National Team since 2000...has earned five caps while playing for the National Team...missed a large part of last season when she was in Australia after having been chosen as an alternate member of the 2000 U.S. Olympic Team...was chosen to train with the U.S. National Team in the residency camp in San Diego from January of 2000 through the following summer...earned membership on the U.S. National Team for the first time in 2000, earning five caps...started in the summer of 2000 as the goalkeeper on the U.S. under 21 national team at the Nordic Cup Championships...earned the starting goalkeeper's job at Carolina as a freshman and had a banner inaugural campaign...followed that up with another outstanding season as a sophomore...has been the starting goalkeeper on two NCAA championship teams at Carolina...Parade All-America High School Soccer Team selection in 1998...Premier Goalkeeper in 1999.

2000 Season--Was an alternate member of the 2000 United States Olympic Team...a Soccer Times honorable mention All-America selection in 2000...played in 16 games for the Tar Heels as a sophomore missing much of the season when she was playing with the U.S. Olympic Team in Australia...made 31 saves on the season while allowing 12 goals...her goals against average was 0.86 per game...she was credited with 4.5 shutouts on the season...she started 14 games last season and played a team-leading 1,257 minutes in goal...she ranked second in the ACC in goals against average at 0.86 per game, seventh in save percentage (.721) and eighth in saves per game (1.94)...made a season-high seven saves in Carolina's 6-1 win over Virginia on September 1, 2000...that was also her career high total for a single game...she had five saves in the Tar Heels' 6-1 victory over Tennessee on September 3, 2000 and four saves in a 4-1 victory at Texas A&M on August 27, 2000...she played all 90 minutes of every game the Tar Heels play in winning the ACC and NCAA Tournaments a year ago...she recorded solo shutouts against Florida State and Duke in the semifinals and finals of the ACC Tournament...she also had solo shutouts against Wake Forest and Connecticut in the NCAA Tournament.

1999 Season—Tapped for honorable mention All-America honors by College Soccer Online and Soccer Buzz...Soccer Buzz first-team Freshman All-America selection...was tapped as Soccer Buzz Southeast Region Freshman of the Year...named first-team All-Southeast Region by Soccer Buzz and to Soccer Buzz Southeast Region All-Freshman Team...named second-team All-ACC as a freshman...led the ACC in goals allowed average at 0.30 per game...played in 22 of the Tar Heels' 26 games last year when not dogged by the injury bug...started in all 22 of those games...had an

Tournament...she was also injured much of her freshman year with various knee and ankle problems...after her injury-marred freshman and sophomore years she is ready to show the world of college soccer this year how good a player she

Anyone who sits down to annually update the Anson Dorrance coaching biography, the first question that always seems to come to mind is, "At what point do a person's mere words no longer do justice to the man's accomplishments?"

That seems to be the perpetual dilemma. After all, that person is writing about someone who is literally a living legend. Dorrance is an individual who built from scratch an athletic program which fully deserves the label, "Dynasty." Filmmakers have already done a feature length documentary about the program that bears the name "Dynasty."

So in the fall of 2001, Dorrance prepares to begin his 23rd season as the head women's soccer coach at the University of North Carolina, he must be wondering what there is left to be accomplished.

In large measure Dorrance learned the answer to a question like that last season. The 2000 Carolina team suffered the program's most losses in a season in 20 years but somehow persevered to again win ACC and NCAA titles. What may have been even more amazing was the fact that three times in the NCAA Tournament Carolina trailed its opponent 1-0 midway through the second half. All three times the Tar Heels came from behind to win 2-1 in regulation en route to the national title.

Dean Smith, the head men's basketball coach at the University of North Carolina from 1961-97 and the man who unseated Adolph Rupp four years ago as the winningest NCAA Division I men's college basketball coach in history, has always been amongst Anson's admirers.

That was proven again four years ago when Coach Smith, arguably the school's most famous employee in history, was asked by the *Football News* about Carolina's 1997 preseason #1 ranking in football and what is was like for some sport other than men's basketball to be sharing the throne at the University.

Coach Smith's reply? "This is a women's soccer school. We're just trying to keep up with them." Coach Smith's clever retort was a way to give Anson his due, knowing that Anson himself is amongst the biggest of all Dean Smith fans.

From the winningest head coach of all-time of one sport to the winningest head coach of all-time of another sport, that seemed to Dorrance like the ultimate compliment. And Anson himself felt humbled by it. There is no human being on Earth who harbors more respect for Dean Smith than Anson Dorrance. As Anson has said, "So much of what we have tried to do in our program is modeled after what Dean Smith has done and accomplished...to have our program compared favorably to his by the man himself is enormously humbling."

Dorrance's loyalty to Carolina is also similar to the loyalty Smith had for his adopted school. Just seven years ago, some people considered Dorrance's 1994 decision not to continue as the head coach of the United States' National Women's Soccer Team to be an act of extreme humility. Others thought that he relinquished the honor in order to avoid the pressure that comes with being the leader of what was then the defending World Cup Champions.



But dig just a little deeper and you will find that, for Dorrance, yielding the National Team's coaching reins had little, if anything, to do with its burden or his modesty.

Dorrance chose not to return as head coach of the National Team because of his devotion to the women's soccer program at the University of North Carolina. Even all of the glory that came along with coaching the United States to the gold medal in the first-ever FIFA Women's World Championship in 1991 was not enough to pull Dorrance away from working full-time with the Tar Heels. He wanted to maintain the level of excellence that soccer fans had come to expect of Carolina's record-shattering program. And to do that, Dorrance knew that he would have to dedicate all of his coaching energy to the University.

"College programs like ours require a lot of work," says Dorrance. "At that point in time we had been getting by by doing the minimum amount of work. We certainly couldn't continue to be successful by doing just the minimum. Now we have time to do more and we need that time to stay competitive in an increasingly tough college game."

It is difficult to comprehend Dorrance and his coaching staff taking Carolina's women's program to greater heights than they have already achieved. The Tar Heels have won 17 of the 20 championships which have been decided in the history of collegiate women's soccer. Carolina has also captured 13 of the 14 Atlantic Coast Conference championships since the sport was given title status by the league in 1987. Carolina's is a record of total dominance.

Of course one of the big news stories of 1995 was that just one year after Dorrance's retirement as the National Team coach, Carolina proceeded to fail to win the national championship in women's soccer for the first time in 10 years. The Tar Heels, top-seeded in the NCAA Tournament and sporting a 25-0 mark, were upset by Notre Dame 1-0 in the 1995 NCAA semifinals on Carolina's own Fetzer Field. It was only the sec-

ond time in history that UNC had lost to a collegiate opponent on its home turf and ironically the Tar Heels did themselves in—scoring an own goal for the Fighting Irish for the only score of the game. While Carolina's loss might have been shocking to some, Dorrance has long understood that the playing field in the sport is becoming more and more level all the time. Rather than expressing shock at Carolina's first NCAA Tournament loss since 1985, the more appropriate question might have been why did it take so long for everyone else to catch up to the Tar Heels.

After relinquishing the title to Notre Dame in 1995, the 1996 season proved that Dorrance's enthusiasm for his craft hadn't waned whatsoever. He took a team that returned nine starters from 1995 and molded it into another championship unit by season's end. It didn't come easily by any stretch of the imagination. The team's chemistry suffered greatly in the first half of the season and in the ninth game of the campaign Notre Dame defeated the Tar Heels 2-1 in overtime. The Fighting Irish thus became the first collegiate team in history to beat Carolina in back to back games.

Dorrance then made some dramatic changes in the way the Tar Heels were doing things midway through the season. The alterations proved to be the key to the Tar Heels' ultimate success as Carolina began clicking on all cylinders. Just a few weeks later, the Tar Heels swept past William & Mary, James Madison and Florida in the opening three rounds of the NCAA tournament before outlasting an outstanding Santa Clara team on its home field in the semifinals. Then, in possibly the most entertaining NCAA women's soccer championship game of alltime, UNC defeated defending champion Notre Dame 1-0 in overtime to claim the 1996 crown.

After regaining the national championship with the 1996 team, Dorrance turned in one of his best coaching jobs of all-time as the Tar Heels returned to the winner's circle once again in 1997. Honored by Soccer Buzz and by *Soccer Times* as the National Coach of the Year, Dorrance spearheaded a Carolina campaign which resulted in a 27-0-1 record. The 27 victories were a school and NCAA record for victories in a season and UNC tied its own school and NCAA record by shutting out 22 opponents during the course of the campaign.

With eight starters back from the previous year, Dorrance crafted a dynamic UNC team which outscored opponents 117-8. It was one of Carolina's best teams ever and probably one of the two best defensive teams in UNC history, joining the 1987 squad which surrendered only two goals all season. The Tar Heels capped the year by beating Connecticut 2-0 in the national title game before a crowd of over 9,000 fans in Greensboro, N.C.

In 1998, Carolina had another brilliant season, going 25-1 but falling 1-0 to second-seeded Florida in the national championship game. Despite the disappointing end to an otherwise brilliant season, the Tar Heels outscored their opponents 98-7 on the year and won their 10th successive ACC championship.

While recovering from the disappointment of not gaining the 1998 NCAA title, Carolina soccer fans took great heart in the performance of the 1999 United States National Team which competed in the Women's World Cup in the United States. The 20-person roster featured eight Tar Heel players—Mia Hamm, Kristine Lilly, Carla Overbeck, Cindy Parlow, Tisha Venturini, Tracy Ducar, Lorrie Fair and Tiffany Roberts—and assistant coach Lauren Gregg was also a UNC alumna. The World Cup Team's performance which resulted in winning back the championship it had won in 1991 but relinquished in 1995 had much to do with the contributions Dorrance has made to the sport of women's soccer down through the years.

Basking in the glow of the World Championship which featured so many Tar Heel ties, Carolina's collegiate dominance seemed to be in dire straits just weeks later when eight games into the 1999 season the Tar Heels were ranked fourth in the national polls with a 6-2 record. After dropping early-season decisions to PennState and to Santa Clara, UNC had lost in the same season twice for the first time since 1985. But Dorrance and his coaching staff retooled the Tar Heels offensively and defensively and led a young Carolina team to 18 successive wins and yet another national championship. Although defender Lorrie Fair earned some National Player of the Year accolades, the 1999 team was in many regards a squad without star presence.

Ironically, the previous time that UNC had failed to win the national crown in 1995 the next summer a great American international achievement took place in the world of women's soccer. In 1996, Dorrance took great pride in watching the United States claim the first ever Olympic gold medal in women's soccer, knowing all the while that he was the chief architect of the success of that team as well.

The 1996 Olympic Team entered play with added incentive. In 1995, the United States had failed to successfully defend its FIFA Women's World Championship as Norway claimed the title. The United States was determined to avenge that defeat on home soil in the first Olympic women's soccer tournament. The U.S. Olympic team featured two assistant coaches who were former Carolina players, seven of 16 players who were current or former Carolina stars and three alternates who were current or former UNC players.

Needless to say, the 1996 U.S. Olympic women's soccer team had a decided Carolina Blue tint to it. The U.S. avenged its 1995 Women's World Cup loss to Norway by winning 2-1 in sudden death overtime in the Olympic semifinals and then the team struck gold when it outlasted China 2-1 in a physical gold medal match. The gold medal victory was the greatest single moment for the growth of the sport in American history and players and coaches with Tar Heel ties abounded in the revelry that followed.

Dorrance was actually an integral part of the process which started the ball rolling toward ultimate Olympic gold. His love of a challenge first

led him to take the head coaching job for the U.S. Women's National Team in 1986, replacing Mike Ryan at the helm. Dorrance wasted no time in taking the National Team to the apex of the world's most popular sport. On November 30, 1991, half a world away from his beloved Tar Heel team which at the time had just finished competing in the ACC and NCAA Tournaments, Dorrance led the United States to a 2-1 win over Norway to claim the World Championship. Dorrance was the master architect of that American triumph, a win hued Carolina Blue in many ways; not only was Dorrance coaching the USA team, but nine of the 18 players on Team USA played collegiately at North Carolina. Astoundingly, Dorrance had already seized yet another championship victory earlier that week. On November 24, 1991, assistant coach Bill Palladino guided Carolina to a 3-1 win over Wisconsin to take the NCAA Championship for the sixth year in a row.

A year after leading the United States to the first Women's World Cup title, Dorrance assembled what many soccer observers have labeled the best college soccer team in history in 1992. The Tar Heels finished the season undefeated at 25-0, claimed the Atlantic Coast Conference championship for the fourth straight year and won the NCAA title for the seventh consecutive time. Carolina's 9-1 NCAA championship game triumph over Duke was as thorough and as complete as the final score made it sound like.

In 1993, UNC again won the NCAA championship with an unblemished record of 23-0. The Tar Heels shut out George Mason 6-0 before what was then a collegiate women's soccer record crowd of 5,721 fans at Fetzer Field. Capping her brilliant career at Carolina, Mia Hamm earned for the second straight year consensus national player-of-the-year honors from every organization which presented such an award.

Amongst all the coaching jobs that Dorrance has done during his career, perhaps the most impressive one was that which culminated in the 1994 NCAA championship. That title drive spoke volumes about Dorrance's coaching genius as he was able to pull together the Tar Heels after arch-rival Duke ended a 101-game Tar Heel unbeaten streak by beating Carolina 3-2 on October 19, 1994. Dorrance refused to let the spirit of his team deflate, and when the two teams met again in the ACC Tournament final on November 6, 1994, the Tar Heels avenged the loss by beating Duke 4-2. Four games later, wins over N.C. State, Duke, Connecticut and Notre Dame brought a 13th national title to Dorrance's ever-growing resume. Midfielder Tisha Venturini



was selected as the 1994 National Player of the Year by every major organization giving the award. It was the seventh straight season in which the Tar Heels had a player selected as the national player of the year.

Dorrance's accomplishments have not gone unnoticed—particularly by those who play for him.

Former Tar Heel great April Heinrichs, now the head coach of the U.S. Women's National soccer team and formerly the head coach at Princeton University, the University of Maryland and the University of Virginia, says that where Dorrance gains his coaching edge is in the way he handles his players.

"Anson is incredibly charismatic and intelligent," Heinrichs says. "He is very attuned to women's issues, in ways that many women's coaches aren't. He breaks down cliques and builds team unity."

Equally effusive in his praise of Dorrance is Atlantic Coast Conference commissioner John Swofford, who served as athletic director at Carolina for 17 years while Dorrance was the head coach from 1980-97.

"Anson's accomplishments on the field are unparalleled. He may well be the single most successful coach in intercollegiate athletics," says Swofford. "I think of Anson as a Renaissance man. He's so talented in so many different ways. And he has analyzed and made a science of coaching female athletes. No one knows the ins and outs of that better than Anson Dorrance. He is a great ambassador, not only for women's soccer, but for the University of North Carolina as well."

Ironically, Dorrance's career plans did not originally include coaching a women's team. He began his coaching career at Carolina as the designated head coach for the men's team in 1976 during Marvin Allen's last year as head coach. He took over as head men's coach the following

year and served as head coach for the men's team for 12 years, posting a 172-65-21 record. His team won the ACC Tournament championship in 1987 and he took the Tar Heels to the 1987 NCAA Final Four and to the second round of the 1988 NCAA Tournament. Dorrance's .708 winning percentage is tops among Carolina's men's soccer coaches and his 172 wins are just two behind his college coach and mentor, the late and legendary Dr. Marvin Allen.

When Carolina decided to make women's soccer a varsity sport in 1979, Dorrance became a two-sport head coach. Dorrance's brilliance at coaching women manifested itself almost immediately as it took just three years before the Tar Heels won a national championship, capturing the 1981 Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW) national title.

Carolina went on to make it four straight



national titles with NCAA championship game wins in 1982 over Central Florida, in 1983 over George Mason and in 1984 over Connecticut. The Tar Heels made it to the NCAA title game in 1985, but lost to George Mason 2-0 on the Patriots' home field in the first of only three times that Carolina has lost an NCAA Tournament game.

That title game loss to George Mason, remarkably, was the last time the Tar Heels lost any game in the decade of the 1980s. Beginning with the season opener in 1986 and continuing through the NCAA final in 1989, Dorrance's Tar Heels won 89 games, tied six matches and lost zero times. Meanwhile, Carolina continued to mow down opponents and win national titles. In 1986, Carolina defeated Colorado College 2-0 in the finals. A year later, the Heels downed Massachusetts 1-0 on the Minutewomen's home field in the title game. The 1988 campaign saw the Tar Heels defeat NC State 4-1 in the title game in Chapel Hill. A year later, Carolina defeated Colorado College 2-0 at Raleigh. And in 1990, the Heels defeated Connecticut 6-0 in Chapel Hill.

During this era, the Atlantic Coast Conference also began championship competition with UNC

winning the inaugural title in 1987. N.C. State claimed the 1988 title on penalty kicks but Carolina regained the title in 1989 and has won every conference championship since then.

The long unbeaten streak that began in 1986 continued into the 1990 season and ended only after a record 103 consecutive games were played without a Carolina defeat. Connecticut ended the unbeaten streak by defeating the Tar Heels in a regular-season match in overtime at Storrs, Conn. on September 22, 1990. The Tar Heels rebounded from that single defeat and won their fifth straight NCAA crown in 1990, ironically beating the Huskies in the final 6-0 in Chapel Hill.

Over the years, 11 different Tar Heels have been named National Players of the Year during the program's history—April Heinrichs in 1984 and 1986, Shannon Higgins in 1988 and 1989, Kristine Lilly in 1990 and 1991, Mia Hamm in 1992 and 1993, Tisha Venturini in 1994, Debbie Keller in 1995 and 1996, Staci Wilson in 1995, Cindy Parlow in 1996, 1997 and 1998, Robin Confer in 1997, Lorrie Fair in 1999 and Meredith Florance in 2000.

North Carolina begins the 2001 season with a 207-7-2 all-time home record at Fetzer Field. In its history, totaling 520 games, Carolina has shut out opponents 359 times and has been held scoreless in just 13 games.

Overall, Carolina has a 487-22-11 record under Dorrance and only twice in 22 years have the Tar Heels lost more than two games in a single season. The Tar Heels' 16 NCAA crowns are more than any other women's Division I sports program in the nation and the 17 national championships are more than any single sports program in ACC history, men's or women's.

Dorrance, who won All-ACC and All-South Region honors while playing at Carolina, has also been chosen both men's and women's National Coaches of the Year. He earned women's national honors in 1982, 1986, 1997 and 2000 and he was named men's national Coach of the Year in 1987.

In 1989, Dorrance was named the Intercollegiate Soccer Association of America South Region Coach of the year. He was the *Soccer News* Southeast Region Coach of the Year in 1996 and the Soccer Buzz Southeast Region Coach of the Year in 1997. In 1987, 1990, 1991, 1993 and 1996, he was named the Atlantic Coast Conference Women's Soccer Coach of the Year.

In 1996, Dorrance received the highest honor possible from the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA). He won the NSCAA's Walt Chyzowych Award for lifetime coaching achievement.

In 1988, Dorrance was inducted into the Order of the Golden Fleece, Carolina's highest honorary society which includes Carolina students, faculty and staff. It is an honor in which Dorrance takes incredible pride.

In 1994, Dorrance added another phenomenal honor when the athletic department at the University of North Carolina designated him as a "Priceless Gem." This honor is reserved only for those individuals who have contributed in extraordinary ways to the successful athletic cli-

mate at the University. It is usually bestowed upon an individual at the time of his or her retirement. The fact Dorrance received the award during the prime years of his coaching career speaks volumes about the man's abilities.

In 1995, Dorrance's program was profiled in a full-length documentary film entitled, "Dynasty." The movie focused in particular on the Tar Heels' amazing nine-year national championship run from 1986 through 1994 and it included in-depth interviews with both current and former Tar Heel players.

Dorrance has also coauthored a book with Tim Nash, the editor and publisher of *Soccer News*, which was published in 1996 and is entitled "Training Soccer Champions." It sold out in its first printing and has done equally well in its second press run.

Following the United States' victory in the women's world championships in 1991, he received an Honorary All-America Award, one of the most prestigious of its kind, from the National Soccer Coaches Association of America.

In 1991, *Soccer America* named Dorrance one of the 20 most influential men in American soccer over the previous 20 years.

Soccer America followed that up in 1995 by naming Dorrance as one of the 25 most influential people in the history of American soccer. Dorrance was one of only three coaches on that list and the only women's coach tapped.

A 1974 University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill graduate with a Bachelor of Arts degree in both English and philosophy, Dorrance began his collegiate career at St. Mary's University in San Antonio, Texas where he spent one year studying and playing soccer before transferring to Carolina to play for legendary soccer coach Marvin Allen.

As a gifted soccer player in Chapel Hill, Dorrance was selected to the All-Atlantic Coast Conference Team three times as an undergraduate and he won All-South Region honors in 1973. He was also one of the top intramural sports performers on the Carolina campus during his days as an undergraduate.

Prior to his permanent return to Chapel Hill in 1976, he organized youth soccer leagues in both Connecticut and North Carolina. He was the founder of both the North Carolina Youth Soccer Association and the North Carolina Senior Soccer Association.

Dorrance has an "A" level coaching license from the United States Soccer Federation and was the head coach of the United States Women's National team from 1986 until August 1994 when he resigned. The U.S. team was 65-22-5 during his tenure. Mike Ryan was the national coach at the inaugural international play of the U.S. Women's National Team in 1985. Dorrance took over a year later and led the program for eight years.

As National Team coach, he directed the United States as it shocked the world by sweeping through six games in China to the first world championship title in 1991.

Dorrance's final act as head coach of the Women's National Team was to lead the United States to victory at the CONCACAF Zone World Championship's qualifying tournament in

Montreal in the summer of 1994.

He was also a charter member of the NCAA Women's Soccer Committee and he has served as the women's chairman of the Intercollegiate Soccer Association of America. He is the former chairman of the NCAA Men's and Women's Soccer Rules Committee. He is one of the few coaches in the country to qualify as a national staff coach for the United States Soccer Federation and for the National Soccer Coaches Association of America. He is also involved in training coaches and awarding coaching licenses.

Dorrance's summer time soccer camps for young women on the UNC campus are the most popular in the nation. The camps sell out well in advance. Dorrance has even hosted a version of the famous camp in England.

Dorrance was born on April 9, 1951, in Bombay, India, and is married to the former M'Liss Gary who is an accomplished professional dancer. The Dorrances have three children, daughters Michelle and Natalie, and a son, Donovan.

Dorrance's soccer origins stem from his youth days living in Ethiopia. He also lived in Kenya, Singapore, Belgium and Switzerland as a youth. His family traveled widely as his father was an international businessman.

Another remarkable facet of the Tar Heel legacy is the number of former Tar Heel players, assistant coaches, staff members and managers who tutored under Dorrance at Carolina and who are currently head coaches or assistant coaches in collegiate women's soccer, with U.S. national development programs or in the women's professional ranks.

Long-time women's assistant coach Bill Palladino ('73) was the head coach of the Raleigh Wings professional team for three years. He led the Wings to the league championship in their first two seasons. Palladino was assisted on the Raleigh Wings staff by Susan Ellis ('83).

Current and former head coaches in the collegiate and national women's soccer ranks include Dawn Crow, '94, at the University of Alabama; Carrie Serwetnyk, '87, at Boston University; Carla Werden Overbeck, '89, at Duke University; Tina Luft, '84, at Incarnate Word; Shannon Higgins Cirovski, '89, at the University of Maryland; Lori Walker, '91, and Croft Young, '94, at The Ohio State University; Bill Steffen, '95, Keri Sanchez Raygor, '94, and Beth Sheppard, '99, at the University of Oregon; Chris Huston, '89, at Rice University; Pam Kalinoski, '91, at the University of San Francisco; Meaghan Dougherty, '93, at Canisius University; Angela Kelly, '94, and Sarah Dacey, '96, at the University of Tennessee; Tracy Noonan Ducar, '95, at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro; Amy Burns, '93, and Jennifer Eames, '95, at Wofford University; Marcia McDermott, '86, and Susan Ellis, '84, of the Carolina Courage; and April Heinrichs, '86, and Tracey Bates Leone, '89, of the United States National Team.

Assistant Coach Bill Palladino

It wouldn't be a stretch to say that Bill Palladino is the second best women's soccer coach in the collegiate ranks. A man who long ago could have left North Carolina and claimed any of the other best head coaching opportunities in the women's college game, Palladino has shown a tremendous loyalty to the program at UNC, his alma mater.

Thus, assistant head coach Bill Palladino begins his 22nd year as head coach Anson Dorrance's right-hand man and the chief architect of the stifling Carolina defense in 2001. Under Palladino's brilliant direction, the Tar Heel defenses have consistently been an important cog in the Tar Heels' runs to national championship after national championship. In 1987 the Tar Heels set a defensive NCAA record probably never to be matched when the team allowed only two goals all season.

Palladino has been an integral part of the Tar Heel women's soccer program since the program's second year when he came aboard as an assistant coach. Palladino has been right along side Dorrance throughout the last 21 years which include 17 national championships and 13 Atlantic Coast Conference titles.

Palladino, who has consistently turned down numerous head coaching opportunities to remain with the Tar Heels, was named the 1991 South Region Coach of the Year by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America/Met Life Insurance Company. He took over the team for much of the 1991 season as interim head coach while Anson Dorrance was directing the efforts of the U.S. Women's National Team in its successful quest to win the 1991 Women's World Cup title in

China.

Palladino coached the Tar Heels in 10 games that season and was victorious in each contest, including all three games of the NCAA Tournament. North Carolina won the 10th of its 16 national titles with a 3-1 win over Wisconsin on November 24, 1991. He is the first assistant coach to have ever won regional coach-of-the-year honors. Palladino most recently served as the Tar Heels' interim head coach in UNC's 6-0 NCAA first-round win over Wake Forest in 1997 while Dorrance was serving a one-game NCAA suspension.

"For me, Bill is the reason I enjoy my job so much," says head coach Anson Dorrance. "He is the reason the players enjoy the program so much. Bill is a big part of reason there is such great team chemistry.

"Bill is a team builder. He has helped us develop a philosophy towards player development that encourages an informal but effective rapport between players and coaches. Bill is a terrific counterbalance against my fiery and intense nature. That balance makes our program unique."

Palladino began his coaching career at Carolina in 1980. A native of Chapel Hill, N.C., Palladino joined the staff that year after three seasons as an assistant coach with the UNC men's team from 1977-79 when it was also coached by Dorrance. Dorrance was named head coach of the men's program in 1977 and led it for 12 seasons through the 1988 campaign. In 1979, Dorrance began the



women's program at UNC. Since then, he and Palladino has been a part of all 17 national championships and 13 conference titles won by the women's program.

Palladino's main emphasis is the defense, which traditionally is the finest in the country. In 1987, the Tar Heels set NCAA records by allowing just two goals in 24 games and recording 22 shutouts. Carolina matched that 22-shutout total in 1997 en route to another national title, allowing just eight goals that season.

The 50-year-old Palladino holds an "A" coaching license from the United States Soccer

Federation. He was head coach of the South team at the 1995 U.S. Olympic Festival in Denver, Colo. The several recent summers he also served as head coach of the Raleigh Wings in the W League, leading the team to an undefeated season in 1998 and to yet another W League title in 1999.

His duties at North Carolina include on-field coaching, recruiting, directing camps, scouting and administration.

A 1973 University of North Carolina graduate with a Bachelor of Arts degree in psychology, Palladino played varsity men's soccer at Carolina for three seasons from 1970-72 under the aegis of legendary coach Marvin Allen.

Palladino added to his repertoire this past summer when he served as a sideline reporter for several WUSA telecasts, most of them featuring the hometown Carolina Courage.

Goalkeeper Coach/Recruiting Coordinator Chris Ducar

Chris Ducar begins his sixth year as the head goalkeeper coach for the University of North Carolina women's soccer program in 2000. He serves as the program's full-time coach with duties as goalkeeper coach and recruiting coordinator.



Ducar was the goalkeeper coach for the under-21 National Team which won the 1999 Nordic Cup title in Iceland. Former UNC player Siri Mullinix was the championship keeper for the U.S. in that tournament and was the starter for the U.S. National Team in the 2000 Olympics.

Ducar was the goalkeeper coach for the 1998 United States' under-20 women's national team which competed in the Nordic Cup in Holland August 3-9, 1998. The United States won the silver medal in that competition. Ducar also served as goalkeeper coach for the 1997 United States under-20 national team which went on to win the gold medal in the 1997 Nordic Cup in Denmark.

In addition to being an assistant coach at UNC, Ducar has also served as an assistant coach for the women's team at UNC-Greensboro from 1995-98 on a part-time basis before he became full-time at Carolina. In 1995, he was the goalkeepers coach at Greensboro College. In 1990-91, he was an assistant coach at UC-Santa Cruz. Recently he trained the under 17 boys national team after serving on the women's side for the past three years.

In the summer of 2000, Ducar served as the head coach for the North Carolina women's

state team that won the regional championship and advanced to compete in the Donnelly Cup National Championship over Thanksgiving weekend 2000.

Ducar graduated from the Missouri in 1990 with a B.A. degree in political science as a Dean's List student. He went on to earn a teaching credential from San Jose State in 1995.

Ducar played soccer at Missouri from 1986-90. Post-collegiately, he played for Inter A.C. in Fremont, Calif. when it won the 1990 Premier Division title. He was the goalkeeper for the San Francisco Bay Blackhawks of the APSL when they won the 1991 national championship. He also played for the San Jose Oaks, the 1992 U.S. Open Cup champions.

National director for Soccer Plus Goalkeeper Schools in Connecticut, he spends much of his time traveling the United States organizing camps and clinics for Soccer Plus. He has also served as director of Go For Gold Soccer Schools, World Soccer and Santa Cruz Soccer Camps in California and for David Brcic's Goalkeeper Schools in Missouri.

Ducar holds coaching licenses from the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (premier license) and the United States Soccer Federation (national "A" license). In 1997, he was named a national clinician by the U.S. Youth Soccer Association. Ducar is on the USSF and NSCAA National Goalkeeping Staffs.

He has been the Director of Goalkeeping for the Carolina United Soccer Club in North Carolina for the past six years.

Ducar was married in 1997 to the former Tracy Noonan. Tracy was a first-team All-America goalkeeper at Carolina and a 1996 alumna of the University. She was a member of the 1999 United States Women's World Cup Team. The couple lives in Durham, N.C.

Women's Soccer General Manager Tom Sander

A vital part of the program for the past decade, Tom Sander was brought on as a paid staff member and made the general manager in spring 1998. Previously, he served as the team's manager for six years.



Sander coordinates team operations at home and on the road and serves as a liaison for the program with the University administration, Educational Foundation, program scholarship donors, soccer alumni and the Friends of Carolina Soccer.

A native of Lancaster, Pa., Sander went to

Hempfield High School and then graduated from UNC with a B.S. degree in biology in 1993.

Sander also works as a consultant for Softsport Inc. based in Los Angeles, Calif. In that role, he works with college and MLS teams, the U.S. men's and women's National and Olympic teams and several international teams. He trains them to use the "match analysis software" during games and how to analyze the results afterward. He also does personal analysis for teams including the UNC women's team. Tom says the highlights of his tutoring in this software have including working with the Women's Olympic Team in 1996 and training people in England to use the software with legendary Manchester United.

Olympic Sports Strength & Conditioning Coach Greg Gatz

Director of Athletics



Dick Baddour, a 1966 graduate of the University of North Carolina, was named Director of Athletics on June 25, 1997. In his four years as director, the UNC Department of Athletics has undergone a number of changes, yet remains one of the premiere programs in the Atlantic Coast Conference and in the nation.

The Goldsboro, N.C., native heads a program that with 28 varsity sports is the largest in the ACC. Carolina won seven conference championships during the 2000-01 school year, equalling the top figure in the league for the 14th consecutive year. Eighteen Tar Heel teams competed in NCAA postseason play.

Baddour is in his 35th year of continuous service to the university. He graduated from UNC in 1966 and was appointed Assistant Dean of Men in 1967. He served as Assistant Dean of Admissions and Assistant Dean of the UNC School of Law and also earned a Master of Arts degree in education prior to joining the athletic department in 1986.

In 2001, he received the Distinguished Service Medal from the UNC General Alumni Association. Active in Chapel Hill community affairs, he is a past president of the Public School Foundation and has served on the Parks and Recreation Commission. He and his wife, Lynda, have two sons, Allen and David, and a daughter, Jennifer.

Beth Miller is in her 18th year supervising the 25-sport Olympic program and serves as UNC's Senior Women's Administrator. She is a 1968 alumna of Appalachian State University with a B.S. degree in health and physical education. She has a master's from ASU and earned a Doctor of Arts degree in physical education at Middle Tennessee State in 1974.

From 1969-72, she served as the head volleyball and basketball coach at ASU. She became head volleyball coach at UNC in 1975 and led the Tar Heels to four successive ACC titles from 1980-83 and five postseason tournament appearances. She also coached softball at Carolina from 1978-79.

She serves on a number of Atlantic Coast Conference committees, including those for women's basketball, wrestling and officiating. She chairs the committees for women's golf and volleyball. She also serves on UNC's Housing Advisory Board. She began supervising UNC's highly successful Olympic Sports program in 1985. Miller is a native of Landis, N.C.

The Department requires its staff members and student-athletes to adhere to NCAA, state and federal laws regarding gambling. In the interest of fair competition and the growth and development of student-athletes, the Department strongly urges its friends and supporters to refrain from gambling/betting on contests involving collegiate competition and to abide by state and federal laws.
