COACHING HIGHLIGHTS

In eight seasons, University of North Carolina head coach Jenny Slingluff Levy has brought the Tar Heel women's lacrosse program into the nation's elite.

In eight seasons as the Tar Heels' head coach, Slingluff Levy has led UNC to a 96-43 record (.691) and three NCAA Final Four appearances.

Given Carolina's strong academics and rich tradition of women's athletics that includes several programs that are among the very best in the country, success both in the classroom and on the playing field are expected in Chapel Hill.

Levy has met and exceeded those lofty goals. The Tar Heel women's lacrosse team annually places a significant portion of its members on the Atlantic Coast Conference Honor Roll and Dean's List. And on the field, the Tar Heels have advanced to the NCAA Final Four three times, won one ACC Tournament and captured two ACC regular-season titles in Levy's eight seasons. Carolina has finished six of the last seven seasons ranked in the Top 10 in the national polls.

"With the performance of our women's lacrosse team over its first eight years, I think it has become obvious that the selection of Jenny for the job as head coach in 1994 was a magnificent choice," says Athletic Director Dick Baddour.

Levy led the Tar Heels to a record of 12-4 and a national ranking of No. 13 in the program's first season in 1996.

In 1997, Carolina went 14-4 with a final ranking of No. 8 and advanced to the NCAA Final Four in only its second season of varsity play. In the process, Levy was named ACC Coach of the Year.

Carolina went 15-3 overall and 3-0 in the ACC in 1998. UNC advanced to the ACC championship game and the NCAA Final Four while also winning the ACC regular-season title. Carolina was ranked No. 2 in the final IWLCFA poll after spending several weeks during the course of the season as the nation's top-ranked team.

In 2000, the Tar Heels again advanced to the ACC Tournament championship game and tied for the ACC regular-season title in 2000. UNC ended the season ranked No. 4 and reached the NCAA quarterfinals.

In 2002, the Tar Heels won their first ACC championship. Carolina set a school record for wins, going 17-3, and reached the NCAA Final Four for a third time. Levy was named the co-ACC Coach of the Year.

An outstanding women's lacrosse player at the University of Virginia from 1988-92 and an assistant field hockey and assistant women's lacrosse coach at Georgetown University from 1993-94, Levy was named as Carolina's first-ever head women's lacrosse coach in October 1994.

She is a 1992 graduate of the University of Virginia with a BA in rhetoric and communications and was a member of the U.S. Women's Lacrosse National Team in 1992-93 and again in 1995.

Levy (then known as Jenny Slingluff) was a member of the UVa women's lacrosse team from 1988-1992 and was named the squad's captain and most valuable player as a senior. She led the Cavaliers to their first-ever Division I National Collegiate Women's Lacrosse Championship in 1991. She scored three goals in the championship game and five in the national semifinal game, leading to her selection as the tournament's Most Outstanding Attacker.

A first-team All-America as a junior and senior, Levy was named the 1992 NCAA Attack Player-of-the-Year. She led Virginia in both goals and assists in 1992 with 52 and 13, respectively, and finished with career totals of 118 goals and 34 assists. In 2002, she was named one of the top 50 players in ACC history.

Levy was married to Dan Levy of Baltimore, Md. in June 1998. Dan is a 1993 UNC alumnus who played lacrosse at Carolina for four years, starring on the 1991 NCAA championship team.

The couple has two sons — Ryan Kane (born Jan. 8, 2002) and Alec Griffith (born Sept. 9, 2003).

Assistant Coach

Alivian Coates enters her first season as an assistant coach with the Carolina women's lacrosse program.

Coates was an All-America on the lacrosse field and in the classroom while playing at James Madison University from 1997-2000.

Coates will assist Levy in every aspect of the Carolina program, including recruiting, practice and gameday management and administrative areas.

"Alivian is a great addition to our staff," head coach Jenny Levy says. "She was a first-team All-America defender at James Madison and was an Academic All-America as well. She's already fit in well with our team this fall. She spent two years as the head assistant at Virginia Tech, and she'll bring a lot of enthusiasm and knowledge to our program. We're very excited about working with her."

Coates served as an assistant coach at Virginia Tech during the 2001 and 2002 seasons. From August 2002 until the summer of 2003, she taught physical education for grades K through 12 at Greenhills School in Winston-Salem, N.C.

During her playing career at James Madison, Coates was a first-team All-America and an Academic All-America (IWLCA and GTE/CoSIDA) in 2000. She was a second-team All-America in 1999 as a junior. Coates also served as the Dukes' team captain and won first-team All-Colonial Athletic Association

honors in 2000. She was a member of the 2000 NCAA All-Tournament Team.

Coates earned a B.A. in psychology with a minor in coaching from James Madison, graduating Cum Laude in May of 2000.



DICK BADDOUR
Athletic Director

Dick Baddour, a 1966 graduate of the University of North Carolina, was named Director of Athletics on June 25, 1997. In his six years as director, the UNC Department of Athletics has undergone a number of changes, yet remains one of the premiere programs in the Atlantic Coast Conference and in the nation.

The Goldsboro, N.C., native heads a program that with 28 varsity sports is the largest in the ACC. Carolina finished eighth in the 2002-03 Director's Cup, a measure of NCAA post-season success. The Tar Heels, inaugural winners of the Cup in 1994, have finished among the top eight teams eight times in the competition's 10 years.

Baddour is in his 37th year of continuous service to the university. In 2001, he received the Distinguished Service Medal from the UNC General Alumni Association.

Active in Chapel Hill community affairs, he is a past president of the Public School Foundation and has served on the Parks and Recreation Commission. He and his wife, Lynda, have two sons, Allen and David, and a daughter, Jennifer.



DR. BETH MILLER
Senior Associate Athletic Director

Beth Miller is in her 19th year supervising the 26-sport Olympic program and serves as UNC's Senior Woman

Administrator. She is a 1968 alumna of Appalachian State University with a B.S. degree in health and physical education. She has a master's from ASU and earned a Doctor of Arts degree in physical education at Middle Tennessee State in 1974.

From 1969-72, she served as the head volleyball and basketball coach at Appalachian State. She became head volleyball coach at UNC in 1975 and led the Tar Heels to four consecutive ACC titles from 1980-83 and five post-season tournament appearances. She also coached softball at Carolina from 1978-79.

In 1979, she was named Athletic Business Manager. She retired from coaching volleyball after 1983, but continued to handle all financial affairs for the department through 1987.

Miller currently serves on a number of Atlantic Coast Conference committees, including those for women's basketball, wrestling and officiating. She chairs the committees for women's golf and volleyball. She also serves on UNC's Housing Advisory Board.

A native of Landis, N.C., she has supervised UNC's highly successful Olympic Sports program since 1985.
