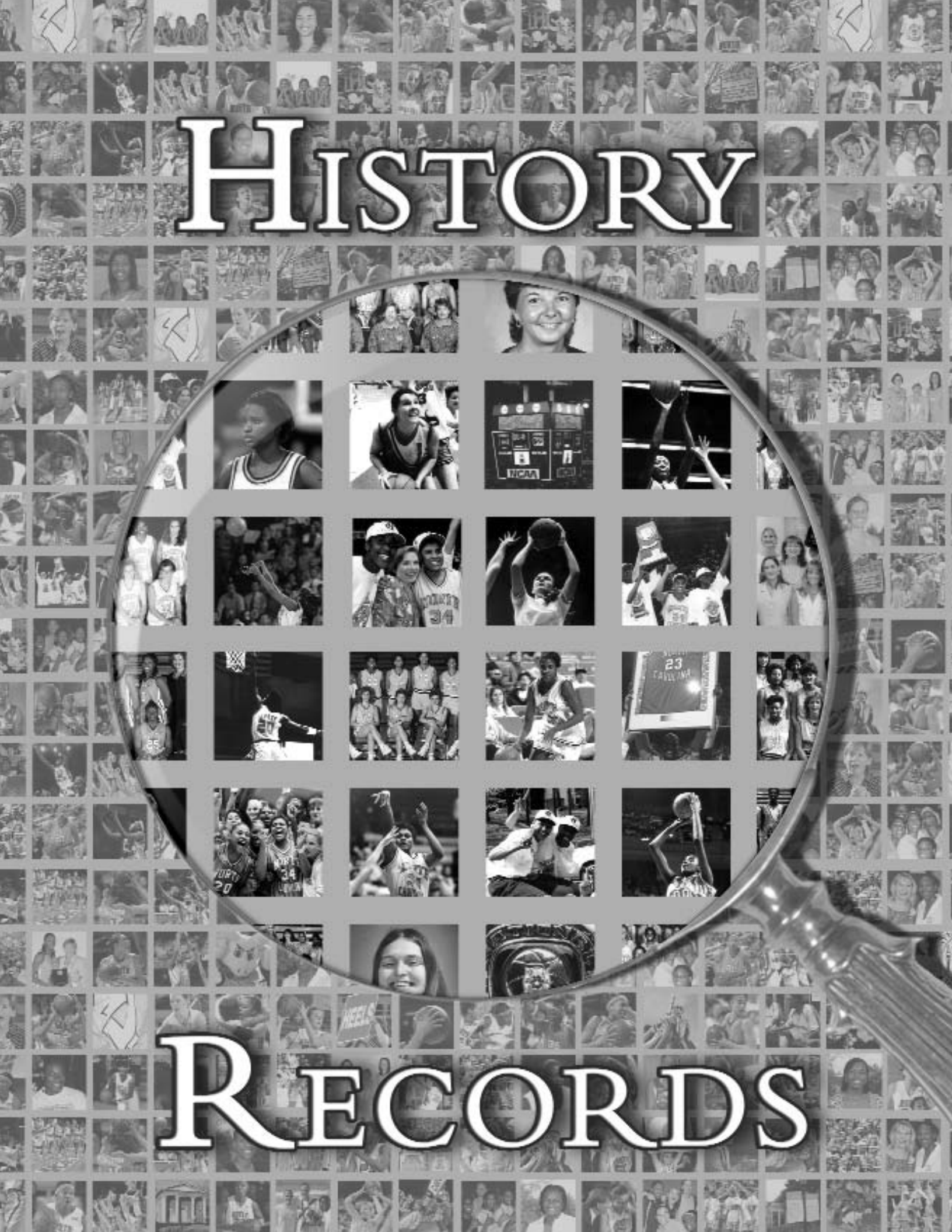

1994 NCAA Championship game: UNC 60, Louisiana Tech 59

Charlotte Smith had to wait for the replay to watch the biggest shot in North Carolina women's basketball history fall through the net. She was the one who released it, just before time expired in the 1994 NCAA Championship game, but ultimately her line of vision was blocked.

"I didn't look at it," Smith said. "And the mob got me before I knew it had gone in."

That mob, made of her teammates, had good reason to be excited. Just three years earlier, when the seniors on that team were freshmen, North Carolina had finished at the bottom of the Atlantic Coast Conference. So to have hit those heights, earning the program's—and the conference's—first NCAA title, was almost too much to be believed.

The success had been building steadily. Since the 1991 season, when UNC finished 12-16 for its fourth consecutive losing season, the Tar Heels had put together

back-to-back 20-win campaigns. Sylvia Hatchell's team headed into the 1993-94 season with five returning starters and an outstanding freshman point guard named Marion Jones, who would go on to gain fame on the track.

First, however, Jones made an indelible mark at UNC in basketball. By the fourth game of the season, Jones was a starter, and she went on to set an ACC record for steals by a freshman. Joining her in Carolina's regular lineup were four experienced players: seniors Sylvia Crawley and Tonya Sampson, and juniors Stephanie Lawrence and Smith.

The Tar Heels opened the 1993-94 season with 11 consecutive wins and climbed to No. 4 in the country before falling at home to Virginia, 77-75 on Jan. 12. The Cavaliers would prove to be the only team to defeat UNC that season, winning

again in Charlottesville on Feb. 9, 83-74.

There were a few other close calls, though. At the ACC Tournament in Rock Hill, S.C., the defense stiffened to beat Clemson 65-64 and advance to the final. Having survived that scare, Carolina finally got the better of Virginia, 77-60 in the championship game, to claim its first conference crown since 1984.

After advancing through first and second-round NCAA Tournament games in Chapel Hill, UNC traveled to the East Regional at Rutgers. There, the Tar Heels beat Vanderbilt 73-69, despite playing without Smith, who served a one-game suspension for fighting during the second round win against Old Dominion. Crawley picked up the slack with a season-high 22 points. An 81-69 victory against Connecticut put North Carolina in its first Final Four.

In Richmond, Va., UNC enjoyed its trip but didn't forget it was there to take care of business. The Tar Heels put on a dunking display at practice, then got serious and won easily in the national semifinal against Purdue, 89-74, to advance to the NCAA Championship game.

On April 3, Louisiana Tech led through most of the first half, but never by more than five. The Tar Heels trailed by two when they got the ball out of bounds on a possession arrow with a mere 00:00.7 showing on the clock. After two timeouts, Lawrence inbounded the ball to Smith on the right wing. The rest, as they say, is history.

"It makes it even more special to know that we came from the bottom to the top," Crawley said after the game. "This is the way I've always dreamed about it, and my dreams have finally come true."

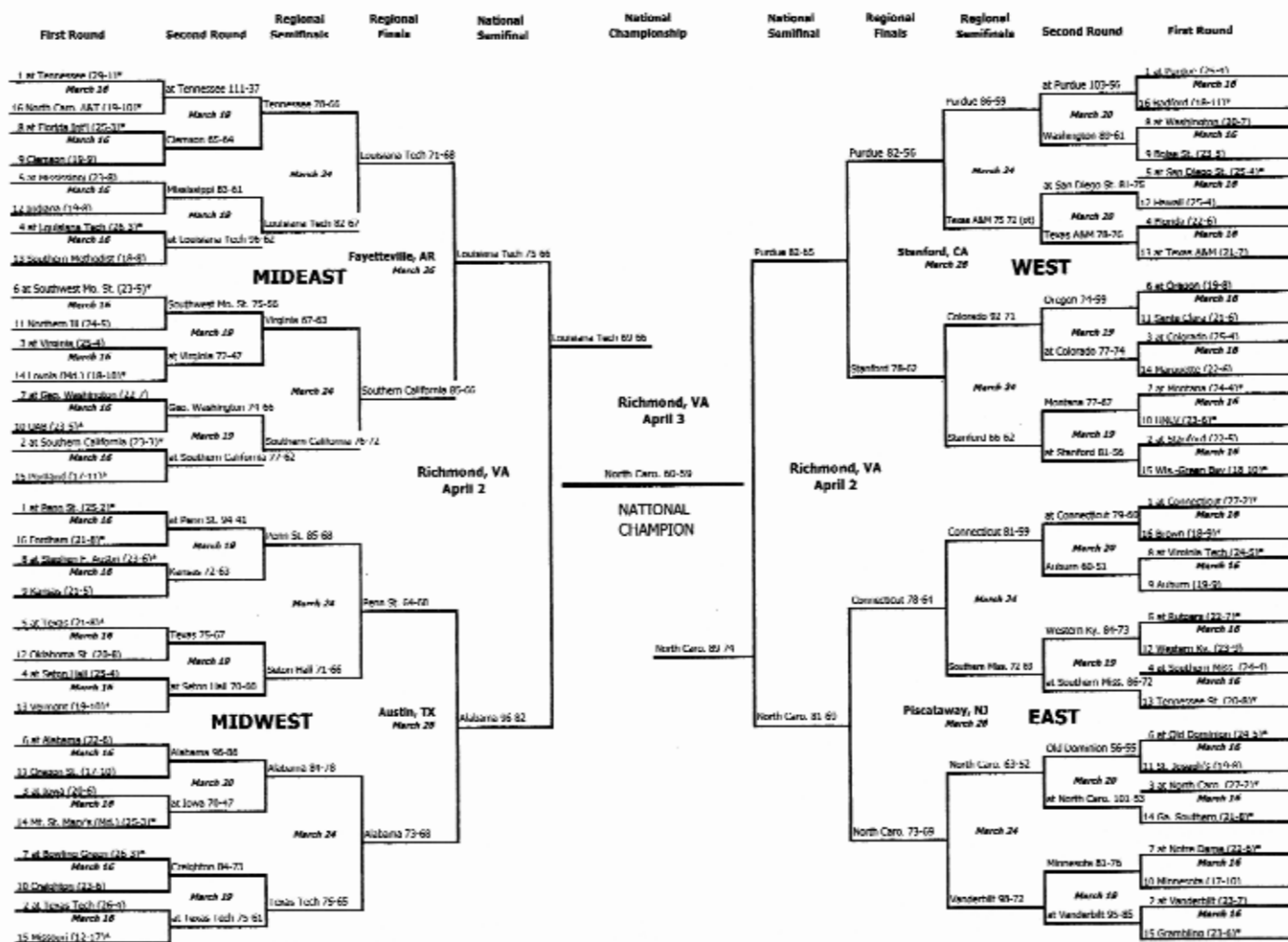

A Decade Later, Memories of 'The Shot'

Charlotte Smith-Taylor

Junior forward on the 1994 team

"When we got the jump ball with seven-tenths of a second to play, I thought, 'it's over.' In the huddle, I was feeling heartbroken. When Coach Hatchell said we were going to go for the win, I thought 'who is she going to pick?' and when I found out it was me, my first reaction was, 'If I miss this shot, I'll never hear the end of it.' Then I tried to remember what play she had called.

"When I was about to take the shot, I just thought, 'Please God, let it go in,' then I released it."

Lori Gear McBride

Freshman guard on the 1994 team

"It was extremely surreal. It happened so fast, and I didn't really believe it was happening to us. I just kept thinking, 'Oh my God, oh my God', while my arms were locked with Kim's and Gwendolyn's. Next thing I knew, we were all in a pile in the middle of the court. I think the most hilarious thing was seeing Coach Calder in the locker room afterward with a huge scrape on his chin from being on the bottom of our pile."

Tiffany Tucker

Sophomore center on the 2004 team, 11 years old at the time of the game

"When the shot went in, I went crazy. I was just really going bananas. My mom asked me what was wrong and I said, 'Charlotte hit the shot!' She had no clue what I was talking about."

Sylvia Crawley

Senior center on the 1994 team

"I was the one that set a screen on Charlotte's man in order for her to take 'the shot' Because of this, my back was toward her when she took the shot. I can recall the ball going over my head and seeming to move in slow motion to the basket. It seemed like the entire building was completely silent. The shot went in and the ball came out of the net and into my hands, then I heard the crowd screaming and it hit me ... we won the game!!!"

Gwendolyn Gillingham

Junior center on the 1994 team

"I remember sitting on the bench holding hands, praying with the other players. I remember not seeing the shot – I didn't want to watch. I was looking down, thinking, 'Well, that's it. It's over.' Then everyone was jumping, screaming, saying she made it. And I remember being dumbfounded. I couldn't believe it. Not only that we had actually won, but that I missed seeing the shot!

"That's OK, though, I've seen plenty of replays over the last 10 years to make up for it."

Emily Johnson Murphy

Assistant coach on the 1994 team

"I remember thinking during the last timeout that somehow, some way we are going to win this game. As the play developed and Charlotte placed herself behind the three-point line, from the bench I was in a perfect line with her. As she released the basketball, I knew it was in. I was just waiting to watch it go through the net. It did and I rushed onto the court looking for someone to hug."

Sylvia Hatchell

Head coach at UNC since 1986



Charlotte Smith's buzzer-beating three-pointer won the 1994 NCAA title for North Carolina. The shot was so dramatic, most people who saw it remember the moment well, whether they were watching TV at home or sitting on the UNC bench.

"We were going to run our 20 series for Sylvia, a lob in front of the goal. I told Stephanie Lawrence – and she was so smart, that's why she's a Division I coach – 'if Sylvia is not wide open, call another timeout.' That's why you save your timeouts. So we went out there and ran that play, but Stephanie didn't think Sylvia was open enough and she called another timeout.

"We came over and I asked Ann Hancock, who was keeping the stats, what had worked. She said 30s, so I went to the huddle and told the players we were going to run 30s and I said 'Charlotte, be behind the three.' In the way the play usually is, you curl around to the baseline right beside the lane and have a nice little jump shot. Charlotte had done that a couple of times in the game. I told her to go out beyond the three this time, that we were going for the win, not the tie. I told Stephanie, you've got to get it out there to her. I knew they'd be all over Tonya Sampson and we had just run the play for Sylvia, so I knew they'd be expecting the lob.

"Charlotte was right between me and the basket and as soon as it left her hand you could see it was right on line. You could see it was going in. That thing went in and, Lord have mercy, All I could think was, 'We won the game, now go shake hands'. It seemed like a dream. That whole season seemed like a dream because three years earlier we had been the last place team in the conference. In three years, we'd taken such strides.

"That team was so much fun. Nobody got tired, nobody got burned out. It was just like destiny, like it was meant to be."

Carrie Davis

Senior center on the 2004 team, 12 years old at the time of the game

"I remember watching the shot on the news that night. I was watching cartoons or something during the game."

Tonya Cooper Williams

Sophomore forward on the 1994 team

"I remember sitting on the bench near the end of that game. All of us were holding hands so tight. I remember just really believing that we still had a chance to win the game. I jumped out of my seat when the shot went in and rushed onto the floor. All of us seemed to just fall into a big pile – at least it felt like a big pile, but it may have

just been a few of us. I remember it being like a catharsis, a release of emotions. All of the hard work and time devoted to basketball just flowed out in tears."

Stephanie Lawrence Yelton

Junior guard on the 1994 team

"I can remember those last moments of the game like they happened this morning. It had been my job to throw the inbounds pass for every inbounds play for my entire career, not just for that one play. When the ball was tied up by Marion Jones under our basket with .7 seconds left in the game, Coach Hatchell called a timeout to run a play designed for Sylvia Crawley to receive a lob pass just in front of the rim. During that timeout, both Coach Ann Hancock and Coach Emily Johnson (now Murphy) reminded me that we still had one timeout left.

As I stepped onto the court to run this play, I remembered earlier in the game that Louisiana Tech had switched the screen and tapped the pass away for a steal. So as that play developed, I watched to see if they were going to play it the same way, which they did, so I called our last timeout.

"From this point, we went to the bench and all the players grasped each others hands. We were ready for whatever the coaches had for us. It didn't take the

staff long to make a decision on a play and then get right in the huddle with us. Coach Hatchell drew up 'the play', which had two options at the time: the first to Tonya Sampson coming toward the basket for the tie and the second to Charlotte Smith for the win. I can remember stepping onto the court with great confidence. It seems funny that I get more nervous now thinking about the magnitude of 'the pass' than I ever did during the game. At the time I was very calm and confident.

"As the play developed, Tonya Sampson was triple-teamed by the Louisiana Tech defenders (which was smart, because she was our All-American that year). My defender, Charlotte's defender, and Tonya's defender played the play. My next option was to look for Charlotte behind the three-point arc on the opposite side of the court. From where I stood, all I could see was her hand in the air behind a screening Sylvia Crawley and Sylvia's 6-5 defender. I aimed for Charlotte's hand. I couldn't tell if it had gotten to her. I stepped in-bounds and looked up. I saw the ball in flight to the basket and it seemed to take minutes, not seconds, for the ball to reach the basket.

"Remember, I was underneath the basket, so I could see the ball approaching the basket from underneath. As the ball approached the basket I mentally cheered it on (GO, GO, GO!) and the rest is history. It took me a second to realize what had just happened – we had won the National Championship!!! I jumped in the air and ran toward Charlotte. On my way I met Sylvia Crawley for a jumping hug and then we all jumped on Charlotte. I was literally on top of Charlotte under the pile and all I could think to tell her was 'You did it! We did it! We won!' What an amazing time for UNC women's basketball!

"Now for a little comical tidbit. After the nets had been cut down, the sparkling cider opened, and the Sears Trophy presented, the team headed to the bus for the three hour ride back to Chapel Hill. You may ask yourself, 'Where did the team stop to eat after winning the National Championship?' Why none other than McDonald's, and we could order anything we wanted!"

Tonya Sampson

Senior forward on the 1994 team

"I really cannot tell you what I was feeling at the time of Charlotte's shot – maybe I was praying for it to go in? I am clueless.

"I just remember that when it did go in, I was jumping for joy. To come to UNC when the women's basketball program was at the bottom and leave on top was nothing but a dream that came to a reality with that shot. We all practiced hard and had faith from the beginning of the season to the end. NO DOUBT we were the best team around."

UNC's academic advisor since 1991

"I was sitting five rows behind the bench and was clutching a pair of gold-plated scissors that Coach Hatchell had given me before we left for the Final Four. I was the 'keeper of the scissors' to be used for cutting down the nets when (not if, but when!) we won. At the game, the whole time holding them I just knew we were going to win, even when we called time out with .7 seconds on the clock. I remember saying to the person next to me, Coach Hatchell's brother, 'Somehow we are going to win!'

It seemed the pass in from out of bounds took forever, but once in Charlotte's hand I could see just how beautiful the shot was – perfect arc, distance, etc.

When it went in, I was not surprised, just relieved. I hugged whoever was next to me and calmly proceeded to approach the floor, scissors in hand. Each of us used these to cut our piece of the net. I still have my piece of the net in the case with my ring!

I do remember feeling bad for the Louisiana Tech coaches and players; they were so distraught. I did get to talk with Coach Leon Barmore for a few minutes, congratulating him on a great season. They had provided the Final Four with some great basketball."

Senior center on the 2004 team, 11 years old at the time of the game

"I remember it was Easter Sunday and I was watching the game from my kitchen table while my mom was at the stove cooking. When 'the shot' went through, I was amazed."

Tracey Williams

Assistant coach on the 2004 team, working for USA Basketball in 1994

"It was hard to cheer during the game because when you work for USA Basketball, you cannot show a lot of emotion for one team or the other. I was sitting lower-level half-court for the championship game and I remember watching the fans from other schools start to leave during the last timeout. I also remember the Final Four people bringing boxes of championship hats and t-shirts and sitting behind Louisiana Tech's bench. Even though there was only seven-tenths of a second on the clock, the excitement and anticipation caused people to look back at the final shot and wow, it went in. What an unbelievable game. Having grown up in North Carolina, I jumped up like everyone else with happiness and pride. Thinking about the game now even gives me cold chills. What an honor to be able to see such an incredible finish to a magnificent game."

Tonya Jackson

Sophomore forward on the 1994 team

"As there were only a few ticks left on the clock, I closed my eyes and prayed for the win. My teammates and I held hands as we watched Charlotte take the shot. It went in and excitement was everywhere! I ran out to hug our hero but she was under the pileup on the floor. It was a great moment for UNC and an exciting time for women's basketball!"



The University of North Carolina's strong women's basketball tradition dates back to 1930, when UNC fielded its first team. The student newspaper, *The Daily Tar Heel*, reported that a group of women using the moniker "Tar Heelettes" played basketball games against high school teams from Greensboro and Chapel Hill.

Three years later, in March of 1933, Carolina played its first intercollegiate game. Gladys Beard, director of women's physical education, combined teams from Phi Beta Phi and Chi Omega sororities with an already-existing freshman squad to play Campbell College. Campbell won that contest 36-12.

The first official UNC women's basketball varsity team was established in 1971 and competed as part of the Department of Physical Education until 1974, when basketball and seven other women's sports came under the direction of the UNC athletic department. Angela Lumpkin coached the 1974-75 Tar Heel squad to a 15-3 overall record and sixth place in the National Women's Invitational Tournament. Tar Heel senior Marsha Mann earned NWIT All-America honors, becoming the first in an ever-lengthening string of UNC All-America picks.

In 1975, Carolina awarded its first women's basketball scholarship to Cathy Shoemaker, who would go on to be a three-time AIAW All-State selection. During Shoemaker's freshman season, the Tar Heels recorded another first, their premier television appearance: On Jan. 26, 1976, local public station WUNC broadcast NC State's 68-58 win in Raleigh.

Lumpkin completed her three-year tenure with a 39-26 record and Jennifer Alley took over as coach prior to the 1977-78 season. In Alley's nine seasons as coach, Carolina never had a losing season and surpassed 20 wins five times.

The Tar Heels won their first Atlantic Coast Conference title in 1984 and only once in Alley's Carolina career did they fail to advance at least as far as the tournament semifinals. Tresa Brown, who led the Tar Heels to that first conference championship, earned MVP honors at the '84 ACC Tournament. That season, she also became Carolina's first ACC Player of the Year and Kodak All-America selection. Other key members of that league championship team were ACC Rookie of the Year Dawn Royster and Pam Leake, who would go on to earn ACC Player of the Year honors in 1985 and '86. Leake was a Kodak All-America selection in 1986.

The program struggled through a few less-successful seasons in the late 1980s, but current head coach Sylvia Hatchell brought Carolina back into the national spotlight in the 1990s. The rebuilding process culminated in the Tar Heels winning the 1994 NCAA Championship, the first ever by an ACC school. Carolina claimed the title with a 60-59 win over Louisiana Tech on April 3 in

Richmond, Va. Charlotte Smith's buzzer-beating three-pointer gave UNC the margin of victory and helped earn her Final Four MVP honors.

UNC posted a 33-2 record that season, the best in college basketball, and won the ACC Championship en route to the national title. Tonya Sampson, a senior in 1994, earned Kodak All-America honors and finished her UNC career with 2,143 points, then the most in the program's history.

Smith, a junior on the championship squad, completed her UNC career in 1995 as the program's most decorated player to date. A consensus first-team All-America as a senior and a finalist for the Naismith Award, she became only the third woman in ACC history to compile 2,000 points and 1,000 rebounds in her career. She was named National Player of the Year by ESPN in 1995 and is the only Tar Heel women's basketball player to have had her jersey, number 23, retired.

In the five-season span from 1994 to 1998, UNC won four ACC Tournament crowns and boasted four tournament MVPs: Smith in 1994 and '95, Marion Jones in 1997 and Tracy Reid in 1998. In 1997, Carolina finished 15-1 in league play to add the regular-season title to the team's list of accomplishments. That season, Hatchell was named ACC Coach of the Year.

Reid earned Kodak All-America and ACC Player of the Year honors in 1997 and '98, her junior and senior seasons. As a senior, she set a school record with 42 points in a game against Virginia and finished her career as the program's all-time scoring leader with 2,220 points.

The Tar Heels have not won an ACC crown since 1998, but have played in four championship games. Record-setting point guard Nikki Teasley played in four ACC title games and earned a spot on the ACC All-Tournament team each time, becoming just the second player in conference history to earn

that honor in all four years of her career. Teasley led the ACC in assists four times and set a league record for career assists per game average (5.9). She also set a school record for career three-pointers (236).

Overall, UNC has been a part of eight of the last 10 ACC title games, and the school's five championships rank second in the league, behind Maryland's eight.

The Tar Heels have made a total of 15 appearances in the NCAA Tournament, 10 in the past 12 years. Carolina has reached the Sweet 16 in eight of the past 11 years.

Against Georgia Tech on Feb. 13, 2000, the Tar Heels earned the 500th victory in the history of UNC's varsity program. The victory on Jan. 31, 2002, at Maryland was Carolina's 200th ACC win.

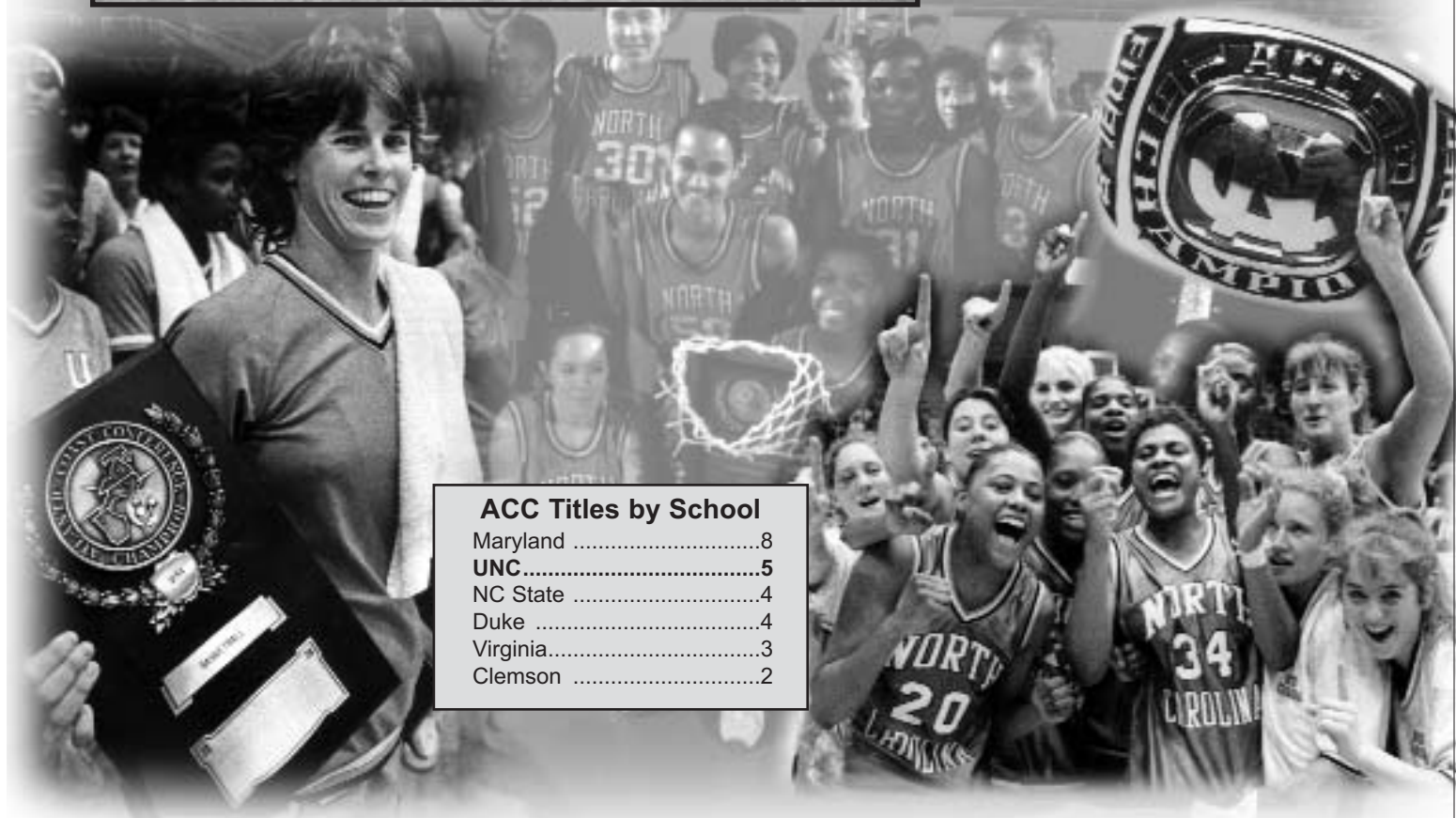

Retired and Honored Jerseys at UNC

On Oct. 4, 1994, the Athletic Council of the University of North Carolina adopted a set of criteria for honoring the jerseys of women's basketball players. In order to have her jersey honored and hung in the Carmichael Auditorium rafters, a player must have been a member of a first-team All-America squad, been a member of an Olympic team as an undergraduate or been selected by the coaches as MVP of a national championship team. Under these guidelines, the UNC women's basketball program announced the first five honored jerseys in a ceremony on Feb. 5, 1995. They belong to Tresa Brown, Pam Leake, Marsha Mann, Bernadette McGlade and Tonya Sampson. On

Feb. 27, 2000, Carolina honored three more, belonging to Sylvia Crawley, Marion Jones and Tracy Reid.

The University's criteria for retiring a jersey, which applies to all UNC varsity athletes, requires a player to be named national player of the year in his or her sport. Only one Tar Heel women's basketball jersey number has been retired. That number is 23, last worn in 1995 by Charlotte Smith. Her jersey was retired on Feb. 24, 1996.

Charlotte Smith #23

The starting forward for the 1994 NCAA Championship team, Charlotte Smith was ESPN's 1995 National Player of the Year.

Smith was named the Most Outstanding Player of the 1994 NCAA Tournament after hitting one of the most dramatic shots in collegiate basketball history. With 0:00.7 left in regulation of the '94 NCAA title game and UNC trailing Louisiana Tech 59-57, Smith drilled the championship-winning three-point basket. She also pulled down a career-high 23 rebounds in that game setting an NCAA Championship game record and tying the NCAA Tournament record.

As a freshman in 1992 she was named the ACC Rookie of the Year. Smith was named All-ACC and ACC Tournament MVP in both her junior and senior seasons.

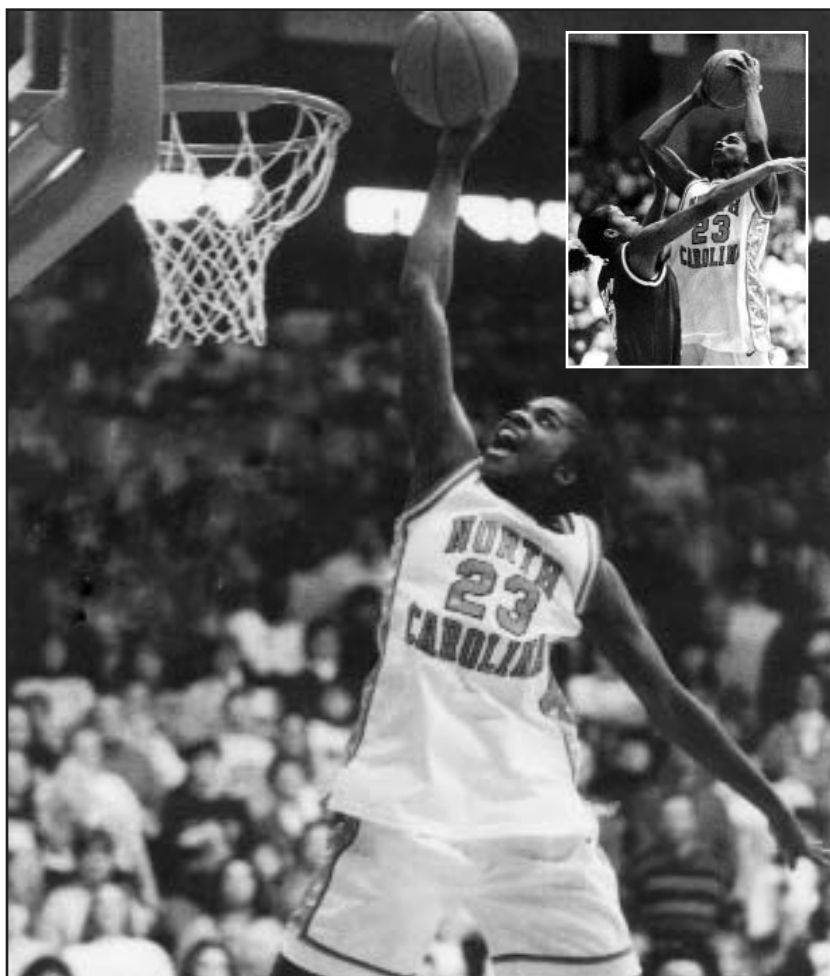


A consensus first-team All-America and Naismith Award finalist as a senior in 1994-95, Smith led the ACC in scoring and rebounding, averaging 19.6 points and 10.7 boards per game. She totaled 21 double-doubles in Carolina's 35 games, including a 10-game streak. As a four-year starter for the Tar Heels, she led Carolina in rebounding every year of her career.

On Dec. 4, 1994, against North Carolina A&T State, she became the second woman in colle-

giate basketball history to dunk in a game.

Smith was the first Tar Heel woman and the third women's player in ACC history to record 2,000 career points and 1,000 career rebounds. Her career total of 2,094 points ranks third in UNC history and eighth in the ACC. Her 1,200 rebounds rank second at UNC and fourth in the ACC.

Marsha Mann #44

Marsha Mann was Carolina's first women's basketball All-America selection, by the National Women's Invitational Tournament in 1975.

Her senior season, 1974-75, was the first year in which the women's basketball team fell under the direction of the UNC athletic department. Mann paced the team in both scoring (17.0 points per game) and rebounding (9.8 per game) and led the Tar Heels to the NWIT in Amarillo, Texas. Under coach Angela Lumpkin, UNC went 1-2 there to finish the season 15-3.

Mann also competed for the United States team that won a silver medal at the 1973 World University Games.

Bernadette McGlade #14

Bernadette McGlade, Carolina's career leader in rebounds, was a National Women's Invitational Tournament All-America selection in 1980. She led the Tar Heels in rebounding in all four seasons she played for Carolina and finished with a school-record total of 1,251. Her career average of 10.3 rebounds per game is the best in UNC history.

Tresa Brown #24

In 1984, Tresa Brown became the first UNC player to earn ACC Player of the Year honors. She also earned Kodak All-America honors that season after helping the Tar Heels to a 24-8 record and the school's first conference championship. Brown, who was MVP of the '84 ACC Tournament, led Carolina in scoring (20.8 points), field goal percentage (56.1) and free throw percentage (81.6) that season, her senior year. She also earned All-ACC honors.

Brown is UNC's career leader in field goal percentage (54.7) and ranks fifth on Carolina's career scoring chart with 1,931 points. She also is among the school's top 10 in career scoring average, total rebounds, rebounding average, free throw percentage and blocked shots.

Pam Leake #20

Pam Leake was a Kodak All-America selection in 1986 when she led the Tar Heels in scoring with 22.4 points per game, the highest season scoring average in school history. With 2,001 career points, she ranks fourth on UNC's career scoring list.

She earned ACC Player of the Year honors in 1985 and '86 and is one of only six players to have been so named twice in their careers.

Leake holds Carolina's career marks in assists (545) and steals (401). Her career scoring average of 16.14 ranks sixth on the school's all-time chart and she is also among the top 10 in field goal percentage and free throw percentage.

Tonya Sampson #34

As a senior, Tonya Sampson earned Kodak All-America honors while leading the Tar Heels to the 1994 NCAA Championship. She paced the team in scoring in each of her four years, averaging a career-best 21 points per

game in 1992-93. She graduated as Carolina's all-time leading scorer with 2,143 points, a total that was surpassed in 1998 by Tracy Reid.

Sampson was a member of the ACC's All-Freshman team in 1991, then earned All-ACC honors as a sophomore, junior and senior. She also earned All-ACC Tournament honors in 1994.

Sampson ranks in UNC's career top 10 in points, scoring average, total rebounds, rebounding average, free throw percentage, assists and steals.

Sylvia Crawley #00

Sylvia Crawley was the starting center on the 1994 NCAA Championship team, averaging 13.6 points and 5.2 rebounds that year as a senior. She was also a co-captain for that team and selected by the coaches as its MVP.

As a senior, she earned All-ACC Tournament honors as UNC won the conference title. En route to the NCAA championship, she was named to the East Region All-Tournament team after scoring a career-high 22 points against Vanderbilt in the semifinal.

She ranks fourth on UNC's career blocks chart with 123 and led the team with 40 in 1994.

Marion Jones #20

Marion Jones made an instant impact on the UNC program, helping the team to an NCAA championship as a freshman point guard. She averaged 14.1 points that season and in 1995 became the first Carolina sophomore to reach the 1,000-point mark.

Jones was 9-0 in Atlantic Coast Conference Tournament play as a member of championship teams in 1994, '95 and '97. She was an All-ACC pick in 1995 and '97, and earned ACC Tournament MVP and All-America (Basketball America) honors in 1997.

Despite playing just three seasons, she ranks 11th all-time in scoring at UNC with 1,716 career points. She ranks third in career scoring average (16.8), third in field goal percentage (53.0), third in steals (334) and sixth in assists (403).

Tracy Reid #00

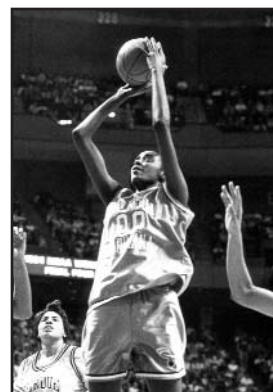
The all-time leading scorer in Tar Heel history, Tracy Reid amassed 2,200 points during her career. She was selected as the ACC Player of the Year in her junior and senior seasons and as a senior was named All-America by the Associated Press, the USBWA and Kodak/WBCA.

Reid earned All-ACC honors in 1996, '97 and '98 after leading the conference in scoring in all three of those years. She was voted to the All-ACC Tournament team in 1997 and '98.

In addition to leading the program in points scored, Reid boasts the highest career scoring average (18.2), the fourth-highest field goal percentage (52.8) and the fourth-highest rebounds total (1,065). She and Charlotte Smith are the only UNC players to total more than 2,000 points and 1,000 rebounds in their careers.
