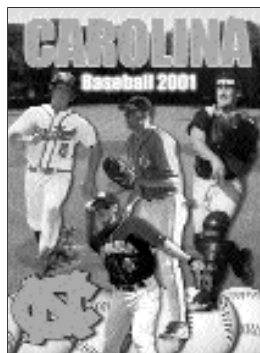

CREDENTIAL REQUESTS

Working press, radio and photographer credentials for games at Boshamer Stadium may be obtained by calling David Tinson at (919) 962-0084, preferably at least 24 hours in advance. Parking is available in the fenced-in lots located on the third-base side of the stadium and in other selected areas outside the main stadium entrance. There is no reserved parking. A phone line can be made available for print media to file stories from the press box after the game has been completed.

VISITING RADIO

A booth is available for the opposing team's radio broadcast. Phone lines for Boshamer Stadium can be arranged by contacting BellSouth at (919) 780-2800 from inside the BellSouth calling area or (800) 767-2355 from elsewhere in the United States. (For ordering purposes, Boshamer Stadium is located on Ridge Road.)

INTERVIEWS

Coach Mike Fox and the Carolina players will be available for post-game interviews following a 10-minute cooling off period. Fox will meet with the media on the field in front of the UNC dugout immediately after talking with the team. Requested Tar Heel players will be escorted to the interview area by media relations personnel.

Interviews with visiting team members can be conducted on the field or in the dugout, subject to the policy of the visiting team's media relations representative.

Non-gameday interviews with Carolina players must be arranged through David Tinson of the UNC Athletic Media Relations office and will be conducted immediately before or after practice whenever possible. Tinson can be reached at (919) 962-0084. Fox is available by calling the baseball office directly at (919) 962-2351.

BOSHAMER STADIUM

Boshamer Stadium is located on Ridge Road across from Henry Stadium and the football practice fields. From I-40, take N.C. Hwy. 54 (exit 273) toward Chapel Hill. Pass under U.S. Hwy. 15-501 then turn left at the traffic light at the edge of the UNC campus onto Country Club Road. Turn right almost immediately onto Ridge Road. Boshamer Stadium will be on the left. Parking is available at the nearby Rams Head Lot.

The network will broadcast as many as 23 regular-season games and all of Carolina's ACC Tournament contests and any NCAA Tournament games in which Carolina is a participant.

Stephen Gates will serve as the play-by-play announcer with Craig Kocher and Jones Angell serving as color analysts for home games. Gates (UNC '98) is in his fifth season as play-by-play man for the Tar Heels, while Kocher (UNC '98) is in his sixth season and Angell (UNC '01) is in his second covering UNC baseball for the Tar Heel Sports Network.

In the interest of fair competition and the growth and development of student-athletes, the Department strongly urges its friends and supporters to refrain from gambling/betting on contests involving collegiate competition and to abide by state and federal laws.

SEASON PREVIEW

Coming off one of the finest seasons in Carolina baseball history — a record-setting 2000 campaign that saw the Tar Heels post a 46-17 record and fall just one win shy of the NCAA Super Regionals — head coach Mike Fox's 2001 team features 18 new faces but has its sights set on building on one of the best runs in the history of the program.

Fox, now in his third year back at his alma mater, has posted an impressive 87-35 mark in two years, but he knows Carolina has its work cut out in 2001. Gone are 15 letterwinners from 2000, including a record-tying seven who were selected in the Major League Baseball Draft, and UNC's hopes will be pinned on the development of several young and inexperienced players.

"For me it's like 'Welcome to Division I baseball,'" Fox says, who returned to Chapel Hill in 1998 after leading Division III powerhouse North Carolina Wesleyan College to 540 wins in 15 seasons and the 1989 national championship. "Everyone's going to say we're a young team, but I told our guys I like to think of it as a new team. I don't want them to get caught up with the idea that just because we're young that means we have to play young or lose games.

"We miss all those guys from last year, but this fall was very exciting. Our guys were very eager to learn, and I thought the few returning players that we have did a great job of meshing with our new guys and showing some leadership."

Despite the loss of some of the most decorated players in Carolina history, there is plenty of talent to build around. Sophomore centerfielder Adam Greenberg, last year's Atlantic Coast Conference Rookie of the Year, and catcher Ryan Blake, also a sophomore after red-shirting the 2000 campaign, will be two keys to Carolina's success. Sophomore infielders Chad Prosser and Russ Adams and junior Chris Maples all gained valuable experience in 2000 and big-hitting Sean Farrell, who last year saw most of his time at first, will see more time in the outfield after the departure of senior right fielder Matt McCay.

The biggest question marks lie in the pitching staff. Six Tar Heel pitchers have been drafted in the last two years, including first-rounders Mike Bynum and Kyle Snyder in 1999 and second-rounder Ryan Snare in 2000, and that leaves sophomore right-hander Scott Autrey as the only returnee with more than one career victory.

Fox will look to establish consistency and confidence in his young squad by opening at home for the first time since 1979. The Tar Heels, who have won 88 percent of their games over the past two seasons at Boshamer Stadium, host James Madison on Feb. 10 for the season-opener. With 22 of its first 26 games in Chapel Hill, Fox hopes his team will have matured when it travels to Tallahassee in late March for its first road ACC series, against powerful Florida State.

"The good thing about this year is that we have 36 home games," Fox says. "The bad news is the conference games we have on the road. We have to visit our arch-rival NC State on the road, we go to Florida State and Clemson, and we struggled at Maryland a couple of years ago and now they have a new coach. Obviously, all ACC games are difficult, but it will be exciting to see how our young team responds."

That 36-game home schedule will be far from easy as well. After returning from the South Alabama Tournament (Feb. 16-18), which features host South Alabama and preseason Top 25 teams Auburn and Minnesota, the Tar Heels host Seton Hall and UCLA, both 2000 NCAA Tournament participants, in back-to-back weekend series. The Tar Heels open the ACC season by hosting Wake Forest March 16-18, while home sets with Virginia and Duke follow in April and Georgia Tech visits Chapel Hill to close the regular season in May.

PITCHING

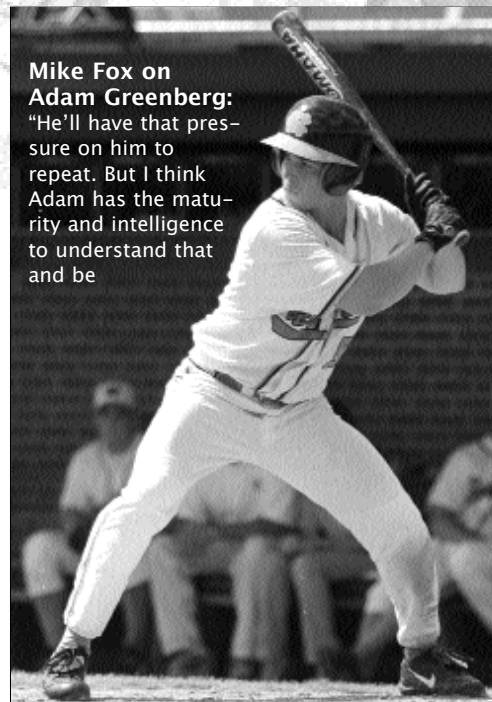
Carolina's pitching staff has been decimated by graduation and the MLB Draft over the past two seasons. The 1999 staff posted the nation's eighth-best ERA two years ago and last season's group made its mark by blanking opponents in seven games, UNC's most shutouts since the 1978 staff also blanked seven opponents en route to that season's College World Series. But just as last year's staff had to compensate for the loss of first-round draft picks Bynum and Snyder, the 2001 group will be without starters Snare, Chris Elmore and Eric Henderson and relievers Derrick DePriest, Ryan Earey and B.J. Finnerty from a year ago. Those six pitchers accounted for 38 of Carolina's 46 wins last year, 14 of its 15 saves and 465.0 of 564.2 innings (82.4 percent).

Those are substantial losses indeed.

Autrey, a right-handed sophomore from Arlington, Texas, had just the ninth perfect season in school history with a 7-0 mark in 17 appearances last year. Carolina's only returning starter, Autrey is coming off a productive summer in the Coastal Plain League and his size and stamina will be a big plus for the Tar Heels in their pursuit for consistent starting pitching.

— will battle for the other spots in Carolina's starting rotation.

Moore, a 6-5, 190-pound left-hander from Spencer, N.C., was highly touted coming out of North Rowan High School and was drafted in the 23rd round by the Florida Marlins.

"Daniel has a very good arm and he can get the ball up there in velocity," Fox says. "We're used to having left-handers in the rotation, so that's a positive, and he looked very good in his first few outings in the fall."

Manshack is a 5-11, 165-pound right-hander from Indian Trail, N.C., who was an all-conference and all-state performer at Piedmont High School. He impressed the coaching staff with his work ethic in the fall.

Robinson, a 6-3, 200-pound righty from Putnam Valley, N.Y., was drafted out of Lakeland High School in the 40th round by the Toronto Blue Jays. He was a three-time all-state pick and was named his league's MVP three years.

Dickerson could also work his way into the rotation. A 6-2, 185-pound left-hander from Asheville, N.C., Dickerson also was drafted late out of T.C. Roberson High School after he helped lead his team to the state 3A title last year as the championship MVP.

"The key for all these guys will be whether they can throw their breaking ball and changeup over the plate, behind in the count," Fox says. "All these guys are just going to have to jump into the fire and learn as they go."

In relief, the consistency of DePriest, who finished his career with 124 appearances (second in school history), will be sorely missed.

Jason Howell, the lone senior on Carolina's roster after transferring from Appalachian State, will likely be used as a closer. Even though it's just his first year in the program, the lefty could have mentality and maturity to fill the void.

Ralph Roberts, a junior transfer from Lenoir

Community College, also could be used to close games. Roberts just joined the Tar Heels in January, but he's a highly talented prospect who has already been drafted three times.

"We're going to have a closer by committee early in the year until we figure out who has the right mentality for the job," says Fox, who added that freshman Whitley Benson will also be in the mix. "After depending on Derrick so long, that's going to be a big hole to fill in the early going."

Sophomore Matt Tanner, who was 1-1 with one save in 20 appearances last year, will likely see time in long- to middle-relief, as will sophomore Jason King, junior Joey Popovich and freshmen Todd Boessen and Scott Senatore.

CATCHER

Carolina's losses around the diamond are also heavily felt behind the plate. Dan Moylan was an eighth-round draft pick last year as a junior by the St. Louis Cardinals. One of the top defensive catchers in the nation, Moylan was also among Carolina's leaders in most offensive categories and he finished his career with a school-record 174 walks in just three seasons.

Sophomore Ryan Blake returns in 2001 after missing last year recovering from shoulder surgery, and the Tar Heels have high hopes that he'll pick up where Moylan left off behind the plate. Blake played in 54 games as a freshman in 1999, starting 38, and he hit .267 with five home runs and 24 RBIs. He was off to a tear in 2000, hitting .323 with two homers and 13 RBIs before his season ended just nine games into the year. He underwent surgery in March 2000 to repair a partial tear of his right rotator cuff.

"We need Ryan to come back healthy with what we lost in Danny," Fox says. "I know he was excited to be back in the fall and he looked good out there. His shoulder looked like it was fully recovered."

"He's lifted hard and gotten bigger and stronger, so we're hoping he has a real good year for us. He'll be in the lineup every day, probably playing first on days when he doesn't catch. But he'll be behind the plate a lot for us."

Ron Braun, a 5-10, 185-pound freshman from Stony Brook, N.Y., will be the top backup at catcher and has the ability to provide some power at the plate. He was New York's Gatorade High School Player of the Year in 2000 and was rated as one of the top 100 prospects in the nation by Baseball America.

"Ron's a real tough, hard-nosed kid that really loves to play and worked really hard this fall," Fox says. "We were fortunate last year with Danny being able to catch every game, but we won't be doing that this year. We'll have Ron back there for us some along with Ryan."

INFIELD

Carolina's most experience is in its infield. The Tar Heels will certainly miss Clay Hooper, who graduated last year after five years in the program and finished his career among Carolina's all-time leaders in runs, hits and doubles, but junior Chris Maples and sophomores Chad Prosser and Russ Adams all gained valuable experience with significant playing time in 2000. They will be counted on to pick up where they left off when the Heels hit the field in February.

Maples is a versatile performer for the Tar Heels who has seen time around the infield during his career, but he's slated to be Carolina's regular starter at third in 2001. He played in 53 games a year ago, starting 24, and batted .306. His improvement throughout the year showed when he was named to the All-Tournament team at UNC's NCAA Regional after hitting .400 in four games.

Prosser, who started 60 games last year in the infield, will play short. One of the best defensive shortstops in the ACC, he shifted to the position late last season after starting 39 of the first 46 games at second base. He flourished in the move over the final 17 games of the year.

Adams will play second base exclusively for the Tar Heels after seeing time at both third and second as a freshman. Adams, who played in 50 games, was fifth on the team last year with a .322 batting average and he ranked third with 20



stolen bases.

"Russ, Chad and Chris are all hard workers," Fox says. "They're going to have to take on more of a leadership role this year. They are the experienced guys on the field, so they'll need to step forward. I love all of our infielders because they just work so hard."

The only hole to fill in the infield is at first base. While Sean Farrell started 21 of the 55 games in which he played at first last year, the power-hitting sophomore will likely see time both at first and in right field. Farrell was third on the team last year with nine home runs and 44 RBIs. Blake will also be used at first on days when he's not catching.

"Sean will probably be in the lineup somewhere," Fox says. "I really think right field is probably his best position, but he may not be able to play there because of other personnel. He might play first one day, right field the next."

OUTFIELD

Greenberg's return to center field should help provide some stability to a young outfield that must deal with the loss of All-America Tyrell Godwin in left and McCay in right.

A freshman All-America and second-team

All-ACC selection in addition to being picked the league's top freshman last year, Greenberg had one of the finest seasons in Carolina history in 2000. From the leadoff slot, Greenberg led Tar Heel regulars in batting average (.386), hits (98), runs (69), triples (7), stolen bases (28) and slugging percentage (.594). Greenberg participated in fall drills on a limited basis because of an injury to his middle and ring fingers on his right hand incurred during an August weight room accident, but after having successful surgery on the hand in November he should be back to full speed.

"It will be a more difficult year this year for Adam because of course everyone now knows who he is," Fox says. "He'll have that pressure on him to repeat. But I think Adam has the maturity and intelligence to understand that and be able to deal with it."

"Our biggest relief is that while he missed much of our fall practice, he's going to be ready to go for the season. We're fortunate his injury was not more serious."

As Fox says, "Our two outfield spots other than Adam in center are very much up in the air."

In left, Roberts and freshmen Brandon Russell and Chase Younts all have a chance to contribute. While Younts, a 5-9, 155-pounder from Lexington, N.C., had a chance to participate — and excel — in fall workouts, Russell and Roberts are both unknowns heading into the season.

Russell is a 5-11, 180-pound two-sport athlete from Decatur, Ga., who started seven games at tailback for the Tar Heel football team and thus did not work out with the baseball team until after that season had ended. He was a standout in baseball as well as in football at Marist High School, batting .483 with 11 homers as a senior, so Fox is optimistic that Russell will be able to contribute in left.

Farrell will see time in right, while freshman Jeremy Cleveland is likely to share some time there as well.

Cleveland, a 6-2, 180-pounder from Fairfax, Va., worked out primarily in the infield during the fall, but he's likely to see most of his playing time in either right or left field. Virginia's Gatorade Player of the Year, Cleveland is an explosive offensive player whose bat will be needed in the Tar Heel lineup.

"Jeremy's our best new offensive player," Fox says. "We know he's going to be in our lineup somewhere, because he proved in the fall that he can hit. We just need to find him the right place to play defensively."

As with any new season, there are always plenty of question marks. A team that returns just 11 letterwinners probably has more than most, but Fox is excited at the challenge of finding which of his newcomers are ready for the challenge of ACC baseball and prepared to help lead the Tar Heels to their goals.

"Our goals are always going to be to get to 40-plus wins and to get into the NCAA Tournament," Fox says. "With a young team, we'll have some peaks and valleys. But it's important that we keep our confidence up throughout the season. It's a long haul and the key is to continue to improve and be playing our best at ACC Tournament time."

HEAD COACH MIKE FOX



Mike Fox is in his third season as head coach of the University of North Carolina baseball program. Fox has led the Tar Heels to an 87-35 record and berths in back-to-back NCAA Tournaments in his first two seasons in Chapel Hill.

Fox became Carolina's head coach on May 7, 1998, when Athletic Director Dick Baddour selected the former UNC player and North Carolina Wesleyan College head coach to lead the Tar Heels into the 21st century.

"In Mike Fox I strongly believe that we have the right fit for the University of North Carolina," Baddour said. "He's someone who knows this institution very well, who understands our values and our tradition, who is committed to bringing in outstanding student-athletes who are committed to academic and athletic excellence.

"In Mike we have an established coach who has a strong tradition of winning and of putting together outstanding teams and coaching staffs. I believe that North Carolina baseball is going to do very, very well for a long period of time under his direction."

Fox has already set a high standard of success in just two years, reaching 50 and 75 wins faster than any other coach in UNC history. The Tar Heels got off to a school-record 21-game winning streak to start the 2000 season, including wins over three ranked teams at the season-opening Disney Blast in Lake Buena Vista, Fla., and a three-game sweep at No. 2 UCLA. Carolina went on to post a 46-17 mark in 2000, its third straight 40-win season and the second-most victories in a season in school history. Carolina earned the No. 2 seed at the NCAA Regional at Upper Montclair, N.J., and came just one win away from advancing to the NCAA Super Regionals. Five players were named either first- or second-team All-ACC and seven Tar Heels were selected in the Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft.

In his first year on the job, Fox led Carolina to a school-best 16 straight wins to open the 1999 season and in the midst of going 22-2 to start the year, the Tar Heels peaked at No. 3 in Baseball America's Top 25 poll. Carolina also earned the No. 3 seed in the NCAA Tournament Palo

Alto Regional and had five players named either first- or second-team All-ACC.

Fox came to Carolina after 15 seasons as the head coach at N.C. Wesleyan College in Rocky Mount, where he led the Battling Bishops to 14 NCAA Tournament appearances, eight Division III College World Series appearances and the 1989 NCAA Division III national championship. His teams posted 15 consecutive top-20 finishes in the national polls and won 11 Dixie Conference championships.

Fox's career record of 540-141-4 at N.C. Wesleyan ranked second in career winning percentage (.792) among all active Division III head coaches at the time of his return to Carolina.

Fox was a three-year letterwinner at Carolina as a second baseman from 1976-78, helping lead the Tar Heels to the 1978 College World Series. As a senior, he hit .277, tied for the team lead with six home runs and was named to the College World Series All-Tournament team. Fox also played on the Tar Heel junior varsity basketball team under Eddie Fogler in the 1975 and '76 seasons.

The 44-year old native of Asheville, N.C., is a 1978 graduate of

Carolina with a degree in Physical Education. He earned his Master of Arts in Teaching at UNC in 1979. Fox served as a graduate assistant at Carolina during the 1979 season and was the head coach at Millbrook High School in Raleigh in 1980 and '81 before taking over as N.C. Wesleyan's head coach in September of 1982. He also had served as the Battling Bishops' athletic director since 1985.

Fox was named the American Baseball Coaches Association Division III National Coach of the Year in 1989 after leading the Battling Bishops to the national title. He has been named the NCAA South Region Coach of the Year and the Dixie Conference Coach of the Year seven times each. He coached 29 All-Americans at N.C. Wesleyan and 92 percent of his players graduated.

The 1974 graduate of East Mecklenburg High School in Charlotte, N.C., played professional baseball for a year after graduating from Carolina before returning to his alma mater as a graduate assistant under Mike Roberts in 1979.

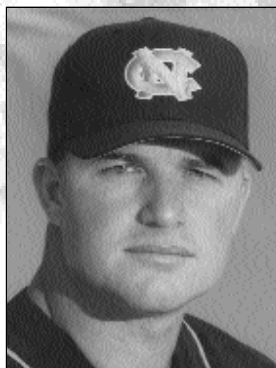

ROGER WILLIAMS

Roger Williams is in his seventh year as Carolina's pitching coach. One year after mentoring first-round Major League Baseball draft picks Kyle Snyder and Mike Bynum, Williams' 2000 staff featured four MLB draftees — Derrick DePriest, Chris Elmore, Eric Henderson and Ryan Snare. That group helped the Tar Heels to seven shutouts last year, its most in a single season since 1978.

Snare, whose stellar junior season included a 10-1 record and a 3.14 ERA, finished his career with 269 strikeouts, fifth all-time at UNC. DePriest was one of the most dominant pitchers in ACC history and he finished his career ranked second all-time at UNC with 124 appearances. Elmore, meanwhile, was 19-3 for an .864 winning percentage in his four-year career, the second-best winning percentage in school history.

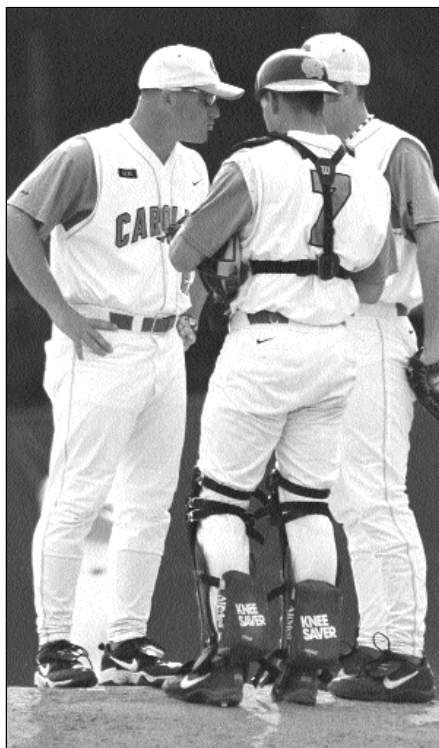
Prior to returning to Carolina, Williams spent three years as the pitching coach at East Carolina University.

A native of Greenville, N.C., Williams was a standout pitcher for the Tar Heels from 1983 to 1985 and a two-time All-ACC selection. He was a fourth-round draft pick of the Chicago Cubs in 1985 and spent three years playing at Triple-A Des Moines. In 1990, his final year of professional baseball, Williams was with the Pittsburgh Pirates organization.

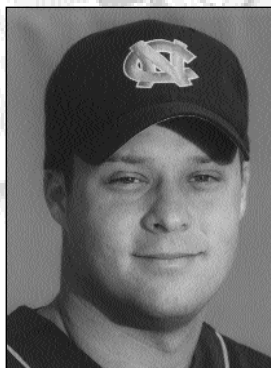
Williams tied an ACC record when he tallied 19 strikeouts against Duke in 1985. He is tied for fourth in Carolina history with 24 career victories and his .800 winning percentage (24-6 record) is among the all-time best at UNC. His 254 career strikeouts rank in the top 10 in school history. Williams' single-season marks of 113 strikeouts in 1985 and a 1.19 earned run average in 1983 are among Carolina's all-time top-five in their respective categories. His career totals in wins and strikeouts also rank among the best in ACC history.

Williams graduated from East Carolina with a bachelor's degree in physical education in 1992 and earned his masters degree in 1994. His father, George, was the head baseball coach at East Carolina from 1974-1976.

Williams married the former Stephanie Hensley in December 2000.

Chad Holbrook, now in his seventh year as a full-time member of the Carolina coaching staff, has been a part of the Tar Heel baseball program since coming to Chapel Hill as a freshman in the fall of 1989. After an outstanding career as a player from 1990 to 1993, the Shelby, N.C., native served as an undergraduate assistant coach during the spring of 1994 and was named assistant coach in the fall of 1994.

Holbrook is Carolina's recruiting coordinator and assists in all aspects of the Tar Heel program. He works most directly with Carolina's outfielders and other hitters.

"Chad had a great career here and that gives him credibility with our players," Carolina head coach Mike Fox says. "He has an enthusiasm and a tremendous love for Carolina and for baseball that is contagious. He is a great communicator and enjoyable person to be around, which endears him to players, parents and everyone in our program."

In the summer of 1997, Holbrook served as the head coach of the Harwich Mariners of the Cape Cod League and led them to the league's Eastern Division championship.

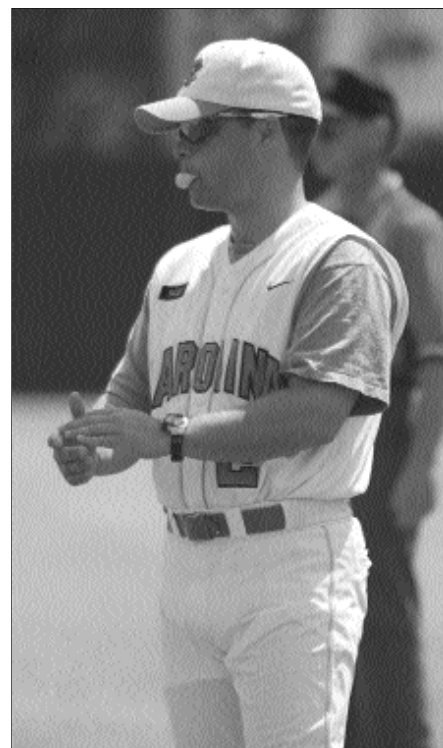
Holbrook's name appears often in the Carolina record book, as he ranks among Carolina's career leaders in hits, runs, games, at bats and stolen bases. His 14 triples still rank No. 1 in school history.

As Carolina's lead-off hitter, Holbrook set the single-season record for stolen bases with 40 in 1993, a record broken by Brian Roberts in 1997.

Holbrook was named all-tournament at the NCAA Central I Regional in College Station, Texas after hitting .565 (13-for-23), including three doubles and two triples, in five games. He was a second-team All-ACC selection who hit .353 as a senior.

Holbrook earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from North Carolina in 1994. His father, Eddie, coached basketball at both Gardner-Webb and Furman.

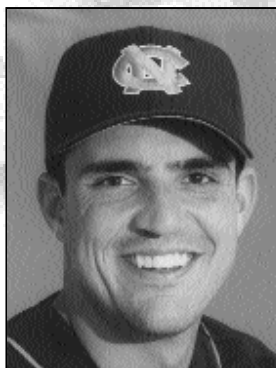

He coached first base and helped with recruiting as the Battling Bishops went 42-7 and advanced to the 1998 NCAA Division III College World

Series.

In the summers of 1999 and 2000, Forbes coached the Wilmington Sharks of the Coastal Plain League. He was named the CPL's Coach of the Year after leading the Sharks to the league title and best overall record at 33-16 in 1999. The Sharks' 33 wins were a league record.

Forbes hit .321 as a player at N.C. Wesleyan during the 1995-97 seasons, leading the Battling Bishops to two Dixie Conference championships and the 1997 CWS. As a senior, he hit .387 with 61 RBIs and 27 doubles, setting the NCAA Division III record for doubles in a season. Forbes married the former Mandy Passwaters in September 2000.

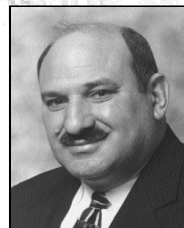

JAMES MOESER CHANCELLOR

When Dr. James Moeser was first approached about leading the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, its academic excellence and tradition as the nation's oldest public campus impressed him.

But that's not why Moeser (pronounced "MEE-zer") ultimately decided he wanted to become Carolina's ninth chancellor. It was the university's potential to be even better.

"What attracted me to Carolina was not, important though it is, the preservation of a great tradition," Moeser says. "It was the opportunity to help take this university to a position where it will be the best public university in the United States. With the right combination of future public and private support, I am confident that such an ambitious goal is within our reach."

Moeser says he will constantly work to articulate what sets the university apart from other schools.

"Students who come to Chapel Hill, from the moment they set foot on this beautiful campus, realize there is something very special about the academic experience," he says. "Carolina's graduates develop a powerful bond that lasts a lifetime, creating a remarkably loyal alumni base. Our job is to take that love and convince alumni and friends to reinvest in the institution that made such a difference in their lives and to help us take it to an even higher level."

The UNC Board of Governors unanimously elected Moeser as chancellor last April. He started August 15, succeeding William O. McCoy, who became interim chancellor in July 1999 following Michael Hooker's death from non-Hodgkins lymphoma. Moeser was installed as chancellor on University Day, October 12, 2000.

Moeser's top priority when he began at Carolina was to help lead UNC's efforts to earn the votes of North Carolinians in November 2000 for the \$3.1 billion bond referendum to improve capital facilities on UNC and community college campuses. Successful passage of the referendum means nearly \$500 million for Carolina's capital needs.

A concert organist, Moeser, 61, began his academic career in 1966 at the University of Kansas as an assistant professor and chairman of the department of organ. After rising through the academic ranks at Kansas, he was named dean of the School of Fine Arts in 1975. In 1984, he was named Althaus Distinguished Professor of Organ, becoming the first academic dean at Kansas ever to hold an endowed chair.

In 1986, Moeser joined Pennsylvania State University as dean of the College of Arts and Architecture and executive director of University Arts Services, which coordinates cultural programs. Six years later, he became vice president for academic affairs and provost of the University of South Carolina, a post he held until becoming chancellor of Nebraska in 1996.

A native of Colorado City, Texas, who grew up in Lubbock, Moeser received a bachelor's of music degree with honors in 1961 and a master's of music in musicology in 1964 from the University of Texas at Austin. He completed advanced study in Berlin and Paris as a Fulbright scholar and received a doctorate in musical arts from the University of Michigan in 1967.

A past president of the American Guild of Organists, Moeser earned an international reputation as a concert organist and performed regularly until 1993. He has chaired several national organ pedagogy conferences and consulted with numerous universities and churches.

Moeser is married to Dr. Susan Dickerson Moeser, a fellow concert organist and faculty member at Nebraska. He has two children from a prior marriage: a son, Chris, a reporter at The Arizona Republic, and a daughter, Carter, a doctoral candidate in physical therapy at the Arizona School of Health Sciences.



DICK BADDOUR DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Dick Baddour, a 1966 graduate of the University of North Carolina, was named Director of Athletics on June 25, 1997. In his three years as director, the Tar Heels have undergone a number of changes, yet remain one of the premier athletic programs in the

Atlantic Coast Conference and across the nation.

The Goldsboro, N.C., native heads a program that with 28 varsity sports is the largest in the ACC. Last year, the Tar Heels finished fifth in the nation in the Sears Cup, a competition that ranks Division I universities for their NCAA championship performances. It was the fifth time in the seven-year history of the competition that Carolina finished in the top five. What makes those top five finishes even more impressive is the fact that Carolina's undergraduate enrollment of just over 15,000 is the 19th-largest among the schools that placed in the Top 25 in the Sears Cup standings last year.

Fiscal responsibility has been a key directive in Baddour's tenure as athletic director. He instituted a number of measures designed to keep UNC among the nation's most competitive athletic programs, while at the same time ensuring a sound financial future. Baddour leads a department that has a budget in excess of \$30 million, which is 16th-largest among the schools that placed in the Top 25 in the Sears Cup standings last year.

Baddour has served as athletic director in one of the most dynamic periods in the history of Carolina athletics. He has hired new head coaches in six sports, including football, men's basketball, men's golf, women's tennis, baseball and men's lacrosse. Just months after taking the job, Baddour had to replace Dean Smith, the winningest coach in basketball history, and Mack Brown, the second-winningest football coach in UNC history.

Baddour continues to direct a vast facilities expansion project that stretches from Kenan Stadium to Finley Golf Course. The McCaskill Soccer Center and the Francis E. Henry Stadium (field hockey and lacrosse) were dedicated two years ago and Finley Golf Course was totally re-designed in November 1999.

Baddour, who has served on 12 ACC committees, is past chair of the ACC Athletic Directors, will serve as a member of ACC Committees on Football, Basketball and Television and has chaired the ACC Tennis Committee.

He is in his 34th year of continuous service to the University. Prior to his current position, he spent 11 years under John Swofford as the executive associate director of athletics.

After graduating from UNC, Baddour spent one year as a cost accountant for Burlington Industries. He then returned to UNC in 1967 as assistant dean of men.

In 1971 he became assistant dean of undergraduate admissions. Coordinating freshman admissions took him into every high school in the state.

In 1975, he was awarded a Master of Arts degree in education with a major in student personnel administration and a minor in business administration.

Baddour was then named Assistant Dean at the UNC School of Law from 1983 to 1986. He served as the school's director of admissions and scholarship programs, head of personnel and supervisor of career planning and placement. He was also in charge of minority recruitment.

He became associate athletic director in 1986, was promoted to senior associate director in 1990 and to executive associate in 1995.

A 1962 graduate of Goldsboro High School, Baddour and his wife, Lynda, have two sons, Allen and David, and a daughter, Jennifer.



CARY C. BOSHAMER STADIUM

Cary C. Boshamer Stadium provides the University of North Carolina baseball program with one of the most beautiful home facilities in the nation.

Boshamer Stadium, located on Ridge Road in the heart of the Carolina campus, was a gift from 1917 Carolina graduate and textile industrialist Cary C. Boshamer of Gastonia, N.C. The Tar Heels have been playing at the current location since the late 1960s when Emerson Field was razed due to University expansion. Boshamer donated the original lighting system in 1970 and the Tar Heels first home night game was played April 18, 1970 vs. Wake Forest.

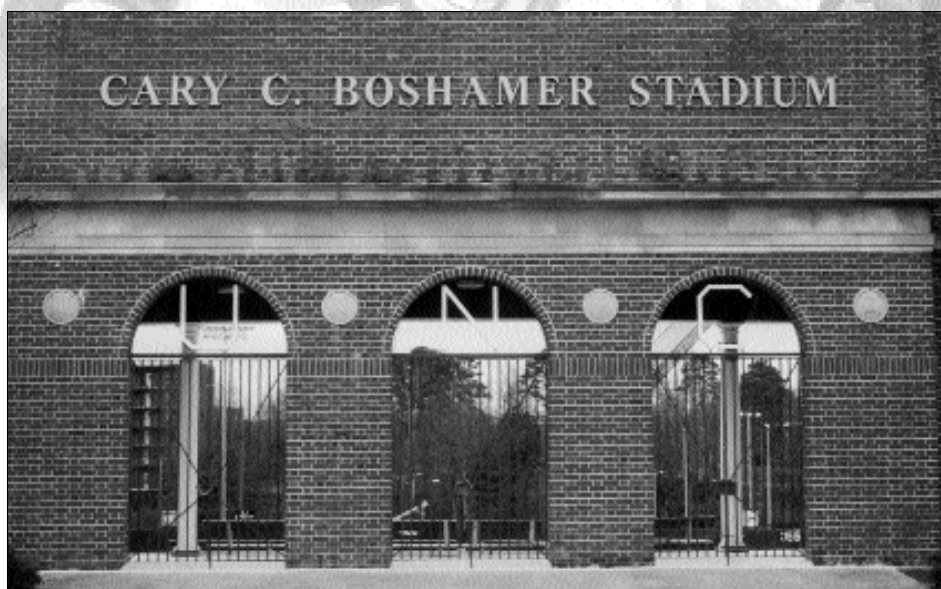
Construction on the stadium began following the 1970 season and Carolina played its first game at the new park on March 21, 1972 when Carolina defeated High Point 3-2 in its season opener. Maryland's Bob Grossman pitched a no-hitter in the stadium dedication game on April 8, 1972.

The Tar Heels have hosted 793 games at Boshamer Stadium and have a record of 598-193-2 (.755), including a 30-5 mark last year. Boshamer has been home to five Atlantic Coast Conference Tournaments, in 1973, 1975, 1981, 1982 and 1983, and the 1983 NCAA East Regional.

Carolina hosted the New York Yankees in exhibition games in 1977, 1979 and 1981 and Boshamer also played host to the 1987 U.S. Olympic Festival.

For five straight years, from 1989 through 1993, the Carolina Invitational brought some of the nation's finest programs to do battle with ACC competition just prior to the NCAA Tournament. In 1989, ESPN was on hand to televise two games live from Boshamer. That year, North Carolina upended No. 1-ranked Arizona 5-3 in 10 innings.

The Tar Heels have excelled for years in games played on its home grass, including last year when they tied a school record with 30 home wins. Carolina's 30th and final home win of the 2000 season came in dramatic fashion, a 6-5 victory over fourth-ranked Florida State on May 13. Chris Maples's two-out, pinch-hit double to right-center field drove in

catcher Dan Moylan from second base for the record-tying game-winner. Meanwhile, Carolina's .857 winning percentage in 2000 tied for the fifth best ever at UNC.

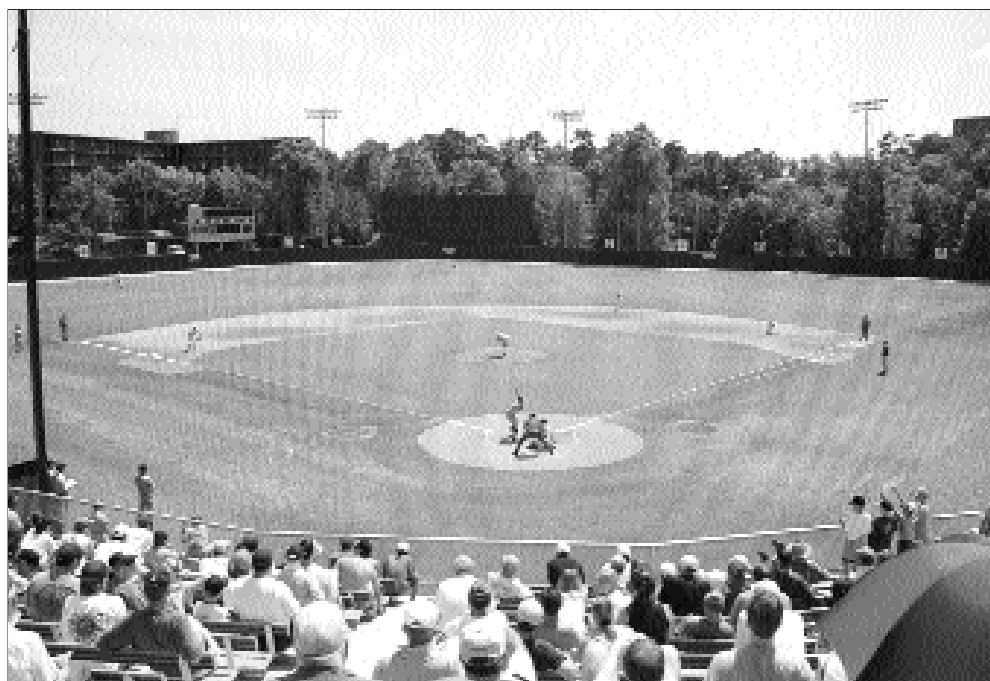
Carolina also won 30 games at Boshamer in 1993 when they went 30-9. The 1990 squad posted a 29-3 ledger at home and posted the third-best home winning percentage in history (.906). The 1983 UNC team also tallied 29 wins at home, including five during the ACC Tournament, on their way to a 42-10 overall record.

Carolina has been particularly successful in non-conference home games over the years, particularly since 1998. The Tar Heels are 62-2 against non-ACC foes over the last three years, a .969 winning percentage.

Boshamer Stadium dimensions are 335 feet down the left and rightfield lines, 370 to left-center, 400 to straight-away center and 362 to the power alley in right-center. The main grand-

stand accommodates nearly 2,000 spectators and another 600 fans can watch from the terraced embankment along the first base line.

The stadium houses the Carolina baseball offices, team room, training room and dressing rooms. Tar Heel players take advantage of a private weight training and conditioning area which supplements the equipment found at the 8,000 square foot workout room at the Student-Athlete Development Center located at Kenan Stadium. Boshamer also has indoor pitching and hitting areas and outdoor cages which allow off the field work in all weather conditions.

The Walter Rabb Press Box, dedicated on May 8, 1987, seats up to 24 members of the working press with separate radio/TV booths at either end of the facility.

Over the past several years, Boshamer Stadium has undergone a number of exciting renovations to keep it one of America's finest college baseball facilities. Since

1999, the Diamond Heels Club, a group comprised of UNC Baseball alumni and other friends of the program, has been a driving force in the renovation efforts. Among these improvements to the stadium over the past few years are expanded dugouts, new awnings over the press box and office space, new field tarp and roller, new fencing and a new training room for the Tar Heels. Renovations will continue at Boshamer and a detailed list of all the activity going at the stadium is found in the inset box in this section.

UNC is fortunate to call as its home one of the finest all-around facilities in the nation. Boshamer has it all—outstanding playing conditions maintained by a dedicated and knowledgeable grounds crew, excellent lighting, close to the field seating and purposeful training and relaxation environments for Carolina's players and coaches.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT

The Academic Support Program assists student-athletes in successfully reaching their academic goals. The program supports students in the process of exploring their interests and abilities and in developing a broad academic experience.

The mission of the Academic Support Program for Student-Athletes is to provide programs and services integrated with the University community that will address the individual needs of a diverse group of students. These programs and services are designed to promote personal growth and responsibility, to inspire educational excellence and an appreciation for the academic experience, and to culminate in graduation and the fulfillment of lifelong goals.

Located primarily in the Pope Academic Support Center, the program opened its doors in 1986. It is equipped with study facilities, a foreign language lab, tutorial rooms, a computer lab, a 128-seat auditorium, counselor's offices, and state-of-the-art video and computer equipment. Students meet with staff to discuss issues related to course selection, major and career exploration, academic progress and academic eligibility.

In the 1999-2000 academic year, 246 UNC student-athletes made the ACC Academic Honor Roll which requires at least a 3.0 cumulative GPA for the year. In the fall of 1999, 146 student-athletes made the Dean's List and 112 student-athletes did so during the spring 2000 semester. Ninety four student-athletes graduated during the 1999-2000 academic year.

"We have an athletic program with our priorities in line with the fundamental academic mission of the University," says Athletic Director Dick Baddour.

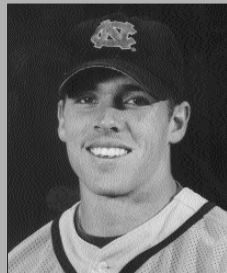
"Our young people are students first and athletes second and that will always be the case at the University. That is a credit to our coaches, administrators, support staff, but most of all, our student-athletes. Their accomplishments in the classroom are very impressive."

The staff consists of Assistant Athletic Director and Program Director Dr. Janice Hilliard; Associate Directors Burgess McSwain and Robert Mercer (baseball's academic advisor); Assistant Directors Susan Berner, Dr. Carl Carey and Dr. Kathy Parker; Academic Counselor Marisa Marucci; and Administrative Assistant Doug Roberts. They serve approximately 725 student-athletes, planning academic and life skill programming designed to help the student-athlete maximize his or her academic and extracurricular activities.

The Academic Support center is open from 8 a.m. to midnight five days a week and from 7:30 p.m. to midnight on Sundays. Visitors are welcome to tour the facility during afternoon hours.

Computers are also available for basketball players to use in the players' lounge, adjacent to the locker room in the Smith Center. The computer labs are equipped with new computers and laser printers complete with a variety of software packages, including word processing, spreadsheets, CD-ROM reference materials, tutorials, internet access and e-mail capability.

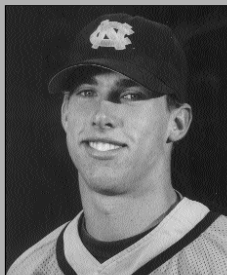

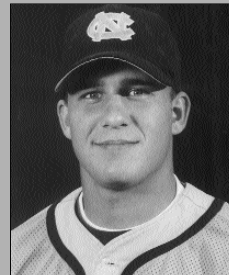

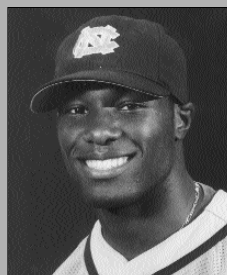

STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING

The baseball team utilizes an 8,000-square-foot fitness center under the direction of Director of Strength and Conditioning for Olympic Sports Greg Gatz, who specializes in sport-specific training and is a speed and strength specialist. The fitness center is located below the Development Center in a wing of the Kenan Fieldhouse and features state-of-the-art equipment including free weights and Olympic weights.

One of four fitness facilities used by Carolina athletes, the Kenan facility also features a performance lab where specialized aerobic equipment such as stairmasters, treadmills and biocycles are used for conditioning and monitoring rehabilitation progress. The squad also makes use of modern strength, flexibility and conditioning methods in a year-round training cycle.

In addition, Tar Heel players may take advantage of a private weight training area at Boshamer Stadium which supplements that at Kenan Field House. The stadium also has indoor pitching and hitting areas and outdoor cages which allow off-the-field work in all weather conditions. The result of such training is athletes who are properly conditioned for competition.

MEDICAL CARE

In addition to the academic and fitness programs, the Tar Heels receive excellent care from one of the country's best sports medicine staffs.

Carolina's Director of Sports Medicine, Dr. Tim Taft, oversees a program that includes care by Dr. Greg Tuttle and Dr. Bryan Smith. Dr. Mario Ciocca serves as the team physician for baseball.

Head Trainer Dan Hooker directs a staff of five full-time athletic trainers and physical therapists, several graduate students and undergraduates. Clairbeth (C.B.) Lehn works directly with the baseball team, as does graduate trainer Tony Trombetta and undergraduate trainer Jamie Berkello.

The medical and athletic training facilities are located in the Student Health Center and Fetzer Gym. Both are near Tar Heel practice areas for easy access to the conscientious treatment and advice on the care and prevention of injuries that is available from the sports medicine staff. A new training room also exists at Boshmaer Stadium that benefits UNC players when immediate care is needed.

The Athletic Department also recognizes a responsibility in educating student athletes on the physical, mental, emotional and legal issues involved in drug abuse. Accordingly, the department has established a drug education and prevention program which is administered by the University's Student Health Services.

CAROLINA OUTREACH PROGRAM

For years, the Carolina baseball team has played a special role in keeping alive a tradition at the University of North Carolina of student-athletes giving back to the community.

Carolina Outreach, a part of the Atlantic Coast Conference Outreach Program, is an organization of Tar Heel athletes dedicated to improving the lives of the residents of the town of Chapel Hill and the state of North Carolina. Assistant Athletic Director for Community Relations John Lotz has headed the Outreach program since its inception 10 years ago.

"The athletes are very receptive to the program," Lotz says. "We get a very high caliber of student-athletes around here. They enjoy giving back."

Each year, the entire baseball team participates in a number of community service activities, including the Juvenile Diabetes Walk-A-Thon, a Read-A-Thon at Frank Porter Graham Elementary School, visits to the Ronald McDonald House in Chapel Hill, the UNC Dance Marathon and a Sunday afternoon playday at the orphanage in Oxford. Outreach is also involved in the Reading Is Fundamental program at local elementary and high schools.

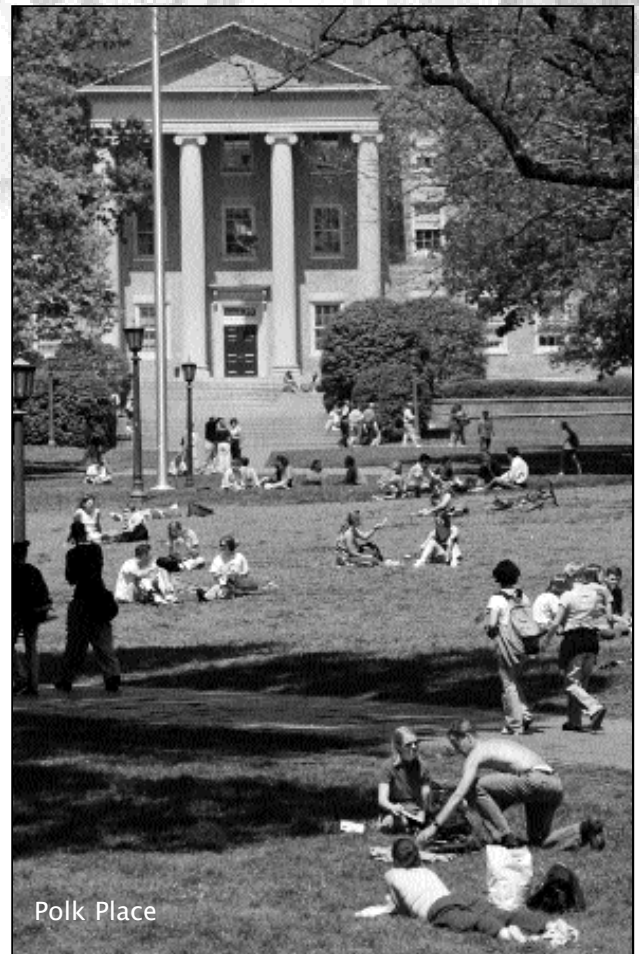
The baseball team is also one of the many University athletic teams that makes weekly visits to the Pediatric Playroom at UNC Hospitals during the season.

"I think it's important for us as student-athletes at Carolina to realize how big an impact we can have in this community," said standout center fielder Adam Greenberg. "Going to the hospital and visiting with local kids is just one of the many things we do to stay involved. I don't think there's anything like the look you see on a small child's face when we take just a few minutes to say hello and visit. It's something that teaches us to not take the gifts we have and the opportunities we are provided at UNC for granted."



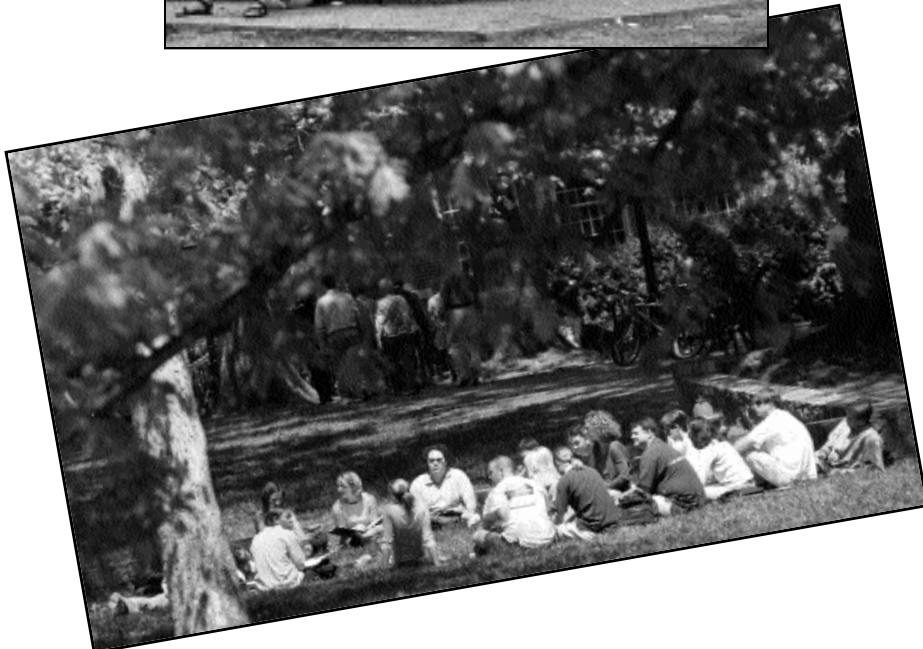

2000 SEASON REVIEW

TAR HEELS FINISH ONE WIN SHY OF SUPER REGIONAL

Carolina's record-setting 2000 baseball team ended its season with two losses to Penn State on the final day of the NCAA Regional at Upper Montclair, N.J. Carolina used 19 hits to defeat the Nittany Lions 14-5 in its NCAA Tournament opener and followed that with a 9-3 win over top-seeded Rutgers on Saturday. But back-to-back losses on Sunday sent Carolina home just one win shy of the NCAA Super Regionals. Penn State took advantage of five UNC errors (Carolina's second highest total of the season) to score a 6-5 win in the first game of the May 28 doubleheader and then eliminated the Tar Heels with a 10-3 victory in Game 2. Clay Hooper, Chris Maples, Ryan Earey, Dan Moylan and Adam Greenberg were each named to the All-Tournament team.

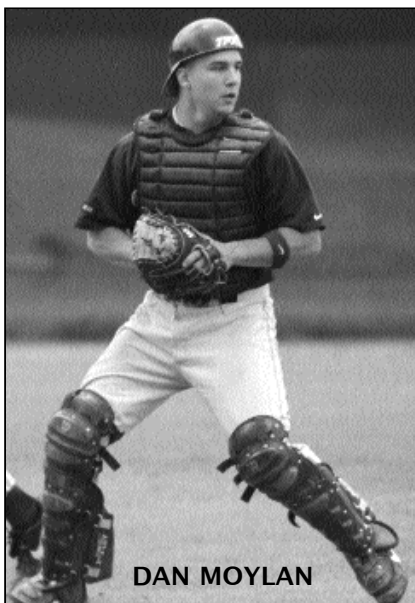
UNC IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

- Carolina earned the No. 2 seed at the NCAA Regional at Upper Montclair, N.J. UNC went to the NCAA Tournament for the third consecutive season and the 16th time in school history. The only other time the Tar Heels made three straight NCAA appearances was from 1982-84.
- Carolina is 35-35 all-time in NCAA Tournament play after going 2-2 in the 2000 NCAA Tournament.
- The Tar Heels faced 12 of the 64 schools selected to the 2000 NCAA Tournament field in a total of 28 games. Carolina was 17-11 in those games (not including NCAA play), including a perfect 14-0 mark against non-ACC teams selected to the NCAA field. Carolina faced six of the 16 No. 1 seeds in the 2000 tournament and was 2-0 against East Carolina, 3-0 against UCLA, 1-0 against Miami, 2-1 against Clemson, 1-3 against Florida State and 0-3 against Georgia Tech.

ANOTHER RECORD START IN 2000

For the second year in a row, Carolina opened the season with a record start. A year after posting its best start in school history as well as the all-time best UNC winning streak with a 16-0 start in 1999, Carolina broke those records with a 21-0 start in 2000. The 21-game UNC winning streak ranks as the second best all-time in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Clemson's 26-0 start in 1977 is the both the best start to a season and the longest winning streak in league history. Of Carolina's 21 wins to open the 2000 campaign, seven came against ranked opponents, including a three-game sweep of then-No. 2 UCLA in Westwood, a sweep of Central Florida, Rice and defending national champion Miami at the season-opening ACC/Disney Blast, and a win over in-state rival East Carolina.

TAR HEELS PEAK AT NO. 2 IN NATIONAL POLLS

Carolina, ranked in at least one of the three major polls every week of the 2000 baseball season, spent back-to-back weeks (March 6 and 13) ranked No. 2 in the nation by both Collegiate Baseball and Baseball Weekly, which was Carolina's all-time highest national ranking. Carolina spent two weeks ranked No. 3 in 1999 by Baseball America (March 15 and 22) for its previous best.

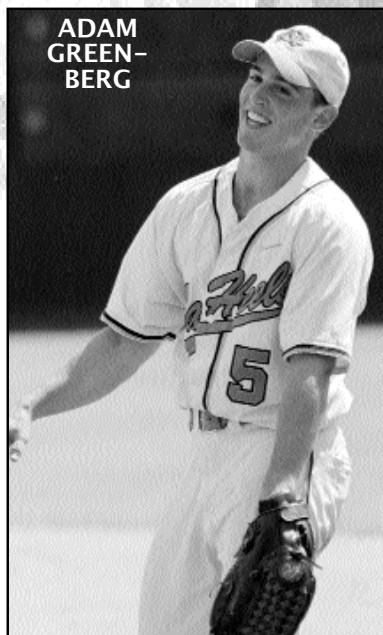
GREENBERG NAMED

ACC ROOKIE OF THE YEAR

Centerfielder Adam Greenberg capped a sensational freshman season by being named the ACC Rookie of the Year, second-team All-ACC and a freshman All-America

(Collegiate Baseball, Baseball America). He also earned a spot on the All-Tournament teams at the NCAA Regional at Upper Montclair, N.J., and the ACC/Disney Blast. Greenberg led all Tar Heel regulars in batting average (.386), hits (98), runs (69), triples (7), stolen bases (28) and slugging percentage (.594). He also had a team-high 34 multi-hit games, a 21-game hitting streak and three leadoff homers in 2000.

He started 61 of 63 games, missing only the regular-season Penn State doubleheader with a sore hamstring. His seven triples rank in a second-place tie with Chad Holbrook for the most triples in a single season in Tar Heel history, while his 98 hits tied B.J. Surhoff's 98 hits in 1985 for the second-most ever in a season at Carolina.

UNC POSTS THIRD STRAIGHT 40-WIN SEASON

- At 46-17 overall, North Carolina reached the 40-win plateau for the third consecutive season (41-18 in 1999, 42-23 in 1998). The only other time in school history the Tar Heels posted three-straight 40-win seasons was from 1983-85 when All-Americans B.J. Surhoff and Scott Bankhead, as well as UNC assistant Roger Williams, helped pave the way for a 126-40-1 record over three years.

- Carolina's 46 wins in 2000 were the second most in a single season in school history. In 1990, the Tar Heels finished 51-14 to set the school record for wins.

FIVE NAMED ALL-ATLANTIC COAST CONFERENCE

In a vote of the nine ACC baseball coaches, five Tar Heels were selected to the All-ACC baseball teams. Derrick DePriest was named first-team All-ACC at relief pitcher after posting 12 saves and a 2.89 ERA out of the bullpen. Ryan Earey, Tyrell Godwin, Adam Greenberg and Ryan Snare were all named to the All-ACC second team. Greenberg was one of just two freshmen selected to either team.

HEELS HAVE RECORD-SETTING SEASON AT THE PLATE

Carolina, which scored double digit runs in 19 games in 2000, set a host of team offensive records in the 2000 season. Carolina's .323 team batting average, 719 hits and 522 runs are all new records, as was Carolina's 21-game winning streak to open the season.

CAROLINA TIES RECORD WITH 30TH HOME WIN IN FSU SERIES

With Carolina's dramatic 6-5 win over Florida State on May 13, the Tar Heels tied a school record with their 30th home win of the season. In 1993, Carolina posted a 30-9 mark at Boshamer Stadium, while the 2000 team was 30-5 in games played in Chapel Hill. Meanwhile, Carolina's .857 home winning percentage in 2000 tied for the fifth best ever at UNC. In 1985, Carolina posted an all-time best .923 winning percentage (24-2) at Boshamer Stadium. When Towson held off a late UNC

rally to take a 9-8 win over the Tar Heels on March 21, the Tigers became the first non-ACC team to win at Boshamer Stadium since Feb. 21, 1998, ending a streak of 52 straight home wins for Carolina over non-conference foes.

PITCHING STAFF POSTS SEVEN SHUTOUTS

After finishing eighth in the nation in 1999 with a 3.73 team ERA, Carolina's pitching staff was solid in 2000, especially considering the loss of first-round draft picks Kyle Snyder and Mike Bynum from the 1999 rotation. The Tar Heels posted a 4.30 team ERA had seven shutout wins, its most since blanking seven opponents in 1978.

DEPRIEST NAMED FIRST-TEAM ALL-ACC, THIRD-TEAM ALL-AMERICA

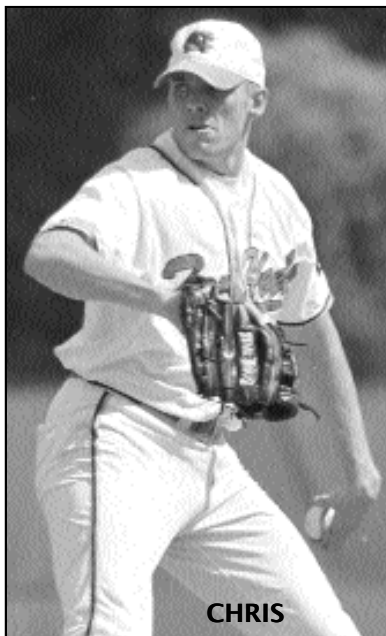
Derrick DePriest finished his career in second place all-time at Carolina with 124 career appearances. He earned first-team All-ACC honors and he was named a third-team All-America by Collegiate Baseball in his final campaign after recording 12 saves and a 2.89 ERA. He struck out 66 batters in 74.2 innings and walked just 31 in 2000.

ELMORE SAVES HIS BEST FOR LAST

Chris Elmore completed an outstanding UNC career with his finest season as a Tar Heel. After posting a 10-2 mark over the first three seasons of his career, Elmore was voted the team's most improved player after going 9-1 with a 4.12 ERA. Despite dropping a hard-luck decision on April 8 to Wake Forest — his first loss in nearly three years — he was consistent all year on the hill in becoming a fixture in the weekend rotation and a senior leader for the Tar Heels. He finished his career by winning each of his final six decisions, including an ACC Tournament win against Duke, and his .864 career winning percentage (19-3) is the second highest all-time at UNC behind only All-America and Olympian Scott Bankhead.

ELMORE AND GODWIN RECOGNIZED FOR ACADEMICS

After first being named to the 2000 GTE Academic All-District III team, Chris Elmore and Tyrell Godwin were both named second-team Academic All-Americans. Elmore was also one of the big winners at Carolina's annual all-sports dinner in April. He was UNC's male recipient of the Mildred McCaskill Award, which is given each year by the University to the senior who represents excellence in athletics, academics and community service. Elmore was also one of six student-athletes honored by the ACC for his community service, and he was baseball's winner of the Athletic Director's Scholar-Athlete Award.

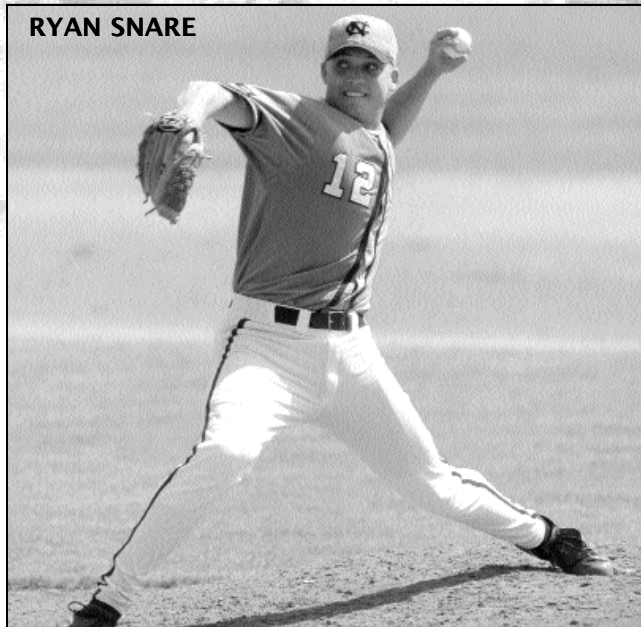

BATTERED EAREY MAKES WAY INTO ACC RECORD BOOK

When Liberty's Darren Adams hit Ryan Earey with a pitch in the fourth inning of Carolina's 7-6 win in Lynchburg, Va., on May 4, Earey became the most hit player in a single season in ACC history. Earey surpassed Florida State's Jose Zabala, who was hit by pitch 24 times in 1997, with his 25th HBP of the season. He added three more HBPs to finish the sea-

son with 28. Remarkably, Earey was actually hit 18 times in the first 21 games of the year, before the pace slowed considerably. Richmond's Andrew Slater holds the NCAA single-season record with 33 HBPs in 56 games in 1997.

SNARE WAS CAROLINA'S ACE IN 2000

Ryan Snare became one of the most dominant pitchers in the ACC and the entire country in a breakout junior season that saw him lead Carolina with 10 wins and 102 strikeouts. He was stellar throughout the 2000 season, particularly after suffering his only defeat of the year, a 5-4 loss at Georgia Tech on March 17. In notching back-to-back wins against NC State (March 25) and Clemson (March 31), Snare posted 13 strikeouts and allowed just one unearned run. In three postseason outings, Snare allowed just four earned runs in 16.2 innings and he struck out 17 batters. He led all Carolina starters with a 3.14 ERA.

GODWIN PULLS IN MORE HONORS IN BIG JUNIOR YEAR

Tyrell Godwin was among Carolina's leaders at the plate in 2000 with a .363 batting average (2nd), 82 hits (3rd), 11 home runs (2nd), 67 RBIs (T-1st) and 24 steals (2nd). He injured his right quadriceps muscle in the second game of the Florida State series and was slowed throughout the postseason, missing the ACC Tournament and seeing limited time in the NCAA Tournament, but he still managed to knock in five runs and get four hits in 11 at bats at the NCAA Regional at Upper Montclair, N.J. Godwin was named second-team All-ACC, second-team All-America by the NCBWA and third-team All-America by Collegiate Baseball and Baseball America, and he was one of 12 semifinalists for the Rotary Smith Award, given annually to the nation's top college baseball player. He was also a second-team selection to the GTE Academic All-America team.

RECORD-TYING SEVEN TAR HEELS SELECTED IN MLB DRAFT

Seven Tar Heels were selected on the first day of the Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft in 2000, tying a school-record for most draftees in one year. Tyrell Godwin became UNC's fourth first-round pick in the last two years and its 10th all-time when he was selected 35th overall with a "sandwich pick" by the Texas Rangers. Juniors Ryan Snare (Cincinnati Reds), Eric Henderson (Milwaukee Brewers), Ryan Earey (San Diego Padres) and Dan Moylan (St. Louis Cardinals) were also selected in the first eight rounds. Fifth-year seniors Derrick DePriest (Montreal Expos) and Chris Elmore (Boston Red Sox) both

TRADITION

Consistency. It's the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds.

Now in its 48th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. ACC schools have captured 79 national championships, including 39 in men's competition and 40 in women's. In addition, 119 men and 29 women have earned the coveted title of NCAA champion.

1999-2000 YEAR IN REVIEW

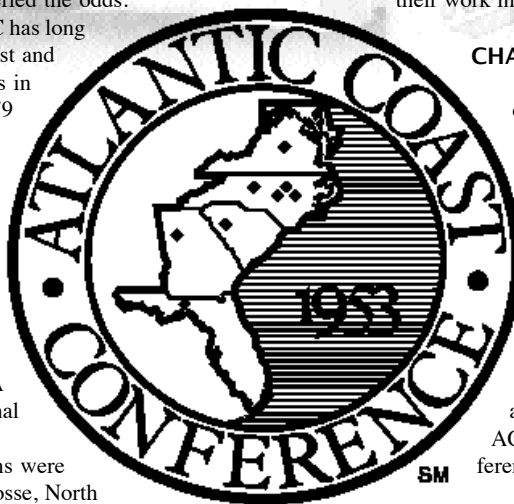
The 1999-2000 academic year concluded with the league pocketing four more national team titles and five individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 36 national team titles the last ten years.

The ACC's 1999-2000 national champions were Maryland in field hockey and women's lacrosse, North Carolina in women's soccer and Florida State in football. Overall, ACC teams posted a 62-46 (.574) mark in NCAA Tournament play.

The ACC placed at least one team in the Top 10 nationally in 19 of the 25 sports sponsored by the league. Other records of note during the 1999-2000 season include 90 teams competing at NCAA Championships, five bowl teams and 34 Top 10 showings.

Fourteen ACC teams, in ten different sports, representing seven of the nine member institutions, earned a No. 1 ranking during the course of the past academic year.

The ACC Academic Honor Roll record was broken for the 13th-straight year in 1998-99 as 1,631 student-athletes were recognized for their work in the classroom.



CHAMPIONSHIPS

The conference will conduct championship competitions in 25 sports during the 2000-01 academic year — 12 for men and 13 for women. The 2001 ACC Baseball Tournament will be held May 15-20 at Knights Stadium in Fort Mill, S.C.

HISTORY

With the addition of Florida State in 1991, the conference is nine members strong. Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, Virginia and Wake Forest all have been members since 1953, the year the ACC was founded. Georgia Tech joined the conference in 1978.

The conference office is led by John Swofford, who is in his third year as ACC commissioner. In addition to overseeing one of the nation's largest athletic conferences, he has been a pivotal force in the formation and development of the Bowl Championship Series to determine a national champion in Division I football. Swofford is a 1971 graduate of North Carolina and played football for the Tar Heels from 1969-71.

UNC BASEBALL HISTORY

1867

The Tar Heels played their first recorded game, routing an all-star team from Raleigh, 34-17.

1891

Baseball returned to Carolina after 23 years and UNC recorded a 1-2 season against collegiate competition.

1921

Manly Lewellyn recorded 11 straight victories to lead the Tar Heels to the first of three consecutive state titles.

1927

The Tar Heels were 14-8-1 and won the North Carolina state crown for rookie coach Jim Ashmore. Ashmore would win a total of 72 games in his four seasons as head coach.

1932

Bunn Hearn returned to coach the Tar Heels, remaining as head coach for 15 seasons and compiling a 214-133-2 record along the way.

1933

Carolina won the first of six Southern Conference titles in the Hearn era. Hearn's teams would also win a pair of Ration League titles in 1943 and 1945.

1934

The Tar Heels recorded the best winning percentage in school history as they were victorious in 21 of 23 games (.913).

1947

Walter Rabb took over the program after Hearn suffered a stroke. Hearn remained at Carolina for another 10 years, but Rabb is credited as being the head coach during that time.

1948

Kenny Black hit .337 and Vinnie DiLorenzo won nine games to lead Carolina to its first NCAA Tournament. The Tar Heels travelled to Kalamazoo, Mich., for the Eastern Regional where they defeated Illinois and lost to Yale and Lafayette.

1954

The Atlantic Coast Conference, formed in May 1953, conducted its first baseball championship season. The Tar Heels placed fifth with a 7-8 league record.

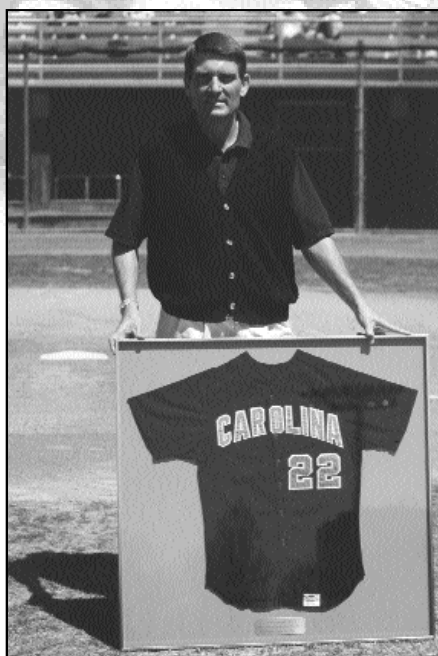
1957

Walter Rabb was officially named head coach, although he is credited for all wins and losses since 1947 when he, in effect, took over the program following Coach Hearn's stroke.

1960

Carolina went 22-7, won its first ACC title and advanced to its first-ever College World Series. The Tar Heels were defeated in the CWS by Minnesota and Oklahoma State.

1964



LEMONDS HONORED 1968 National Player of the Year Dave Lemonds had his No. 22 jersey officially retired at an April 13, 1996, ceremony at Boshamer Stadium.

Walter Rabb was named ACC Coach of the Year after the Tar Heels posted a spotless 14-0 ACC record to win their second league title. All-America pitcher Bill Haywood was 10-1 and leading hitter Ken Willard hit 11 home runs with 40 RBI. No other team in ACC baseball history has ever been undefeated in conference play.

1966

Two-sport star Danny Talbott hit .395 to lead the Tar Heels to their second College World Series appearance. Talbott also quarterbacked the Carolina football team and later went on to play in the Baltimore Orioles organization and with the NFL's Washington Redskins. Charlie Carr led the team with a .397 average and relief ace George McRae was 4-0 with a 1.71 earned run average.

1967

Garry Hill won all eight of his decisions and allowed just seven earned runs in 89 innings for a 0.70 ERA, which is still the third-best single-season mark in ACC history.

1968

Dave Lemonds went 7-1 with a 1.49 ERA and 96 strikeouts in 72 1/3 innings and was named National Player of the Year by The Sporting News. Lemonds led the Tar Heels to a 12-6 ACC record and a fourth ACC championship.

1970

Eddie Hill, a first-team All-ACC first baseman in 1968 and 1969, was ACC Player of the Year, batting .357 and pitching his way to a 5-1 record and 1.07 ERA.

1972

Catcher Mike Roberts earned first-team All-ACC honors for the third consecutive season and concluded his career with a .292 batting average.

1977

Walter Rabb retired as head coach following the season, ending a 31-year career which produced a 540-358-9 record, four ACC championships and two trips to the College World Series. The "Old Leaguer" was named to the ABCA Hall of Fame in 1978 and to the North Carolina Sports Hall of Fame in 1990.

1978

Rookie coach Mike Roberts guided the Tar Heels to a 38-17 season and third-place finish at the College World Series. The Tar Heels won the South Regional at Auburn, Ala., and split four contests in Omaha, losing to eventual national champion Southern California 3-2. ACC Player of the Year Greg Norris was 14-2 with a 1.75 ERA and 118 strikeouts and finished the regular season with a no-hitter vs. East Tennessee State.

1979

Third baseman Jim Atkinson, an All-ACC selection in 1977 and 1978, hit .359 with 16 home runs and 52 RBI and to earn ACC Player of the Year honors.

1980

Scott Bradley, playing third base at the time, become the third Tar Heel in as many years to be named the ACC Player of the Year, batting .386 with 10 homers and 63 RBI. Bradley hit .351 during his three-year career and was an All-America choice in 1980 and 1981. The Tar Heels won the ACC regular-season title for the first time since 1969.

1982

Pete Kumiega's suicide squeeze bunt scored the winning run in the 12th inning of the ACC Tournament Championship Game, giving the Heels a 3-2 win over Virginia for Mike Roberts' first tournament championship.

1983

Scott Bankhead won all nine of his decisions, and Carolina won 40-plus games for the first time in history. The 42-10 Tar Heels placed six players on the All-ACC team and won the ACC Tournament for the second straight year.

1984

Scott Bankhead went 11-0 and struck out 124, and catcher B.J. Surhoff hit .400 with 27 extra-base hits and 53 RBI in leading the Tar Heels to regular-season and tournament ACC titles. Carolina set a then-school record with 44 wins and Bankhead and Surhoff each earned first-team All-America plaudits. Bankhead concluded his career with a 24-3 record and 257 strikeouts. Surhoff set single-season UNC standards with 98 base hits and 65 runs scored. Bankhead and Surhoff also competed on the United States Olympic baseball team that won the silver medal in the Los Angeles Games. Bankhead was the 16th choice of the Kansas City Royals

in the June amateur draft.

1985

B.J. Surhoff became the first and only Carolina player to be named first-team All-America in consecutive years following a .399 campaign in which he hit 14 homers and drove in 57 runs. Shortstop Walt Weiss batted .351 and earned first-team ACC honors for the second time. The Milwaukee Brewers selected B.J. Surhoff as the number-one pick in the draft. Surhoff completed the 1994 season with a .268 career average, having played 985 games with the Brewers since the start of the 1987 season. Shortstop Walt Weiss was the 11th pick in the first round by the Oakland Athletics. Weiss was named the American League Rookie of the Year in 1988 and was a key contributor in Oakland's three consecutive A.L. championships and 1989 World Series crown.

1987

Outfielder Devy Bell set an ACC career record with 57 home runs.

1989

John Thoden won 12 games and catcher Jesse Levis hit .341 to lead the Heels to a 41-18-1 record, ACC regular-season title and College World Series berth. Carolina defeated second-ranked Mississippi State twice on the Bulldogs' home field to win the South Regional championship. Thoden, a Baseball America third-team All-America selection, was 12-1 with a 2.45 ERA and earned MVP honors at the South Regional. Michael Hoog's complete game, 2-1 victory over MSU in the regional semifinals typified the entire season—terrific pitching and timely hitting. Mike Roberts was named the ACC and Atlantic Region Coach of the Year. Levis led the team in eight offensive categories, was a third-team All-America and was drafted in the fourth round by the Cleveland Indians. The Tar Heels played host to the inaugural Carolina Invitational and defeated No. 1-ranked Arizona 5-3 in extra innings.

1990

The Tar Heels won a school-record 51 games, captured the ACC regular season and tournament championships and entered the NCAA Tournament as the top seed at the Northeast Regional. Michael Hoog set UNC career records in wins (30), starts (60), innings (390) and strikeouts (289). Steve Estroff hit .389 with 15 home runs and 73 RBI and was a Baseball America second-team All-America, and shortstop Ron Maurer set a UNC record with a 31-game hitting streak. Jim Dougherty went 12-2 with a 1.71 ERA and freshman Paul Shuey earned Freshman All-America honors with an 8-1 record and eight saves during his rookie season. Carolina set an ACC record March 3 by scoring 19 runs in the fifth inning in a 23-0 win over Seton Hall.

1991

Paul Shuey and Donnie Leshnock competed as members of the U.S. National Team. Shuey participated with Team USA in the Pan American Games in Havana, Cuba.

1992

Paul Shuey was the second overall pick in the

draft when the Cleveland Indians selected him in the first round. Donnie Leshnock was a fifth-round choice by the New York Yankees.

1993

Carolina compiled a 43-20 overall ledger, including a school-record 30 wins at home, and advanced to the finals of the NCAA Central I Regional where Manny DaSilva, Chad Holbrook and Cookie Massey were named all-tournament. Sophomore relief pitcher Thad Chrismon tied for first in the nation with an ACC-record 18 saves and was named first-team All-America by Collegiate Baseball. Holbrook finished his career with UNC's highest career totals in hits, stolen bases, triples, games played and at bats. Head coach Mike Roberts earned his 600th career win on May 22 when UNC defeated Miami, 3-1, in the Winn Dixie/Carolina Invitational.

1994

Senior designated hitter Cookie Massey was a second-team All-America selection by the NCBWA, the ABCA and Collegiate Baseball and named first-team All-ACC.

1995

Carolina posted a 39-23 record and earned a No. 3 seed in the NCAA Tournament's Atlantic II Regional in Coral Gables, Fla. Senior Sean Murphy posted an 11-4 record and set the UNC record for strikeouts in a season with 125. Thad Chrismon received All-ACC honors for the third consecutive year, after he was named to the second team. Chrismon finished his career leading both the ACC and UNC with 141 career appearances and 41 saves.

1996

The Tar Heels went 33-25 and first baseman Mike Stoner was named first-team All-ACC after pounding 20 home runs, the fourth-best single-season figure in school history. Head coach Mike Roberts earned his 700th career victory in a win over Georgia Tech on Apr. 21.

1997

Brian Roberts was named the national Freshman of the Year and set school records with a .427 batting average, 102 hits, 24 doubles and 47 stolen bases. The Tar Heels went 29-31 on the season.

1998

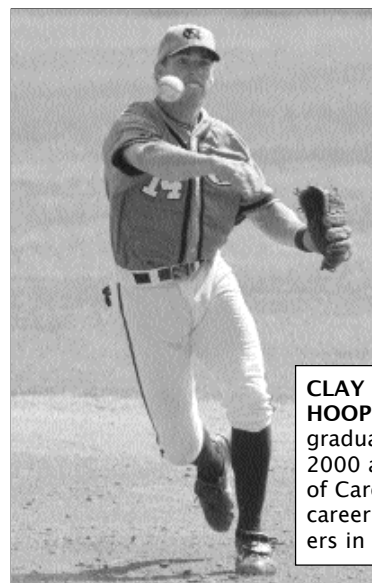
Carolina went 42-23 and reached the finals of the NCAA Tournament Atlantic I Regional before losing to No. 1-ranked Miami. Brian Roberts was named UNC's first ACC Player of the Year since Scott Bradley in 1980 after batting .353 with 13 home runs, 49 RBI and 63 stolen bases, a total that led the nation. Jarrett Shearin joined Roberts on the first-team All-ACC squad after hitting .346 with 14 homers, 68 RBI and 28 steals. Reliever Derrick DePriest set a school record and led the ACC with 44 pitching appearances, going 7-3 with an ERA of 3.15 in 114.1 innings. The season marked the final campaign in Mike Roberts' 21 years as UNC's head coach.

1999

Under the direction of new head coach Mike

Fox, Carolina went 41-18 and made its fifth NCAA Tournament appearance of the 1990s. UNC began the season with the best start in school history, 22-2, which included a Carolina-record 16-game winning streak. Carolina peaked at No. 3 in Baseball America's national rankings, also a Tar Heel record, during the strong start. The Heels were led by one of the nation's finest pitching staffs (team ERA of 3.73 ranked eighth nationally), including regular weekend starters Mike Bynum, Ryan Snare and Kyle Snyder, as well as ace reliever Derrick DePriest, who posted the nation's lowest ERA (1.71). Snyder and Bynum were both first-round draft picks in the Major League Baseball Amateur Draft. Jarrett Shearin finished his career ranked No. 1 in runs, doubles, RBI and hits in the UNC record book. Tyrell Godwin and Dan Moylan earned first-team All-ACC honors.

2000



CLAY HOOPER graduated in 2000 as one of Carolina's career leaders in runs,

One year after getting off to its best start in school history, Carolina eclipsed that with a UNC-record 21-game winning streak to open the 2000 campaign. The Tar Heels went on to post a 46-17 record, its third consecutive 40-win season and the second most victories in school history. The Tar Heels, who peaked at an all-time-high No. 2 in the Collegiate Baseball and Baseball Weekly polls, earned their third consecutive NCAA Tournament berth and fell just one win shy of advancing out of the Regional at Upper Montclair, N.J. as the No. 2 seed. Centerfielder Adam Greenberg earned Freshman All-America honors and was named the ACC Rookie of the Year after having one of the finest freshman campaigns in UNC history. Greenberg led all Tar Heel regulars in batting average, runs, hits, triples, stolen bases and slugging percentage. Overall, five Tar Heels were named either first- or second-team All-ACC, including Derrick DePriest and Tyrell Godwin, who were also both All-America selections. Following the season, seven Tar Heels were selected in the MLB Draft, including Godwin, who was a first-round supplemental pick of the Texas Rangers.

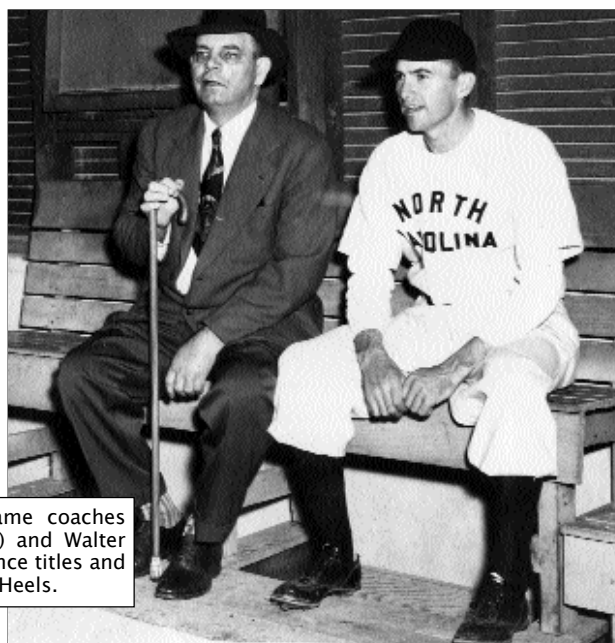

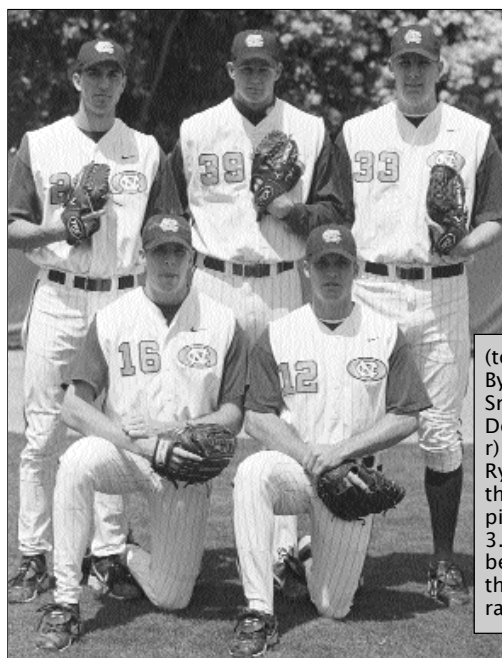
