### DRIVING DIRECTIONS TO SMITH CENTER/KOURY NATATORIUM

#### From Virginia and Points North:

Take I-85 South to Durham, NC. Exit left at US 15-501 in Durham and follow 15-501 approximately 9 miles to Chapel Hill. Once in Chapel Hill, maintain US 15-501 Bypass (Fordham Boulevard). At around the 7th stoplight, turn right onto Manning Drive. The Smith Center is one-half mile on the left on Skipper Bowles Drive.

#### From Points West:

Take I-85 North toward Durham. Exit just past Burlington onto NC 54 East (Exit #148, Chapel Hill Exit). Follow NC 54 for approximately 20 miles to Carrboro. Pass Carrboro Plaza on the right and stay on NC 54 for about 4 miles to the next stoplight, Manning Drive. Turn left on Manning Drive. The Smith Center is one-half mile on the left on Skipper Bowles Drive.

#### From Points East:

Take I-40 West toward Chapel Hill. Exit at NC 54 West (Exit #273 A) and follow for approximately 4 miles. Once in Chapel Hill, continue to follow signs for NC 54 West, which means you will have to exit right under first overpass. At the top of the exit turn right at light. Follow NC 54 West/15-501 South until the 2nd stoplight. Turn right onto Manning Drive. The Smith Center is one-half mile on the left on Skipper Bowles Drive.

#### From Points South:

Take US 15-50 North toward Chapel Hill. Exit right onto US 15-501 Bypass in Chapel Hill. Turn left at first stoplight onto Manning Drive. The Smith Center is one-half mile on the left on Skipper Bowles Drive.

For 29 years, head swimming coach Frank Comfort has walked the pool deck as the leader of Carolina Swimming and Diving. Under his tutelage, the Tar Heels have finished in the top three of the ACC an astounding 56 times, including 25 conference titles. The 2006-07 season will be Comfort's proverbial swan song as he will end his run at the helm of one of Carolina's most successful programs after 30 years of service. Nevertheless, with a talented crop of newcomers and a tough, battle-tested group of returning veterans, the future looks just as bright as it did when Comfort took control over a quarter century ago.

Arguably, the most important newcomer to the Tar Heel program won't even climb the blocks nor the springboards this year. Head Coach Designate Rich DeSelm rejoins Carolina after being the assistant head coach and recruiting coordinator at the University of Florida for the past six seasons. During his time with the Gators, DeSelm helped coach swimmers and divers at UF to over 300 All-America honors. In those six seasons, the Florida women's team never finished lower than 10th in the country and the men no lower than sixth—a winning tradition he hopes to continue with the Tar Heels.

"Coach DeSelm brings to the table every positive imaginable," says Comfort. "He is one of the finest college coaches in the nation and a Carolina alum. We have adopted a completely new model and by bringing him in this season we hope to make the transition as seamless and smooth as possible. There are really no downsides to it."

Joining Comfort and DeSelm on the full-time coaching staff are assistant swimming coach Catherine Vogt and diving coach

Kevin Lawrence. Vogt, a former Carolina swimmer herself, joined the staff last year after making a name for herself as one of the top age group coaches in the Southeast. Lawrence, who begins his fifth season with the Tar Heels, has also been recognized as one of the top college teach-

ers and trainers.

"We will always have one of the largest groups of divers at both the ACC Championships and the NCAA Championships," explains Comfort. "And that is because we have one of the best diving coaches in the country."

Also stepping into leadership positions for the 2006-07 season are an unprecedented four captains for both the men's and women's teams. Leading the men will be senior breaststroker Aaron Burns of Sinking Spring, Pa., senior diver Jon Fox of Neenah, Wis., junior backstroker Keith Laabs of Memphis, Tenn., and junior freestyler Robby Swendiman of Kensington, Md. The women will be led by two-time captain senior Becky Smock of Richmond, Va., senior freestyler Erin Cutrell of Ligonier, Pa., senior backstroker and butterflyer Emily Reardon of Marietta, Ga., and junior butterflyer Lindsey Marck of Newton, Pa.

"In terms of leadership, I'm elated," Comfort says of his two pairs of quad-captains. "As a parent, these are kids that you just hope your kids turns out like."

Last season, the Tar Heel men finished the year with a 6-3 mark in dual meets including a 4-1 record in the ACC. They took second in the Nike Cup, third in the ACC Championships and finished in tied for 41st place at the NCAA Championships. They also ended the year ranked 23rd by the College Swimming Coaches Association of America dual-meet poll.

The women had just as good a year as the men, going 8-2 in dual meets, including 4-1 in the ACC. They claimed the Nike Cup championship and, like the men, finished third in the ACC Championships and tied for 41st in the NCAA Championships. They also finished the year at No. 24 in the CSCAA poll.

### Going in depth with the women

With 26 letter winners returning to join a talented eight-woman freshman class, the women's squad is stocked with both the

experience and the talent that matches up with any of the championship caliber teams in the ACC.

The team returns three NCAA qualifiers, including two school record-holding sophomores. Marck, who also qualified for the NCAA Championships as a freshman, is one of the ACC's and nation's top women's butterflyers. Last season, she claimed the ACC title in the 200-yard butterfly and took second in the 100 fly. She will be one of the favorites in both events again this year.

Sophomores Whitney

Sprague and Nicole O'Donnell joined Marck at the 2006 NCAA's representing the Tar Heels, but the highlight of their seasons may have come a few meets earlier. On the first day of the 2005 Nike Cup, Sprague finished the 500-yard freestyle in 4:44.25, half a second faster than any North Carolina woman in school history. Not to be outdone, O'Donnell shattered the school record in the 1650-yard free just two days later. Her time of 16:13.88 beat out the old record time by four seconds. With those two returnees in the lineup the Tar Heels' distance freestyle corps will tough to beat.

"Throughout the 1990s, we had a phenomenal run of talent and production," said Comfort of the women's teams that won nine ACC titles in 12 years from 1991-2002. "With the types of swimmers we have brought in the past couple years, we are close to seeing those results again."

In addition to the four captains, the team will look to find leadership from senior backstroker Meagan Eickman (Spartanburg, S.C.), divers Laura Filip (Durham, N.C.) and Lauren Karatanevski (Toronto, Ontario), backstroker Bridget Kimmel (Towson, Md.), and breaststroker Marissa Nilon (Kennett Square, Pa.).

The junior class boasts some of the team's most accomplished swimmers with two NCAA qualifiers in Marck and individual medleyist Kelly Woodruff of Shoreline, Wash. The team's top returning sprinter Kelsey Morrissy (Horsham, Pa.) and ACC one-meter and three-meter diving finalist Erika Matheis (Webster, N.Y.) also hail from the junior class. They are joined by breaststroker Sam Deal (Boone, N.C.), freestyler Karen Gately (Sudbury, Mass.) and freestyler Kristin Oxford (Charlotte, N.C.), a transfer.

While Sprague (Bronxville, N.Y.) and O'Donnell (Cornelius, N.C.) may headline the sophomore class with their record times, diver Mandi Arak (Scottsdale, Ariz.), individual medleyist Nikki Griswell (Charlotte, N.C.), freestyler Lindsay McIlvain (Brentwood, Tenn.) and butterflyer Hannah Mein (Doylestown, Pa.), all finished

in the top eight of individual events at the 2006 ACC Championships. Aubrette Biegel (Schererville, Ind.) and Sarah Scott (Pittsboro, N.C.) were integral parts of top five freestyle relays. They are joined by some of the summer's most improved competitors in freestyler Kim Davis (Cary, N.C.), breaststroker Jen Frazier (Indian Harbour Beach, Fla.), diver Katy Pritchett (Lubbock, Texas) and freestyler Sarah Proctor (Charlotte, N.C.). The Tar Heels will also get to see red-shirt sophomore freestyler Taylor McFarlane (Cape Elizabeth, Maine) in action for the first time after she sat out last season as a transfer from the University of Miami.

Coach Comfort is also very excited to see the potential of the incoming freshman class which includes freestyler Eliza Butts (Weston, Mass.), breaststroker Alison Clemens (Staten Island, N.Y.), freestyler Ashley Howard (Durham, N.C.), freestyler Beth Miller (Davidson, N.C.), breaststroker Annie Norton (Charlotte, N.C.), butterfly Sarah Stankavage (Durham, N.C.), backstroker Megan Steeves (Newark, Del.) and individual medleyist Barbara Thomas (Plantation, Fla.).

"The freshman class matches up very well with what we have in the current team," remarks Comfort. "Their addition makes us a much more complete, full team."

### Going in depth with the men

While the women's team brings back a deep, battle-tested group of returnees, the Tar Heel men face a more challenging task of replacing six Atlantic Coast Conference championships finalists, including the school record holder in the 200-yard butterfly, Josh Glasco. But a pair of the conference's top sophomores, a much-decorated diving corps and one of the nation's most sought-after recruits will help pace another of Comfort's Carolina squads that has goals of an ACC title and a Top 20 NCAA Championships finish.

"Losing guys like Josh Glasco, Chad

Ames, Jonny Albrecht, and Jon Van Assen, that's a whole lot to lose," explained Comfort. "But we still have a pretty darn good base and a ton of potential. I expect improvement this year from both our veteran performers and our newcomers."

Reigning ACC Freshman Swimmer of the Year Hank Browning was the Tar Heels' highest finisher at the NCAA Championships last season after taking 12th place in the 500-yard freestyle which earned him honorable mention All-America honors. Browning (Cincinnati, Ohio) also captured the conference crown in the 200-freestyle while cracking the Carolina career top five in three different freestyle events.

Classmate Yi-Khy Saw (Penang, Malaysia) also saw his name climb the Tar Heels' career charts while also making a pair of ACC Championship finals. The two will be big point producing favorites again this year at both the conference meet and the national meet.

"Hank Browning was an All-America last year in the 500 free and I see no reason why he won't continue to increase his list of honors as he continues to improve and get stronger," said Comfort.

"With the composition of our team, we are going to be able to move Yi-Khy back to his more natural events in the butterfly and individual medley where he is really going to perform well."

While Browning and Saw have made a name for themselves in the Atlantic Coast Conference, the Tar Heel whose reputation has the most prominence on the national level is most likely newcomer Chip Peterson, who has yet to even

don the Carolina logo swim trunks. Peterson was named Swimming World's Open Water Co-Swimmer of the Year after notching two top 10 placings at the Open Water World Championships. Peterson hopes that kind of experience will transfer on to the collegiate stage this season for the Tar Heels.

"Chip Peterson is simply one of the best swimmers in the world," Comfort said of his newest addition. "He has trained with some of the best coaches and swimmers throughout his career. We are excited to have him at Carolina."

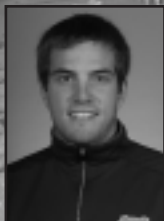
Carolina will also be looking for points in dual and championship meets from a team of divers that copped five top eight finishes at the ACC's including a pair of top three finishes from junior Ryan Funderburk. Funderburk and senior tri-captain Jon Fox also qualified for the NCAA Championships and will look to improve on their 17th and 19th place finishes on the one-meter board at last season's big show.

Along with captains Aaron Burns and Fox, the senior class also boasts backstroker Wade Baccich (Charlotte, N.C.), individual medleyist Robbie Bittner (Beaufort, N.C.), backstroker Ben Grafchik (Prospect, Ky.), freestyle sprinters Jared Kleber (Charlotte, N.C.) and Casey Kott (Morrisville, N.C.), butterfly Stewart Norman (Cary, N.C.), and freestyler Adam Schauer (Raleigh, N.C.).

# Head Coach Frank Comfort Carolina Swimming and Diving

## Veteran Head Coach Frank Comfort To Close Out Tar Heel Tenure

On June 30, 2007, the career of one of the most respected college swimming coaches in history will come to a close. His 565 total dual-meet victories heading into his last season place University of North Carolina Head Coach Frank Comfort atop a very distinguished list as the winningest college dual-meet coach in collegiate swimming history, a status he achieved after surpassing Bob Kipputh of Yale during the 2004-05 season. Add to that 25 Atlantic Coast Conference championships, 10 with the men's teams and 15 with the women's – the most in conference history by a single coach – and it is easy to see the caliber of success Comfort has achieved.



In April 2006, Comfort announced his retirement from coaching, effective at the close of the 2006-07 school year. Rich DeSelm, a former long-time assistant to Comfort at UNC, is already in place on this year's staff as the Tar Heels' designated head coach, effective July 1, 2007.

Comfort's swimmers and divers have won, won often, and won big — both at the University of North Carolina for the past 29 years and previous to that when he coached at Johns Hopkins University for nine years. Of his 565 career dual meet wins, 303 have come while coaching men's teams and 262 while coaching women's teams. Away from the pool, Comfort has also been dedicated to his swimmers' success in the classroom and has trained his swimmers to be active and successful members of the college communities where they attend school.

## The 30th Year at North Carolina

But success is not as simple as the shifting of hands around a clock, the measure used in computing winning or losing in the swimming world. A collegiate program's merit is more complex. The merit is found in whether its team members are truly student-athletes and whether they develop as individuals in all facets of collegiate life during their tenure with the program.

And in these ways, Comfort, who closes out 30 years of coaching at North Carolina in 2006-07, has excelled beyond any reasonable standard. In fact, the way his student-athletes combine success in the pool with success in the classroom could easily be cited as a model for all to follow.

Just over a decade ago, in 1995, Comfort became the winningest swimming coach in the history of the Atlantic Coast Conference, in terms of league championships won, marking success in a conference that dates back to 1953. That season, Comfort won his 17th and 18th conference titles, surpassing the 17 league crowns former North Carolina State University coach Don

Easterling won from 1970-94.

Comfort has continued to add to his impressive resume. Heading into the 2006-07 campaign, he has led Tar Heel teams to 25 ACC championships during his tenure. That figure includes 10 men's championships and 15 women's titles. In his 29 years as the Tar Heels' head coach, Comfort has led his teams into battle in ACC championship meets 57 times. Twenty-five times (43.9 percent of the time), UNC has won the title.

## 500th Win Comes in 2002

Comfort passed the 500 victory mark in dual meet wins in his career in the fall of 2002. Going into the 2006-07 season, Comfort has led UNC men's teams to 221 dual meet wins, the most in league history, just in front of Easterling's total of 217. Comfort's 10 men's ACC championship equal the second most won by a head coach in league history.

Since the ACC recognized women's swimming and diving as a championship sport in 1978-79, Comfort has led the Tar Heels to 245 dual meet wins, the most in league history. Comfort's winning percentage of .836 in that time period is also No. 1 in the annals of ACC swimming lore. Comfort has led his women's teams to 15 ACC titles, 10 more than any other coach in ACC history.

In recent years, Comfort has led the Tar Heel swimming and diving program to some of its most distinguished moments in the pool. The Carolina women won six successive conference championships from 1991-96 and despite not winning the league crown from 1997-99, the women went on to finish 16th, 12th and 20th, respectively, in the NCAA Championships those years. The 1999-2000 team returned to the victory stand at the ACC Championships and repeated the feat in 2000-01 and 2001-02.

UNC's women have twice won six ACC championships in a row, doing so in 1981-86 and again in 1991-96. In the 28 ACC championship appearances under Comfort's tutelage, UNC has 15 titles, 11 second-place finishes and two third-place standings.

The men won six successive ACC titles from 1993-98, the third-longest



streak in ACC men's swimming and diving history and the longest string of ACC men's swimming titles in school history. UNC also won a total of nine ACC championships in men's swimming in the 11-year period from 1988-98. The only years the Tar Heels did not win in that time span were 1990 when they finished second by only three points and 1992 when they finished third. In fact, the Tar Heels have never finished lower than fourth in the ACC Championships. In Comfort's 29 years as head coach the men have finished first or second in the ACC meet 20 times.

Neither the women nor the men have ever finished out of the upper division of the ACC in Comfort's 29 years at Carolina. No other school can make that claim.

## Consistency Nearly Three Decades Long

In his 29 years at Carolina, Comfort's women's teams have been consistent national powers, finishing in the national Top 25 in 25 of those 29 years, including nine

seasons in the Top 10. Only once in the 29 seasons have the Tar Heels failed to score at the AIAW or NCAA national championships. Carolina has won 15 women's ACC championships during his tenure and has never finished lower than third in the league. UNC's ACC championship seasons have been 1981, 1982, 1983, 1984, 1985, 1986, 1991, 1992, 1993, 1994, 1995, 1996, 2000, 2001 and 2002.

The overall dual-meet record for the Carolina women under his tutelage is 250-51-1, a winning percentage of .829, and 126-19 in Atlantic Coast Conference dual meets, a winning percentage of .869. Four of his teams have gone through seasons unbeaten in dual-meet competition and 13 have posted perfect records in ACC dual-meet action.

Overall, Comfort's men's teams at UNC are 221-87-1 in dual meets, a winning percentage of .717, and they are an even more impressive 125-31-1 in ACC dual meets, a winning percentage of .799. When Comfort arrived at UNC in 1977, the Tar Heels had

not won an ACC championship since 1964. Carolina claimed its first ACC crown under Comfort in 1983 and it has gone on to win nine more conference titles in 1988, 1989, 1991, 1993, 1994, 1995, 1996, 1997 and 1998.

### **It All Started at Johns Hopkins**

Prior to coaching at Carolina, Comfort was the head men's swimming and diving coach at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, Md., an NCAA Division III swimming power. In nine seasons there, the Blue Jays went 82-26 in dual meet competition, a winning percentage of .759. Comfort also coached the Johns Hopkins women for two seasons with the Blue Jays going 12-5.

At Johns Hopkins, Comfort's men's teams won four Mason-Dixon Conference titles and eight Middle Atlantic Conference championships. The women won two MAC crowns.

The Blue Jays' men's teams had seven Top 10 finishes at the NCAA Division III championships, winning the title in 1977 and

finishing second in 1975 and 1976.

Comfort's overall coaching record, including his tenure at Hopkins and with both the Carolina men and Carolina women is 565-169-2, a winning percentage of .769. Comfort has been a part of teams which have won 39 conference championships in the ACC, the Middle Atlantic, and the Mason-Dixon leagues. He has coached teams which have combined to total 46 national Top 25 finishes.

Comfort was selected as the ACC Women's Swimming Coach-of-the-Year in 1982, 1984, 1985, 1992, 1993, 1995, 1996, 2000, 2001 and 2002 and as the ACC Men's Swimming Coach-of-the-Year in 1991, 1993, 1996 and 1997.

Comfort's swimmers also do extremely well in the classroom. The squads have won numerous academic accolades through the years from the College Swimming Coaches Association of America. Each semester finds many members of the two teams recognized on the University's Dean List.

## Head Coach Frank Comfort Carolina Swimming and Diving

As another brief example of what is the norm in the program, the Carolina men's and women's swimming and diving teams did a stellar job in the classroom during the 2005-06 school year as recognized by the Atlantic Coast Conference. Thirty-three Tar Heels earned membership on the league's ACC Academic Honor Roll last school year. Those kinds of numbers are the norm for UNC year-in and year-out.

### A Plethora of Distinguished Swimmers

During his long tenure at the University of North Carolina, Comfort has tutored NCAA, AIAW, and U.S. Swimming national champion swimmers like Jessi Perruquet, Sue Walsh, Barb Harris, Cami Berizzi, Amy Pless, Bonny Brown, Ann Marshall, Sarah Perroni, Susan O'Brien, Kari Haag, Richelle Fox, Bryan Stuck, Trevor Runberg and Molly Freedman. Swimmers he has coached who have been chosen for Olympic Teams include Sue Walsh, Ann Marshall, Wendy Weinberg, Janis Hape, Chris Stevenson, David Monasterio, Yann deFabrique and Yi-Khy Saw.

His top men's swimmers have included All-America backstroker Kenny Ireland; four-time first-team All-America backstroker Eric Ericson; Olympians Chris Stevenson, David Monasterio and Yann deFabrique; John Davis, who won more individual men's ACC championships than any other swimmer in conference history; All-America freestyler James Hamrick; Trevor Runberg, a member of the U.S. National Team at the 1998 World Swimming Championships in



Perth, Australia; and, in the past decade, All-Americans and ACC champions Jeff Weiss, Eric Fehr, Scott Troy, Tucker Shade, Ted Brisson, Sean Quinn, Yuri Suguiyama and Hank Browning.

Amongst the top performers on the women's side have been a corps of national collegiate champions — Sue Walsh, the winner of 11 titles on her own, as well as Amy Pless, Cami Berizzi, Barb Harris and Jessi Perruquet; another group which includes ACC Swimmers of the Year or conference meet Most Valuable Performers such as Melissa Douse, Leslie Ramsey, Kari Haag, Richelle Fox, Cindy Shirey, Gayle Hegel, Susan O'Brien, Chrissy Miller; and All-Americans and ACC champions like Polly Winde, Melanie Buddemeyer, Sarah Perroni, Erika Acuff, Christy Watkins and Katie Hathaway.

Three of Comfort's swimmers have won the Patterson Medal as the top senior student-athlete at UNC — Bonny Brown in 1980, Sue Walsh in 1984 and Katie Hathaway in 2002.

In 2002-03, the 50th anniversary year of the ACC, 33 Tar Heel swimmers were amongst the Top 100 swimmers and divers named to the all-time 50th anniversary team, the largest contingent of any conference school. An overwhelming number of those 33 swimmers — 28 — were coached at UNC by Comfort.

### Coaching National Teams

Because of these accomplishments, his stature as a coach has solidified in the amateur and international ranks. Comfort served as the head coach for the U.S. team at the 1999 World Junior Championships in Barcelona, Spain. In 1994, he served as the head coach of the United States Women's Team which competed in the Goodwill Games in St. Petersburg, Russia.

Comfort was also named by U.S. Swimming as the head coach for the 1997 U.S. Women's Junior National team which competed in the Malmo Grand Prix in Malmo, Sweden.

Additionally, he served on coaching staffs at the U.S. Olympic Festival on six occasions — as an assistant coach for the South Team at the 1979 Festival in Colorado Springs, Colo., as the South Team's head coach on three occasions — in 1982 in Indianapolis, Ind., 1985 in Baton Rouge, La. and 1989 in Oklahoma City, Okla. — and as the North Team's head coach in 1993 at San Antonio, Texas, and the East Team's head coach in 1995 at Denver, Colo. In 1987, he served as the sport commissioner for swimming at U.S. Olympic Festival in Chapel Hill, an appointment from North Carolina Amateur Sports, the local organizing committee for that event.

Comfort has also been head coach for U.S. teams which met the Soviet Union in a dual meet in Knoxville, Tenn. in August 1982 and which participated in the Hapoel Games in Tel Aviv, Israel in May 1983. He was an assistant coach for U.S. teams in the August 1981 World University Games in Bucharest, Romania, for the U.S.-West German dual meet in Gainesville, Fla. in July 1982, and for the August 1990 League of European Nations meet in Rome. His international experience also includes a Czechoslovakian tour in 1976.

Comfort's name has consistently been on the U.S. Swimming International Coaches List, an honor going only to the most elite coaches in the United States. Comfort first appeared on that list in 1976.

The Harrisburg, Pa., native was a charter member of the NCAA Women's Swimming Committee when it was formed in 1981. He served on the committee for five years and then served for an additional year on the

combined men's and women's NCAA Swimming Committee in 1986-87.

### Personal Information

Born December 20, 1945, Comfort is a 1967 alumnus of Syracuse University with a Bachelor of Arts degree in history and physical education. Comfort was a three-time swimming letterman for the Orangemen. He earned a Master of Arts degree in physical education from the University of North Carolina in 1968, coaching the Tar Heel freshman men's swimming team that year to a 7-0 record.

Prior to returning to Chapel Hill in 1977, Comfort was head men's and women's swimming coach at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, Md., for nine years from 1968-77. His 1975 and 1976 teams at Johns Hopkins were NCAA Division III runners-up and the 1977 team won the NCAA Division III championship.

He also coached the highly successful Homewood Aquatic Club in Baltimore, Md. during his Hopkins tenure. One of his best swimmers at Homewood Aquatic Club was Wendy Weinberg, a member of the 1976 U.S. Olympic Team in Montreal, Canada where she won the bronze medal in the 800-meter freestyle.

Comfort's swimmers at Hopkins won 12 NCAA individual titles and one NCAA relay team title. He was inducted into the Johns Hopkins University Athletic Hall of Fame on September 13, 1997.

Carolina's first ever full-time swimming coach when he came to Chapel Hill in 1977, Comfort was named the youngest recipient ever of the Master Coach Award from the College Swimming Coaches Association of America in 1979. He also received a 25-year service award in 1992 from the CSCAA.

### The Comfort Family

Comfort is the son of the late Robert Comfort and the late Frances Comfort of Harrisburg, Pa. His father was a professor of business administration at Shippensburg University in Pennsylvania. His mother was the head librarian at Harrisburg Area Community College. She was also Carolina's No. 1 swimming fan for over two decades. Mrs. Comfort was a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Syracuse.

Comfort has two children, a son, Steven, and a daughter Susan, both Carolina graduates. Steven graduated from UNC in 1989 and was a member of Chi Psi fraternity. He works for HI5.com in San Francisco, Calif. He has held management positions at several internet companies over the past 16 years and sold a few of them to Yahoo! And Monster.com. ## Head Coach Designate Rich DeSelm Carolina Swimming and Diving

Rich DeSelm, an assistant coach at the University of Florida for the past six years, and a former team captain and longtime assistant at the University of North Carolina, will take over as the head coach for UNC men's and women's swimming and diving on July 1, 2007.



DeSelm, 50, will serve as head coach designate in 2006-07, and become the head coach when Frank Comfort retires after the season. Comfort, the winningest dual-meet swimming coach in college history, announced on April 28, 2006 that he would step down after his 30th season as North Carolina's head coach.

"We are fortunate to hire a person of Rich's integrity, talent and passion to be the next head coach of Carolina swimming and diving," says Director of Athletics Dick Baddour. "He's been successful at Carolina, Davidson and Florida, as a head and assistant coach. He has a proven track record as a coach who recruits outstanding young people who are committed to excellence academically and in the pool. He is a teacher in the truest sense. I know the transition with Coach Comfort will be a seamless one that will allow Frank the opportunity to finish his remarkable career knowing the program he has built for 30 years will be in good hands for the future."

DeSelm was an All-America swimmer in Chapel Hill from 1974-78 and earned a Bachelor of Science degree in business administration in 1978. Ten years later he earned a Master of Arts degree from Duke. He left Carolina in 1993 to become the head coach at Davidson, where he spent seven years.

He was an assistant at Carolina on Comfort's staff from 1978 to 1993, in which time he became the second full-time swimming coach in school history. In his 15 years coaching at Carolina, the Tar Heels won 14 Atlantic Coast Conference championships (nine by the women, five by the men). The women had seven Top 10 and 14 Top 20 NCAA finishes, while the men finished in the national Top 25 on 10 occasions.

"I could not be more pleased and excited for the program," says Comfort. "This was an

extensive search, but all roads led to Rich. He has vast experience at Carolina and at two other great schools. I have every confidence that he will do a superb job with me this year and for many years to follow. Coaching alongside him in

my final year will be an absolute joy. He knows Carolina's philosophy, goals and standards and he is a brilliant coach and person."

"This is an exciting opportunity for me to coach at my alma mater, a school for which I have so much respect," says DeSelm. "The University of North Carolina is a fantastic place in so many different ways. I appreciate the confidence Dick Baddour, Beth Miller and Coach Comfort have shown in asking me to lead this program forward. I am most excited about returning to Chapel Hill and getting to work with the Tar Heel student-athletes and becoming a member of the university and local communities. I have had wonderful experiences at both Davidson and Florida, and now it is a terrific honor to return to North Carolina."

While at Florida, DeSelm helped recruit the men's and women's teams that were consistently among the best in the country. Each year from 2001 through 2006, both the men's and women's swimming teams finished the season in the Top 10 nationally. Also, during DeSelm's time at Florida, the men's team finished second in the Southeastern Conference five times. The women finished third multiple times, second once, and won the conference meet in the 2001-02 season.

The Gators earned more than 300 All-America honors in his six years in Gainesville, including a school-record 26 by Carlos Jayme, who DeSelm mentored from 2000-2004. Jayme was the 2001 Southeastern Conference Freshman of the Year, 2003 SEC champion, and the school record-holder in the 50-yard freestyle, the 100-yard freestyle, and as a member of the 200 free, 400 free, and 400 medley relay

units. DeSelm also assisted in the training of many more All-America honorees, national and school record-holders, and an Olympian. Gabriel Mangabiera who finished fifth in the 100-meter butterfly at the 2004 Athens Olympic Games while competing for Brazil. She was also an SEC champion and Florida record-holder.

"North Carolina got a great candidate to be its next head coach," says Gator head coach Gregg Troy. "Rich did an outstanding job here and he will be missed by all of us at the University of Florida."

DeSelm led Davidson College to four women's and three men's titles at the Southern States Championships and he earned seven coach-of-the-year awards. Mary Shell Brosche won three consecutive Southern States Female Swimmer-of-the-Year awards.

He coached a pair of Tar Heels to berths in the 1992 Barcelona Olympics. Yann deFabrique, a first-team All-America at Carolina, was the 1993 French national champion in the 400-meter freestyle and he placed 14th in the Olympics in that event. David Monasterio, a first-team All-America at UNC in the 200-yard freestyle and 200-yard butterfly, swam on the 1992 Puerto Rican Olympic Team.

Other notable UNC swimmers coached by DeSelm include Sue Walsh, Polly Winde, James Hamrick, Carrie Szulc, John Davis (an 11-time individual event ACC champion), Gary Gauch, Melissa Douse and Sarah Perroni. Walsh and Winde were members of the 1983 United States Team in the Pan American Games.

"You will not find a person with more integrity, passion for swimming and loyalty to his alma mater than Rich DeSelm," says Walsh, an 11-time national collegiate champion and American record-holder, and currently the Director of Endowment and Stewardship at the UNC Educational Foundation. "This day is indicative of an exciting future for our swimming and diving program. Few coaches would be able to successfully follow what Frank Comfort has accomplished, but Coach DeSelm has the qualities necessary to drive this program to be one of the best in the ACC and nationally. He is well-positioned to carry on the tradition of winning with integrity that we have all come to expect at UNC."

DeSelm was the assistant manager for the United States team at the 2000 Olympic Games in Sydney, Australia, and the 2004 FINA Short Course World Championships. He was the head manager for United States teams at the 1997 and 1999 Pan Pacific Championships and the 1995 Pan American Games.

DeSelm and his wife, Tracy, have two children, Grant (10) and Claire (8). He is a native of Knoxville, Tenn., and attended high school there and in Jacksonville, Fla., where he graduated from The Bolles School.

Catherine Frock Vogt, formerly a top-flight age group coach in the North Carolina club ranks, enters her second year as a full-time assistant with the Tar Heel swimming and diving Program. A 2000 graduate of UNC, Vogt was hired in August 2005 and is excited about the program's 2006-07 campaign.

Vogt, whose permanent residence is Emerald Isle, N.C., was a four year letter winner as a Tar Heel undergraduate. Specializing in distance freestyle during her career, she helped lead UNC to an Atlantic Coast Conference Championship during her freshman year. Her top individual ACC finish was fifth place in the 1650-yard freestyle in 1996.

Vogt studied education and psychology while at Carolina, earning her degree as a double-major in May of 2000. She also earned a position on the ACC Academic Honor Roll and Dean's List at Carolina for three consecutive years in 1997, 1998, and 1999.

Vogt has been busy since the completion of last year's season with the Tar Heels. In May 2006, she was the head coach of the Pan American Open Water Championship Team that competed in Salinas, Ecuador. Under Vogt's tutelage, the American men's team won the 5K and 10K events while the women's team won both events as well. In addition, the Americans took home the overall team award at the event's conclusion.

After attending U.S. Nationals with North Carolina Aquatic Club as an assistant coach, Vogt was appointed by United States Swimming as the head coach of the Pan Pacific Open Water Championships Team that competed in Victoria, British Columbia, in August 2006. Her appointment as the head coach of a major international squad (Pan Pacifics, World Championships, or the Olympics) marked only the second time that a woman had held such a position. Again, Vogt led the Americans to victories in the men's and women's 5K and 10K races and brought home the overall Pan Pacific team award.

Having been a member of the U.S. coaching staff during the 2005 Open Water World Championships in Montreal, Quebec, Vogt was also selected for the 2006 Open Water World Championship Team that traveled to Naples, Italy, this past August. Vogt personally coached Tar Heel freshman standout Chip Peterson during these international meets.

Peterson followed up his 2005 World Championship victory in the 10K with strong 2006 performances resulting in second place in the 5K and 6th place in the 10K.

Continuing to be involved with U.S. Open Water Swimming, Vogt acted as an assistant coach at United States Swimming's Open Water Select Camp in Fort Myers, Fla. This event coincided with the Open Water National Championships in Fort Myers.

Prior to accepting her position at Carolina, Vogt's last full-time coaching position was with the Carteret Currents Swimming Club in Morehead City, N.C. She coached age group and senior swimmers during her 14 months with the Currents who won medals at the Open Water National Championships, Open Water World Championships, U.S. Senior National Championships, Junior Pan Pacific Games, World Championship Trials, and U.S. Olympic Trials.

From May 2002 to September 2003, Vogt was an assistant coach and then head coach for the Meridian Swim Association in Meridian, Miss. She coached a six-time Mississippi state champion during her time with MSA.

Vogt's coaching experience also includes a period as a head coach in the South Run Winter Swim League in Fairfax Station, Va., a stint as the head coach of the summer league team at the UNC Faculty Club and experience as a coach at UNC's annual summer swimming camp time as a swim school program coach with NCAC.

Most recently, Vogt was named the head coach of the 2007 Pan American Open Water Championship Team that will compete in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. She hopes that her involvement with the U.S. National Team will give her added experience that will contribute to the continued success of Carolina's storied swimming program.

Catherine's husband Matt is a captain in the Marine Corps who flies Harrier attack jets out of Cherry Point Marine Corps Air Station, N.C. An avid Tar Heel fan, he splits his time between Emerald Isle, N.C., and Chapel Hill.

5th Year at Carolina

Kevin Lawrence begins his fifth year as the diving coach for the Tar Heel program with the start of the 2006-07 season.

The UNC diving corps is coming off a magnificent 2005-06 season, which became one for the record books. Carolina had both junior Ryan Funderburk and senior Jon Fox qualify for the NCAA Championships. Carolina was one of only five schools in the nation that had more than one diver qualify for the championship meet and also had more men qualify than any other ACC school.

Carolina also had seven different divers final at the ACC Championships, including Jon Fox, Ryan Funderburk, Ryan Matuszak, Erika Matheis, Gia Santoro, Mandi Arak and Lauren Karatanevski. The four Carolina women consisted of half the field for the one-meter finals. Carolina had a total of 10 divers in the championship finals of the men's and women's one-meter and three-meter competitions, more than any other school in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Ryan Funderburk received All-ACC honors on both the one-meter and three-meter boards.

The past two years have been very successful for the Carolina diving squad. UNC has racked up 16 championship finalists at ACC's from eight different divers.

During the summer of 2006, Ryan Funderburk qualified for the 2006 U.S. Senior Nationals at the IUPUI Natatorium in Indianapolis. Ryan finished 24th on three-meter, and made it to the semifinals on the one-meter, finishing seventh.

During the 2004-2005 campaign, Carolina was the only men's team to have three divers make the championship final in any event at the ACC meet with three in the finals of one-meter diving. The UNC men also scored more points for their team than any other group of divers in the ACC and had the most total finalists of any squad. During the dual-meet season, UNC's men won 16 of the 20 diving events. Lawrence coached Gia Santoro to All-ACC status and Jon Fox was a championship finalist on both boards. Ryan Matuszak finished in one-meter and platform diving while Ryan Funderburk finished in the Top 12 of both boards and also finished on platform.

In 2003-04, Lawrence led Eric Poitras to Atlantic Coast Conference Diver-of-the-Year honors and the ACC championship in three-meter diving. No Carolina diver had won those awards since 1994. Seven Tar Heel divers qualified for the 2004 NCAA Zone Diving Championships and Poitras became the first Tar Heel men's diver in 13 years to advance to the NCAA national meet. Altogether, five UNC divers made seven championship finals at the 2004 ACC Championships.

## Swimming & Diving Staff Carolina Swimming and Diving

During the 2002-03 season, Lawrence coached four different divers to finals at the ACC Championships. Poitras was runner-up on three-meter, setting a new school record in the process, and Lindsay Waddell also finaled on both boards. Poitras earned All-ACC honors in the process. Lawrence also qualified six divers for the NCAA zone meet, where Poitras and Stephen Krebs finished as the first and second alternates in qualifying for the NCAA Championships. In June 2003, Lawrence traveled to Winnipeg, Manitoba to coach Poitras in the Canadian Senior Nationals. Poitras finaled in both events, finishing eighth on the one-meter and seventh on the three-meter.

Lawrence is also the head diving coach for the North Carolina Aquatic Club. NCAC produced the Junior Olympic one-meter, three-meter and platform national champions in 2005. The NCAC diving program finished third in the country as a team at the 2005 Summer Junior Olympics nationals. NCAC was represented by two divers on the United States team in the Junior Pan American Championships.

During his first year coaching for NCAC, Lawrence led divers to finals spots at the Indoor Junior National Championships and the Outdoor Junior National Championships. Lawrence also coached a three-meter champion at the U.S.–Canadian Challenge as well as two silver medal finishers at the Junior Pan American Championships in Brazil in September 2003. The NCAC Diving program trains at Koury Natatorium.

From 1997 to 2002, Lawrence was the diving coach at the University of Kansas. At Kansas, he coached 11 different divers who finaled 22 times on the one-meter, three-meter and platform events at the Big 12 Conference Championships. Additionally, 13 different divers qualified for the NCAA Zone D Championships, including four divers who finished in the Top 10 at that meet. He coached the 2002 women's Big 12 one-meter runner-up who was a University of Kansas female athlete-of-the-year finalist. Both the Kansas men's and women's platform record holders competed there under the tutelage of Lawrence.

While working at Kansas, he also was the head coach of the Jayhawk Diving Club. He had 20 different divers qualify to compete at the Junior Olympic Indoor and Outdoor National Championships on 60 occasions on the one- and three-meter boards. He coached the 1998 Junior Olympic indoor national titlist on the three-meter board and the 1998 high school girls' one-meter national champion.

Prior to going to Kansas, Lawrence was the diving coach at St. Cloud State University for five years. He coached eight athletes to a total of 25 All-America citations there, including the 1997 NCAA Division II women's one-meter national champion. He was named the North Central Conference Diving Coach of the Year in 1994, 1996 and 1997. His divers won 10 conference titles during his tenure and his divers were named all-conference a total of 22 times.

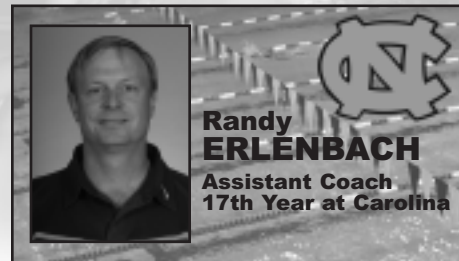
Three of his athletes were honored a total of five times as the NCC's Diver-of-the-Year. While coaching at St. Cloud State, he was also a fifth and sixth grade teacher at Holy Cross School.

Lawrence attended Western Illinois University from 1989-92, studying elementary education, competing as a diver and compiling a 3.4 grade point average. He was named to the Dean's List three times. As a diver at WIU, he was named All-Conference in 1990 and 1991 and won the school's Academic/Athletic Achievement Award. He is the Leathernecks' three-meter diving record holder and was an NCAA zone qualifier. He finished his Bachelor of Science degree in elementary education with an emphasis in social sciences at St. Cloud State in 1994, graduating Magna Cum Laude with a 3.65 GPA. He is a native of Wisconsin where he was a three-time All-State selection as a high school diver and runner-up at the 1989 state high school meet.

Lawrence served a four-year term as the Diving Rules Chairman for the NCAA Swimming and Diving Rules and Championships Committee from 2000-04. He has also chaired the Zone D Diving Subcommittee, holds membership in U.S. Diving and is a past member of the College Swimming Coaches Association of America.

Lawrence has either worked on the staff at or served as director of diving camps at the University of Minnesota, Saint Cloud State University, the University of Texas, the Northwest Diving Camp in Grand Forks, N.D. and the University of Wisconsin Eau Claire. He has given presentations at diving coaches' clinics, taught basic springboard diving classes and hosted clinics on the judging of high school diving.

Lawrence and his son, D.J., reside in Durham, N.C. Lawrence is also active in community service projects. Currently he is volunteering at Githens Middle School in Durham working with at-risk eighth graders. The goal of the Second Chance Academy is to help eighth graders move on to high school. He organized Adopt-a-Family for the KU Swimming program and served as a lecturer at St. Lawrence Cathedral. While at St. Cloud, he worked with the Big Brothers/Big Sisters of St. Cloud while serving as the lecturer at St. Mary's Cathedral of St. Cloud.



Randy Erlenbach is now in his 17th year of working with the swimming program at the University of North Carolina. Like most Tar Heel swim coaches, Erlenbach is familiar with success. His performance as an assistant swimming coach at Carolina and as the head coach of the North Carolina Aquatic Club has been quite remarkable. Erlenbach is simply one of the most gifted swimming coaches in the nation.

United States Swimming consistently names Erlenbach to its International Coaches List, an honor going only to the most elite coaches in the United States. He was first named to that list in 1997 and continues to be a member of that prestigious company.

Erlenbach, a former four-year swimming letterman at Duke University was also an assistant coach at Clemson University before joining the Tar Heels.

He also serves as the head swimming coach of the North Carolina Aquatic Club, an age group and master's swimming program based in Chapel Hill, N.C., in addition to performing his duties as an assistant coach for Carolina's men's and women's teams. He is also the director of the annual Carolina Swimming Camps conducted each summer on the UNC campus.

As the coach at NCAC, Erlenbach has been very successful at developing local swimming talent. Several members of Tar Heel teams have been former NCAC swimmers. In addition, Erlenbach has coached a talented array of age group swimmers who have gone on to earn scholarships at other NCAA Division I institutions.

He was named the United States Swimming North Carolina Coach of the Year in 1995, 1997 and 2000 for his work with the North Carolina Aquatic Club.

Erlenbach, 47, is a native of Brookfield, Conn., and a 1981 Duke University graduate. He co-captained the Blue Devil swimming team in his last season. After graduating from Duke, Erlenbach served as an assistant swimming coach with the Wilton (Conn.) YMCA Wahoos team for a year and then was the head coach of the Durham (N.C.) Aquatic Club for two years.

From 1984 to 1989, Erlenbach served as the aquatics supervisor for the city of Lenoir, N.C. He also served as the head swimming coach for the Caldwell County Swim Team.

After a year working as a registered representative for Edward D. Jones and Company, he returned to college coaching as an assistant swimming coach at Clemson for the 1990-91 school year. He moved to Chapel Hill to take his current position in 1991.

Erlenbach and his wife, Sian Hunter, enjoy biking, hiking and fishing in their spare time.



Greg Johnson is now entering his fifth season as an assistant coach with the Tar Heels, working primarily with Coach Comfort and the butterfly corps as well as managing home meet operations. He is also the Senior assistant coach for the North Carolina Aquatic Club, where he is thrilled to watch the development of young, enthusiastic swimmers.

Johnson was born in Winston-Salem N.C., where he began his swimming career at age seven with the Winston-Salem YMCA. After graduation from North Forsyth High School as the North Carolina state high school champion in the 200-yard individual medley, he was accepted to the U.S. Military Academy at West Point as a recruit for the men's swimming team.

After only eight weeks, a knee injury precluded him from military service and he returned to Winston-Salem, N.C. The following year he was accepted to the University of North Carolina and he gained a spot as a member of the men's swimming team. Under Coach Randy Erlenbach, Johnson became a solid performer in the 100 and 200 butterfly events and the distance freestyle events. He finished his career at UNC in 2002 with a top eight performance in the 200-yard butterfly at the ACC Championships and a degree in journalism and mass communication.

Upon graduation, he was invited to join the staffs at UNC and NCAC, where he has been fortunate to work with the finest college and age-group swimmers in the country, as well as living in beautiful Carrboro with his wife Samantha.

As a coach, he has had the honor of working with several national qualifiers, ACC finalists and has accompanied swimmers to National Select Camps in Colorado Springs.

In his spare time, Johnson likes to watch *The Simpsons* and write workouts for the next day's practice, as well as perform various other administrative tasks around the swimming office. He also likes camping and attending bus festivals in his 1986 VW Westfalia.



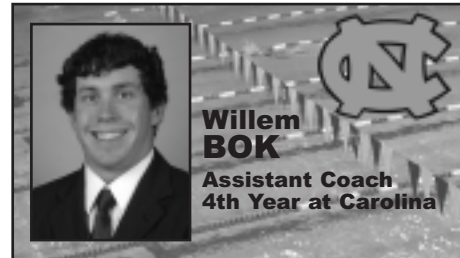
The Tar Heel school record holder in the 200-yard breaststroke, 100-meter breaststroke and 200-meter breaststroke, Sean Quinn begins his third season as an assistant swimming coach at the University of North Carolina in 2006-07. He is also the current head age group coach for the North Carolina Aquatic Club.

A native of Lancaster, S.C., and 1999 alumnus of Lancaster High School, Quinn was a three-time All-America selection as a Tar Heel, earning honors in 2000, 2002 and 2003. His best finish was an eighth place in the 200-meter breaststroke as a freshman in 2000. He finished 10th in the 200-yard breaststroke at the NCAA Championships in 2002.

Quinn, a tri-captain of the 2003 Tar Heel team, won a silver medal in the 200-meter breaststroke at the 2003 Pan American Games in Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic. He finished fifth in the 200-meter breaststroke at the 2000 U.S. Olympic Trials and he was offered a slot on the United States Team at the 2002 Short Course World Championships in Moscow. During his freshman year, he competed in the Short Course World Championships in Athens, Greece. Before enrolling at Carolina, he swam in the 1999 U.S. Junior World Championships in Barcelona.

Quinn won ACC championships in the 200-yard breaststroke in 2000 and 2003. He holds the Tar Heel school record in the 200-yard breaststroke at 1:56.39 and he ranks fourth in school history in the 100-yard breaststroke with a career best time of 55.15.

A four-time All-ACC selection, Quinn swam for the Mecklenburg Aquatic Club while in high school and was coached there by Pat Hogan. Quinn was named the University of North Carolina's most outstanding swimmer in 2000 and 2002 and the team's most valuable swimmer in 2003. His sister Kathleen swam for four years at UNC and was a tri-captain of the 2004-05 women's team.



Willem Bok is in his fourth year as an assistant coach at UNC. Bok received a B.S. in business administration with minors in both chemistry and biology from Carolina in 2002. He is currently completing a dual M.D./M.B.A. degree at Duke Medical School and Carolina's Kenan-Flagler Business School, respectively. Bok is a former high school All-America swimmer and letter winner for the Tar Heels.

In 2003, Willem returned to his Alma Mater and began coaching alongside Frank Comfort. During his time at Carolina, Willem has worked with multiple All-ACC swimmers, ACC finalists and NCAA qualifiers. During the summers, Willem works as the assistant national coach for Eric Steidinger of the Tar Heel Aquatic Team. Under Steidinger, Willem has coached numerous junior national, senior national and Olympic trial swimmers.

In addition to coaching and his academics, Willem traverses the vast areas of wilderness throughout the United States and Canada with fellow 2002 alums Mike Callahan and John Spaziano. The group plans to eventually compose a journal based on their travels in dedication to David Green, a 2001 graduate who inspired the trio with his explorations across Tonga and other Pacific Islands. In his free time, Willem enjoys biking, water polo and shuffleboard.

Willem possesses a passion for swimming and UNC, and he hopes to contribute as much as possible to making this a successful season for the Tar Heels.

## History & Tradition Carolina Swimming and Diving

The University of North Carolina's proud swimming and diving heritage predates America's entry into World War II. On January 23, 1939, Tar Heel swimmers and divers participated in the school's first varsity intercollegiate swimming meet against the University of Virginia at historic Bowman Gray Pool on the UNC campus.

Since 1939, Carolina's men's teams have posted a cumulative dual-meet record of 518-177-1, a winning percentage of .745. Carolina teams have captured 14 Southern Conference team championships and 17 Atlantic Coast Conference team titles, while posting a 60-3 (.952) Southern Conference dual-meet mark and a 240-60-1 (.799) record in ACC dual meets. On 28 occasions, UNC men's teams have finished amongst the Top 25 teams at the NCAA Championships. Carolina swimmers have also won four individual NCAA championships in the history of the program.

Although Carolina had women's swimming teams in the early 1970s competing in Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW) competitions as part of the UNC physical education department, the women's swimming and diving program was not elevated to varsity status and taken under the aegis of the intercollegiate athletic program until the 1974-75 school year. In 31 years, Carolina teams have compiled a 270-54-1 dual-meet record, a winning percentage of .832. Carolina has won 15 ACC championships and never finished lower than third in the league championships, taking first place on 15 occasions, second place on 11 occasions and third place twice.

UNC's record in ACC dual meets is a

gaudy 126-19, a winning percentage of .869. Twenty-seven of UNC's 31 women's teams have finished the season ranked in the national Top 25, including 13 straight years from 1976-88 and 10 straight years from 1995 through 2004. The only times Carolina has missed finishing in the Top 25 were in 1975, 1989, 1994, 2005 and 2006. UNC women's swimmers have also won 15 individual national collegiate championships and produced one national championship relay team.

### **Roots of the Program Under Dick Jamerson**

While these records demonstrate decades of excellence, one of the program's most important years was 1938. That year marked the completion of historic Bowman Gray Pool and the arrival of Carolina's first varsity coach. Without those events the Tar Heel swimming program would not exist as we know it today.

The pool was completed on March 25, 1938, but the first meet was not held until almost a year later. The pool was a gift to the University from Mrs. Bowman Gray, Sr., in memory of her two sons, Bowman Gray, Jr., and Gordon Gray.

Bowman Gray Pool served as home to the Carolina swimming and diving program until the fall of 1986 when the Tar Heels moved into their current home, the Maurice J. Koury Natatorium, which is part of the Dean E. Smith Center complex on the UNC campus.

Richard E. Jamerson came to UNC in 1938 from Oberlin College in Ohio to take over the helm of the fledgling Tar Heel team. Dr. Jamerson, one of the top coaches in 1930s collegiate swimming, served as head coach of the Tar Heel program for 11 years. Five of his squads went undefeated and 10 of his teams won Southern Conference championships.

The annual awards given to Carolina's most valuable, most outstanding and most improved swimmers bear Jamerson's name, as does the timing system at the Maurice J. Koury Natatorium.

### **Ralph Casey Continues the Tradition**

Jamerson turned over the coaching reins to his long-time assistant coach, Ralph Casey, on a full-time basis in 1952. Casey had served as interim head coach in 1949 and as co-head coach with his brother, Willis Casey,

in 1946. Willis Casey also coached the 1945 Tar Heel team by himself in Jamerson's absence.

Ralph Casey guided the Tar Heels to additional championships during his tenure from 1949 to 1957. Two of Casey's teams won Southern Conference titles and another two teams won Atlantic Coast Conference crowns after UNC became a charter member of the new league in 1953-54. Under his direction, the 1955 squad finished fifth in the nation, the 1953 team tied for fifth nationally, the 1957 squad was sixth at the NCAA Championships and the 1949 team took ninth place.

In both 1949 and 1957, bookends of Casey's tenure, UNC hosted the NCAA Division I Men's Swimming and Diving Championships at Bowman Gray Pool. The 1949 championships marked the first time a national championship event in any sport on the collegiate level had been held in the South. However a visit to Bowman Gray Pool today would lead one to believe that it would have been difficult to host an NCAA Championship in that tiny facility. Somehow UNC pulled it off.

Pat Earey took over as UNC's head coach in 1958 and continued the remarkable swimming success in Chapel Hill. His teams won a percentage of .711 of their dual meets, and

they captured five ACC championships before he retired in 1974.

### **Women's Swimming & Diving Added to Program**

With the addition of women's swimming and diving as a varsity sport in 1974-75, the program had split head coaches for the only time in its history as Paul Doty, who was then Carolina's head men's lacrosse coach, coached the men for one season and Maxine Forrest coached the women the same season.

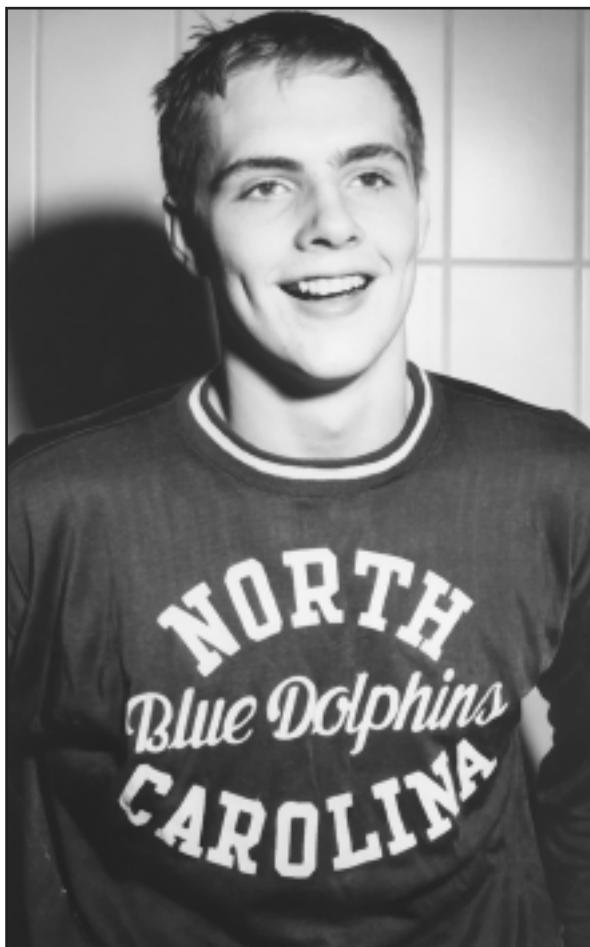
Jim Wood was then brought in to coach both teams in 1976 and 1977 and, after a successful two-year coaching run, he returned to club coaching in New Jersey.

The program's current head coach, Frank Comfort, was hired away from NCAA Division III power Johns Hopkins University, in Baltimore, Md., to take command of both the men's and women's teams during the summer of 1977. Comfort arrived in Chapel Hill after having just led the Blue Jays' men's squad to an NCAA Division III championship in 1977 after attaining runnerup finishes in 1975 and 1976.

He has helped continue and improve upon Carolina's swimming success. His men's teams have won .717 percent of their dual meets and the women's teams have won .829 percent of their dual meets under his tutelage. His 1983 men's squad captured the school's first ACC title in the sport in 19 years and the 1988 and 1989 teams won back-to-back league crowns for the first time since 1963 and 1964. With six titles in a row, the 1993, 1994, 1995, 1996, 1997 and 1998 men's teams became the first UNC teams since 1956-59 to capture as many as four ACC crowns in a row. The men have also made decided progress on the national level. The 1993 team finished 14th, the best Tar Heel national finish since 1967, and the 1996 team had an outstanding 15th-place standing in the championships. The women have finished in the Top 25 in the nation in 25 of the 29 seasons of Comfort's tenure and won 15 of the 28 ACC championships since that meet's inception in 1979. On 11 of the other 13 occasions, the Tar Heels have been conference runners-up, an amazing string of consistency. Comfort's swimmers also do extremely well in the classroom. The 2005-06 school year was the 19th year in a row that Carolina's swimming and diving contingent placed at least 21 members on the ACC Academic Honor Roll. Beginning with the

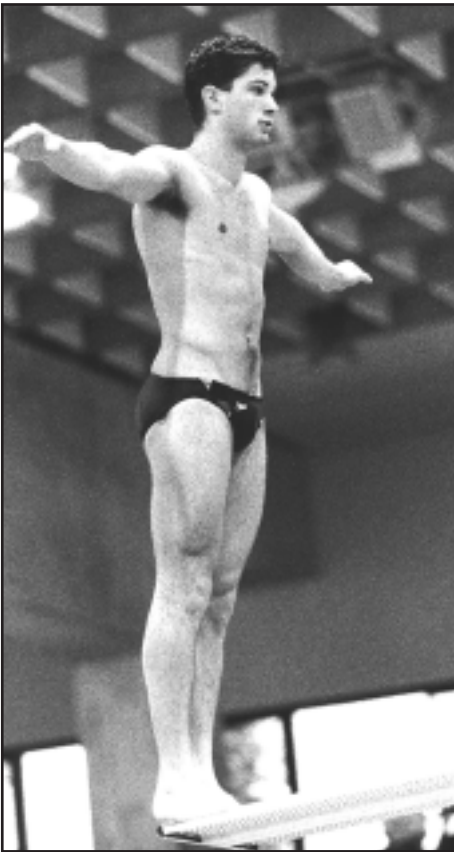

1987-88 school year and continuing through last year, UNC swimming has placed 21, 21, 22, 23, 24, 23, 24, 25, 25, 27, 33, 30, 38, 43, 37, 35, 23, 34 and 33 individuals on the ACC Honor Roll over the past 19 school years. That is a continuous record of academic excellence in which the student-athletes can truly take pride.

Carolina's swimming success since the program's inception cannot be credited only to the outstanding coaches who have directed Carolina swimming fortunes. The program has also been distinguished by a long string of outstanding swimmers and divers.

### **A Who's Who of Great Talent**

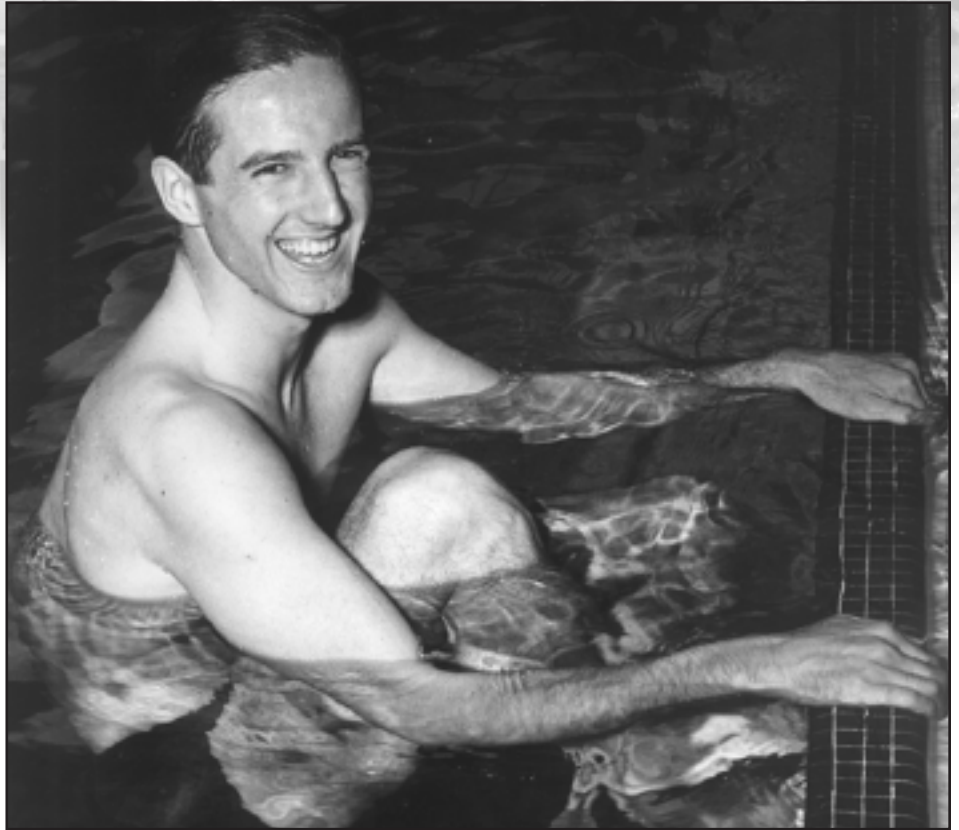
Seven Tar Heel swimmers have been honored as recipients of the Patterson Medal as the school's outstanding senior athlete, an amazing number for the sport given Carolina's rich athletic heritage in so many other sports, particularly men's basketball.

Among those seven are three outstanding women who have won the school's highest athletic award.

Jamerson's early teams were full of stars. They included Denny Hammond of Atlanta, Ga., who in 1942 established a national intercollegiate backstroke record; George Whitner of Jacksonville, Fla., who established a national freshman breaststroke mark in 1942; and Buddy Crone of Goldsboro, N.C., who

was the head varsity cheerleader at Carolina and the winner of the national junior Amateur Athletic Union (AAU) diving title.

Several Tar Heels in the early era won the Southern Conference's Most Valuable Swimmer recognition, including Fleming Stone in 1940, Denny Hammond in 1943, Dick Twining in 1948, Jimmy Thomas in 1949, 1950 and 1951 and Donnie Evans, who was the co-winner with Thomas in 1951.

Another one of the outstanding student-athletes in early Carolina swimming and diving history was Norm Sper (1947-50), who both swam on the team and was an outstanding diver, while also serving as Carolina's head cheerleader during the Charlie Justice football era on campus. He is one of only two men in the program's illustrious history to be named a first-team All-America during each of his four years in school, the other being Eric Ericson (1981-84). In 1949, Sper won the National AAU men's platform diving championship in Los Angeles, Calif.

Sper's tremendous diving feat was equaled in 1950 by one of the greatest of all Carolina athletes, Sara Wakefield. A native of Charlotte, N.C., who grew up in Palm Beach, Fla., Wakefield, then 22, won the 1950 women's one-meter AAU national diving championship in her hometown with a score of 133.90. The win came during Wakefield's senior year at Carolina. Don Draper served as Wakefield's diving coach at UNC. Wakefield, while at Carolina, also won the

Southeastern AAU championship in 1950 at Atlanta, and the Florida state meet and national junior championships in 1949.

### **The Greatest Swimmer In Southern History**

Jimmy Thomas, the Patterson Medal recipient in 1951, was an amazingly versatile swimmer who won two AAU national individual medley championships and one AAU national backstroke crown during his career. He established 10 American records, four NCAA standards and seven Southern Conference marks while a swimmer at UNC. In 1950, Thomas, considered by many to be the top swimmer in Southern history, became the first swimmer in NCAA annals to be named an All-America in four different individual events in the same year. He completed his career having never lost in conference competition in the 220- and 440-yard freestyle events. At the 1949 NCAA Championships in Bowman Gray Pool, Thomas was the meet's high scorer, with his best finish being second place in the 150-yard backstroke.

Buddy Baarcke, who was a contemporary of Thomas, set a world record in the 100-yard butterfly in 1954. He was the first swimmer in history to go under one minute in the 100-yard distance of three different strokes — the butterfly, the backstroke and the freestyle — and he won gold and bronze medals at the 1955 Pan American Games in Mexico City, Mexico.

Other top men's swimmers have included

1955 NCAA 200-yard butterfly champion Phil Drake; Charlie Krepp, who won NCAA titles in the 100- and 200-yard backstrokes while swimming in the 1957 NCAA Championships at Carolina's own Bowman Gray Pool; Harrison Merrill, the 1965 Patterson Medal recipient who was a three-time All-America and the winner of seven individual ACC titles; and 1966 NCAA 100-yard butterfly titlist Phil Riker, who was also a member of the 1964 U.S. Olympic Team.

### **Olympic Gold Medalist Thompson Mann**

Arguably the finest men's swimmer in Carolina history was Thompson Mann. A three-year All-America, Mann was a 1964 Olympic Games gold medalist as the leadoff swimmer on the United States' victorious 4x100-meter medley relay squad. He set a world record at the Tokyo Olympic Games in the 100-meter backstroke during that race and was the first person to ever eclipse one minute at that distance, clocking a time of 59.80 seconds.

Of more recent vintage, outstanding men's swimmers at Carolina have included Ken Ireland, a backstroke who was the Most Valuable Swimmer at the 1979 ACC Championships and a first-team All-America in both 1979 and 1980; Eric Ericson who, like Norm Sper, was a four-year first-team All-America, as well as the 1984 ACC Championships MVP and winner of seven ACC individual titles during his career; Chris

Stevenson, a versatile swimmer who competed in the 1984 Olympic Games for Greece and was the Most Valuable Swimmer at the 1986 ACC Championships; the incredibly gifted John Davis, who twice was the ACC Championships MVP and once the ACC Swimmer-of-the-Year, and who also set the ACC record for career individual men's championships with 11; David Monasterio, who was the ACC Swimmer-of-the-Year in 1991, a two-year first-team All-America, a three-time medalist swimming for Puerto Rico in the 1991 Pan American Games in Havana, Cuba and a member of the 1992 Puerto Rican Olympic Team; James Hamrick, who was a first-team All-America both his junior and senior years and a Chapel Hill native and son of a former Carolina swimming team captain and ACC champion, Harvey Hamrick; and, Yann deFabrique, who swam for France in the 1992 and 1996 Olympics, placing as high as 14th in the 400-meter freestyle in 1992, and then went on to win three medals for the French in the 1993 World University Games in Buffalo, N.Y., and two medals for France at the 1995 World University Games in Fukuoka, Japan. Two 1997 alumni, Steve Bonack and Jeff Weiss, also added their names to the list of great swimmers at Carolina. Both were All-America breaststrokers at UNC. Trevor Runberg, '98, was a gifted UNC swimmer for four years, being named ACC Co-Swimmer of the Year in 1996

and earning a spot on the U.S. World Championships Team in 1996. In 1999, the top senior swimmers included Tucker Shade, a three-time ACC champion in the 100-yard butterfly and a four-time All-America selection, and Ted Brisson, the former ACC record holder in the 100-yard backstroke and two-time Verizon Academic All-America selection. More recently, Carolina has produced Sean Quinn, two-time ACC champion and three-time All-America in the breaststroke, and Yuri Suguiyama, 2003 and 2004 All-America and back-to-back ACC champion in the 200-yard freestyle.

### **Talented Women Since the Inception**

Obviously, there have also been many talented women's swimmers at Carolina. In 1976, Ann Marshall, the

first female swimmer to receive an athletic scholarship at UNC, captured AIAW national championships in the 200-yard backstroke and 200-yard freestyle. Marshall, a 1972 Olympian as a 14-year-old prodigy, was followed to campus by Bonny Brown, who in 1980 became the first female recipient of the Patterson Medal as UNC's outstanding senior student-athlete. Brown had been a gold medalist at the 1975 Pan American Games in Mexico City and, a year later, she established the American record in the 100-meter freestyle. In 1977, she won the AIAW national championship in the 100-yard individual medley, and later that summer she was a gold medalist at the World University Games.

Hot on the heels of Brown came the incomparable Sue Walsh. North Carolina's outstanding swimming figure of all time, Walsh won 10 national collegiate individual championships and was on one AIAW national championship relay squad. She was named the Most Valuable Swimmer at the ACC Championships three times and was an American record holder in the 50- and 100-yard backstrokes and the 100-meter back-

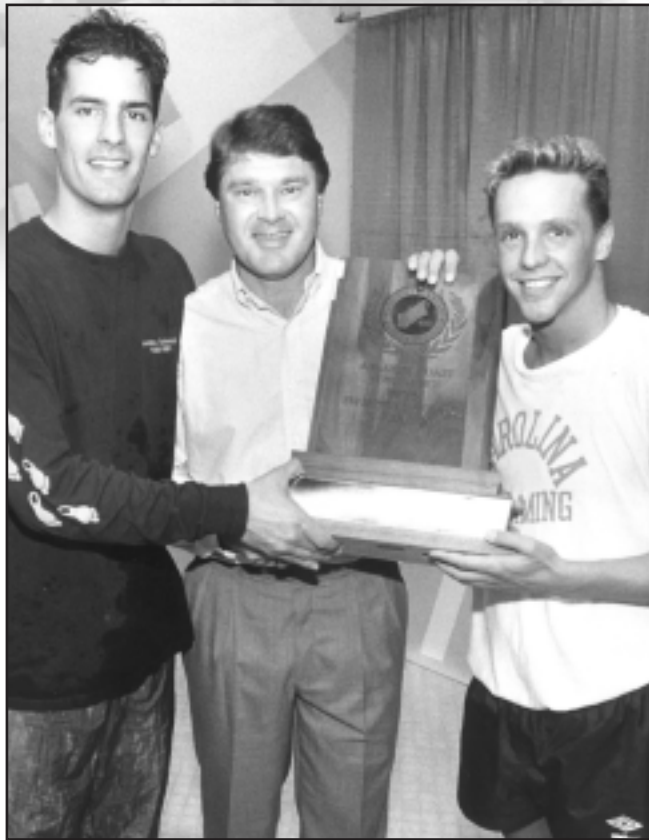

stroke. Walsh won the Patterson Medal in 1984 and, in 1983, she was named the North Carolina Athlete-of-the-Year by the Greensboro News & Record.

Walsh was joined on the United States' 1982 World Swimming Championships and 1983 Pan American Games teams by Tar Heel teammate Polly Winde, an individual medleyist and breaststroker extraordinaire, who also had a standout Carolina career. Winde finished second in the 400-yard individual medley at the 1984 NCAA's and is now married to former Tar Heel baseball star B.J. Surhoff, a major league baseball standout for the past two decades. Winde has been inducted into the Maryland Swimming Hall of Fame, which also includes former UNC swimmer Wendy Weinberg, '80, and Tar Heel head coach Frank Comfort.

Other outstanding swimmers of the 1980s included Barb Harris, the 1982 NCAA champion in the 50-yard butterfly, and Amy Pless and Cami Berizzi, who combined with Walsh and Harris to win the AIAW national championship in the 200-yard medley relay in 1981.

### **The ACC MVPs**

Several Tar Heel women have been named the Most Valuable Swimmer at the ACC Championships, including Cindy Shirey in 1979, Gayle Hegel in 1980, Sue Walsh in 1981, 1983 and 1984, Susan O'Brien in 1985 and 1988, Melissa Douse in 1992, Kari Haag in 1995, Chrissy Miller in 1996 and 1998 and Richelle Fox in 1997.

Another top swimmer for Carolina was

Melanie Buddemeyer, a two-time first-team All-America. Buddemeyer is one of only a handful of women's swimmers in ACC history to sweep an individual event all four years of her eligibility. Buddemeyer accomplished the feat in two events, winning Atlantic Coast Conference titles in both the 100- and 200-yard butterfly in 1985, 1986, 1987 and 1989. Also duplicating the feat were Walsh in the 100- and 200-yard backstrokes (1981-84), Polly Winde in the 400-yard individual medley (1983-86) and most recently Christy Watkins in the 50-yard freestyle from 2000-03.

A complete list of the great Carolina swimmers would also have to include Sarah Perroni, who graduated from UNC in 1993. A three-time first-team All-America, Perroni finished fourth in the 50-yard freestyle at the 1993 NCAA Championships, won a pair of medals at the 1993 World University Games and participated on the American Team at the 1993 Pan Pacific Championships in Kobe, Japan. She also swam in the Short Course World Championships in December of 1993 in Mallorca, Spain and was a member of the U.S. Swimming Resident National Team training in Colorado Springs, Colo., for two years.

Another great Tar Heel sprinter was Jessi Perquet who swam at Carolina from 2001-04. Perquet was the winner of multiple individual and relay ACC championships and she was the 2003 NCAA co-champion in the 200-yard freestyle. Perquet was the ACC Swimmer-of-the-Year in 2003 as well.

Another tremendous freestyler was Kari Haag, who graduated from Carolina in 1996. Haag was the ACC Swimmer-of-the-Year in both 1995 and 1996 and she came extremely close to winning UNC's first national title in 11 years in 1995 when she finished second at NCAA's in the 200-yard freestyle. Haag is married to Brad Woodall, a former star pitcher for the Tar Heel baseball

team who spent several years in the major leagues with teams like the Atlanta Braves, Chicago Cubs and Milwaukee Brewers.

Richelle Fox was the 1997 and 1998 ACC Women's Swimmer-of-the-Year. She had six finishes in championship finals at the 1997 and 1998 NCAA meets, including a pair of second-place finishes in the 100-yard butterfly. Fox was named to the United States squad for the 1999 Pan Pacific Championships. She was joined on that team which competed in Sydney, Australia by Kari Haag and by Molly Freedman, later a stand-out butterflyer at UNC.

### **Tar Heels On International Teams**

UNC swimmers have also been fixtures competing in international and Olympic-related competitions. That has especially been true over the past three decades. Starting with Bonny Brown's appearance in the 1977 World University Games, other Tar Heels invited to that biannual competition have been Barb Harris and Gayle Hegel in 1979; Sue Walsh in 1981 at Bucharest, Romania; Eric Ericson and Sue Walsh in 1983 at Edmonton, Alberta; Melanie Buddemeyer in 1985 at Kobe, Japan; Melanie Buddemeyer and Susan O'Brien in 1987 at Zagreb, Yugoslavia; Sarah Perroni, James Hamrick, Yann deFabrique and individual medley standout Carrie Szulc in 1993 at Buffalo, N.Y.; Yann deFabrique, Kari Haag and Trevor Runberg in 1995 at Fukuoka, Japan; and Jessi Perquet and Jessie Brosch in Daegu, South Korea in 2003. Perquet won two silver medals at the 2003 World University Games. Haag won a gold medal at the 1995 World University Games as a member of the U.S.'s 800-meter freestyle relay squad, while deFabrique won three medals at the 1993 World University Games and two more medals at the 1995 World University Games. Buddemeyer and O'Brien also swam together at Brisbane, Australia in August 1987 at the Pan Pacific Games.

In August 1987, UNC had a participant in the Pan American Games in Indianapolis in the person of Tony Monasterio, representing his native Puerto Rico. Tony Monasterio was followed to the same competition four years later by his younger brother David Monasterio, who swam splendidly in the 1991 event at Havana, Cuba. Sean Quinn represented the U.S. at the 2003 Pan American Games in Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic, where he won the silver medal in the 200-meter breaststroke.

Carolina Olympians of the past 30 years have included Ann Marshall in 1972, Wendy Weinberg and Janis Hape in 1976, Sue Walsh in 1980, Chris Stevenson in 1984, David Monasterio and Yann deFabrique in 1992, Yann deFabrique in 1996 and Yi-Khy Saw in 2004. Yann deFabrique also competed for France in the 1994 World Championships in Rome, while Trevor Runberg swam for the American team at the 1998 World Championships.

## Carolina Swimming and Diving National Champions

University of North Carolina swimmers have accounted for 19 individual national collegiate championships on the NCAA and AIAW level and one relay title on the AIAW level during the program's storied 68-year history of the men's and women's swimming and diving programs from 1938-39 through 2005-06.

Men's swimmers have been responsible for four of those titles and the women have won 15 individual titles and one relay crown.

The first championship came in 1955 under the tutelage of veteran head coach Ralph Casey when Phil Drake captured the 200-yard NCAA butterfly crown in 2:13.70. Nearly 50 years after his feat, Drake was chosen as one of the ACC's Top 50 swimmers of all-time in 2002.

Two years later, in 1957, Charlie Krepp, while swimming in the NCAA Championships in his home facility at UNC's Bowman Gray Pool, won both the 100- and 200-yard backstroke titles in 58.10 and 2:07.80, respectively. Krepp was coached to those championships by Casey, then in his final year as UNC head coach.

In 1966, Phil Riker won Carolina's fourth men's NCAA individual championship, capturing the 100-yard butterfly in a time of 51.19. Riker, who had been a member of the 1964 U.S. Olympic Team, was coached by the late Pat Earey. Like Drake, both

Krepp and Riker were honored on the ACC's Top 50 Team in 2002.

Carolina's first women's championships came under the aegis of the now-defunct Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW), which ran women's athletics on the collegiate level from the early 1970s until the NCAA took over sponsorship of women's championships in 1981.

Coach Jim Wood helped produce swimmers who won three national championships in his two years at the helm of the program. In 1976, Ann Marshall won AIAW national titles in the 200-yard freestyle and the 200-yard backstroke. Historical records do not have times listed for either of those victories but Marshall was a celebrated swimmer who had been on the 1972 U.S. Olympic Team before enrolling at Carolina in 1975.

A year after Marshall's victory, Bonny Brown won the AIAW title in the 100-yard individual medley in 1977. Again no time is listed in historical records. Both of those swimmers, Marshall and Brown, won their national titles as freshmen at Carolina.

She won the 50- and 100-yard backstrokes at the AIAW meet in 1981 and then went on to win the 50-, 100- and 200-yard backstrokes at the 1982 and 1983 NCAA meets and the 100- and 200-yard backstrokes at the 1984 NCAA Championships.*

The remainder of the UNC titles have been produced during Frank Comfort's tenure as head coach.

In 1981, another talented Carolina freshman burst on to the scene in the person of Sue Walsh, a native of Hamburg, N.Y. Walsh won a total of 10 individual titles and was on one national championship relay unit during her tenure at UNC. In 1981, the last season of AIAW governance of the sport, Walsh won titles in the 50-yard backstroke (25.97) and the 100-yard backstroke (55.60).

That same year, Carolina's 200-yard medley relay team won the national title with a 1:42.63 clocking, then an American record in the event. That relay team consisted of Sue Walsh swimming the backstroke, freshman Amy Pless the breaststroke, freshman Cami Berizzi the butterfly and junior Barb Harris the freestyle.

A year later in 1982, the NCAA sponsored its first women's swimming and diving championship meet. Barb Harris excelled again, winning the 50-yard butterfly crown in 24.82 seconds.

That same year saw the start of Sue Walsh's incredible dominance of NCAA backstroke races. In fact,

she never lost a backstroke race in her three years of NCAA competition. As a sophomore in 1982, she won the 50-yard backstroke in 25.64, the 100-yard backstroke in 54.81 and the 200-yard backstroke in 1:59.47. A year later, she repeated in all three events with times of 25.85 in the 50-yard backstroke, 55.62 in the 100-yard backstroke and 1:59.05 in the 200-yard backstroke. Prior to the beginning of the 1983-84 season, the 50-yard backstroke was eliminated as an NCAA event, but Walsh still captured titles in the 100-yard backstroke in 55.32 and the 200-yard backstroke in 1:59.84. They were both thrillingly close races as she won the 200-yard backstroke by one one-hundredth of a second and the 100-yard backstroke by one-tenth of a second. Nevertheless, the twin titles capped a brilliant collegiate swimming career in style.

Carolina's most recent NCAA champion was Jessi Perruquet, a brilliant freestyler from Danville, Pa., who like Marshall, Brown, Walsh, Pless, Berizzi and Harris was named in 2002 to the ACC's Top 50 Team.

Perruquet tied for the NCAA title in the 200-yard freestyle during her junior season of 2003. Competing at Auburn University, Perruquet tied the host school's Heather Kemp for the crown, both with times of 1:45.01, Perruquet's career best.

## Patterson Medal Winners Carolina Swimming and Diving

The Patterson Medal, established in 1924, is the highest athletic award given at the University of North Carolina. It is given annually to the Carolina senior athlete who has demonstrated general excellence throughout his or her career in a myriad of areas. The selection is based on athletic accomplishments, sportsmanship, morale, leadership and general conduct and is made by a committee of athletic officials, faculty members and student representatives.

The award was first given in 1924 by university benefactor Dr. Joseph Flanner Patterson in memory of his brother, John Durant Patterson. It has since been continued by the Patterson family. Since the University of North Carolina started a swimming and diving program in 1938, seven Tar Heel swimmers have won the award, including three women.

The first swimmer to win the award was Denny Hammond in 1944. A native of Atlanta, Ga., Hammond established a national intercollegiate backstroke record during the course of his career at Carolina. He swam on teams which won the Southern Conference team championships in 1942, 1943 and 1944. The 1942 squad also tied for 12th nationally at the NCAA meet. In 1942, Hammond was a first-team All-America in the 150-yard backstroke

and on the 300-yard medley relay team and the 400-yard freestyle relay team. He also earned first-team All-America honors in 1944 as a member of the 300-yard medley relay. Hammond won Southern Conference individual championships in the 150-yard backstroke in both 1942 and 1943 and in the 220-yard freestyle in 1943.

Carolina swimmers won back-to-back Patterson Medals in 1951 and 1952. In 1951, Jimmy Thomas was the winner of the award. An amazingly versatile swimmer, Thomas won two Amateur Athletic Union (AAU) national swimming titles in the individual medley and one in the backstroke during his UNC career. While a Tar Heel, he established 10 American records, four NCAA marks and seven Southern Conference standards. Considered to be the top swimmer in Southern history, Thomas became the first person to be named a first-team All-America in four different individual events at the NCAA Championships in 1951. Thomas completed his career at Carolina having never lost in conference competition in either the 220- or 440-yard freestyle events.

A year later, in 1952, Cecil Milton, was named the winner of the Patterson Medal. Milton was an accomplished athlete at Carolina in both swimming, where he lettered three years, and on the tennis squad, playing one year for legendary head coach John Kenfield. Milton won Southern Conference titles in both the 220- and 440-yard freestyles in 1950.

The 1965 recipient of the Patterson Medal was Harrison Merrill, one of the most popular athletes at Carolina in the 1960s and also one of its most accomplished. Merrill was the winner of seven individual ACC titles in his career and was a three-year All-America at UNC, winning honors in 1963, 1964 and 1965. Merrill was an outstanding freestyler who specialized at the 100- and 200-yard distances.

In 1980, Bonny Brown became the first woman athlete to ever capture UNC's most prestigious athletic award. In 1975, Brown won a gold medal for the United States at the Pan American Games. A year later, the Murphy, N.C., native set the American record in the 100-meter freestyle. At Carolina, she won the AIAW national title in 1977 in the 100-yard individual medley.

Just four years later in 1984, the most decorated swimmer in UNC history, Sue Walsh, captured the Patterson Medal. A member of the 1978 U.S. World Championships team and the 1980 U.S. Olympic Team, she won 10 national championships on an individual basis (four in the 100-yard backstroke, three in the 200-yard backstroke and three in the 50-yard backstroke). At the 1980-81 ACC Championships, Walsh won the 50-yard, 100-yard and 200-yard backstrokes, 50-yard freestyle and was a member of the 200-yard and 800-yard freestyle relay championship teams. Walsh was an All-America in the 50-yard, 100-yard and 200-yard backstrokes, 50-yard freestyle and on 200-yard medley relay and the 200-yard and 800-yard free style relays. That 200-yard medley relay unit won the national title.

She captured five ACC titles, individual and relay, in 1982 and was an All-America in the 50-yard, 100-yard and 200-yard backstrokes, the

50-yard freestyle, the 100-yard individual medley and as part of the 200-yard medley relay and the 200-yard free relay.

Her junior season in 1982-83 was no different as Walsh won six ACC championships in individual events and relays while being named All-America in the 50-yard, 100-yard and 200-yard backstrokes, the 100-yard individual medley and on the 200-yard medley relay and 200-yard and 400-yard freestyle relays teams.

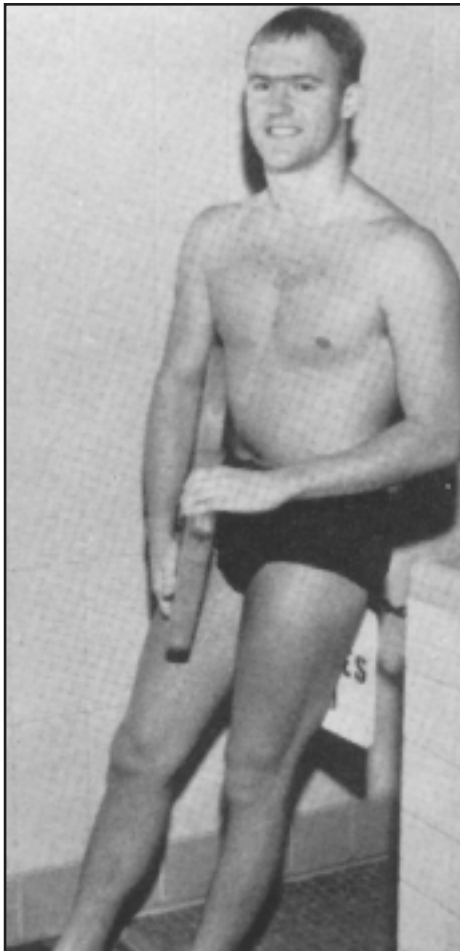
She captured six ACC titles in 1984 as well as the ACC Championships' Most Valuable Swimmer award for the second year in a row. That season Walsh was an All-America in the 100-yard and 200-yard backstrokes, on the 400-yard medley relay team and on the 200-, 400- and 800-yard freestyle relay units. She was a 27-time All-America winner in her collegiate career while winning an amazing 23 individual and relay ACC titles as well. She held the school record at UNC for the 100-yard backstroke and 200-yard backstroke and was the American record holder in the 50-yard backstroke and 100-yard backstroke. Walsh was a two-time Verizon First-Team Academic All-America and she was inducted into the Verizon Academic All-America Hall of Fame in 2002.

Katie Hathaway, a swimming letter winner from 1999 through 2002 and a native of Matthews, N.C., is the most recent Carolina swimmer to win the Patterson Medal. Hathaway won the award in 2002, becoming the first swimmer to win the honor since Walsh a total of 18 years earlier. Hathaway was a six-time first-team

All-America in the 400-yard individual medley and 100- and 200-yard breaststrokes and an 11-time honorable mention in the 200-yard breaststroke, the 200-yard individual medley and as a member of 200-yard freestyle relay, 200-yard medley relay, 4 0 0 - y a r d freestyle relay, 400-yard medley relay and 800-yard free relay teams from 1999 through 2002. Hathaway won 10 ACC championships on relay teams and in the breaststroke events while a member of the Tar Heels and she led UNC to a trio of ACC team championships.

University of North Carolina athletics and the quadrennial Games of the Summer Olympiad have always been inextricably linked in so many different sports with multiple Tar Heel representatives each four years. That has especially been true in the sport of swimming. Several former Tar Heel swimmers have either participated in the Olympic Games or have been chosen as coaches, beginning with the Melbourne Summer Olympic Games in Australia in 1956.

That first association between the two entities came in 1956 when Stan Tinkham, who had an outstanding swimming career as a Tar Heel before graduating from UNC in 1952, was chosen to coach the U.S. Olympic women's swimming team at the Games held in Melbourne,

Australia. That American women's team came home from Down Under with one gold, three silver and two bronze medals.

In the 1964 Games at Tokyo, Japan, UNC was represented by a pair of outstanding male swimmers, the incomparable Thompson Mann, and rising American star Phil Riker. Mann captured a gold medal in Tokyo, swimming the lead-off leg on the United States' victorious 400-meter medley relay team. In swimming that leadoff leg, Mann became the first person ever to swim the 100-meter backstroke in less than a minute, clocking a 59.80 split. Meanwhile, Riker swam the 200-meter butterfly for the American squad in Tokyo in 1964, two years shy of capturing the NCAA title in the 100-yard butterfly.

Ann Marshall, who graduated from Carolina in 1980, was the first women's Carolina swimmer to make an Olympic Team. As a 14-year-old from Florida, Marshall made the U.S. team for the 1972 Games in Munich, Germany. She was the fourth-place finisher in the 200-meter freestyle at those Games, just missing a bronze

medal.

Two Tar Heel greats were members of the United States women's team at the 1976 Olympic Games in Montreal, Quebec. Both made the Olympic Team after graduating from high school that spring and before enrolling for their freshman year in college that fall. Janis Hape, UNC Class of 1980, swam in the 200-meter breaststroke that July. Meanwhile, Wendy Weinberg, also Class of '80, won a bronze medal in the 800-meter freestyle. Weinberg, a Baltimore, Md. native who at that time swam for legendary Tar Heel Head Coach Frank Comfort at the Homewood Aquatic Club, was one of two Americans to medal in that event. The famed Shirley Babashoff took the silver medal.

In 1980, the summer before she enrolled at UNC, Sue Walsh earned a spot on the United States Olympic Team which was to compete in the Games of the XXII Olympiad at Moscow in what was then the Soviet Union. She was slated to swim the 100-meter backstroke and was a candidate to swim the leadoff leg on the 4x100-meter medley relay. However, U.S. President Jimmy Carter, in response to the Soviet government's invasion of Afghanistan in the early months of 1980, joined with leaders in many other democratic countries to organize a boycott of the Games by Western nations.

In 1984, at the Summer Olympic Games in Los Angeles, Calif., UNC rising junior Chris Stevenson represented Greece in the swimming competition. Stevenson was born in Greece and his mother was a Greek citizen, thus he qualified for the team. Stevenson's best finish at the University of Southern California's McDonald's Pool was in the 100-meter butterfly, where he took 13th. He also finished 18th in the 200-meter butterfly, 20th in the 100-meter backstroke and 23rd in the 200-meter backstroke.

The Tar Heel program was honored to have two swimmers participate in Summer Games

held in July and August of 1992 in Barcelona, Spain. David Monasterio, UNC Class of 1993, swam for his native Puerto Rico, while Yann deFabrique, Class of 1995, who had dual citizenship in both the U.S. and France, qualified for the French team.

Monasterio swam the 400-meter individual medley, the 200-meter butterfly and was a member of the 400-meter medley, 400-meter freestyle and 800-meter freestyle relays for the Puerto Rican squad. Yann deFabrique participated in two events at Barcelona. In the 400-meter freestyle, he qualified for the consolation finals and finished 14th in a school long course record time of 3:54.37. He also combined with Christophe Bordeau, Lionel Poirot and Franck Horter to finish 10th in the 800-meter freestyle relay with a clocking of 7:26.22.

Yann deFabrique again made the French team for the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta, Ga. He swam on the French 800-meter freestyle relay team which finished in eighth place, capturing a spot in the finals. Yann deFabrique led off the relay with a 1:50.76 split. In the 400-meter freestyle, deFabrique finished seventh in the consolation final of the event with a clocking of 3:56.46. He also swam in the 1500-meter freestyle, recording a time of 15:40.49.

Carolina's most recent Olympian was Yi-Khy Saw who competed for his native Malaysia in the 2004 Olympics in Athens, Greece. Saw swam the 1500-meter freestyle in the Games.

## ACC Top 50 Honorees Carolina Swimming and Diving

Eleven University of North Carolina men's swimmers and 22 Tar Heel women's swimmers headlined the list of the 50 greatest Atlantic Coast Conference men's and women's swimmers and divers of all time, announced in September of 2002 by the ACC.

As part of its 50th anniversary celebration, the ACC recognized the all-time greatest athletes in conference history in each sport. Teams were announced throughout the months of August and September in 2002.

"I'm very proud of the large number of UNC student-athletes named to the team," said Frank Comfort, the head coach at North Carolina since 1977, and the head coach of six of the 11 men's swimmers and all of the 22 women's swimmers on the list. "This was an amazingly representative list and brings great honor to the history of swimming at North Carolina. I want to thank the ACC for organizing the teams and the celebration of the 50th year of the Atlantic Coast Conference."

With 33 of the top 100 swimmers in conference history, UNC's total stood at the top of the list among ACC schools.

UNC's 279 ACC Top 50 selections in all sports were honored at a banquet in Chapel Hill, N.C. on September 27, 2002 followed by recognition at halftime of the UNC-Georgia Tech football game on September 28. The ACC honored ACC Top 50 selections from all schools at an event in Greensboro, N.C. in March 2003 in conjunction with the ACC basketball tournament. At that time, North Carolina's Sue Walsh was recognized as one of the 50 greatest women's athletes in ACC history regardless of sport.

Following is the complete list of Tar Heel honorees for men's and women's swimming and diving:

**John Davis (1988-91, Weston, Conn.)** was a first-team All-America in the 200 free and as a member of the 800 free relay and honorable mention as a member of the 400 free relay in 1988. Davis was an honorable mention All-America in the 200 free relay and the 800 free relay in 1990 and 1991. He was the Most Valuable Swimmer at the ACC

Championships and the ACC Co-Swimmer-of-the-Year in 1990. The 11 ACC individual championships won by Davis are the most in ACC men's swimming history.

**Yann deFabrique (1992-95, Boynton Beach, Fla.)** was a first-team All-America in the 200 free and on the 800 free relay and an honorable mention in the 500 free, 200 fly and on the 400 free relay in 1993. He was an honorable mention All-America in the 200 and 500 free and 200 fly in 1994 and on the 800 free relay in 1995.

**Phil Drake (1953-55, Fort Lauderdale, Fla.)** was a first-team All-America in the 200 fly and on the 300 medley relay team in 1955. He won the ACC championship in the 200 fly in 1955. Drake also won the NCAA crown in the 200 fly in 1955, bringing UNC its first national champion in swimming.

**Eric Ericson (1981-84, Wilmington, Del.)** was a first-team All-America in the 100 back in 1981 and 1982 and the 100 and 200 back in 1983 and 1984. He is one of only two UNC men's swimmers in history to be a first-team All-America four years in a row. He won the ACC championship in the 100 back in 1981; the 100 and 200 back and on the 400 medley relay team in 1982, 1983 and 1984; and on the 400 free relay team in 1983.

**Kenny Ireland (1978-81, Fort Lauderdale, Fla.)** was a first-team All-America in the 100 back in 1980 and in the 200 back in 1979 and 1980. Ireland won the ACC championship in the 100 and 200 back in 1979 and 1980; the 500 free and on the 400 free relay and the 800 free relay in 1980; and in the 200 back and on the 400 medley relay and 800 free relay units in 1981.

**Charlie Krepp (1955-57, Baltimore, Md.)** was a first-team All-America in the 100 and 200 back and on the 300 medley relay team in 1955; the 100 and 200 back and 200 IM in 1956; and the 100 and 200 back and on 400 medley relay team in 1957. Krepp won the NCAA title in both the 100 and 200 back in 1957.

**Thompson Mann (1962-64, Chesapeake, Va.)** was a first-team All-America in the 100 and 200 back in 1962 and 1964, 100 back in 1963 and on the 400 medley and 400 free relays units in 1964. He won ACC championships in the 100 and 200 back and on the 400 medley relay team in 1962; in the 100 back, 200 IM and on the 400 free relay in 1963; and in the 100 and 200 back, 200 IM and on the 400 medley relay in 1964.

**Harrison Merrill (1963-65, Atlanta, Ga.)** was a first-team All-America in the 200 free in 1963, in the 100 and 200 free and on the 400 free relay team in 1964 and on the 400 free relay unit in 1965. Merrill won ACC championships in the 100 and 200 free and the 400 IM in both 1963 and 1964, on the 400 free relay team in 1963 and in the 500 free and on the 400 free relay squad in 1965.

**David Monasterio (1990-93, Ponce, Puerto Rico)** was a first-team All-America in the 200 free and the 200 fly in 1991 and on the 800 free relay team in 1993. He was an honorable mention All-America as a member of the 800 free relay team in 1990, 1991 and 1992, in the 500 free and the 200 fly in 1992 and in the 500 free in 1993. He was Swimmer-of-the-Year in the ACC in 1991.

**Phil Riker (1966-68, Paterson, N.J.)** won the NCAA championship in the 100 fly in

1966. Riker was a six-time first-team All-America in the 100 and 200 fly and on 400 medley relay and 800-freestyle relay teams from 1965 to 1967. He won the ACC championship in the 100 and 200 fly in 1966, 1967 and 1968 and on the 400 medley relay team in 1968.

**Trevor Runberg (1995-98, Chapel Hill, N.C.)** was a first-team All-America in the 500 free in 1996 and an honorable mention choice on the 800 free relay team in 1995, on the 400-medley relay and 800 free relay squads in 1996 and on the 800 free relay team in 1997. Runberg was named the Co-Swimmer-of-the-Year in the ACC in 1996.

**Erika Acuff (1997-2001, Gladwyne, Pa.)** was a first-team All-America in the 400 IM in 1997, 1999 and 2001 and in the 200 IM in 1998 and 2001. She was an honorable mention All-America in the 400 IM in 1998. Acuff swam on 11 relay teams which won honorable mention All-America honors. She was the ACC Rookie-of-the-Year in 1997. Acuff captured ACC championships in both the 200 & 400 IMs in 1997 and 1999, in the 200 IM in 1998 and 2001 and in the 200 breast in 1997. She was a member of eight relay teams which won ACC championships.

**Cami Berizzi (1981-84, Riverside, Conn.)** was a member of the AIAW national championship 200 medley relay team in 1981. She was a first-team All-America in the 50-, 100- and 200-yard backstrokes in 1981 and 1982; in the 50 and 100 fly and on the 200 medley relay team and on the 400-medley relay in 1981; and on the 400 med-

squads from 1977-1980.

**Melanie Buddemeyer (1985-89, Penn Hills, Pa.)** was a six-time first-team All-America in the 100 and 200 butterfly and on 200 medley relay and 400 medley relays between 1985 and 1989. She was a 10-time honorable mention All-America in the 100 and 200 fly, 200 medley relay, 400 medley relay, 400 free relay and 800 free relay between 1985 and 1989. Buddemeyer won all eight ACC titles in the two butterfly events during her four years at UNC.

**Melissa Douse (1989-92, Great Falls, Va.)** was a four-time first-team All-America on the 200 free relay and 400 free relay units and a five-time honorable mention All-America in the 50 and 100 free, on the 200 free relay, the 400 free relay and the 800 free relay from 1989 to 1992. She was the 1992 Most Valuable Swimmer at the ACC Championships and the ACC Swimmer-of-the-Year.

**Lauren Dupree (1977-80, Jacksonville, Fla.)** was a 16-time first-team All-America in the 200, 500 and 1650 free, 100 and 200 fly, 400 free relay and 800 free relay squads from 1977 to 1980. She also won an ACC championship as a member of the 800 free relay in 1979.

**Richelle Fox (1997-98, Scotia, N.Y.)** was a six-time first-team All-America in the 50 and 100 free and 100 fly and six-time honorable mention selection on the 200 medley relay, 400 medley relay, 400 free relay and 800 free relay teams from in 1997 and 1998. She was named the ACC's Swimmer-of-the-Year in 1997 and 1998.

**Kari Haag (1993-96, Windsor, Wis.)** was a six-time first-team All-America in the 50, 100 and 200 free and on the 400 free relay and a four-time honorable mention choice in the 50 free and on the 200 free relay and 800 free relays from 1993-96. Haag was the 1995 Most Valuable Swimmer at the ACC Championships and the ACC's Swimmer-of-the-Year

in 1995 and 1996.

**Janis Hape (1977-80, Mission Viejo, Calif.)** was a four-time first-team All-America in the 200 breast and on 200 medley relay and 400 medley relay teams from 1977 through 1980. She was a U.S. Olympian in 1976.

**Barb Harris (1979-82, Lincoln, Neb.)** was a member of the AIAW national champi-

onship 200 medley relay team in 1981 and she won the NCAA championship in the 50 fly in 1982. Harris was a 26-time first-team All-America in the 50 and 100 fly, 100 free and on 200 medley relay, 400 medley relay, 200 free relay, 400 free relay and 800 free relay teams from 1979 to 1982.

**Katie Hathaway (1999-2002, Matthews, N.C.)** was a six-time first-team All-America in the 400 IM and the 100 and 200 breast and an 11-time honorable mention selection in the 200 breast, 200 IM and on 200 free relay, 200 medley relay, 400 free relay, 400 medley relay and 800 free relay teams from 1999 to 2002. Hathaway became the first Tar Heel swimmer in 18 years to win the Patterson Medal as the outstanding senior student-athlete when she did so in 2002.

**Gayle Hegel (1980-83, Turnersville, N.J.)** was a 23-time first-team All-America in the 100 and 200 breast, 100, 200 and 400 IM and on 400 medley relay, 400 free relay and 800 free relay teams from 1980-83. She won 13 ACC titles in those events and the 50 breast as well as 200 medley relay teams. Hegel was the Most Valuable Swimmer at the 1980 ACC Championships.

**Ann Marshall (1976-79, Fort Lauderdale, Fla.)** was an 18-time first-team All-America in the 100, 200 and 500 free, 50 and 200 back and on 200 medley relay, 200 free relay, 400 medley relay, 400 free relay and 800 free relays from 1976-79. Marshall was on two ACC title-winning relays in 1979. Marshall was a member of the 1972 U.S. Olympic Team when she was only 14 years old.

**Chrissy Miller (1995-98, Phoenixville, Pa.)** was a first-team All-America in the 500 free in 1998 and she was an eight-time honorable mention in the 200 fly, 400 IM, 500 free and on the 800 free relay team from 1995-98. Miller was the 1995 ACC Rookie-of-the-Year and was twice named the Most Valuable Swimmer at the ACC Championships in 1996 and again in 1998.

**Susan O'Brien (1985-88, Bethesda, Md.)** won first-team All-America honors in the 100 and 200 backstrokes during each of her four years at Carolina. She won ACC titles in the 100 and 200 backstroke and 100 free in 1985. In 1987, she again won ACC

**Bonny Brown (1977-80, Murphy, N.C.)** won the AIAW national title in the 100 individual medley in 1977. She was a 25-time first-team All-America in such events as the 50, 100 and 200 free, 100 and 200 IM and on 200 medley relay, 200 free relay, 400 free relay, 400 medley relay and 800 free relay

titles in the 100 and 200 backstrokes. As a senior, O'Brien gained ACC titles in the 100 and 200 backstrokes and the 200 IM.

**Sarah Perroni (1990-93, Bristol, R.I.)** was named 1990 All-ACC and won ACC titles in the 50 and 100 freestyles and on the 400 medley relay and the 200 and 400 freestyle relays. That year she also did well at the NCAA Championships, getting All-America nods in the 100 freestyle and on two relay teams. In 1991, she won ACC titles in the 50 free and on the 400 medley relay and the 200 and 400 freestyle relays. Perroni returned for her senior season in 1993 and was named All-ACC for the third time in her career while capturing ACC titles in the 50 and 100 freestyles and on three relay squads. Perroni closed out her career with All-America status in the 50 free in 1993.

**Jessi Perruquet (2001-04, Danville, Pa.)** established herself quickly as one of the top swimmers in the ACC and was named to the ACC Top 50 Team after only two seasons at Carolina. Perruquet won the co-championship in the 200 free at the 2003 NCAA Championships and finished her career as UNC's record holder in the 200 free. She was the ACC Rookie-of-the-Year in 2001 and Swimmer-of-the-Year 2003.

**Amy Pless (1981-84, Asheville, N.C.)** was an outstanding swimmer for UNC in the early 1980s. She swam on UNC teams which finished third in the nation in 1981 and 1982, sixth in 1983 and fifth in 1984. She won ACC championships in the 50 breast and 100 IM in 1981, in the 100 IM in 1982, in the 50 breast in 1983 and in the 200 IM in 1984. Pless swam the breaststroke leg on Carolina's 200 medley relay team which claimed the national title in 1981. She also swam on eight ACC championship relays in her career. Pless won first-team All-America all four years at Carolina and swam on four ACC championship teams.

**Leslie Ramsey (1992-95, Yorktown, Va.)** was named the ACC Swimmer-of-the-Year in 1995. She swam on four ACC championship teams at Carolina and was the captain of the 1995 team. She won ACC titles in the 200-yard butterfly in both 1992 and 1994. She also swam on the ACC 800 free relay championship team in 1995. Ramsey earned first-team All-America honors in 1994 and honorable mention All-America honors in 1992 and 1995.

**Sue Walsh (1981-84, Hamburg, N.Y.)** was the greatest swimmer in the history of the Atlantic Coast Conference. A member of the 1978 U.S. World Swimming Championships team and 1980 U.S. Olympic Team, she won 10 national championships in individual events (four in the 100 back, three in the 200 back and three in the 50 back). At the 1981 ACC Championships, Walsh won the 50-yard, 100-yard and 200-yard backstrokes and the 50-yard freestyle. She was an All-America in seven events that year. As a freshman she swam on a 200 medley relay that won the national title. She captured five ACC titles in 1982 and was an All-America in five individual events and on two relays. Her junior season in 1983 was no different as Walsh won six ACC championships, was named the ACC Championships most valuable swimmer and earned All-America honors in four individual events and on three relay teams. She captured six ACC titles in 1984 as well as the ACC Championships most valuable swimmer award for the second year in a row. That season she was an All-America in two individual events and on four relays. She was a 27-time All-America honoree in her collegiate career while winning an amazing 23 ACC titles in individual and relay events. She held the all-time record at UNC for the 100-yard backstroke and 200-yard backstroke and was American record holder in 50-yard backstroke, the 100-yard backstroke and the 100-meter backstroke. Walsh was two-time Verizon first-team

Academic All-America and was inducted into Verizon Academic America Hall of Fame in 2002.

**Christy Watkins (2000-03, Winter Springs, Fla.)** became the ACC record holder in the 100-yard backstroke as a freshman. In 2000, she broke Sue Walsh's record in that event which had stood for 17 years. Watkins is one of the few ACC swimmers in history to win an event four straight years at the league championship meet. She did so in the 50-yard freestyle from 2000-03. Watkins also won three successive ACC titles in the 100 back from 2000-02.

**Polly Winde (1983-86, Ellicott City, Md.)** enjoyed a freshman season which included ACC titles in the 200-yard and 400-yard IMs and the 200-yard breaststroke while meriting All-America honors in four individual events. She continued her swimming success in her sophomore year with ACC titles in the 200-yard breaststroke and 400-yard IM while claiming All-America honors in three individual events. Winde won ACC titles in the 200-yard and 400-yard IMs and on both medley relays in 1985. That year she was named All-America in the 400-yard IM and on a trio of relay teams. In 1986 she won the 200-yard and 400-yard IM titles at the ACC Championships. Winde captured the 400 IM title at four successive ACC meets. Her international career included winning a silver medal in the 400-meter individual medley at the 1983 Pan American Games.

### *Notes About Carolina Swimming Team Awards:*

*The Most Valuable, Most Outstanding and Most Improved Awards for both the men's and women's teams are all named by Richard E. Jamerson, who founded the University of North Carolina swimming program in 1938-39. The Hill Carrow Spirit Award is presented annually in honor of former Tar Heel swimmer Hill Carrow, Class of 1977, to the swimmer on each team who exhibits the most school spirit. The Bruce Webster Memorial Award is presented annually to the most dedicated member of the men's team. The award honors former Tar Heel swimmer Bruce Webster, Class of 1981, who passed away in 1983. The Athletic Director's Scholar-Athlete Awards, begun in 1986, are presented annually by the UNC Athletic Director to the top student-athlete in each of UNC's 28 varsity sports. The Andrea Erben Memorial Award is given each year to the most dedicated swimmer on the women's team and honors Andrea Erben, a Tar Heel swimmer who passed away following her sophomore year in 2003. The Class of 1940 Blue Dolphin Award is given in honor of the senior class which founded UNC's swimming program in 1938-39 and is awarded to an individual who has made exceptional overall contributions to the Carolina swimming program. The Osterneck Family Award is given annually by Rhoda Osterneck of Durham, N.C., to the swimming program's unsung heroes. It is dedicated in the loving memory of Bob Osterneck, Rhoda's husband, who passed away in June 1991, and her late mother, Minnie Pitkus. The David McInnis Diving Awards honor David McInnis, Class of 1957, and winner twice of the John A. Futchenberg Award as the ACC's top diver. It is awarded each year to the outstanding diver on each UNC squad.*

## Koury Natatorium Carolina Swimming and Diving



Swimmers and divers at the University of North Carolina enjoy one tremendous advantage in achieving excellence in their chosen sport. The facility the University has built and maintained for the sport on the Carolina campus is one of the best structures in the Atlantic Coast Conference and amongst the finest competition pools in the United States.

Originally opened in 1986, the Maurice J. Koury Natatorium underwent a series of massive improvements in 2005 and 2006. At that time, the locker rooms for the women's swimming and diving and men's swimming and diving teams were both redesigned and updated. An extensive series of updates were made to the coaches office suite as well.

The Carolina athletic department also purchased new starting blocks and invested in improvements to the timing system and the scoreboard which makes the overall operation state of the art.

It was after 48 seasons of intercollegiate swimming and diving competition in historic Bowman Gray Pool that the Tar Heel men's and women's

swimming and diving teams moved into their new digs in October 1986 with the opening of the Maurice J. Koury Natatorium as part of the Dean E. Smith Center complex.

Now in its 21st year of use, Koury Natatorium has gained a reputation as one of the finest pools in the nation and one of the best on the East Coast. Several top-flight competitions have already been staged here, with one of the showcase events having been United States Swimming's Senior Short Course National Championships held from

March 21-25, 1989.

Koury Natatorium served as the host of the U.S. Master's Swimming Short Course National Championships in May of 1992. That meet drew thousands of master's level swimmers from all over the nation to Chapel Hill.

Koury Natatorium has also hosted several Atlantic Coast Conference Men's and Women's Swimming and Diving Championships. Those meets were held at Koury Natatorium in 1987, 1989, 1991, 1992, 1993, 1995, 1996, 1997, 2000 and 2003. The Tar Heels will host the ACC Championships again in 2007.

Other top meets held at Koury Natatorium

have included the 1988 and 1991 NCAA Southeast Regional Diving Championships, North Carolina High School Athletic Association men's and women's championship meets and a trio of North Carolina-Virginia all-star meets. U.S. Swimming held its annual elite

training camp at Koury Natatorium shortly after the pool's opening from December 27, 1986 to January 3, 1987.

Another major highlight in Koury's history was the swimming and water polo competition at U.S. Olympic Festival '87, an event which was probably the most successful U.S. Olympic Festival ever staged by the U.S. Olympic Committee. Swimming competition in July 1987 played to overflow crowds all three nights and the water polo competition also set Festival attendance standards for

that sport. The crowds for swimming were so large that temporary bleachers had to be set up on the pool deck to accommodate all the spectators.

The natatorium was officially dedicated in ceremonies on October 2, 1987, a gala affair which drew a capacity crowd of UNC athletic partisans, swimming enthusiasts and statewide dignitaries, including North Carolina's Lieutenant Governor, Robert Jordan, who gave the official address dedicating the facility.

However, the first actual competition in the facility took place almost a year before the Dedication Day when on October 31, 1986 UNC hosted the Tar Heel Invitational. The first dual meet competition was on November 10, 1986 when UNC's women defeated NC State, 171-96.

The pool itself measures 50 meters in length by 25 yards in width. There are two moveable bulkheads which can configure the dimensions of the pool in many ways. At its most shallow point, the pool measures seven feet in depth, and the pool is 18 feet at its deepest point. The pool also features continuous flow gutters and has one of the most advanced lighting systems of any swimming facility in the world. The gallery area provides seating for approximately 2,000 fans.

The acoustical system at the natatorium is spectacular. The gallery area is served by six speakers and six more serve the pool deck, which underwent an elaborate tiling project immediately after the Olympic Festival in 1987. In excess of 2,300 individual acoustical tiles are installed in the ceiling.

The pool, which features underwater speakers and observation booths, holds one million gallons of water, quadrupling the water capacity of Bowman Gray Pool, which held about 250,000 gallons. There are no water jets in the pool, eliminating the problems caused by water currents. The natatorium also features a blower system and sliding windows for better ventilation during the summer.

Each Carolina team has a locker room which affords two lockers for each team member. A team meeting room adjoins the deck and is named for former UNC swimming coach Ralph Casey, who passed away in 1986. There is also a separate locker room for the UNC coaches and locker room facilities for visiting teams, recreational swimming and officials.

The locker rooms and meeting room are located directly across the hall from the athletic training room of the Smith Center, which is under the direction of Marc Davis, who serves as the head trainer for the UNC swimming program. The natatorium also contains outstanding facilities for diving with platforms at several levels have been added during the

summer of 2001 to the already existing one-meter boards and three-meter boards. The diving area also includes a separate scoreboard and message board for diving and chairs used by judges in major meets.

There is a second scoreboard and message board on the swimming end of the facility. The original scoreboard system was named for the late Dick Jamerson, founder of the UNC swimming program in 1939 and its first head coach. The original system was dedicated December 2, 1986 at a dual meet against Duke University with Coach Jamerson's widow, Anna Jamerson, in attendance for the ceremonies. A new scoreboard and timing system was installed in the fall of 2006 in time for the Tar Heels' home opener

against Georgia.

Also located on the deck level adjacent to the pool are the swimming offices, with a reception area and a manager's workroom and separate offices for all the Tar Heel coaches. The offices of the North Carolina Aquatic Club are also located on the Koury pool deck. NCAC is the United States Swimming swim club based in Chapel Hill.

All these special facets help make Koury Natatorium a showpiece of the Carolina athletic program and one of the nation's finest aquatic facilities while at the same time giving each and every UNC swimmer and diver the resources to achieve his or her maximum potential.

## Dick Baddour

• Director of Athletics



Dick Baddour, a 1966 graduate of the University of North Carolina, was named Director of Athletics on June 25, 1997. In his nine years as director, the UNC Department of Athletics has undergone a number of changes, yet remains one of the premiere programs in the Atlantic Coast Conference and in the nation.

The Goldsboro, N.C., native heads a program that with 28 varsity sports is the largest in the ACC. Carolina prides itself on a strong overall athletic program and finished fourth in the 2005-06 U.S. Sports Academy Cup, a measure of NCAA post-season success. The Tar Heels, inaugural winners of the Cup in 1994, have finished among the top 10 teams 11 times in the competition's 13 years.

Baddour is in his 40th year of continuous service to the university. He graduated from UNC in 1966 and was appointed Assistant Dean of Men in 1967. He served as Assistant Dean of Admissions and Assistant Dean of the UNC School of Law and also earned a Master of Arts degree in education prior to joining the athletic department in 1986.

In 2001, he received the Distinguished Service Medal from the UNC General Alumni Association.

Active in Chapel Hill community affairs, he is a past president of the Public School Foundation and has served on the Parks and Recreation Commission. He and his wife, Lynda, have two sons, Allen and David, and a daughter, Jennifer.

Beth Miller is in her 22nd year supervising North Carolina's highly-successful 26-team Olympic Sports program and serves as UNC's Senior Woman Administrator. She is a 1968 alumna of Appalachian State University with a B.S. degree in health and physical education.

She has a master's from ASU and earned a Doctor of Arts degree in physical education at Middle Tennessee State in 1974.

From 1969-72, Miller served as the head volleyball and basketball coach at Appalachian State. Miller currently serves on a number of Atlantic Coast Conference committees, including those for women's basketball, women's golf and volleyball. She chairs the Awards Committee and the Senior Woman Administrators Committee. She also serves on UNC's Housing Advisory Board.

Through its teaching, research and public service, the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill is an educational and economic beacon for the people of North Carolina and beyond.

## •History

The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill was the nation's first state university to open its doors and the only public university to award degrees in the 18th century.

Authorized by the N.C. Constitution in 1776, the university was chartered by the N.C. General Assembly Dec. 11, 1789, the same year George Washington first was inaugurated as president.

The cornerstone was laid for Old East, the nation's first state university building, Oct. 12, 1793. Hinton James, the first student, arrived from Wilmington, N.C., Feb. 12, 1795.

## •Location

The 729-acre central campus includes the two oldest state university buildings, Old East and Person Hall. Old East and Playmakers Theatre, an 1852 Greek-revival building are National Historic Landmarks.

The American Society of Landscape Architects selected the Carolina campus as one of the most beautifully landscaped spots in the country. That listing is among the praise affirming the charm of mighty oaks, majestic quadrangles, brick sidewalks and other landscaping synonymous with UNC.

Today, the campus is undergoing an unprecedented physical transformation made possible in part by North Carolinians' overwhelming approval of the \$3.1 billion bond referendum for higher education. The referendum, approved in November 2000, was the nation's largest higher education bond package.

The bonds mean \$510 million for renovations, repairs and new buildings so 21st century students at Carolina can learn in a 21st century environment. Also guided by a visionary master plan for growth now rapidly coming to life, the university is investing another \$800-plus million from non-state sources, including private gifts and overhead receipts from faculty research grants, for other buildings essential to excellence. The resulting \$1.3 billion capital construction program is among the largest underway at any major American university.

Recently completed projects include the renovation of Memorial Hall, which anchors the university's planned arts common and is now a comfortable, elegant venue for the performing arts; the Rams Head Center, a linchpin in the campus master plan that combines a 700-space parking deck, dining and student recreation facilities, and innovative sustainability practices; and the renovated Health Sciences Library, which features 140 computer workstations and technology that will encourage collaboration among scientists and educators in Chapel Hill and beyond.

This fall, groundbreakings will include the North Carolina Cancer Hospital, a \$180 million facility being built by the UNC Health Care System that was approved by the North Carolina General Assembly and Gov. Mike Easley in 2004.

UNC anchors one corner of the famed Research Triangle Park, which has played a vital role in nurturing the economic development of North Carolina.

## •Recent Rankings

Several national publications regularly publish rankings that listed Carolina prominently in categories ranging from academic quality to affordability to diversity to public service to international presence. Recent highlights include:

5th best public university in U.S. News & World Report's annual "Best Colleges" guidebook. Affirmation as a national leader in student accessibility; 2nd among public campuses and 19th overall in "Great Schools, Great Prices," based on academic quality, net cost of atten-



dance and average student debt. Also 6th among publics for "least debt."

Kenan-Flagler Business School: tied for 6th among undergraduate programs.

4th among public universities in "The Top American Research Universities," produced in December 2004 by the Lombardi Program on Measuring University Performance at the University of Florida. Based on categories such as research, endowment assets, private giving, faculty, and advanced training.

1st among the 100 best public colleges combining great academics and affordable tuitions as ranked by Kiplinger's Personal Finance. Carolina has been first four consecutive times.

A "best value" among 81 schools chosen for "America's Best Value Colleges, 2006 Edition" by The Princeton Review/Random House for outstanding academics, relatively low costs, and generous financial aid packages. Carolina has appeared in this publication two years in a row.

1st for the top entrepreneurial campus and 5th "most connected," according to The Princeton Review and Forbes.com. UNC has an undergraduate business degree offering with a concentration in entrepreneurship in the Kenan-Flagler Business School, a new minor in entrepreneurship in the College of Arts and Sciences, and a new campuswide Carolina Entrepreneurial Initiative. In 2000, UNC became the nation's largest university requiring undergraduates to own laptop computers. With more

than 850 wireless access points, UNC provides wireless connectivity in classrooms, labs, libraries, residence halls and quadrangles.

1st among public research universities, for the second consecutive year, recording the highest rate of undergraduates studying abroad in 2002-2003; 7th among all research universities for the total number of undergraduates going abroad, according to an annual report published by the Institute of International Education.

1st among U.S. academic institutions recognized as "best places to work for postdocs," according to The Scientist magazine. Based on conditions for postdoctoral fellows working in the life sciences as part of the magazine's third annual survey. Carolina was 6th among all U.S. institutions, including government institutions and private research centers.

"Hottest" for health careers, according to the Kaplan/Newsweek 2005 "How to Get into College" guide, based on admissions trends and interviews with a broad array of educators, admissions officers, students and other long-time observers of the admissions process. An article in the guide says UNC's diverse offerings in the health disciplines – all in the same place – are helping attract prospective students.

14th among top U.S. colleges and universities for the number of alumni volunteering to serve in the Peace Corps in 2004. Currently, 60 Chapel Hill graduates are representing the United States abroad by serving people who live in the developing world as Peace Corps volunteers.

14th – the highest ranking for any major public research university – in the 2004 "Black Enterprise-DayStar Top 50 Colleges and Universities for African Americans" list. This ranking was based on responses to questions about which schools were both a good academic and social fit for African-Americans.

One of the nation's top universities in fostering social responsibility and public service, according to The Princeton Review and Campus Compact. Carolina appears in a book, "Colleges With a Conscience: 81 Great Schools With Outstanding Community Involvement." Based on admissions practices, scholarships rewarding community service and support for service-learning programs.

Among the 20 very "best buy" public universities in the U.S. and Canada as judged by the 2005 Fiske Guide to Colleges based on the quality of the academic programs in relation to the cost of attendance.

Degree programs or specialty areas from the schools of business, education, law, medicine, pharmacy, public health as well as the College of Arts and Sciences appeared prominently in the Spring 2005 edition of U.S. News & World Report's "American's Best Graduate Schools" issue. Highlights included medicine, overall primary care, 2nd, overall research, tied for 23rd; pharmacy, 3rd for Pharm.D. doctoral program; Kenan-Flagler Business School's MBA program, tied for 21st, law, tied for 27th; education, tied for 27th; sociology, tied for 4th; history, tied for 13th; political science, tied for 13th; English, tied for 19th; and psychology, tied for 22nd.

Kenan-Flagler appeared in several other best MBA program lists. They included Business Week, 16th, Forbes, 8th for return on investment to graduates; The Wall Street Journal,

11th based on a survey of corporate recruiters; The Financial Times, 7th; and Hispanic Business, 5th, among top business schools for Hispanics. The school's international executive education program was ranked 17th overall by The Financial Times. The school was included in a new Princeton Review book, "Best 143 Business Schools," and the MBA program was ranked 6th for best campus environment, 10th for best professors and 10th for most family friendly.

## •Key Statistics

Now in its third century, Carolina offers bachelor's, master's, doctoral and professional degrees in academic areas critical to North Carolina's future: business, dentistry, education, law, medicine, nursing, public health and social work, among others. Offerings include 71 bachelor's, 110 master's and 77 doctorate degree programs. The health sciences are well integrated with the liberal arts, basic sciences and high-tech programs. Patient outreach programs affiliated with Carolina and the UNC Health Care System serve citizens in all 100 North Carolina counties.

Carolina belongs to the select group of 62 American and two Canadian campuses forming the Association of American Universities.

In fall 2004, Carolina enrolled more than 26,800 students from all 100 North Carolina counties, the other 49 states and more than 100 other countries. Eighty-two percent of Carolina's undergraduates come from North Carolina.

Those students learn from a 3,100-member faculty. Many of those faculty members hold or have held major posts in virtually every national scholarly or professional organization and have earned election to the most prestigious academic academies and organizations.

The Carolina academic community benefits from a library with more than 5.6 million volumes and perennially ranks among the best research libraries in North America as judged by the Association of Research Libraries. The most recent association listings place Carolina 15th among 114 research libraries in North America. UNC's North Carolina Collection is the largest of its kind among state-oriented collections on campuses nationwide. And the Southern and rare book collections also are among the country's finest.

Carolina's more than 243,000 alumni live in all 50 states and in 146 countries. Notable alumni include writers Thomas Wolfe, Shelby Foote, Russell Banks and Jill McCorkle; athletes Michael Jordan, Vince Carter, Antawn Jamison, Mia Hamm, Marion Jones and Davis Love III; and journalists Alan Murray, Roger Mudd, Charles Kuralt, Stuart Scott and Tom Wicker.

Others include former White House Chief of Staff Erskine Bowles; former White House Communications Director Don Baer; former U.S. Sen. John Edwards (now director of UNC's new Center on Poverty, Work and Opportunity); Bill Harrison, chairman and chief executive officer of JPMorgan Chase & Co.; Sallie L. Krawcheck, chief financial officer and head of strategy for Citigroup Inc.; Ken Thompson, chairman and chief executive officer of Wachovia Corp.; Dr. Mary Sue Coleman, a biochemist and former Carolina vice chancellor and now the University of Michigan president; Dr. Elson Floyd, former Carolina executive vice chancellor and now president of the University

of Missouri system; U.S. President James Polk; geneticist Francis Collins; actors Jack Palance, George Grizzard and Andy Griffith, as well as actresses Louise Fletcher and Sharon Lawrence; editorial cartoonist Jeff MacNelly; Hugh McColl, retired chairman and chief executive officer of Bank of America Corp.; and fashion designer Alexander Julian.

## •The Carolina Covenant

Carolina has expanded its nationally recognized Carolina Covenant initiative to make a debt-free college education possible for more low-income students. The changes, announced by Chancellor James Moeser during his 2004 State of the University address, send an even stronger message about accessibility and the traditional commitment to opportunity in Chapel Hill for qualified students – regardless of their ability to pay.

Launched in fall 2004, the Carolina Covenant initially covered 225 freshmen who can graduate without debt. Instead, they agree to work on campus 10 to 12 hours weekly in a federal work-study job, and Carolina meets the rest of their needs through a combination of federal, state, university, and other privately funded grants and scholarships.

Now the university is increasing the financial eligibility requirements for the program to cover an estimated 120 new students. Starting in fall 2005, students and their families must be at or below 200 percent of the federal poverty level – up from 150 percent. That raises the threshold to cover a family of four with an annual income of about \$37,000 or a single parent with a child who makes about \$24,000. This year, those income levels were at about \$28,000 and \$18,000, respectively.

Carolina became the first major public U.S. university to announce plans for such a program in fall 2004. Since then, several universities, including Virginia, Maryland, Nebraska, Illinois, Harvard and Brown, have created or announced plans for similar programs. UNC also has begun a mentorship program for Covenant scholars being supported by faculty volunteers.

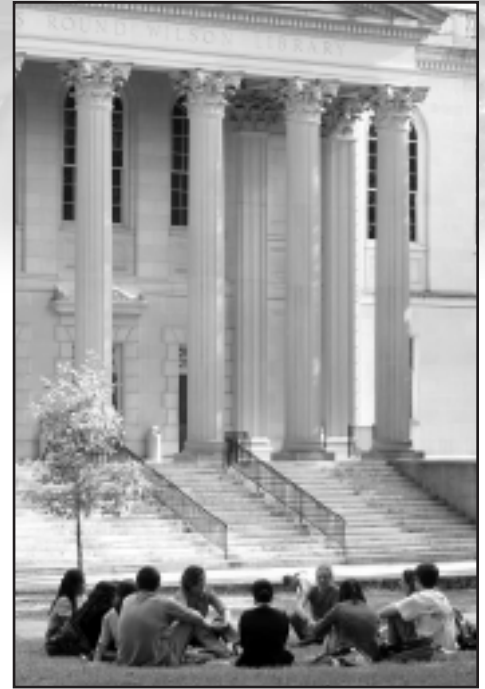
The university consistently ranks among the national leaders in making education financially accessible to students. Carolina also meets the full need of middle-income students, with financial aid packages comprised of two-thirds grants and scholarships and one-third loans and work-study. (Most aid packages are closer to two-thirds loans and one-third grants.)

Carolina Covenant scholars were admitted under the university's rigorous admissions standards. More than half of the first year's class in 2004 were first-generation college students. Covenant students posted an average 4.21 grade-point average and 1,209 Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) score.

## The Carolina First Campaign

The Carolina First Campaign is a comprehensive, multi-year private fund-raising campaign – the largest in the university's history – to support the vision of Carolina becoming the nation's leading public university. The ultimate beneficiaries of reaching that goal will be the people of North Carolina, whom Carolina is dedicated to serve.

The university exceeded the \$1 billion mark for the campaign during fiscal 2002-2003. As of June 2005, the campaign has raised more than



\$1.47 billion in gifts and pledges from alumni and friends toward its \$1.8 billion goal.

Carolina First has created 144 new endowed professorships toward a total goal of 200 and 473 new scholarships and fellowships for students toward a target of 1,000. Faculty support and the quality of students and facilities are among key priorities for the campaign, scheduled to close in July 2007.

Other campaign priorities include providing the means to pursue strategic initiatives to enrich the academic experience; conduct research that improves the health and the economic, social, and cultural well being of citizens; and redouble the commitment to public service and engagement.

Total giving in fiscal 2004 was \$190 million in gifts and private grants – the largest single amount received in a single year in the university's history. The campaign counts gifts, pledges and deferred gifts, bringing the campaign total to \$237 million for fiscal 2004. The \$190 million figure counts only gifts received outright.

In fall 2000, Chancellor James Moeser pledged to the people of North Carolina that if they passed the higher education bond referendum the university would triple their investment with private funds. The people responded overwhelmingly, and successful completion of the Carolina First campaign will fulfill that pledge. The ultimate beneficiaries will be the people of North Carolina.

## •Students

Recent freshman classes at Carolina have set new standards of excellence as measured by the rigorous coursework students have taken in high school, as well as their grades and SAT scores. In 2004, the university's incoming freshmen continued that trend. And the most academically qualified incoming class ever is headed to Carolina in fall 2005 with an average SAT score of 1301, up 14 points over last year's class. Admitted freshmen hail from every North Carolina county, each of the nation's 50 states and 44 other countries.

Incoming freshmen will include 43 new

Morehead Scholars: 24 of North Carolina's most dynamic young leaders and the rest from 14 other states and England. Among the largest and most competitive scholarships at U.S. colleges and universities, the Morehead Awards cover all expenses for four years of undergraduate study, including summer enrichment experiences. The program, now more than a half-century old, is modeled after the Rhodes Scholarships to Oxford University in England.

The newest Tar Heels who will enter Carolina this fall will include 22 Robertson Scholars. Along with 20 others who will matriculate at Duke University, they are part of the fifth class of this unique scholarship program, created by a \$24 million gift from Julian and Josie Robertson. The full-tuition scholarship allows each student to spend a semester in residence at the other campus. The scholarships bring together two of the nation's finest universities and help foster enhanced collaboration between both campuses.

As the first public university in the nation, Carolina has a long and proud history of linking its expertise and energy to the needs of the people. Among those graduating last May were champions of the people — 15 scholars who contributed hundreds of hours of service to the community and received special training in how to make that service more effective. These students comprised the first graduating class of the Public Service Scholars Program, which was launched in 2003 by the Carolina Center for Public Service. More than 450 students are enrolled in this innovative program, working in nursing homes, hospitals, public schools, the Special Olympics, the Animal Protection Society, the Family Violence Prevention Center, Habitat for Humanity and the Big Buddy mentoring program. They reported more than 26,000 hours of service during the 2004-05s academic year.

The number of Carolina students winning distinguished scholarships is rivaled by only a handful of other universities. For example, Carolina has the second largest number of Rhodes Scholars among public universities (38 since 1902). The 38th winner, Class of 2002 alumna Rachel Mazzyck of Laurel, Md., won the award last November to study at Oxford University in England. She earned an undergraduate degree in English with highest distinction from UNC and graduated from Harvard University's master's program in education policy and management. She will use the scholarship to earn a doctorate of philosophy specializing in educational studies.

Last spring, nine other undergraduates joined Mazzyck as among the university's distinguished scholarship winners by being selected for Truman, Goldwater, Mitchell and Churchill scholarships, as well as a Mellon fellowship and a slot on USA Today's 2005 All-USA College Academic Team:

Lauren McAlee, a junior from Crofton, Md., with a double major in public policy and philosophy, won the Truman Scholarship, which will fund her senior year and graduate studies. She hopes to open a charter school in a low-income community.

Four students — juniors Carrie Gibbons of Cary, Kimberly Kallianos of Atlanta and James Mahaffey of Raleigh, and sophomore Gregory Charville of Raleigh, won Barry M. Goldwater

scholarships. This award goes to students who show a strong commitment to careers in mathematics, the natural sciences or engineering. Carolina has had 27 Goldwater Scholars since the first awards were made in 1989. This year, UNC was among 12 campuses with four winners each, including Harvard, Princeton and Stanford universities.

Richard Waters of Morehead City won the George J. Mitchell Scholarship for graduate study in Ireland. Richard, who graduated in May with a double major in chemistry and mathematics, is Carolina's second Mitchell Scholarship winner since the program began in 1998. He plans to earn a graduate degree in applied science at the University College Cork in Cork, Ireland, and will eventually pursue a medical degree to help people in underserved regions of the world.

Nicholas Love, a biology major who graduated in May, won a Churchill Scholarship for outstanding academic and extracurricular accomplishments. Nicholas, who hails from Brighton, Mich., will seek a graduate degree in zoology at Cambridge University in England.

John W. Steen IV of Winston-Salem received an Andrew W. Mellon Fellowship. John, who graduated with highest honors in English in May, will use the award to study for a doctorate in comparative literature at Emory University.

Pablo Durana, a junior from Montreal, was chosen as a member of USA Today's 2005 All-USA College Academic Team. Durana was one of 20 undergraduates chosen for the "first team." The communication studies major founded and coordinates the Carolina Language Partnership, which offers one-on-one English lessons to Hispanic employees at UNC.

#### Faculty

Dr. Oliver Smithies, Excellence Professor of pathology and laboratory medicine, was one of two recipients of the 2005 March of Dimes Prize in Developmental Biology for his role in developing gene targeting. Smithies helped develop a technique that gives scientists around the world the ability to alter particular genes in cultured cells and transfer those targeted genes to laboratory mice. Gene targeting allows them to design and produce "knockout" mice to study how the disabled gene works and to create animal models of human diseases. Smithies also won the 2001 Albert Lasker Award for Basic Medical Research, the nation's most distinguished honor for outstanding contributions to basic medical research. The Lasker Awards have often been called "America's Nobels," and more than 60 researchers who won a Lasker went on to receive the Nobel Prize.

Two faculty members last spring were elected fellows of the prestigious American Academy

of Arts and Sciences in recognition of major contributions to their fields. They are Drs. Jack D. Griffith, Kenan Distinguished Professor of Microbiology and Immunology and member of the UNC Lineberger Comprehensive Cancer Center; and Joseph M. DeSimone, W.R. Kenan, Jr. Distinguished Professor of Chemistry and Chemical Engineering at UNC and N.C. State University. The academy is considered the nation's oldest and most illustrious learned society. Griffin's melding of electron microscopy methods with biochemical tools revealed important insights into genetic diseases. His 1999 co-discovery that the ends of chromosomes are tied in firmly knotted loops provided insights into cancer and aging. DeSimone holds more than 100 U.S. patents and is renowned for discovering revolutionary ways to use carbon dioxide in place of conventional organic solvents for environmentally responsible manufacturing, cleaning and processing. Earlier this year, he was



elected to membership in the National Academy of Engineering. Griffith and DeSimone bring to 27 the total number of Carolina faculty members elected to the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.

Assistant Professor Lisa Pearce of the Department of Sociology was named a William T. Grant Scholar. The award provides \$300,000 over five years to support research in youth development. Pearce, a fellow of the Carolina Population Center, will use the funds to study the role of religion in the shaping of self-image, aspirations, and achievement in youth.

Two distinguished professors at Carolina have been selected for prestigious Guggenheim Fellowship awards. Drs. Donald J. Raleigh, Jay Richard Judson distinguished professor of history, and Gerald J. Postema, Cary C. Boshamer professor of philosophy and law are 2005 recipients. Fellows are selected by the John Simon Guggenheim Memorial Foundation and recognized for distinguished individual achievement and exceptional promise for future accomplishment. Raleigh has written, translated or edited more than a dozen books on a wide variety of issues related to Russia. He will use his fellowship to research an oral history project, "Soviet Baby Boomers: An Oral History of the Class of '67." Postema has written close to 60 publications, articles and chapters, and has written several books, including "Bentham and the Common Law Tradition."

## Student-Athlete Services

### Advancing toward graduation, Building Character and Developing leadership

Student-Athlete Services at the University of North Carolina encompasses three areas that play an integral part in the collegiate experience of every UNC student-athlete. Those three areas are Academic Development, Student-Athlete Development and Leadership Development.

#### • ACADEMIC DEVELOPMENT

The Academic Support Program is the main service utilized in advancing UNC student-athletes to graduation. The program assists student-athletes in exploring their interests and abilities, enjoying a broad educational experience, and reaching or exceeding their academic goals. "Our young people are students first and athletes second and that will always be the case at the University," says UNC Director of Athletics Dick Baddour. "That is a credit to our coaches, administrators and support staff, but most of all, our student-athletes. Their accomplishments in the classroom are very impressive."

During the 2006-07 academic year, 275 Carolina student-athletes made the ACC Academic Honor Roll, which requires a cumulative GPA of at least 3.0 for the year. In the fall of 2005, 144 student-athletes made the Dean's List, and 153 did so in the spring of 2006.

The Academic Support Program is housed primarily in the Pope Academic Support Center, which is equipped with study facilities, tutorial rooms, a computer lab, a 128-seat auditorium, counselors' offices, and state-of-the-art video and computer equip-

ment. At the center, students meet with staff to discuss course selection, major and career exploration, academic progress and academic eligibility.

The Academic Support Program helps freshmen transition from high school to college through a variety of academic programs

such as academic counseling, individual tutoring, group review sessions and supplemental instruction.

A member of each team serves as the Academic Team Captain, providing a strong link between the Academic Support Program and the other student-athletes on the squad. The Academic Team Captain for men's swimming for 2006-07 is Aaron Burns, for women's swimming is Emily Reardon and for diving is Alex Kenley.

#### • STUDENT-ATHLETE DEVELOPMENT

Building character in UNC student-athletes is the main charge of Student-Athlete Development.

Through Carolina Outreach, Tar Heels are involved in a variety of projects and organizations on campus and in the community. The UNC Department of Athletics has partnered with Gatorade and the UNC School of Public Health for a national pilot program called Get Kids in Action, in which Tar Heel student-athletes visit local elementary schools to encourage children to exercise. The Carolina Dreams program allows young patients at UNC Children's Hospitals to attend Tar Heel sporting events with UNC student-athletes. Other recent activities have included building a house with Habitat for Humanity, cooking meals at Ronald McDonald House and cleaning up the roadways through the Adopt-a-Highway program.

Under the direction of the UNC Olympic sports strength and conditioning staff, Tar Heel student-athletes get outstanding coaching intended to help maximize their physical potential. The staff evaluates Carolina student-athletes in a variety of ways, including the use of specialized software for lifting and running video analysis, to encourage steady progress toward reaching optimum preparation for competition.

The men's and women's swimming teams train at the Olympic sports weight room in Kenan Field House while the men's and women's diving teams train at the Koury Natatorium/Smith Center weight room. In addition to top-of-the-line strength equipment, the Kenan-based center boasts a five-lane, 25-yard rubberized surface for teaching and performing warm-up activities, acceleration drills and agility movements. Year-round training produces athletes who are prepared to compete successfully and safely.

Greg Gatz is the Director of Strength and Conditioning for Olympic Sports and oversees the program. Steve Gisselman specifically works with the men's and women's swimming teams at Carolina while Jonas Sahratian works with the men's and women's divers.

In the fall of 2003, *Sports Illustrated on Campus* (above) declared UNC's women's soccer program the greatest college sports dynasty ever.

The Tar Heel program, under the leadership of legendary head coach Anson Dorrance, has won 18 of the 25 national championships ever decided in the sport of women's soccer on the collegiate level.

North Carolina fields 28 varsity athletic teams, 15 for women and 13 for men. During the 2005-06 school year, 24 of 28 Carolina squads qualified for postseason play and Carolina finished fourth in the National Association of Collegiate Athletic Directors' Cup, symbolic of overall athletic excellence. Carolina has won 242 Atlantic Coast Conference championships in its history and has been the dominant school in league play in that respect. Maryland ranks second with 177 alltime ACC titles and none of the other schools in the conference have won more than 113 league championships. UNC won 12 titles in 1994-95, the most ever won in a single school year by one university.



Dean Smith is the winningest coach in NCAA Division I college basketball history, with 879 wins in 36 seasons at UNC.



North Carolina's Dean E. Smith Center, named after the legendary Tar Heel basketball coach, is home to one of the nation's best men's college basketball programs. Crowds of nearly 22,000 fans pack the Smith Center for every Tar Heel home game.



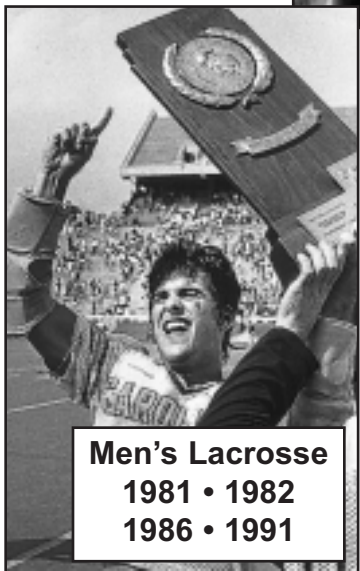
