The University of North Carolina has a long-term agreement with Nike, which provides UNC teams with shoes, apparel, equipment bags and other products. The contract, signed in 1994 and again in 1997, was extended for a period of eight more years beginning in July 2002. 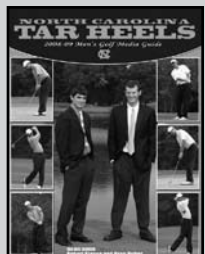


2008-09 UNC Men's Golf Guide

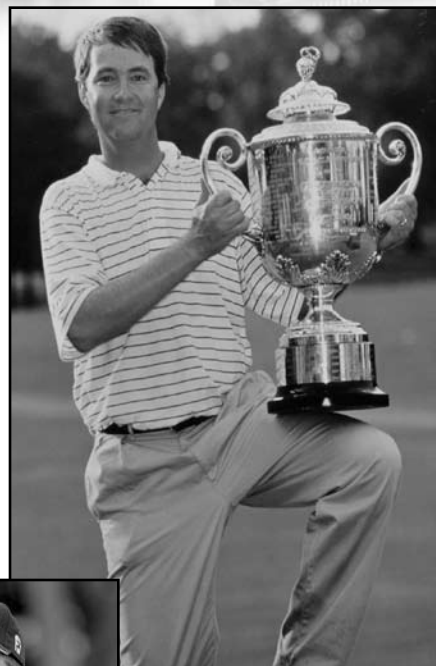


Directions To UNC Finley Golf Course

From Eastern North Carolina and/or Raleigh/Durham International Airport: Take I-40 West to Chapel Hill. Stay to the left and follow I-40 West to Exit 273-A. Follow NC 54 West for approximately three miles. There will be a Finley sign on your left at the sixth stoplight. Go left and the club house is approximately 1/2 mile away. **From North of Chapel Hill:** Take I-85 South to Durham. Exit to the left at exit 174 onto 15-501 South. Stay to the left on 15-501 Bypass. You will make a left turn onto Old Mason Farm Road – there is a sign for both Finley and the N.C. Botanical Garden. The club house will be approximately one mile away. **From Charlotte and West of Chapel Hill:** Take I-85 North to I-40 East. 85 and 40 split at Hillsborough, just west of Chapel Hill. Take I-40 to exit 270 and exit onto Highway 15-501 South. Stay to the left on 15-501 Bypass. You will make a left turn onto Old Mason Farm Road – there is a sign for both Finley and the N.C. Botanical Garden. The club house will be approximately one mile away. **From South of Chapel Hill:** Take I-77 North to I-85 and then follow the same directions as from Charlotte. Or take I-95 North to I-40 West. 95 and 40 converge just north of Benson, N.C. Then take I-40 all the way to Chapel Hill and follow the directions from the airport (see above).

The University of North Carolina men's golf team will be all about one thing for the 2009 spring season: consistency. Head Coach John Inman is in his 11th year with the Tar Heels and he knows he has a great team – the team just needs to strive for consistency throughout the lineup to insure a strong spring season.

“We’ve had some good rounds [in the fall of 2008], but we just haven’t been able to keep it going,” said Inman. “And that’s the thing we’ve got to do. That consistency, it has got to be throughout the round.”

The Tar Heels return with a full lineup of stellar golfers, and Inman’s emphasis on consistency is on the mind of each player. Some are returning with strengthened amateur resumes and some are back from injuries. But all are looking to play hard and strive for success.

One senior that Inman knows he can count on for work ethic is Robert Riesen. The Pinehurst, N.C., native was third on the team with a 73.14 scoring average last year. He also tied for 10th in the North Carolina Amateur last summer before his senior year. Riesen has already shown some senior leadership in the fall of 2008 by competing in all four tournaments.

“Robert has been a great player for us over the years,” said Inman. “He’s playing with a lot more confidence. I expect him to continue that play because he really wants to go on and play professional golf – and I think this is a stepping-stone. You’ve got to be comfortable at this level and you have to play well at this level. He knows that and he’s working hard.”

Fellow senior Ryan Holler, of Morehead City, N.C., is also looking to get more playing time in his final season as a Tar Heel. Although Holler has struggled some throughout his career, he has consistently been competitive on the B-team.

“Ryan hasn’t played as much for us,” said Inman. “But I expect him to keep

working hard and to be ready to play in the spring. He played one A-team tournament last fall and has also played a couple other times as an individual and another B-team tournament. He’s had some mixed results, but I know he’ll be ready to play in the spring.”

With only two seniors, Carolina has the opportunity to look to the juniors for more leadership. Chase MacFarland

and David Holzworth have already proven that they can be big contributors.

MacFarland finished second in the ACC Championship in 2008 after a huge comeback that spring and placed highest among Carolina’s players at the NCAA West Regional with a tie for 25th. The Savannah, Ga., native was also named to the All-ACC Academic Golf Team.

“Chase is an incredible talent,” said Inman. “When he’s on, he’s one of the best in college golf. We’ve just got to find a way for him to maintain that level week in and week out. He wants to be in the lineup – he wants it a great deal. He’ll do the things that it will take to get there.”

Holzworth had a much more exciting freshman season than his sophomore season, but he has already played in two tournaments as a junior in the fall of 2008. An eight-over 224 in the Bank of Tennessee Intercollegiate and a three-over 213 in the Jerry Pate National Intercollegiate were carded by the Chapel Hill, N.C., native.

“David is a very talented player and he’s really becoming more consistent,” said Inman. “To be able to maintain at that high of a level for an extended period, that’s the difficult part, but David is learning how to do that. I expect him to really help us in the spring because he is one of our most talented players.”

The Tar Heel to watch out for is sophomore Kevin O’Connell out of Cary, N.C. As a freshman, he consistently tagged top-30 finishes – seven of which were top-10. The 2008 ACC Freshman of the Year led the team with a 71.66 scoring average and the most under-par at 14. He spent the summer playing in the North Carolina Amateur where he finished sixth, the U.S. Amateur where he advanced to match play, and the Fuji Xerox USA vs. Japan Collegiate Golf Championship at Tokyo Golf Club where he earned MVP honors and carded three victories. Clearly, O’Connell is a superstar in the making.

“He just has that determination,” said Inman. “When he’s putting well, when his short game is on, he’s going to win golf tournaments. He just has what it takes to be one of the best players in college golf. He’s working on trying to get a little bit more length, trying to hit it a little further. And I think that is something that

will help him when he gets to his pro career.

"He's an outstanding player. He hates to lose and he really goes about everything in a really professional manner. He's going to have a long and very good career. He's intense – very intense."

Sophomore Henry Zaytoun III of Raleigh, N.C., really came on as a team player in the spring of his freshman year. Eighteen of his total 20 rounds played in 2007-08 were counted towards the team total. His best finish was a tie for 27th at the Administristaff Augusta State Invitational.

"Henry came off a great high school career and junior golf career," said Inman. "He has been a little bit inconsistent, I guess, with his results in tournaments. He has just struggled and I think he puts a lot of pressure on himself. He's learning how to relax on the golf course and let the game come to him by not putting so much pressure on the results."

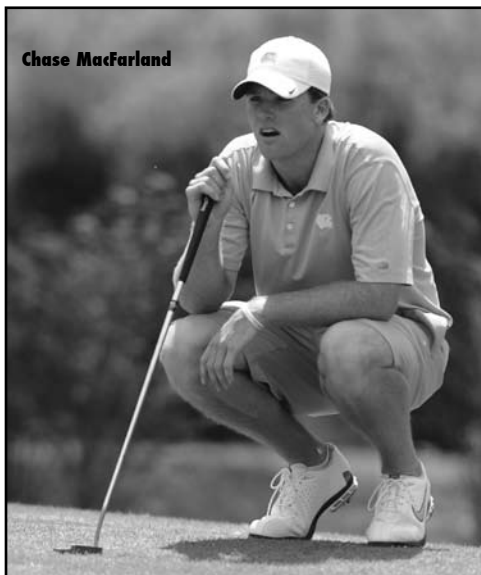
Philip Chauncey, a sophomore out of Durham, N.C., returns to the Tar Heels after rehabilitating from knee surgery in 2007-08. He is healthy and ready to play, hoping to get a real start in college play. He already got a start in amateur competition by competing in the North Carolina Amateur where he tied for 56th. In the fall of 2008, Chauncey played in three tournaments. He led the team at the Carpet Capital Collegiate, a tournament in which all the Tar Heels struggled.

"He's finally gotten the taste of being in the lineup and getting comfortable at that point," said Inman. "That is what is going to help us in the spring: these guys having that experience and being ready for the big tournaments in which we're playing, and Philip is making good strides."

The 2008-09 team is already stacked with talent, but the freshmen class has plans of their own to help the team. Inman agrees that the three newcomers will help the team immensely.

Jack Fields is already a standout in North Carolina. The Southern Pines, N.C., native won the 2008 North Carolina Amateur and went on to play in the U.S. Amateur before entering college. Fields' final round at the North Carolina Amateur included an impressive double eagle, an eagle, and five birdies. As a Tar Heel, he has already carded a top-10 finish at the Maryland Intercollegiate.

"Jack has made the transition, and that's the hardest part," said Inman. "He already has a taste of some good playing in college. I

think that he's a guy who has that fire in his belly. He wants to win. And on top of that, he has the abilities to shoot good scores. He's going to be a great player for us and he's just going to bring a lot of fire and intensity to the game and that's what we need. We need that little bit of swagger."

Patrick Barrett, of Pinehurst, N.C.,

was a high school classmate of Fields. Unfortunately, Barrett suffered some injuries at the end of his junior career, including a broken bone in his hand.

"He continued to play through it but shot some pretty poor scores and got frustrated," said Inman. "But he's back, he's healthy, and we've seen what he can do. He hasn't reached that level of maturity yet on the golf course, but that's something he'll get because he has all the tools. He picks things up quickly so I think that he's going to be incredible."

Pine Valley, N.J., native Matt Raudenbush rejoins the Tar Heels after a medical redshirt season used to recover from shoulder surgery. The former hockey player is known for his competitiveness, and Inman thinks that will "pay big dividends for him."

"He's tough, mentally tough," said Inman. "Matter of fact, I have a lot of putting games out there with him. He loves to beat me just as much as I love to beat him. Hopefully everybody is pushing him to make him better. He's just a very mature young man."

With only two seniors and three juniors, Carolina does seem to have a young team. But Inman is not worried because the underclassmen have already proven that they can pull their clout with the rest of the big-time players in college golf.

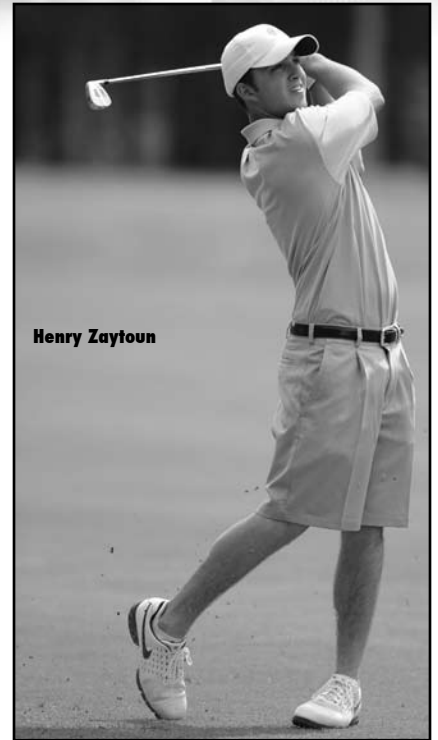
"We're very deep right now," said Inman, "and I think we're going to have a lot of competition for those five spots."

An interesting fact about the men's golf team is that all but one of the players are from the southeast, but even more remarkable is that eight are from the state of North Carolina. The program has had internationally and nationally renowned players before, but to have so many in Carolina's own backyard is truly special.

"Assistant Coach Don Hill has done a great job in establishing the relationships with these kids and really being out there," said Inman. "It's not to say that we don't recruit the best players in the country or internationally, but when we have so much talent here in the state, it would be silly not to utilize it."

Utilizing the talent available is evident in the Tar Heels' performances – the only thing lacking is consistency. But Inman knows that, and he is pushing his players to strive for that consistency for the spring portion of the 2008-09 season.

"We've got some work to do," said Inman. "We're trying to find our consistency. I'm not worried about where we are right now because I know how much ability and talent and desire these guys have. We're going to get it going in the right direction."

The Carolina Order of Merit was established in 1991 by the University of North Carolina Department of Athletics and Golf Program to honor former players, coaches, administrators and friends who have distinguished themselves in the game and for their overall contributions to the golf program at the University. The contributions of these individuals have been of paramount importance in the growth of the program at UNC, and they are an integral part of the excellence of one of America's top collegiate golf programs.

The first two inductees, Jim Ferree and Harvie Ward, were inducted in 1991, Chuck Erickson and Bill Williamson were inducted in 1992, Bobby Galloway was inducted in 1993, Dot Gunnells and Ed Kenney were the inductees in 1994, John Inman was inducted in 1996, Davis Love III was inducted in 1997, Roger Perry was inducted in 2001, A.E. Finley and the Finley Foundation were inducted in 2002, Donna Andrews was inducted in 2003 and Woody Durham was inducted in 2007. The inductions take place at the Executive Cup Golf Tournament each year during the event's annual banquet.

DONNA ANDREWS

Donna Andrews, one of Carolina's top players, now plays on the LPGA Tour. A star on Tar Heel teams, 1986-89, Andrews was selected second-team All-America in 1989. During her collegiate career, she captured one championship, the 1988 Lady Paladin Invitational. She also finished third at the 1989 NCAA Championship, the best finish ever by a Carolina player in that prestigious event. Andrews was a two-time champion of the North and South Amateur, capturing that title in 1984 and 1988. She was selected in 2003 to the Atlantic Coast Conference 50th Anniversary Women's Golf Team.



Andrews, a past president of the LPGA, has been playing on the LPGA Tour since 1990. She also provides commentary for some events. She has captured six LPGA championships, including the 1994 Nabisco Dinah Shore Championship. She is a two-time member of the Solheim Cup, 1994 and 1998. Andrews finished in the top three in the 1992 and 1993 U.S. Women's Open Championships, a truly remarkable accomplishment.

WOODY DURHAM

Woody Durham, in his 37th year as "Voice of the Tar Heels," was inducted into the Order of Merit in 2007. He has participated in UNC's Executive Cup Golf Tournament and served as the emcee of the tournament's banquet since its inception in 1976.

Durham has received numerous broadcasting awards during his career. He has been honored 12 times as the North Carolina Sportscaster of the Year, the most recent in 2005. In 2004 he was inducted into the North Carolina Broadcasters Association Hall of Fame and in 2005 he was inducted into the North Carolina Sports Hall of Fame. In November 2000, Durham received the William R. Davie Award, the highest honor given by the UNC trustees. He has been honored or received awards from the UNC Athletic Department, the North Carolina High School Athletic Association, the UNC General Alumni Association, the Atlantic Coast Conference and the All-America Football Foundation.

In addition, Durham serves as co-chairman of the Carolina Kids Classic, which raises money for the Ronald McDonald House, the UNC Children's Hospital and the Childhood Trust.

Durham and his wife, Jean, reside in Chapel Hill. They have two sons, Wes, who is the play-by-play broadcaster for Georgia Tech and the Atlanta Falcons, and Taylor, who is the network affiliations manager for International Sports Properties in Winston-Salem, N.C.

CHUCK ERICKSON

A very famous name in Carolina athletic history is Chuck Erickson. He served as Carolina's men's golf coach for 23 years from 1935 till 1961, minus three years during World War II when the school fielded no team. In that span, his teams won five conference championships and placed second and fourth in the 1953 and 1960 NCAA Tournaments. Erickson coached three All-Americans, Harvie Ward, Bill Williamson and Bill Thornton, and one NCAA champion, Ward in 1949.

Erickson was also Carolina's athletic director, 1952-1968. During his tenure, the University broke from the Southern Conference and helped form the Atlantic Coast Conference. Erickson was directly responsible for the construction of UNC's own Finley Golf Course.

A native of Oak Park, Ill., Erickson graduated from



Carolina in 1931 and was a star halfback on the 1928-1930 football teams. He was a recipient of the Helms Athletic Hall of Fame Award in 1970 and was inducted into the North Carolina Sports Hall of Fame in 1992. Erickson passed away in 1977 after suffering a heart attack.

JIM FERREE

Jim Ferree played on Carolina's 1951-1953 golf teams and was the 1953 Southern Conference Champion. A native of Pine Bluff, N.C., Ferree played on the PGA Tour for 11 years, 1956-1966, and won the 1958 Vancouver Centennial. He was a fixture on the Senior Tour for many years, beginning in 1981. He won two tournaments on the Senior Tour – the 1986 Greater Grand Rapids Open and the 1991 Bell Atlantic Classic. In addition to his win at the Bell Atlantic Classic in 1991, he carded eight top-10 finishes.



A.E. FINLEY & THE FINLEY FOUNDATION



A.E. Finley and the Finley Foundation have been instrumental in all Tar Heel golf success with their generous and loyal support for over 50 years of the men's and women's golf programs. Finley was largely responsible for the original construction of Finley Golf Course which opened in 1949. The Finley Foundation remains an integral part of the A.E. Finley Executive Cup Golf Tournament which is an important part of the tradition of Carolina's golf program and a fixture on the schedule each year.

BOBBY GALLOWAY

Bobby Galloway was the fifth inductee into the Order of Merit. Galloway lettered for the Tar Heels in 1959 and 1960 and was captain in 1960 when Carolina won the Atlantic Coast Conference championship. That same year, Galloway was a quarterfinalist at the NCAA Championships and led the Tar Heels to a fourth-place finish.

He turned professional in 1964 but not before he won the Winston-Salem City-County Championship on four occasions. He had his best PGA Tour finish in 1965 when he placed 10th at Memphis. Galloway was the Carolinas PGA champion in 1971. He won the North Carolina Open in 1972 and the National PGA Club Pro title in 1976. Galloway was the Carolinas Professional Golfer of the Year in 1976.

In 1980, Galloway regained his amateur status and has since won 10 tournament titles. He presently resides in Chapel Hill.



DOT GUNNELLS

Dot Gunnells, one of the premier coaches in the country during her tenure, was the head coach of Carolina's women's team for 18 years, 1974-1993.



Gunnells was named Coach of the Year in 1993 by the National Golf Coaches Association. That same year, she was inducted into the National Golf Coaches Association Hall of Fame and was the recipient of the National Golf Coaches Association Gladys Palmer Award for contributions to golf outside the normal coaching responsibilities.

In 1985, Gunnells was named the ACC Coach of the Year and in 1992 she was selected the Mid-Atlantic/East Region Coach-of-the-Year. Her teams carded 11 national top-25 finishes, placed eighth at the NCAA Championship three times (1989, '92 and '93) and won the ACC Championship in 1992. She also coached five All-Americans.

JOHN INMAN

One of Carolina's greatest golfers, John Inman won the NCAA Championship in 1984 at Bear Creek Golf World in Houston, Texas. He broke Ben Crenshaw's NCAA record with a 17-under-par score which stood in the record books for 16 years. Inman was the second Tar Heel to win an NCAA Individual Championship, the first being Harvie Ward in 1949. Inman won the 1984 Fred Haskins Award as the National Player of the Year. He was a member of the World Amateur Team that same year and won the 1984 Western Amateur. He was a three-time All-America (1982-84) and a three-time All-ACC performer (1982-84) during his four-year career (1981-84)





as a Tar Heel. Inman captured five collegiate titles. Besides his NCAA title, he won the '83 Augusta College Invitational, '82 ACC Tournament, '82 Forest Hills Invitational and '81 Methodist Invitational.

He turned professional in 1985 and played on the PGA Tour for 12 years (1987-1998). While playing on the PGA Tour he won the 1987 Provident Classic and the 1993 Buick Southern Open. A native of Greensboro, N.C., Inman is in his 10th year as head coach of the Tar Heels and has already led Carolina to three top-10 NCAA finishes and an ACC Championship.

ED KENNEY

Ed Kenney served as the head professional at Finley Golf Course and also coached the men's team during 27 years with the University. He was the head pro at Finley and manager of the pro shop from 1949, the year the course opened, until he retired in 1976.



Kenney was the men's golf coach for 12 years, 1961-1972. His teams won over 71 percent of their matches and finished 12th at the 1962 NCAA Championship. His 1965 team captured the ACC Championship. Kenney also coached three ACC individual champions.

Kenney passed away in 2001, and a men's golf team award was established in his honor. It encompasses a player's attitude, academic and athletic contributions.

DAVIS LOVE III

One of Carolina's greatest golfers, Davis Love III, now stars on the PGA Tour. As a Tar Heel, Love was a three-time All-America and three-time All-ACC performer (1983-85). He was the ACC Champion in 1984, one of six individual titles he captured during his three-year career as he led the Tar Heels to 17 team championships. Love was selected to the 1985 Walker Cup team.



Love was an immediate star on the PGA Tour as he was named the 1986 PGA Rookie of the Year. Since then he has posted 19 PGA victories including the '97 PGA Championship and the '95 World Cup individual title. Love has been a five-time member of the World Cup Team (1992-95, 1997), a six-time member of the Ryder Cup Team (1993, 1995, 1997, 1999, 2002, 2004) and a six-time member of The Presidents Cup (1994, 1996, 1998, 2000, 2003, 2005).

ROGER PERRY

Roger Perry is a great friend and supporter of the Carolina golf program and was inducted into the Order of Merit in 2001. Perry served as chairman of Carolina's Executive Cup Golf Tournament for three years and was co-chairman of the fundraising campaign for the recent \$10 million redesigning and construction of UNC Finley Golf Course and the Chapman Center.

Perry, a real estate developer and president of East West Partners Management Company, Inc. in Chapel Hill, has served on numerous local and national fundraising committees and charities.

Perry is a 1971 graduate from Carolina and presently resides in Raleigh.



HARVIE WARD

One of the most celebrated golfers in Carolina's history is Harvie Ward. A member of the Tar Heel 1947-1950 golf teams, he was Carolina's first All-America in 1949 and was the NCAA Champion that same year, defeating Oklahoma's Bo Winninger, LSU's Gardner Dickinson and Notre Dame's Tommy Veech before dispatching Texas' Morris Williams Jr. in the 36-hole final, 5 and 4. However, he gained national prominence a year earlier when he won the 1948 North and South Amateur. A virtual no-name nationally when he entered the tournament, he sent Arnold Palmer and former U.S. Amateur Champion Dick Chapman home before edging international star Frank Stranahan in the 36-hole final, 1-up. Estimated crowds, upwards of 2,000, came to the famed Pinehurst #2 as fraternity brothers, teammates, coeds and others formed a caravan from Chapel Hill to Pinehurst to cheer the happy-go-lucky Ward on to victory.



Ward was the 1950 Southern Conference Champion and following graduation he won the 1952 British Amateur, the 1954 Canadian Amateur and the 1955 and 1956 U.S. Amateurs.

A native of Tarboro, N.C., Ward spent much of his life as a businessman and golf pro in California before semi-retiring and moving to Pinehurst. He passed away in September 2004.

BILL WILLIAMSON

Bill Williamson played on Carolina's 1951-1953 teams. He had an outstanding season his senior year as he was the runner-up in the NCAA Tournament in 1953. He led the team to a second-place finish that year, the Tar Heels' first top 20 finish, and was named to the All-America team, becoming Carolina's second All-America in history.

Williamson is a former chairman of Carolina's Executive Cup Golf Tournament and is an active booster of the Tar Heel golf program. In the fall of 2004, the men's and women's practice range, greens, etc. were dedicated and named the Williamson Golf Team Practice Facility. A businessman who resides in Charlotte, Williamson was co-chairman of the fundraising campaign for the recent refurbishing of UNC Finley Golf Course.



A.E. FINLEY EXECUTIVE CUP

The A. E. Finley Executive Cup remains an important part of the tradition of the Carolina golf program and a fixture on the schedule each year.

Formerly the Carolina Executive Cup, this tournament now carries a name to recognize an individual who has meant so much to Tar Heel Golf. In addition to providing funds for the original construction of the golf course and facilities, his estate has donated money for the annual trophy given to the tournament winners and also for the banquet held after the competition.

This annual tournament is an opportunity for supporters of Carolina golf to play with past and present Carolina golfers, coaches and University officials. This tournament is more than just a fundraiser; it is a homecoming for former players to renew old acquaintances and establish new friendships.

The A. E. Finley Executive Cup, which had its start in 1976, provides vital funds for an endowment from which both golf teams may draw additional revenue for travel expenses. Since the men's and women's teams play national schedules, which take them all across the country to face tough competition, the A. E. Finley Executive Cup is pivotal in helping maintain the Tar Heel program at the top of collegiate golf.

The appearances of golfing legend Jack Nicklaus in the 1980, '81 and '83 events are highlights of the tournament's history, as he thrilled all spectators and contestants with a clinic he conducted after each tournament.

At the 1997 event, which was held at UNC's Finley Golf Course, Davis Love III was inducted into Carolina's Order of Merit for all of his contribu-

tions to the Carolina Golf Program.

The inaugural Executive Cup in 1976 was played at the Country Club of North Carolina in Pinehurst, N.C. The tournament was moved to Grandfather Mountain a year later and was played there for one year (1977) before returning to the Country Club of North Carolina for two more years (1978-79). Beginning in 1980 it was played at UNC's Finley Golf Course and continued to be played there through 1990. After a four-year stint at the Governors Club (1991-94), the event returned to UNC Finley Golf Course where it is still played today. The 2008 winning team was Mark Wilson, Greg DiDonna, Ryan Parker and Rob Simmons.

UNC Finley Golf Course

• UNC Finley Golf Course is one of the premier college facilities in the nation. Traditionally recognized as one of the most beautiful courses in the southeast, Finley recently received a facelift that makes it one of the most challenging as well.

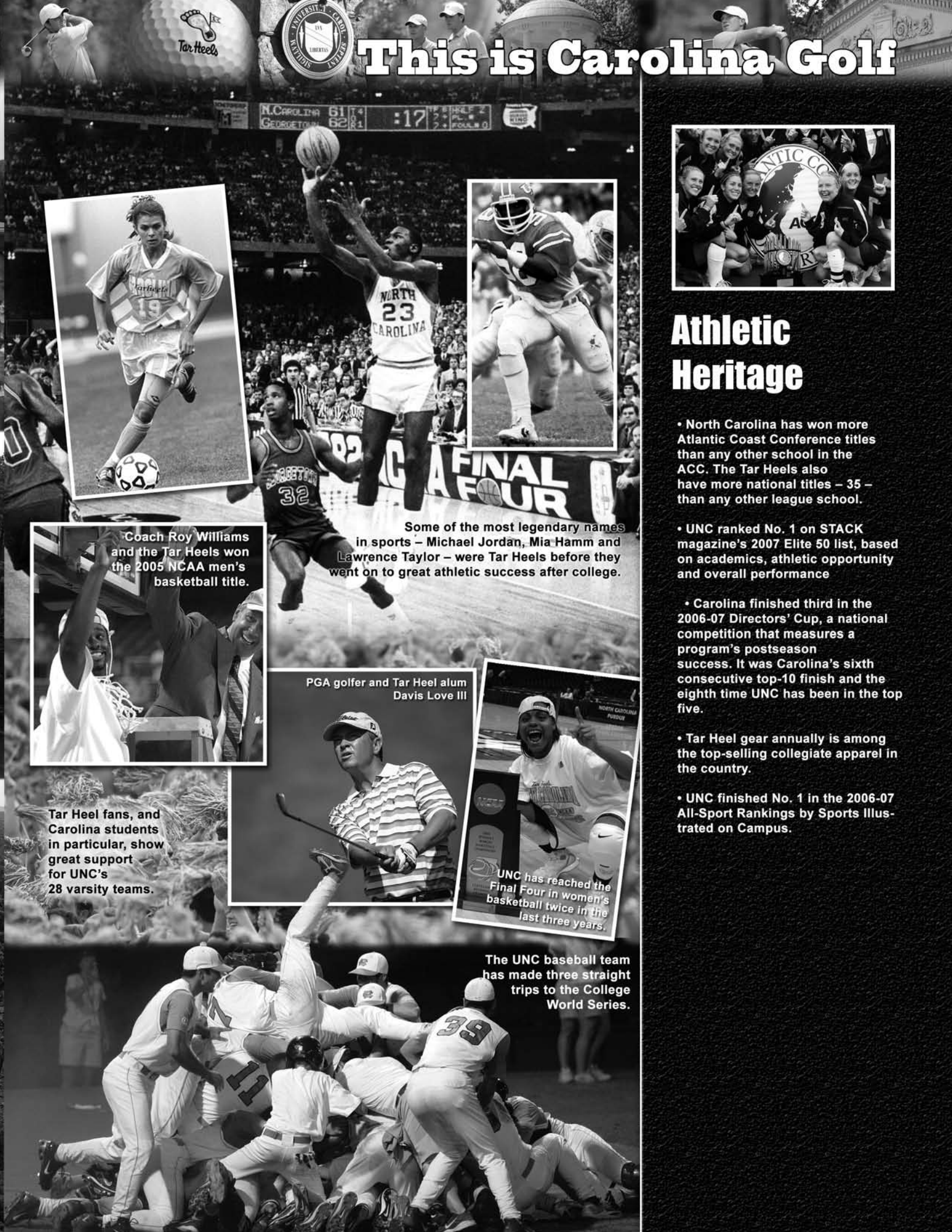
• Internationally renowned golf course designer Tom Fazio designed the new UNC Finley Golf Course, which reopened November 1999. It features a completely different layout, yet some of the best aspects of the old course were retained.

The new course features a par 72 layout with five sets of tees ranging from 4,981 yards from the forward tees to 7,187 yards from the championship markers, thus presenting a stiff challenge to the best golfers while still remaining accessible to those of all skill levels. Tees, greens and fairways were built and planted to the highest standard, while a state-of-the-art irrigation system and exceptional drainage maintains the quality of the course.

• Carolina's golf teams also have a team facility, the Chapman Golf Center, which opened in November 2001. The 4,500-square-foot facility houses coaches' offices, locker rooms, a team meeting room and a reception area. There is also a climate-controlled individual teaching area with two hitting bays and a state-of-the-art teaching system. At the far end of the range adjacent to the team facility is the Williamson Golf Team Practice Facility. In addition to a practice range, there are putting and chipping greens as well as bunkers so the teams can hone their short games. All of these superb facilities are located just a couple of miles from Carolina's campus.
