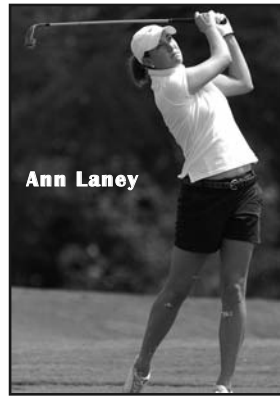
Supporting UNC Women's Golf

The University of North Carolina has a long-term agreement with Nike, which provides UNC teams with shoes, apparel, equipment bags and other products. The contract, signed in 1994 and again in 1997, was extended for a period of eight more years beginning in July 2002. In addition to Nike products, the agreement provides \$100,000 annually to the Chancellor's Academic Enhancement Fund for undergraduate teaching and \$100,000 annually to the UNC athletic department to reward Olympic sport programs and coaches for academic and athletic excellence.

Directions To UNC Finley Golf Course

From Eastern North Carolina and/or Raleigh/Durham International Airport: Take I-40 West to Chapel Hill. Stay to the left and follow I-40 West to Exit 273-A. Follow NC 54 West for approximately three miles. There will be a Finley sign on your left at the sixth stoplight. Go left and the club house is approximately 1/2 mile away.
From North of Chapel Hill: Take I-85 South to Durham. Exit to the left at exit 174 onto 15-501 South. Stay to the left on 15-501 Bypass. You will make a left turn onto Old Mason Farm Road – there is a sign for both Finley and the N.C. Botanical Garden. The club house will be approximately one mile away.
From Charlotte and West of Chapel Hill: Take I-85 North to I-40 East. 85 and 40 split at Hillsborough, just west of Chapel Hill. Take I-40 to exit 270 and exit onto Highway 15-501 South. Stay to the left on 15-501 Bypass. You will make a left turn onto Old Mason Farm Road – there is a sign for both Finley and the N.C. Botanical Garden. The club house will be approximately one mile away.
From South of Chapel Hill: Take I-77 North to I-85 and then follow the same directions as from Charlotte. Or take I-95 North to I-40 West. 95 and 40 converge just north of Benson, N.C. Then take I-40 all the way to Chapel Hill and follow the directions from the airport (see above).





One of the top collegiate women's golf tournaments in the nation, the Tar Heel Invitational, is an annual event that takes place each fall at UNC Finley Golf Course. Since its inception in 1976, the tournament has brought some of the nation's premier women's golf programs to Chapel Hill to compete in the three-day intercollegiate event. For five years (2000-2004), the event was known as the Franklin Street Partners Invitational. The women's golf program is sincerely appreciative of Franklin Street Partners' continued support and superb sponsorship during those years.

Carolina got the tournament off to a roaring start by winning the inaugural Lady Tar Heel Invitational in 1976. Former Carolina Coach Dot Gunnells' squads captured five Tar Heel championships in 1976, 1979, 1985, 1991 and 1992. Vanderbilt won last year's event with an 893 team total while Texas A&M's Ashley Knoll captured individual medalist honors for the second consecutive year with a two-under-par 214 total.

The Tar Heel Invitational will be played at UNC Finley Golf Course on October 5-7. Finley, designed by internationally renowned architect Tom Fazio, features a par 72, 6,285-yard layout. The Tar Heels would like to thank the UNC Finley Golf Course staff, especially Golf Course Superintendent Ross Fowler and Director of Golf Johnny Cake. The Tar Heels would also like to thank Michael Beale of the sports marketing office and Kathy Duffy of UNC Finley Golf Course.

In addition to host North Carolina, this year's participants include Auburn, College of Charleston, Duke, East Carolina, Florida State, Georgia, Kentucky, NC State, Oklahoma State, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Texas A&M, Tulsa, Vanderbilt, Virginia and Wake Forest.

UNC Finley and Chapman Center

UNC Finley Golf Course is once again one of the premier college facilities in the nation. Traditionally recognized as one of the most beautiful courses in the southeast, Finley recently received a facelift that makes it one of the most challenging as well.

Internationally renowned golf course designer Tom Fazio designed the new UNC Finley Golf Course, which reopened November 1999. It features a completely different layout, yet some of the best aspects of the old course were retained.

The new course features a par 72 layout with five sets of tees ranging from 4,981 yards from the forward tees to 7,187 yards from the championship markers, thus presenting a stiff challenge to the best golfers while still remaining accessible to those of all skill levels. Tees, greens and fairways were built and planted to the highest standard, while a state-of-the-art irrigation system and exceptional drainage maintains the quality of the course. In addition, the practice range was expanded and rebuilt and the clubhouse and snack shop underwent extensive renovations.

Carolina's golf teams also have a new team facility, the Chapman Golf Center which opened in November 2001. The 4,500-square-foot facility houses offices for the men's and women's golf coaches, men's and women's locker rooms, a team meeting room and a reception area. A Hall of Honor which honors former Carolina players and coaches is planned for the future. There is also a climate controlled individual teaching area with two hitting bays and a state-of-the-art teaching system. At the far end of the range adjacent to the team facility is the Williamson Golf Team Practice Facility used

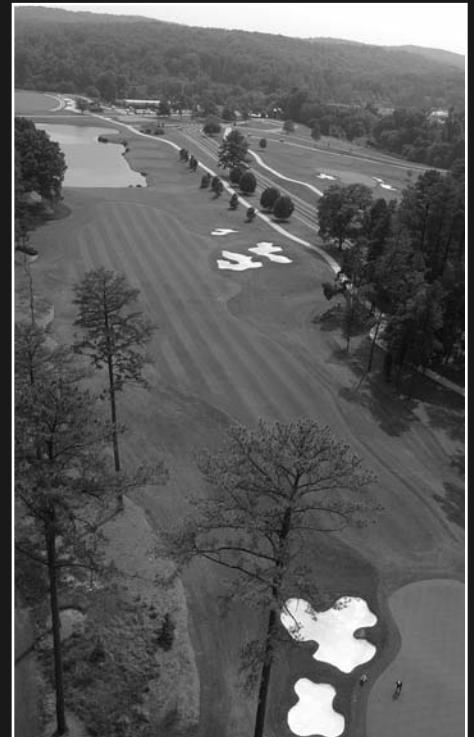


exclusively by the men's and women's golf teams. In addition to a practice range, there are putting and chipping greens as well as bunkers so the teams can hone their short games. All of these superb facilities are located just a couple miles from Carolina's campus.

UNC Finley Golf Course, originally designed by George Cobb and built by Raleigh businessman A. E. Finley, opened in 1949. Three holes were added in the early 1980s, also designed by Cobb, and the clubhouse underwent renovations in 1988.

Over the years, Finley has been host to many collegiate, high school and amateur competitions. Finley also plays host to the annual A. E. Finley Executive Cup Tournament and to championships conducted by the North Carolina High School Athletic Association.

UNC Finley Golf Course is located off Highway 54 in Chapel Hill. It is frequented by Carolina students, faculty and staff as well as many alumni of the University



- UNC finished third in the 2006-07 Directors' Cup, a national competition that measures a program's postseason success. It was Carolina's sixth consecutive top-10 finish and the eighth time UNC has been in the top five.

- Tar Heel gear is annually among the top-selling collegiate apparel in the country.

- UNC finished No. 1 in the 2006-07 All-Sport Rankings by Sports Illustrated on Campus.

- North Carolina has won more Atlantic Coast Conference titles than any other school in the conference. The Tar Heels also have more national titles than any other ACC school.

UNC baseball has reached the College World Series in each of the last two seasons, finishing as the national runner-up.

Ivory Latta helped lead the Carolina women's basketball team to the Final Four in 2006 and '07.



Coming off their first NCAA appearance since 2004, the University of North Carolina women's golf team hopes to further that success with big hopes for the 2007-08 season. The Tar Heels return four of the five players from that NCAA squad and that experience should translate into further success.

"I think we are going to feed off that performance," said head coach Sally Austin. "They know what they are capable of. There are four of the five back from Regionals when they shot eight-under on that final day. They know they can do it and I want them to expect great things."

One of the first challenges for this Tar Heel team comes in replacing the leadership of their three graduated seniors, especially graduate Katie Miller. Miller started in all 43 tournaments Carolina played during her career. However with three experienced seniors in Laura Caniff, Ann Laney, and Colette Lowe stepping up, Austin feels the team will have more than enough leadership both on and off the course.

"As always, we look to our upperclassmen, our seniors, and we will again," said Austin. "Katie, as well as our other seniors, Shannon Boyle and Brittany Walker, were wonderful leaders last year. I feel the same way about the seniors this year. They have been wonderful representatives of the University and leaders both on and off the course."

Of the three seniors, Laney returns as the most decorated on the course. Her 76.45 scoring average is best of the three, as are her 13 career top-25 finishes. The Charlotte native also was one of 12 players named to the 2006 All-ACC team. After battling back troubles through most of last spring, Laney looks to have returned healthy and primed for a big senior season.

"Ann can now get back to the task of playing golf and not worrying about the shot she is hitting or the results," Austin explained. "I think when you have an injury that takes you out of competition like Ann's did, it can take a while to get back to just playing the game. She is making some good wing changes and is hitting the ball well. She is capable of great things and I expect for her to have a wonderful senior year."

Senior Colette Lowe is one of the Tar Heels' more inspirational stories. Lowe, a native of Rancho Palos

Verdes, Calif., played sparingly as walk-on during her first three years at Carolina, appearing in just five tournaments for the scoring team. But through determination and hard work, Lowe has earned herself a partial scholarship and a spot in Carolina's starting five.

"She has just gotten consistently better," said Austin. "Her swing is good. It is apparent that she worked hard on her golf swing over the summer. She is on some scholarship now and has earned it and is playing hard. If she gets a little

bit better around the greens, a little more savvy, her scores are going to plummet too."

Laura Caniff, the third of the team's three seniors, was a constant in the starting lineup during her freshman and sophomore seasons. As a junior she suffered a bit of a setback keeping her from as many starts as she had wanted. Now, as a senior, she looks primed to regain a starting spot.

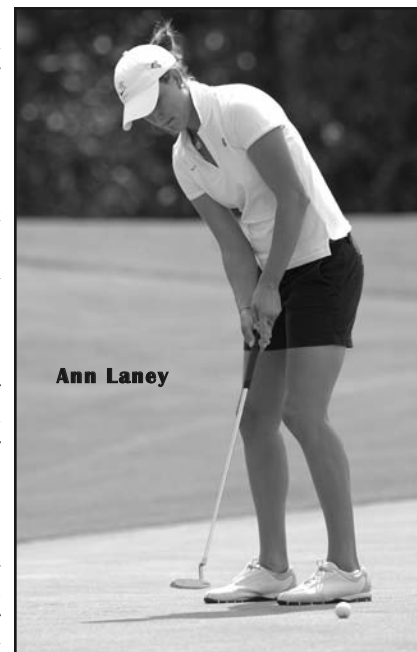
"Nobody works any harder than Laura," said Austin. "She needed to pick up distance and she has over the summer. She is playing pretty well and she is going to push for a starting spot."

Arguably the team's best and most consistent player from last season, junior Lauren Hunt led the team in scoring average and top ten finishes. Hunt took the individual crown in last season's first event, the Cougar Classic. She then bookended the fall season with a tie for second in The Derby Invitational. In the spring she was just as good with four more top-25 finishes, including a tie for fourth in the Bryan National Collegiate. The Tar Heels see no reason Hunt won't be able to repeat her sophomore success.

"Lauren is capable of doing great things," said Austin. "It is a matter of believing she can do it. Just going through the process of getting it done, focusing on one shot at a time and letting the results take care of themselves, believing every time you go out that you can. Lauren certainly can."

Junior Sydney Crane, who has battled a wrist injury throughout the offseason, looks to be a major contributor when she returns to full strength for the spring. Crane will play through the injury during the fall, and after a prolonged winter break, she will battle for a starting spot in the spring.

"Nobody works any harder than Sydney," said Austin. "Nobody is

any more determined. She has a bit of a wrist problem right now, so I'm not letting her practice or hit as many balls as she would like, but everyday she goes out and works her tail off. I think she is another one who, with some confidence, can post some low scores."

Sophomore Kate Thomas came to Chapel Hill last season with quite the reputation. One of the top international recruits of the year, she was slated to become a key producer for the Heels. After a bit of a rocky start, Thomas began to show the promise Austin and the Tar Heels had been looking for. The Australia native was Carolina's top finisher at both the NCAA East Regional

"I think we are going to feed off that performance," said Austin. "There was no doubt in their mind they were going to make it through Regionals. There was no look of worry on their faces, like 'oh my gosh, I just made a bogey.' It was all about what was in front of them and just playing the golf course one shot at a time and letting shots fall where they may. They were terrific. If we can capture that mindset we will have a super year."

and NCAA Championship.

"Kate hits the ball as well as anybody," said Austin. "When she is on, she is so dialed in. The whole thing for her is confidence in her putting. She knows it and she is working on it. It will get better. Her golf swing is efficient and simple. She hits the ball great. Now, for her, it is just a matter of inside four feet just making those putts."

With such a strong returning squad, freshmen Jordan Allyne and Margaret Pentrack will have the ability to ease their way into Division I college golf, while still competing on some of the top courses in the country. Austin has asked both players to play some tournaments as individuals in the fall and then challenge for the starting lineup in the spring.

"Freshmen Jordan Allyne and Margaret Pentrack were both good junior players," said Austin. "It is definitely an adjustment coming into college. They are adjusting well and they are getting better. They just have to get used to college golf. I expect great things from them."

Despite a smaller roster size than in past years, Austin feels like the current composition for the team is ideal to make a run at the NCAA Championship.

"The biggest thing that I am thrilled about," said Austin, "is the chemistry on this team and that spots 1-8 are all competitive and all pushing. That right there, if they can keep that competitiveness up, can make us a great team. They are all involved. I don't care if number eight doesn't get to play in every tournament, the fact that she is pushing those other girls, it is a team effort in that regard. That matters a whole lot."

Carolina will hope to use that competitive atmosphere day in and day out to build upon and improve on last year's success.

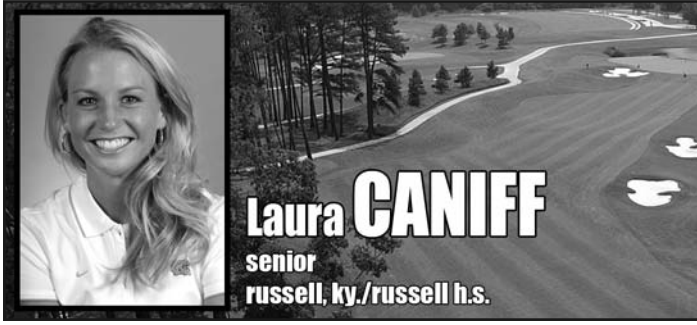

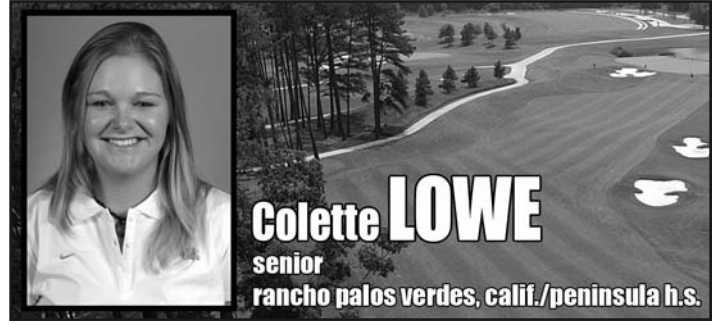

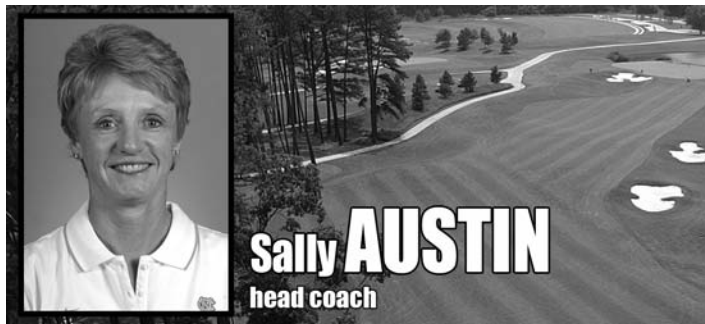

As a member of the first varsity team at the University of North Carolina in 1974, Sally Austin had already established herself as one of the founding figures of Tar Heel women's golf as an undergraduate. Entering her 15th year as the head coach at Carolina, Austin is well on her way toward continuing the Tar Heel women's golf legacy and making its fourth decade of existence among the finest in the program's history.

In Austin's 14 seasons as head coach, Carolina has finished in the top 25 at the NCAA Championships six times.

The Tar Heels have won six tournament titles with Austin at the helm. Also, six players have captured 13 individual championships while under Austin's tutelage. Austin has coached four All-Americans who have been named to the team six times and eight All-ACC performers named to the team on 15 occasions. In addition,

one of her players, Marcy Newton, was selected ACC Rookie of the Year in 1996-97 and was named to the 1999 Golfweek Sagarin Mid Atlantic/East District First Team.

Several of Austin's players have been honored academically as well. Rachel Poston was named to the 1996 GTE Academic All-America District III At-Large Team. Several players have been selected to the National Golf Coaches Association's All-America Scholar Team – Staci Aber in 1994 and Shannon Boyle in 2005 and 2006. In addition, Sydney Crane was selected to the inaugural 2007 All-ACC Academic Women's Golf Team while Crane, Ann Laney and Katie Miller were selected to the 2007 squad.

Austin was selected the LPGA Coach of the Year in 2004. In 1999, she was named the LPGA SE Section Coach of the Year.

Carolina placed 21st at the 2007 NCAA Championship while in 2005-06, the Tar Heels finished 10th at the NCAA East Regional. In 2004-05, Carolina was led by Katie Miller who was selected to the All-ACC team. The Tar Heels tied for 15th place at the 2003-04 NCAA Championship and were led by a pair of first-team All-Americans – Meaghan Francella and Ashley Prange. Carolina finished in 13th place at the 2002-03 NCAA Championship and junior Meaghan Francella captured the ACC Individual Championship. In 2001-02, the Tar Heels finished 16th at the NCAA East Regional; while in 2000-01 Carolina tied for 15th place at the NCAA East Regional, which was played in Chapel Hill. In 1999-00, Carolina finished 17th at the NCAA East Regional and missed the cut for the NCAAs. However, senior Marcy Newton, an All-ACC performer, honorable mention All-America and later U.S.

Women's Amateur champion, advanced as an individual participant. In 1998-99, the Tar Heels tied for ninth at the NCAA East Regional.

Carolina finished 15th at the 1998 NCAA Championship while the 1997 team finished third at the ACC Tournament and tied for 10th at the NCAA East Regional, missing the cut for NCAAs. The 1996 squad also missed the cut for NCAAs as Carolina finished 12th at the NCAA East Regional and third at the ACC Championship. The 1995 team finished eighth at the NCAA Championship while the '94 squad tied for 16th.

A native of Raeford, N.C., Austin took over head coaching duties of the women's golf team after the 1992-93 season. Austin replaced longtime Tar Heel coach Dot Gunnells after serving as an assistant to Gunnells since 1983.

In addition to her tenure as assistant coach, Austin was a member of the Tar Heels' first varsity program in 1973-74. Her father played an instrumental role in helping pioneer that first team. Before his daughter entered UNC, Jake Austin approached then athletic director Homer Rice about starting a team. Rice seemed receptive to the idea, and upon Austin's arrival, sent out a "recruiting notice" to students who might be interested in playing. Three other students besides Austin responded to Rice's request. One of those who responded was Mindy Moore, a future president of the LPGA.

Moore and Austin played together for four years from the team's inception until graduation. Austin captured the 1974-75 UNC-CH Invitational individual title. By the time the two were seniors, they had led the team to a spot as one of the top 20 teams in the country. They accomplished this feat with Coach Gunnells at the helm.

Upon graduation from North Carolina in 1977 with a bachelor of science degree in business administration, Austin continued her pursuit of golf. The winner of the 1979 North Carolina Women's Amateur Championship, Austin won events on the Women's Professional Golf Tour and the Futures Tour. She received her LPGA Tour card in 1987.

In addition to the one-year LPGA experience, Austin played for five years on mini-tours across the country (1980-85), two years on the Asian Tour (1984-85) and one year on the WPGA European Tour (1986). At the 2007 SkyCaddie LPGA Teaching & Club Professional Championship, she was the runner-up, losing by just a single stroke in the senior division.

Austin has been a golf instructor at the Pine Needles Schools in Pinehurst since 1978, where she has worked under the supervision of Peggy Kirk Bell. She also was a golf instructor from 1986-89 at the Ben Sutton Golf Schools and from 1989-94 at the Craft-Zavichas Schools. Austin holds an LPGA Class A Teaching Certification.

Patricia Martinson enters her fifth year as an assistant coach for the Tar Heels. Martinson teams up with head coach Sally Austin in running the day-to-day operations of the women's golf program in addition to her on-course duties as coach and instructor. Martinson, two-time Big South Player of the Year, joined the Tar Heels after playing on the Futures Golf Tour in 2002 and 2003.

"Patricia has been with us since March of 2004," says head coach Sally Austin. "She is a terrific player, teacher and communicator. Patricia is a tremendous asset to our program. We make a great team."

In her spare time, Martinson hits the links and is continuing her education. She is an LPGA member and is working toward Class A membership. She most recently competed at the 2007 SkyCaddie LPGA Teaching and Club Professional Championship where she tied for eighth place in the championship division after tying for ninth place at last year's event which is played at Pinehurst #8. In 2004, Martinson missed qualifying for the 59th U.S. Women's Open by one stroke. She played on the Futures Golf Tour in 2002 and 2003. Martinson played in 18 events in 16 states in 2002 while carding three top-20 finishes and gaining exemption status in 2003.

A native of Marion, Iowa, Martinson played collegiate golf at Charleston Southern in Charleston, S.C. (1997-2001). She won four tournament titles during her four-year career as a Buccaneer, was the Big South Champion and Player of the Year in 1999 and 2000 and was named the 2001 Charleston Southern Female Athlete of the Year. Named the most valuable player all four years at Charleston Southern, Martinson carded all top-10 finishes during her senior year. In addition, she was champion of the 2000 Iowa State Amateur.

Martinson excelled academically at Charleston Southern as she was

three-time Big South Scholar Athlete of the Year for Golf (1999, 2000 and 2001). She graduated from Charleston Southern in 2001 with a bachelor of science degree in biology and a minor in business administration. She also served as a work study assistant in the Charleston Southern sports information office.

"Being a part of the Carolina women's golf program is a privilege and a dream come true," said Martinson. "The abilities and talents of the girls I coach are unparalleled. I'm proud to be making a difference and building on our successful program one girl, one stroke, and one tournament at a time."
